FRESH TROUBLE IN NEAR EAST?

"Budding Turkish Menace Not Bluff"

London Paper's Correspondent Cables of Landing of Turkish Troops in Aid to Cut Off Allies at Dardanelles and Constantinople.

London, May 23.—Threats of fresh trouble in the Near East are attracting attention here. Referring to the reported wrecking of the bridge across the Maritza River connecting Adrianople and Karagatch, the Daily Telegraph's diplomatic correspondent says that, although the railway bridge has not yet been damaged, it is in danger. He recalls that the Turks are known to have mined it.

The budding Turkish menace cannot be dismissed as bluff and there is some realization in competent quarters that it must be promptly dealt with.

ALL'S WELL ON EASTER ISLAND

Schooner Brings Denial of Reports That It Has Sunk in Pacific.

Santiago, Chile May 23.—Recurrent rumors that Easter Island had sunk beneath the Pacific during the intense earthquakes of last November, have been proven unfounded. The fishing schooner Falcon, which left for the island in February, returned yesterday reporting that it is the Chilean Government as a penal colony, has a population of about 1,200. It is the easternmost inhabited member of the Polynesian group and is remarkable for its giant pieces of sculpture, apparently the work of a pre-historic people. The island lies 2,600 miles west of the Chilean coast.

BOOSTS MUSEUM FOR DOMINION

Royal Society President Says Canada Needs Building and Organization.

Ottawa, May 23.—Canada's need for an adequate national museum was spoken of by Dr. J. P. McCrurgh in his presidential address before the Royal Society last night. The present museum, while acknowledged to be fair was said to be in a state of "suspended animation." It was a state responsibility, Dr. McCrurgh said, that Canada should have a national museum for the collection and dissemination of information and where research material might be kept. A suitable and adequate home and definite organization were needed.

GIVES \$50,000 TO CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

Manchester, N. H., May 23.—The New Hampshire Children's Aid and Protective Society announces that Charles H. She was born in 1860 but it was not until 1906, when in thirty-nine years of age that she began to take part in the struggle for votes for women. She was imprisoned four times for her militant activities, then, disguised as a woman of the working class under the pseudonym of Jane Walton, was imprisoned in the Brixton prison.

DESCRIBES WORK OF SCOTLAND YARD

Sir William Horwood Says
Novelists Apply Name to
Only One Branch.

New York, May 23.—Brig-Gen. Sir William T. F. Horwood, Commissioner of Police of Scotland Yard, London, who was here for the international police conference, called for Liverpool on the White Star liner Celtic. He said that he had enjoyed his twenty-day visit in New York. Police Commissioner Enright and other officers of the department, with the police band and glee singers, gave the British police head a send-off at the pier.

Sir William thanked Detective Sergeant Bernard J. Flood for the care he had taken of him in New York, and told Commissioner Enright of the work done by Flood in France during the war in co-operation with the Scotland Yard forces detecting spies.

Just before the liner sailed a messenger rushed to the ship with a box of chocolates, which he handed to Dr. T. W. H. Atkins, the ship's surgeon. Sir William, who looked very "fit", remarked that he had perfectly recovered from the effects of the chocolates he had eaten in London a few weeks ago. In the statement prepared for reporters, the London Commissioner of Police said:

"The police system of Great Britain dates back over 1,000 years to the days of Alfred the Great, who appointed great officers, or carls, to assist and keep the King's peace. This system has grown to the present day, when the duty has fallen on local authorities, the counties and boroughs, with the sole exception of the police of London, which is responsible through its commission to the Secretary of State.

"I listened with great interest to the address given by Judge MeAdoo regarding the law relative to firearms, and afterwards discussed this subject at length with him and luckily had a copy of the English Firearms Act with me which I could give him. This law makes regulations for the manufacture and sale of firearms, and delegates to the police the granting or refusing of a permit to carry arms. The law has been of great assistance to the police in the prevention of crime.


"One of the most interesting addresses was that on traffic and street accidents. London, like New York, has its traffic problems, caused by the placing and collection of more vehicles on the streets than the streets can possibly hold. Anyone must realize that your Commissioner has a greater task to surmount than I have in London.

