

WILSON'S REPLY ALMOST READY

Washington Does Not Regard Situation Acute

Answer to Allies May Go Forward Today — French Political Writer Summarizes the Situation re Adriatic Business.

Washington, Feb. 21.—With President Wilson's reply to the note of the Allied premier on the Adriatic question almost ready for dispatch, officials here have felt it best to wait until they have ascertained the situation as acute, nor do they expect that negotiations will take such a turn that the United States would be forced to consider whether or not it could become a party to the treaty of Versailles.

CALLS ON FRANCE TO MAKE READY HER AIR-FLEET

Paris, Feb. 21.—Pleas that "something be done for French aviation," which is described to be in a state of paralysis are made by the newspaper Liberte, which asserts that the next war will be won or lost through the state of efficiency attained by air forces in peace time.

The newspaper states that Great Britain has appropriated 215,000,000 sterling for its air service, 22,000,000 being for civil aviation.

SAY THEY WILL CLOSE CIGARETTE FACTORY

Dresden, Feb. 21.—Employees in the cigarette factory here have been notified that work in the establishment will cease on March 8. Meanwhile an effort is being made to obtain the lowering of the government tax of 75 per cent on tobacco. Other manufacturers are threatening to join the lockout.

INSPECTED LIMESTONE DEPOSIT

Fredrick Gleason—Hon. J. F. Tweeddale returned last evening from Upper Kent, Carleton county, where he had been inspecting a deposit of grey limestone which had been reported from that locality. A sample of the deposit was taken by the minister, who will send it to Ottawa for an analysis to see if it will be good for fertilizing purposes when ground. Should the limestone be reported of a good quality, it will mean much for the farming country in that region. The minister also proceeded to Lunenburg, where he viewed the location of a bridge to be built across that stream.

ARRANGE FOR MEETING

SWISS TO SEND FOOD TO AUSTRIANS

New York, Feb. 21.—Millie Liston, sixty years old, an actress on the stage and in moving pictures for more than thirty-five years, died yesterday in Bellevue hospital of pneumonia. Her husband, who has been married for more than half a century, retired about four years ago. Mrs. Liston was a native of Durham, Canada. She appeared with Annette Kellerman in "A Daughter of the Gods," and in thirty other plays.

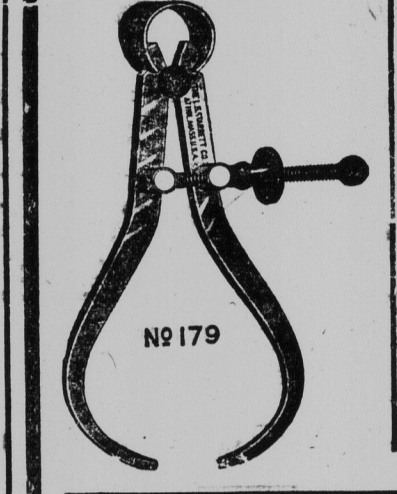

SHOOTSON, KILLS SELF AS WIFE DIES

Grief-Crazed Father Sends Bullet Into Boy's Head, Then Ends Own Life—Tragedy Follows Vigils.

Garfield, N. J., Feb. 19.—Had an hour after his wife died of influenza. Jim Fromberger, 29 years old, carried his son, John, Jr., 15-months-old, into an adjoining room at their home at 134 Schley street, and after placing the child in a comfortable position on a pillow in a bed, shot the boy dead, the father then turned his pistol on himself, and sent a bullet into his temple, causing instant death.

Fromberger, an electrician, was known among his neighbors as a specially devoted to his wife and child. When Mrs. Fromberger was confined to her bed with influenza two weeks ago, her husband gave up his position with the National Electric Company, of Passaic, N. J., in order that he might nurse her.

Mrs. Thomas Adametz, mother of Mrs. Fromberger, lives with the couple in a neat little house. Although she insisted there was no need of Fromberger leaving home, he insisted that because of his mother-in-law's poor health, he must remain constantly at his wife's bedside.

Fromberger felt his wife's pulse at 8.30 this morning and found she was dead. He said nothing to her, but calmly lifted his son from the bed. He carried the boy and for about fifteen minutes, Mrs. Adametz said, rocked him to and fro without uttering a word.

An ambulance hurriedly was summoned from St. Mary's hospital. Mrs. Fromberger and her son were hurried to the hospital. There the physicians declared the father had been shot in the head and the bullet had entered the brain.

Both the neighbors and the police in the neighborhood were amazed by the grief of the father, and the fact that his son would not receive the Reformed Presbyterian church burial.

