MRS. PERRY IN COURT CHARGED WITH MURDER

Former St. John Woman Remanded Till Tomorrow

Daughter's Fiance Accused as Accessory in Slaying of Yarmouth Captain—Witnesses From Montreal to Be Heard.

Yarmouth, N. S., April 20.—Charged with murdering her husband at his home here on the night of Saturday, Feb. 25, Clara Elizabeth Perry was arraigned before Stipendiary Magistrate Pelton in the Yarmouth police court this morning and remanded until tomorrow morning, when the preliminary examination will begin.

When Mrs. Perry entered the prisoner's box and the stipendiary read the charge accusing the widow of the "wilful killing and slaying with malice aforethought" of her husband, she showed no apparent concern, nor did her countenance change in the least.

Mrs. Perry was formerly of West St. John.

Young Syrian Is Killed; Part of City Rocked by Explosion

Charles Random, 18 Years Old, Loses Life as Dynamite Wrecks Shack at Newman Brook Work and Shatters Glass in Houses in Large Area.

As a result of frightful injuries received in an accidental explosion of dynamite at Newman Brook this morning, Charles Random, of 30 Albion street, a Syrian, died soon after being taken to the General Public Hospital.

The accident happened between 11 and 11:30 o'clock. What was the exact cause of the explosion is in doubt and will likely remain a mystery. The shack in which the dynamite was stored was erected on the side of the filling on the southern side of Newman Brook. It was also used for a blacksmith shop and Random was engaged in the work of sharpening drills.

Although very little material was blown into the street, the shock shattered every pane of glass in the fronts of the houses from the bridge along Adelaide road to the corner of the Old Adelaide road and on the other side of the bridge for more than 100 yards.

The detonation of the explosion caused a hole in the ground under the shack about eight feet in diameter. It is estimated that there were about ten pounds of dynamite on hand. Police Sergeant Rankine, who was on the scene soon after the accident, said that there was evidently a fire in the small forge, and the burning embers were scattered about after the explosion.

An alarm was sent in from box 134 by Frank Shannon, and was responded to by the North Main fire department and No. 2 Salvage Corps. It was realized that Random was seriously injured and instead of waiting the arrival of an ambulance, which was called by telephone, he was placed on No. 2 Salvage wagon and hurried to the hospital.

Mr. Moses, who was nearby at the time, went immediately to central police station and returned to the scene of the explosion in the immediate vicinity of the bridge suffered most severely from the shock of explosion.

While nobody in the houses was injured, some of the occupants were quite badly shocked. One lady said that the sensation was as though the house had been lifted two or three feet from the ground and then dropped heavily back again. Others living farther from the scene said that the shock caused the houses to rattle for several seconds.

BRIAND TO HYTHE TO CONFER WITH LLOYD GEORGE

France Said to Hold She Can Occupy Ruhr Region Herself and Bring Germany to Terms.

London, April 20.—Owing to the inability of Premier Lloyd George to leave the country during the industrial crisis, Aristide Briand, French premier, will cross the channel on Saturday, for a preliminary conference with Lloyd George at Hythe, prior to a discussion of the Allied plans on the question of German reparations.

There is an inclination, especially in Liberal and Labor circles in England, to watch closely any new move on the part of France against Germany, not so much, it is said, because they do not desire to see Germany made to pay the full reparations, but on account of what the further occupation of Germany is likely to cost the already over-burdened taxpayer.

MINERS OWNERS HAVE PROPOSALS TO MAKE TO MEN

Many Demands Met is Statement After Meeting

Coal Diggers Reaffirm Demand for National Wage Board and National Wage Pool—Say Lloyd George Has Not Grasped Essential Features.

London, April 20.—British mine owners, who met here yesterday, announced last night that the meeting had completed proposals which would be submitted in an effort to secure a settlement of the coal strike. These proposals, it was declared, met many of the demands of the miners and would care for men who were inadequately paid.

Men's Demand Reaffirmed

Demands for the establishment of a national wage board and a national wage pool have been reaffirmed by large majorities by district committees of miners throughout the country, so it is said by the Daily Herald, the organ of labor. It says that these meetings, which were held preparatory to a conference of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain here on Friday, stood fourteen to one in favor of the demands of the union.

Statement was issued by the Miners' Federation last night declaring that Premier Lloyd George's address in the House of Commons on Monday did not carry the possibility of a settlement any further than it stood last week.

The statement declares that Lloyd George "has not yet grasped the essential features of the national wage pool, and that he is 'obsessed by the view that the miners demand a pool of profits, whereas their proposal is remote from the averaging of profits."