"I have frequently been asked during my stay what is Scotland Yard? Scotland Yard is the headquarters of the Metropolitan Police. It is there that the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis is assisted by four paid Deputy Assistant Commissioners and roughly 250 subordinate police officers and civil servants to carry out the duties of recruiting, organization and discipline of the 21,500 men who form the force.

"Each Assistant Commissioner has certain duties assigned to him by the Commissioner, one being charged with command of the celebrated Criminal Investigation Department, around which novelists have wound the synonyms of 'Scotland Yard'. The C. I. D. consists of 1,000 men, all recruited from the uniform branch of the force, and with the exception of about eighty distributed over the twenty-two divisions of the Metropolitan Police District. The eighty belonging to headquarters are at Scotland Yard, and are specialists in particular forms of crime. It is open to any Superintendent of a division who has any particular grave crime on hand to ask me to detail one or more of these men to assist him.

"I am also prepared to send a small detachment of these men outside the Metropolitan Police District, to assist any Chief Constable of the United Kingdom who requires assistance and writes or telephones me that he requires it.

"We do not thrust ourselves on the other forces for this purpose, but most chief constables in the United Kingdom from time to time avail themselves of our services. The population of the Metropolitan Police District, roughly 8,000,000, spread over an area of 700 square miles, is not so cosmopolitan as that of New York. Serious crimes

MAY 24 TIME OF DANGER FOR WOODS

Forestry Officials Prepare for Emergencies from Forest Fires.

As a result of the dry period preceding the Victoria day holiday on May 24th, when thousands of the residents of the province will answer to the call of the woods and streams, forestry officials are preparing for emergencies which may arise from forest fires. Victoria Day has always been regarded as one of the most dangerous periods of the fire season.

Already approximately fifty municipal fire wardens, appointed at the discretion of the county councilors, have been confirmed in their appointments as such by the Department of Lands and Mines, while additional municipal fire wardens are also being appointed in the parish districts remote from the direct supervision of the county councilors representing these districts. The municipal fire warden is vested with the same power in respect to the control of forest fires as held by the county councilors. At present York and Kings counties have led in the number of the appointments which have been made.

The school authorities are said to have taken up the matter of her absence with the parent, and this is believed to have influenced the girl to take poison.

She is described as a bright girl, distinctly clever, and not usually of a despondent nature. Inquiries at the hospital elicited the information that her condition is quite serious, though for the time being no fatal turn is expected.

6500 AT THE AUCTION OF SHOPPING CHAMPION

Gallion (Ohio) People Rush to Buy Souvenirs of Woman Who Spent Fortune on 'Bargains'.

Gallion, Ohio, May 23.—The last echo of romance broken off years ago was heard here in the sale of the possessions of Mrs. Emno Lee, known as "the shopping champion."





Pasteurization of Milk and Its Good Results
If order that the consumers of milk may have a better conception of what pasteurized milk is, and the treatment the raw milk receives from the producer to the pasteurization plants, and from the plants to the household, the Board of Health will furnish from time to time short articles which they respectfully ask the general public to read and digest. At the outset they wish to advise that pasteurization is not an experiment. It has long since passed the experimental stage, for in 1898 Nathan Straus erected a pasteurization plant on Randall's Island, New York, where city wells were cared for, and at which institution the death rate for the years 1905-07 was 41.80 per cent. average. 

DR. F. ZEIGFIELD, AGED FATHER OF PRODUCER, DIES

Founder of Chicago Musical College and Sponsor of Noted Artists Stricken in His Eighty-third Year.

Chicago, May 23.—Dr. Florens Zeigfeld, president emeritus of the Chicago Musical College, and father of Flo Zeigfeld, New York theatrical producer, died at his home here last week.

His two sons, Flo and W. K. Zeigfeld, and a daughter, Mrs. Willis E. Ruhl, of Detroit, were at his bedside when the end came. He was eighty-two years of age.

Dr. Zeigfeld was one of the great musical artists of his time. He was the pupil of such masters as Moschles, Pleydun, Pappeter, Lisst and Wagner, he also was the discoverer, sponsor, and instructor of some of the most accomplished artists of the present day.

Among students of the greatest contributors to the development of the musical centers of Europe and of the United States, he brought to the attention of American artists and audiences the names of such composers as Liszt, Mendelssohn, Chopin, and others.

