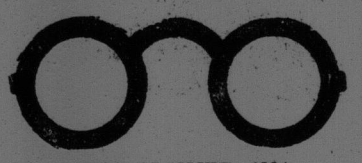

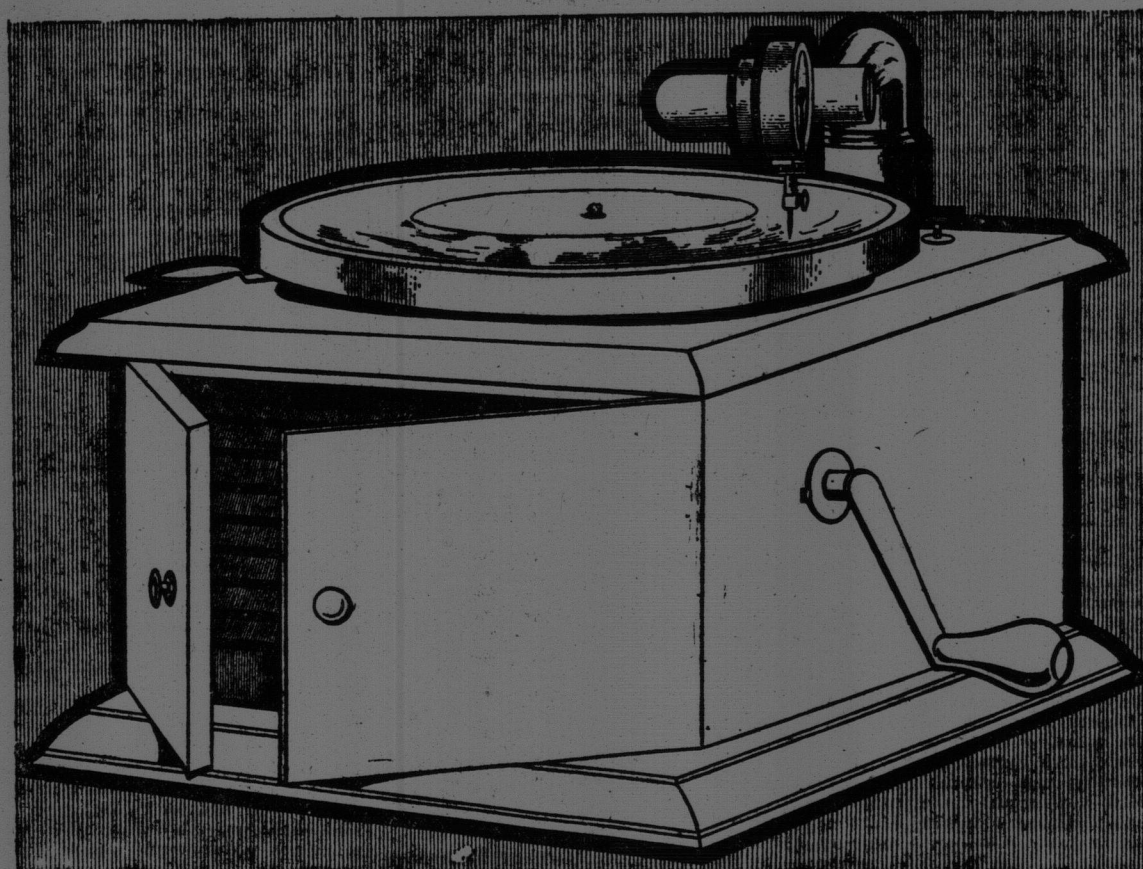

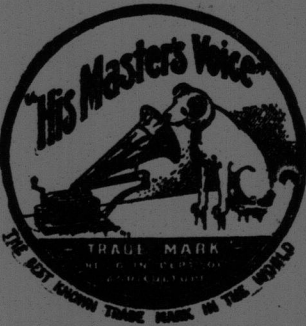

**GOVERNMENT POSITIONS FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS**

Will, However, Have to Take Examination, But Be Given Headicap Over Others

(Ottawa Free Press)  
 While no formal decision has yet been reached there is no doubt that provision will be made to employ a considerable number of returned soldiers in the civil service.

Dr. Adam Shortt, the chairman of the Civil Service Commission, said this morning that the question has been discussed with several of the commissioners and the government were heartily in sympathy with the idea.

"The impression prevails in some quarters that the competitive examination will be waived in the case of returned soldiers, but this is not correct. We will probably follow the British system," said Dr. Shortt. All candidates, returned soldiers, as well as others, will be required to take the examinations, but the soldiers will be allowed so many marks in consideration of their services to their country. They will start with a handicap over all other contestants. The concessions will vary with the grade.

Dr. Shortt said that there were many positions in the inside service such as packers and sorters, which requires only a minimum of clerical knowledge and the examination for which is of a very elementary character. Other positions, however, demanded certain scholastic qualifications, if the standard of the service was to be maintained. Dr. Shortt made it clear, however, that the commission would co-operate in every possible way with the government and would open the doors as widely as possible to the men who have served their country.