It is suggested that there shall be levied a certain amount on each ton of coal, this money being used for the purpose of establishing a national wage pool. It is proposed that the sum levied should be figured as one of the elements of the cost of production. The statement asserts that this method of providing funds for the pool is perfectly feasible, but that the mine owners have refused to accept it "on inadequate and mistaken grounds."



From 2,000 to 2,500 men who will thus be released will be distributed among the other collieries. Nos. 5 and 10 are at Reserve; Nos. 11 and 24 in the Dominion No. 4 district, town of Glouce Bay. No. 24 was only recently being opened. No. 15 is one of the Waterford collieries. All five collieries are expensive to operate. A decision, however, has not yet been reached.

LEFT ON DOORSTEP

Mother Waited to See Child Picked Up - London, April 20. - From an unexpected quarter help was forthcoming for Violet May Buckle, seventeen, who appeared on remand at London Mansion House on a charge of abandoning her sixteen-month-old baby boy. It was announced that a city man who had lost his wife and child had offered to adopt the baby, and was, for the present, placing it in a home, paying 15s. a week. He had also obtained a situation for the mother at 12s. a week. He was a stranger to them. The magistrate sanctioned the arrangement, which had been investigated by the probation officer, and found satisfactory, and formally bound defendant over for a year. The infant was left in a doorway in Fenchurch street. Pinned on its cape was a card begging the finder to take care of him and give him a good home, as his father had never said anything towards his sustenance, and completely deserted him. Defendant gave herself up to the police next day, but stated that she had waited to see the child picked up by two young ladies, who seemed kind to him. The father, she asserted, is an officer in the Middlesex Regiment, now in Egypt. She had recently lost her situation as a typist, and could not keep her child.

ECONOMIC MOVE IN BRITISH NAVY Atlantic and Mediterranean Fleets to be Reduced One-Fifth - Change of Organization Also in Atlantic Squadrons. London April 18. - (By Canadian Press) - The Admiralty under its new administration, continues to set an example of drastic economy, which according to the "big navy" critics is bringing the country perilously near the danger-line. In accordance with the policy, announced by Lord Lee, of reducing the number of capital ships in full commission from 20 to 16, the Atlantic and Mediterranean fleets are each to be reduced by two big ships. In addition, two admirals will hand down their flags without replacement in the Atlantic battle fleet, which will have in future four flag officers instead of six. This fleet has hitherto consisted of the Queen Elizabeth as fleet flagship, the first squadron of five vessels, the second battle squadron of four, and the battle-cruiser of four. The battleship Royal Sovereign is to be withdrawn from the first squadron and the Tiger from the battle-cruiser. The Royal Sovereign was reduced to reserve complement at Portsmouth on January 28 as a temporary measure, as she is to undergo an extensive refit in the dockyard for which \$28,121 is taken in the new estimates. She will now join the reserve fleet permanently, with three-fifths complement. The withdrawal of the Tiger will be postponed until shortly before the commissioning of the Renown, now under refit at Portsmouth after her dominion cruises with the Prince of Wales. The Renown is expected to rejoin the fleet next September. In the Mediterranean a battle squadron of six vessels has been stationed since the armistice. These six at present are the Iron Duke, Emperor of India, Ajax, Benbow, Centurion, and King George V. The Emperor of India and Centurion are, on April 1, or as few days.

THE WHEAT OUTLOOK (Ottawa Journal) The United States Department of Agriculture reports winter wheat in fine condition and the prospects of a yield of 44,000,000 bushels in excess of the crop of 1920. The anticipated total was exceeded only in 1914, 1915, and 1919. The acreage of 1919 was 49,105,000, whereas last autumn only 40,605,000 acres were seeded. The conditions this spring, however, are more favorable than they were at the corresponding period two years ago. The total production in the United States for 1921 is estimated at 621,000,000 bushels. This gives the assurance of sufficient for domestic consumption and a considerable volume available for export. In that fact it is to be found ample cause for an optimistic view of the situation as to food and food prices. The outlook in Canada is also most promising, although on this side of the line, especially in the west, the crop prospects cannot be definitely ascertained until spring wheat is well above the ground. That will not occur until late in May. Vienna hears that guarantees against a return of former Emperor Charles to the Hungarian throne are being prepared at Belgrade by Jugo-Slavia, Czecho-Slovakia and Rumania and will be presented to the Budapest government in a few days.



**IN PARLIAMENT**

The Commons Divided on Matter of Militia Estimates; Government Has Majority.