As president of the Chicago Musical College, which he founded in 1867 and personally directed until 1916, he brought to this country such masters as Joseph Strauss, Emil Sauret, Alexander von Fellet, Arthur Friedheim, Rudolph Ganz, William Castle, and a host of others, many of whom were at various times on the faculty of the Chicago college.

In 1872 he won world fame by assembling at the Boston Peace Jubilee three of the most famous military bands of Europe, the state and court bands of France, Germany and England. He was decorated by France with the Cross of the Legion of Honor and was named Fellow of many of the leading artistic societies of the world, including the Academy of Letters and Art of Italy.

Dr. Zeigfeld was born June 10, 1843, in Jentz, Oldenburg, Germany, where his father occupied an official station in the royal court. In his sixth year he began the study of music, and before his sixteenth birthday he was graduated from the Leipzig Conservatory. He came to America in 1863, moving to Chicago in response to the "Go West" urge which then held sway in the East.

He was aided by Field and Leiter.

In the fast growing inland metropolis of less than 200,000 population, the talents of the young musician soon attracted the attention of civic leaders and soon afterward, at the behest of Marshall Field, Joseph Loeb and other prominent citizens, he was appointed to establish a musical center "commensurate with the material status of the city." The project early took form in the Chicago Musical College, and grew from a mere circle of enthusiasts meeting in the old Crosby Opera House.

Dr. Zeigfeld organized the 2d Regiment of Illinois National Guards, and was its first colonel. Governor Lowden appointed him a brigadier general in 1921.

He was chairman of the Board of Music awards of the World's Fair here in 1893.

Dr. Zeigfeld is survived by his wife, two sons and a daughter. His wife was Rosalie de Hez of France, a great granddaughter of General Grant, of Napoleon's staff.

NEAR END OF WORK AFTER 36 YEARS

Noted Astronomers Completing Map of the Heavens—Approximately 800,000,000 Stars.

Paris, May 23.—(A. P. By Mail)—What is regarded here as one of the most interesting and valuable results of modern studies in astronomy is nearing completion in the Paris Observatory after 86 years of painstaking labor. It is a new map of the heavens, the catalogue of the stars.

The compilation shows that there are approximately 800,000,000 heavenly bodies visible through the powerful telescopes.

Photographing the heavens was a plan first developed by the Paris Observatory, and its then director, Admiral Moche, was called here in 1887 on an international congress of astronomers which decided to map the heavens. There were 18 nations, including Mexico, Chile, and the republics of Argentina and Brazil, which agreed to contribute to this work.

The heavens were subdivided, with four French observatories taking the central zones of the heavens.

Ten thousand leaves of the photographic map contain stars to the fourteenth magnitude, whereof there are above twenty millions. Stars to the sixth magnitude may be seen with the naked eye, and above that, telescopes and other aids are needed.

In reality, it is explained, the number of stars appear to be infinite. As huge lenses are constructed, each increase in the size of the lens reveals a large number of stars.

A few years ago the number of stars was set at approximately one hundred millions. Now that number has been trebled, and as the explorers of new worlds in the universe progress their studies, they find space filled with stars, the light of which reaches the eye of the explorer after years of travel, so distant are these bodies.

Mapping the heavens was a task not undertaken by astronomers previous to 1887, and before the work could be started it was necessary to agree on plans concerning the size of the photographs and means of measurements.

The majority of the astronomers of the world used their ingenuity and learning in the task.

By means of this new map, fresh measurements of the location, size, and nature of the stars may be made by astronomers, and philosophic specula-

tion stimulated as to the inhabitants, if any, of the stars, and the general system and scheme of the universe.

riding, he said, several towns which were owned and controlled by the companies operating in them. In these towns the companies exercised control, and could refuse entry to any person they preferred not to admit. This did not make for good citizenship.

Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor, told the House that he had no official advice of the matter brought up by Mr. Neill. He was rather uncertain what action the Labor Department or Parliament could take in the matter.

A large number of people appeared to think that the Industrial Disputes Act gave the right to the Government to exercise control in cases of this kind. This was hardly the case, however. He hoped that no one had any doubt as to where he personally stood in the matter. He belonged to a Labor organization, and had represented one officially for a large number of years. In this period he had come into contact with employers who had refused to treat with unions, and therefore the case in point was not new to him. One of the Labor principles laid down in the treaty of peace at Versailles was the association for all lawful purposes by employees.