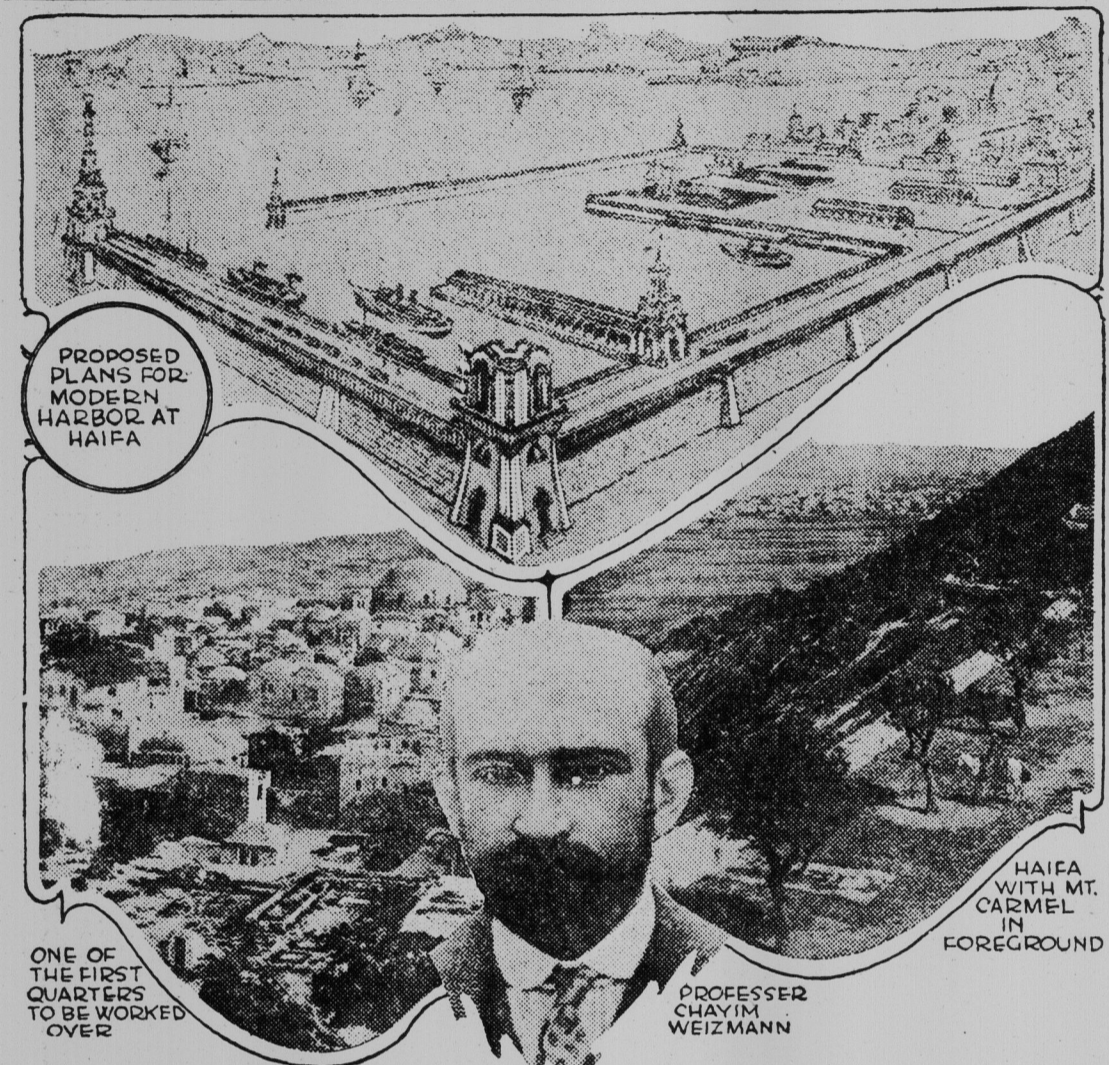
CANADIAN GIRLS ARE WELCOME AT WOMEN'S HOSTEL