Ottawa, April 20.—Yesterday in the House of Commons the prime minister introduced a bill to enable Grand Trunk arbitration proceedings to be continued on surrender of control by the Grand Trunk directors.

A bill was introduced to amend the inland revenue act in regard to power of officials to make seizures.

There was discussion in committee of a bill ratifying the trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies. The bill was read a third time.

The resolution was passed and bill given first reading to amend the opium and narcotic drug act.

Third reading was given to a bill to extend the time for payment of certain debentures issued by the harbor commissioners of Montreal, and to a bill empowering the issue of a five-cent nickel coin.

On supply motion, Donald Sutherland (South Oxford) declared that a return tabled in the house (for which he had asked) was incorrect, misleading and incomplete.

In supply on the militia estimates I. E. Pedlow (South Renfrew) moved that a vote for salaries be reduced by \$150,000. This was defeated by a government majority of seventeen. The progressives voted with the opposition. Another opposition motion, sought a reduction of \$76,000 in the amount provided for command pay. This was defeated by forty. Progressives and cross-benchers voted with the government. A third opposition motion sought to cut in half a vote of \$1,500,000 for militia drill. This motion was defeated by twenty-five.

An item of \$450,000 for cadet services was carried. A vote of \$264,846 was under discussion when the committee rose at 12:55 a. m.

The senate, in a brief sitting, gave first reading to several bills from the commons and adjourned till three o'clock today.

**CITY COUNCIL**

In the absence of the mayor Commissioner Frink presided at yesterday's meeting of the common council. The report of the road engineer on the Douglass avenue tenders was not presented as the acceptance would necessitate a bond issue and a full vote of the council. The report of the committee was received. An application from the residents of Seely street extension and Pine street extension for water and sewerage facilities was referred to Commissioner Jones. It was decided to grant permission to James Cooper to erect a gas-main tank at 28 Thorne Avenue, provided it is approved by the underwriters.

Mr. Frink said that the regular mark of the Canadian Pacific Railway for its poles was an "X" and the company asked that it be permitted to use this mark in lieu of the mark designated by the council.

Reference to this matter was, on motion, ordered changed to permit the company to use its own mark.

By buying cement in small quantities, Mr. Frink explained, it cost the city \$5.60 a barrel. By purchasing a carload of it would cost only \$4.80, less discount and cost of bags, bringing the net cost down to approximately \$4. On motion, the public works department was authorized to purchase one carload of cement, the public works and water and sewerage departments to pay for it.

Mr. Thornton presented a bill of \$9,397.71 from the N. B. Power Company for street lighting for the quarter ended March 31. The original amount was \$9,798.71, less \$404 for lights out, leaving a net amount of \$9,394.71. The bill was ordered paid.

TWO ARRESTS IN PERRY CASE




CONFERENCE ON  
BRIDGE MATTER  
HELD IN OTTAWA

Ottawa, April 19—For nearly two  
hours this afternoon the minister of  
public works, Hon. F. B. McCurdy,  
listened to the discussion from all angles  
of the Canadian Pacific plans for a rail-  
way bridge over the St. John river above  
the Reversing falls. The St. John deputation  
warmly pressed its views that the  
bridge should be raised to such a height  
as would give a clearance of 84½ feet  
to vessels passing under it. The Cana-  
dian Pacific engineers adhered to their  
view that the plans approved of last No-  
vember by the department of public  
works should stand.  
Departmental engineers were also  
heard. The deputation from St. John  
consisted of Mayor Schofield, Messrs. F.  
C. Beattie, Alex. Wilson, George S.  
Cushing and R. H. Cushing, the latter  
saying that he had come with the dele-  
gation at the request of Premier Foster.  
Of the Canadian Pacific officials present  
there were F. L. Wanklyn and Messrs.  
Fairbairn, Mottley and Draper. St.  
John members, S. E. Elkin, M. P., and  
Hon. R. W. Wignmore, minister of cus-  
toms and inland revenue, were with the  
delegation, and so were Senator W. H.  
Thorne of St. John, and Major General  
H. H. McLean, member for Royal.  
Among the departmental engineers  
present were the deputy minister of pub-  
lic works, James B. Hunter, Alex. Gray  
of St. John and E. D. Lafleur. The  
minister reserved his decision.

Would Hinder Shipping.