At the National Industrial Conference, held in Ottawa in 1919, the employers' committee had recommended that employers should admit the right of employees to join in lawful organizations. Another recommendation of employers was that these should not be required to discriminate as between employees of unions and those not members.

In view of this attitude of the employers at the conference, was it not passing strange that there were still found in various parts of Canada today employers adhering to the pre-war policy of denying the right of employees to organize for their protection? Others had, also.

The Powell River Pulp Company was not the only employer of labor in the Dominion which still maintained this position. There were other employers, and some of them large, which

the Labor Department had found to have very little regard for Labor organizations. Such employers were in the habit of making it very plain to their men what they should not do if they hoped to hold their jobs. Mr. Murdock thought it was rather fortunate that the particular matter in discussion had come so that Parliament might learn something of actual conditions.

Mr. Murdock concluded by stating that the matter came within the jurisdiction of the Province of British Columbia under the B. N. A. Act.

J. S. Woods (Liberal, Kings, P. E. I.) urged the Government to do all in its power to secure redress for the men. He agreed that if Parliament could protect the rights of property it could or should protect the rights of workmen. The Government should get the workmen of Canada know where its sympathies lay.

Thomas Vren (Liberal, LeBlondier) took the ground that it was a provincial matter, and one of civil contract.

T. G. McBride (Progressive, Carleton) was surprised to see this particular company behave in such a manner. The Government should take steps to protect the men's rights.

W. C. Good (Progressive, Brant) said that he did not like to see the Government sit helplessly in such a manner. He blamed the capitalistic system which had brought instability, inefficiency, sabotage and bloodshed. There would always be industrial trouble until this system was replaced by something on a more cooperative basis.

Premier's Declaration.

Premier King urged the House to remember that all the details they had about the matter were those contained in the communication placed before the House. But he did not hesitate for one moment to say that if the facts were as stated in the letter, and he believed that they were, it should be intimated to the company—that this Parliament was behind the articles in the Versailles treaty by which the workers had the right to organize.

He thought that it would be sufficient if the action of the company was drawn to the fact that Parliament had debated the matter, and that public opinion had been focused on the matter. If that were not sufficient, he would be much surprised if the Parliament of Canada could not find some means to deal satisfactorily with the matter.

L. W. Humphrey (Progressive, East Kootenay) expressed disappointment that Mr. Murdock had not gone further in announcing what his department was prepared to do. The right of organization among employees was recognized by employers throughout Canada, and the matter brought up by Mr. Neill involved an important principle. The organization of workmen in Labor Unions made for greater efficiency and better work.

Mr. Neill said that the discussion show that there was need for legislation to deal with such situations as the one he had brought before the House. A man selling his labor to another certainly did not sell his soul to his employer, regardless of whatever contract he might sign. If Mr. Murdock would take action along the lines indicated by the Prime Minister Mr. Neill thought that would be satisfactory.

HIGHER SALES BUT A SMALLER PROFIT

Annual Meeting of Directors of Cornwall Cotton Mills - High Price of Raw Cotton.

Very small profit on the operations of the last year were reported at a meeting of the shareholders of the Cornwall and York Cotton Mills Company, Limited, held yesterday afternoon. There was an increase in total sales of \$446,830 during the year. The lack of a larger surplus was attributed to competition from the United States and to the high price of raw cotton.

The directors, in their report, expressed great regret at the death of their fellow director, James Manchester, who had been associated with the company since it was founded. The board was re-elected, with the addition of H. F. Puddington in the late Mr. Manchester's place.

Kearns complimented Dempsey on his selection of a training camp and said that the quarters here were far superior to those used by the champion at Toledo and Atlantic City before his bouts with Willard and Carpenter respectively.

The champion himself declined to comment on his future bouts, declaring there was time enough to do that after he had beaten Gibbons. Dempsey took a five-mile run, and he indulged in a session of shadow boxing and rope jumping, he will probably start boxing on Monday or Tuesday.

George Godfrey, negro giant, Frank Powers, New York middleweight, and Jack Burke, Pittsburgh heavyweight, are at his camp and other sparring partners, including Joe Benjamin and Willie Mehan of California; Harry Drake and Billy Wells, British boxers, are on their way here.