A large number of the disabled soldiers will be found positions in the outside service, and those who are returning now will be given positions in the militia department. There are plenty of positions, the salaries for which are paid out of the war votes, which they can fill.

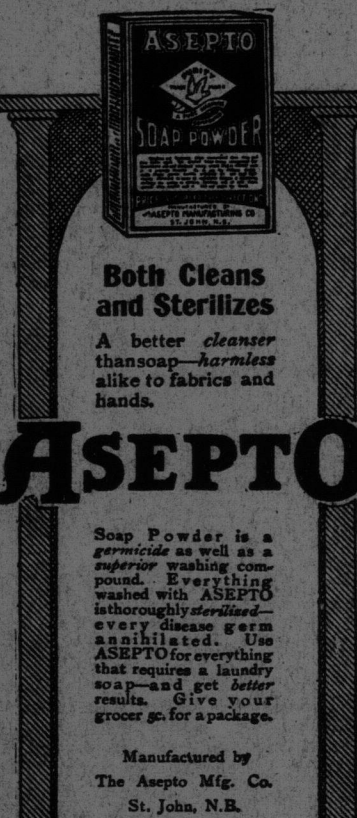
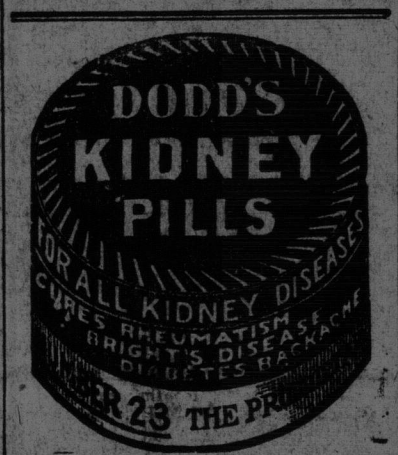
#### MINISTER ARRESTED ON SEDITION CHARGE LECTURED AND FREED

**Unlikely to Fail.**  
New York, Dec. 1.—To Judge from all the information available about the charges to be made against George Goulding, Canadian walker, before the local Registration Committee, Goulding will never be declared a professional. George Matthews, chairman of the Registration Committee, said last night that the letter from W. H. Parry, which would be the basis for charges is lacking in detail, and that it is even doubtful if Goulding's name will be mentioned at all.

Other rumors had it that Parry was depending on the help of another man, but that this other man has completely backed away from the case and will not have anything to do in the line of accusing Goulding.

What the A. A. C. officials and almost everybody else would like to know is the identity of the writer of a decoy letter to Goulding some time ago. This letter bore a Brooklyn postmark and the writer represented himself to be an A. U. official and the officer of one of the local clubs. He said he was running off a meet, and wanted to know how much Goulding wanted for expenses and advised the Canadian not to be cheap in his demands.

It was so unattractive an attempt at a "plant" that Goulding saw through it in an instant and immediately sent the letter to a friend of his in New York to look up the man with the "smooth" advice about the liberal expenses. The "A. A. C. official" could not be found, but the bar-writing was said to be familiar.

**WM. ANDREWS IS DROWNED IN HARBOR**

Engineer of Tug Victoria Falls Overboard

LIKELY SLIPPED ON ICE

Several Efforts at Rescue But None of Avail as Unfortunate Man Soon Sank -- Leaves Wife and Children

William Andrews, engineer of the tug Victoria, of the Norton Griffiths Company fleet, was drowned in the harbor this morning. Just how the accident happened is not known, but it is thought that he slipped on ice at the after portion of the boat and, losing his balance, fell overboard.

About half past eight o'clock, as the tug was proceeding down the harbor with a hoisting scow in tow en route to Courtenay Bay, Captain J. Smith heard cries for help. Looking out of the wheel-house he saw a man struggling in the water a short distance in the rear of his boat. He signalled the engine room for a reverse of engines, but as there was no one there, the call was unheeded. Crying out to Cook Archer Thurber, to take charge of the engine, the captain quickly cast off his tow and, turning the tug, tried to reach the spot where he had last seen the struggling man. He arrived too late, however, and despite his alertness in watching for sign of his reappearance, failed to again see the unfortunate man.

W. J. Quinn, superintendent of dredges for the Norton Griffiths Dredging Company, while waiting on the wharf at Reed's Point for one of his boats to come along, heard a cry for help and soon discerned a man struggling in the water some 300 yards away. He rushed to a motor boat, which was tied to the wharf, and starting the engine, headed for the place where he had last seen the unfortunate man. In the meantime a row boat containing members of the crew of the pilot boat Howard E. Troop was heading for the same spot, but they were unable to render any assistance, as the man apparently would not swim and had kept himself afloat for only a few minutes by frantically beating his arms in the water. They recovered his hat.

Mr. Andrews was in the employ of the Norton Griffiths Dredging Company for some time and was a good, steady, reliable workman. He was a general favorite with his fellow employees, and his tragic death cast a gloom over the entire staff. He was about thirty-five years of age and is survived by his wife and several children. It is understood that he is a resident of St. Andrews, and while in this city lived on board the tug.

Mr. Quinn soon had men grappling for the body and offered a reward of \$25 to the one who would recover it.