This afternoon George S. Cushing and  
F. C. Beattie presented the  
building of the new bridge, according  
to the present plans, would interfere for  
all time to come with the provision of  
facilities for the operation of more than  
84½ feet. The reply of the Canadian Pacific  
representatives was rather startling.  
They said the company was in favor  
of removing the old bridge. It had  
been the natural conclusion of everyone  
here that the new bridge was to take  
the place of the old, but it was said  
today that the company would repair  
the old bridge and let it stand. It was  
also contended that the highway arch  
bridge had been designed according to  
the statement of the designer, Mr. Dugan,  
to give in effect as much freedom  
of navigation as the old cantilever rail-  
way bridge. At the sides of the arch  
this was not so, but at the peak of the  
arch the conditions allowed for greater  
clearance. It was said that the piers  
for the new railway bridge have been  
built and that the superstructure has  
been purchased and is now almost com-  
pletely fabricated.  
As the original plans of the Canadian  
Pacific Railway were accepted by the  
department it was made abundantly  
clear at the conference that if the  
height of the bridge is increased seven  
feet the federal government will have to  
pay for it. Mr. Fairbairn estimated the  
cost of increasing the height at \$3,000.  
No decision was reached, but it will  
be announced towards the end of the week.  
The conference came to an end at 6  
o'clock.

Empress of France

As this is the last trip of the C.P.O.S.  
steamer Empress of France to St. John  
this season an informal luncheon was  
held in honor of Premier Foster, who  
is to sail on this steamer on Fri-  
day, and city officials. Captain E. Cook,  
commander of the steamer, was a genial  
host, and others present were Hon. W.  
E. Foster, J. H. Frink, acting mayor;  
Commissioner Bullock, Commissioner  
Jones and Commissioner Thornton, Dr.  
L. M. Curran, M.P.P.; J. C. Chesley, F.  
R. Taylor, Captain J. T. Walsh, general  
manager of the C.P.O.S.; Commander G.  
O. R. Elliott, general superintendent;  
Carleton Brown, purchasing agent and  
Captain Sibbons, staff captain of the  
Empress of France. Captain Cook made  
a brief but hearty address of welcome  
and Dr. Frink, Captain Walsh and the  
premier also made short speeches, telling  
of the cordial relations between the city,  
the province and the C. P. R. Follow-  
ing the luncheon the guests made an in-  
spection of the fine steamer and were  
much impressed with the complete ap-  
pointments for the safety, convenience  
and comfort of the passengers.

GIRL'S OSTRICH APPETITE

London, April 20—Nearly 200 gram-  
ophone needles, pieces of tin from a sa-  
ndrine box, and a pen nib, were found in  
the stomach of a girl who was operated  
on at Harrogate Infirmary. When, suf-  
fering intense pain, she was seen by the  
family doctor, he found that she had  
swallowed a piece of tin. X-rays re-  
vealed a solid mass of foreign matter, about  
the size of a match-box. The medical  
men were surprised at the little perfor-  
ation of the internal organs. As some  
of the needles were rusty, and others  
bright, it is assumed they were swallowed  
at intervals. She has been discharged  
from the hospital cured.



The death of Daniel G. Toole occurred at his residence 228 St. George street, West Side, after a few days illness. Mr. Toole was well known on the West side, where he resided all his life. Besides his wife, he leaves two daughters—Mrs. Fenwick L. Craft and Mrs. John J. Burt, both of the West side. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 2:30 from his late residence.

HAMPTON ENTERTAINMENT.
A pleasing entertainment was given last night in the Agricultural Hall, Hampton, when the Hampton Dramatic Club presented their three-act farce "The Circus Girl" in aid of a fund towards the erection of church hall in the parish. The proceeds amounted to about \$100. In addition to the several specialties were given in which Mrs. H. M. Campbell, C. P. Wetmore, G. Kenneth Robb and Masters Cedric Taylor and Edwin Swenson took part. One of the outstanding features of the entertainment was the beautiful scenery which had been obtained for the occasion. Rev. C. G. Lawrence was chairman.

MISSIONARIES HERE FROM INDIA

Presbyterian Workers on the Melita—Speak of Their Work.

Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Graham, two missionaries from India, were passengers on the C. P. O. S. liner Melita, which arrived in port last night from Liverpool. Mr. Graham is a son of Rev. D. Graham of Edmonton, and his wife was formerly Miss Conpton of Prince Edward Island. They are returning to Canada on a furlough and will first visit relatives in Montreal, after which they will proceed to P. E. Island. In the fall they will go west and remain there until they return to resume their work in India.

Mr. Graham has been in India for six and a half years, and Mrs. Graham for two and a half years. They were married last summer, and are residents of Rassalpara, where the former is in charge of the medical work in the hospital. They are both members of a Presbyterian mission.