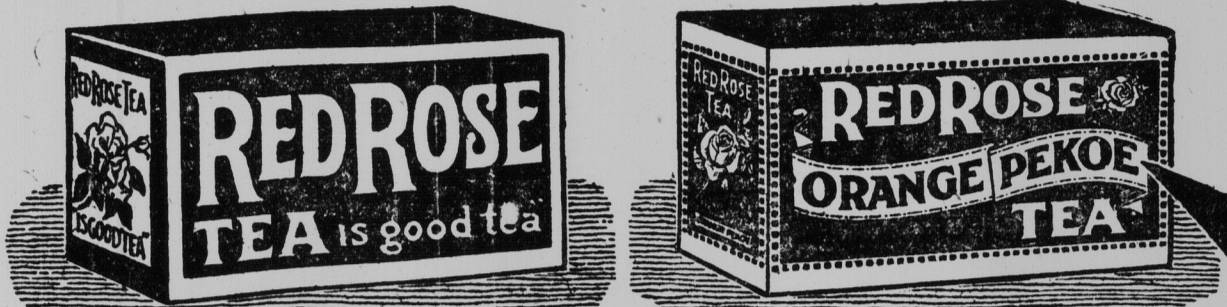
The Arcadians.

FIRST STUDENT OF KING'S COLLEGE

(Occasional in Halifax Recorder).

Bishop John Inglis, the third Bishop of Nova Scotia, stood first upon the list of students at the opening of the academy at Windsor in November, 1788. In October, 1788, when the Loyalists were departing from New York for the remaining colonies of Great Britain, in North America, five clergymen (three of whom were afterward bishops), addressed a letter to Sir Guy Carleton, then in New York, dwelling upon the importance of the immediate establishment, in Nova Scotia, of a seminary of learning "which (as they observe in their letter)" in conjunction with the episcopate in "Nova Scotia, recommended by your excellency will diffuse religion, literature, loyalty, and good morals here."

This may be regarded as the first suggestion for the establishment of a college in Nova Scotia, and there can be no doubt that the seminary, then contemplated, was intended by the five clergymen who interested themselves for its establishment to be in connection with the established church. The letter was signed by Charles Inglis, H. Addison, Jonathan O'Dell, Benjamin Moore and Charles Morgan.

In a letter to Richard Cumberland, the king's agent for Nova Scotia, dated Jan. 27, 1789, the bishop writes: "Our academy goes on extremely well. At the next meeting of our assembly I shall endeavor to have the allowance of £400 a year for the academy made permanent."

If I succeed in this I shall then beg leave to apply for your assistance, which you were so good as to offer in applying to government for help to enlarge the plan of this seminary and place it on a more respectable footing. There are a number of Halifax names in the first list, sons of prominent people of Halifax. Many of the students went into the army and navy, and a number rose to be chief justices and judges in Nova Scotia and Canada.

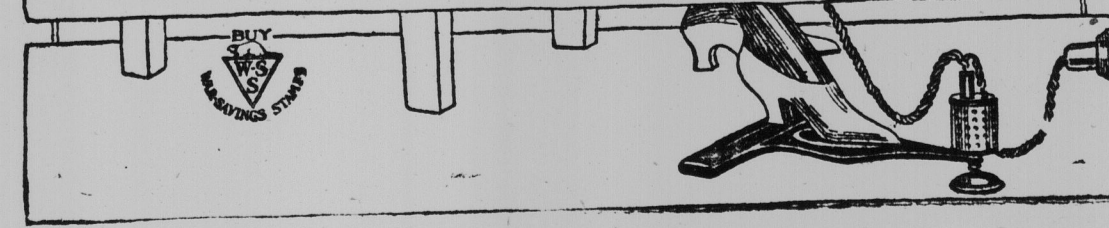

EXCHANGE RATES AND EMPIRE TRADE

T. B. Macaulay Makes a Contribution to the Discussion on This Subject of the Hour.

To the Editor of the Montreal Gazette:—I take this opportunity to express my hearty concurrence in most of the remarks in your valuable editorial of last Tuesday. You have rendered public service by drawing further attention to the seriousness of the exchange situation, and to the far-reaching results of the various regulations under discussion.

May I again briefly re-state the problem? If a Canadian merchant has \$10,000 to expend, his money may be equal to perhaps \$8,260 in New York, or \$13,090 in London, if the pound is considered worth its nominal gold value. The goods he will buy in one country or the other, but if the goods come from the United States he will pay duty on but \$8,200, while if they come from Britain, he will be penalized by having to pay on \$13,500. As you say, this regulation "obviously more than wipes out the preferential rate."

This discrimination against imports from the Mother Country in favor of the United States comes at a time when it is the patriotic duty of every Canadian to buy in Britain instead of New York, in order to maintain the value of sterling exchange, and thus avoid the collapse of our export business in farm products and manufactures.