When Mrs. Graham first went to India she was attached to the Dhar hospital, but after her wedding last year she took charge of all medical work in the hospital at Rassalpara, Mhow. There are 300 families, all Christians, in their village and are looked after by Mrs. Graham, who is ably assisted by Doctor Bunyan and his sister, Doctor Shundy. Two Indian maidens assist in nursing. In addition to members of the village, scores of people from surrounding districts come to them for treatment. Speaking to the Times, Mrs. Graham said that the work is largely among the children, who suffer from eye diseases. They also instruct all regarding proper sanitary methods in their mode of living and also on hygiene.

Mr. Graham's activities are along industrial lines. He has a large school where boys are educated, and is also instructed in carpentry work, the manufacture of silk, carpets, printing, etc. He also started an agricultural school just before leaving on his furlough. In addition to these activities, both Mr. and Mrs. Graham devote a period every day to evangelical work and have large classes of natives who are studying the Christian religion. They report two of their greatest triumphs the conversion of two Brahmins. One is a young man, who was ostracized by his relatives for becoming a Christian, and the other was an old Hindu priest. Learning of the teachings of Mr. Graham, he went to see him and was converted. He is now going about preaching the Christian doctrine to his former followers, and is reported doing very effective work. Both Mr. and Mrs. Graham are happy in their work, and although they are delighted to be back in Canada they are already looking forward to their return to their home in Rassalpara.

ROADS OPENED FOR AUTOMOBILES

Some Released in Statement Today—Request to Pleasure Riders—Trucks Still Barred.

The provincial road engineer, B. M. Hill, arrived in the city on Tuesday and after examination of several roads leading out of St. John, authorizes the statement that the following roads are open for automobile traffic, namely:
The Loch Lomond road as far as the Upstead St. Martins road; the Golden Grove road as far as the junction of the Church Land road and the French Village road as far as Kellar's Corner. The Rothesay Avenue road as far as Gondola point; the Westfield road as far as Westfield Beach; the St. John-St. Stephen road as far as Musquash, and the Red Head road to Mispec.

Business conditions require the opening of these roads earlier than would be justified for pleasure, and the provincial engineer hopes that automobiles used for pleasure only will not make excessive use of these highways before May 1.

The Westfield road is still in the hands of the contractors who are completing the gravelling and therefore automobiles must assume certain risks and be subject to any delay.
Mr. Hill hopes that the road from Rothesay to Sussex will be available for travel in a few days but owing to certain sections still retaining the frost, he considers it inadvisable to open it now. This condition also applies to roads on the Kingston Peninsula and other centres in the southern part of the province where shaded roads have prevented the frost from coming out as early as in the more open sections.

FERGUSON SAYS THAT HE IS GUILTY

Fredericton Post Office Clerk Remanded for Sentence—Business Notes.

Fredericton, N. B., April 20—The case of George R. Ferguson, post office clerk, came up in the police court this morning. Adjournment applied for by R. B. Hanson, K. C. counsel for the accused, was refused by Magistrate Limerick who said that he would allow several days after the prisoner might plead, for the preparation of a statement of extenuating circumstances as forecasted by counsel. After private consultation with the accused and Post Office Inspector H. W. Woods, Mr. Hanson returned to the court room and the accused elected to be tried by the police magistrate and pleaded guilty to the charge that between August, 1920, and April 11, 1921, he stole postal letters. Magistrate Limerick then remanded him until the 27th for sentence.

TELL OF THEFTS AT LA TOUR

Witnesses in Case of Frederick Roberts Testify in the Police Court.

As a result of an investigation by the detective department into recent thefts from LaTour Apartments, Frederick Roberts testified in the police court this morning, on suspicion of stealing a revolver, valued at \$5, from George Gibbs; six shirts, valued at \$9, from Charles H. MacDonald; and also on suspicion of breaking and entering the room of Mr. MacDonald and stealing a watch, valued at \$30.

Mr. MacDonald gave evidence. He said the accused was at one time a porter in the apartments.
Detective Biddiscombe told of searching the room of the accused in the Windsor Hotel and finding six shirts identified by the complainant. With Detective Donahue he said he had a conversation with the accused which led to a search in another room, where they found a watch sewed in the corner of a mattress.
Mr. Gibbs, who occupies a room in LaTour Apartments, said that he missed his revolver. He said the accused in the course of his duties would have access to the rooms. The case was postponed.
Two men charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and were remanded. One man who was arrested on a similar charge, put up a deposit last night, but failed to appear this morning.