The regulation also causes loss to the government, for, as you point out, if the American dollar were taken at its real value in Canadian currency, the customs revenue would be enlarged because of the great preponderance of imports from the United States.

You have drawn attention to the fact that this regulation is at variance with the law, which provides that other currencies shall be taken at their actual value as compared with the standard dollar of Canada, in so far as such comparative values are known. As you very rightly say, either the practice should be amended to conform to the law, or the law be amended to conform to the practice.

You, however, express a fear that an alteration of the regulation would have undesirable results in regard to our trade with France, Belgium and Germany. Let us consider the Canada situation affects these countries.

The franc is now worth in Canada about eight cents. If one of our mer-

chants should wish to buy 100,000 francs worth of French goods, the cost would be \$8,000. But under this regulation every franc is advanced to be worth 12 cents, so that the custom dues would be levied on \$19,300, or almost two and a half times the actual value of the goods. Put in another way, the duties on French goods are raised from say thirty per cent ad valorem, to seventy-five per cent on the actual money expended. We talk of encouraging trade with France, and then discriminate against that country, to an almost prohibitive extent.

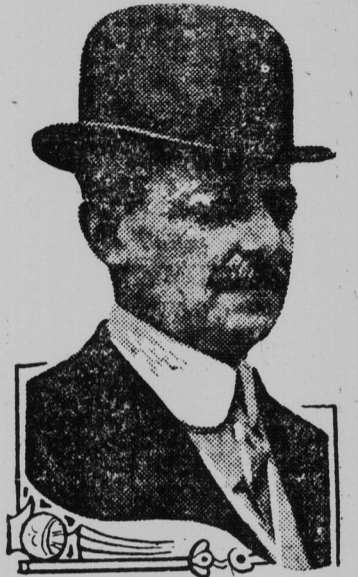
The case of Italy is still worse. If a merchant invests 100,000 lire in Italian goods, the actual cost to him will be \$6,000; but again he will have to pay duty on \$19,000, or three and a fifth times the real value, equivalent to raising the duty from thirty to ninety per cent.

The German mark is worth about one and a fifth cents today. For customs purposes it is, however, taken as worth twenty-four cents. This is assessing the goods at twenty times their real value, or increasing the duty from thirty per cent to six hundred per cent.

Under this regulation the actual rate of customs tax increases automatically as the currency of any country depreciates in value. If the pound sterling should drop to fifty per cent of its nominal value, the customs rate would be automatically doubled. If it should drop to one-third, the rate would be trebled, and so on. The laws of supply and demand work to prevent sterling exchange from dropping too low, by stimulating imports from the mother country, but this regulation prevents those laws from having their full beneficial effect. If we wish to encourage trade within the empire, and to discourage trade with certain other countries, there is but one right way of doing this, and that is by increasing the empire preference, and United States at their expense.

Our exchange situation will be helped by our people buying everything possible from the United States; but the permanent solution of the problem requires the development of all parts of the empire to the utmost, so that we may, as far as possible, be self-contained for raw materials, foodstuffs and other necessi-

The way to bring this about is produced to him, showing that the value in United States currency of the foreign money specified in the invoices were at the date of certification at least ten per cent more or less than the value here proclaimed.

The United States thus provides for the necessary use of foreign currencies at their actual values. Can Canada adhere to this value, especially when by doing so she reduces the revenue of her government, discriminates disastrously against the empire, increases the premium on American funds, reduces the value of sterling exchange, and injures our export trade?

ELECTIONS IN NEW ZEALAND

Emphatic Victory for Reform Party - Liberals Defeated

Owing to System of Polling and Rise of the Labor Party. (Christian Science Monitor.) Wellington, New Zealand—New Zealand's general election, held after a lapse of five years, has resulted in an emphatic victory for W. F. Massey, who has been prime minister since 1912 and is now confined in the position for a further period of three years.

Mr. Massey has about forty-eight supporters in the new house of representatives, which contains eighty members. The Liberal opposition contains about nineteen members, and there are eleven Labor members and two Independents. The Labor members are divided into two groups—eight official representatives of the Labor party and three Independent Labor members. The two Independents probably will give general support to the government.

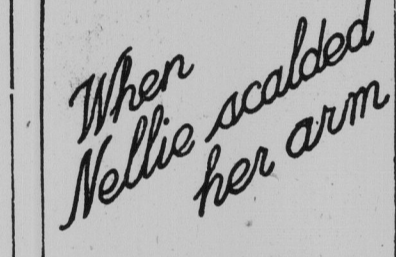

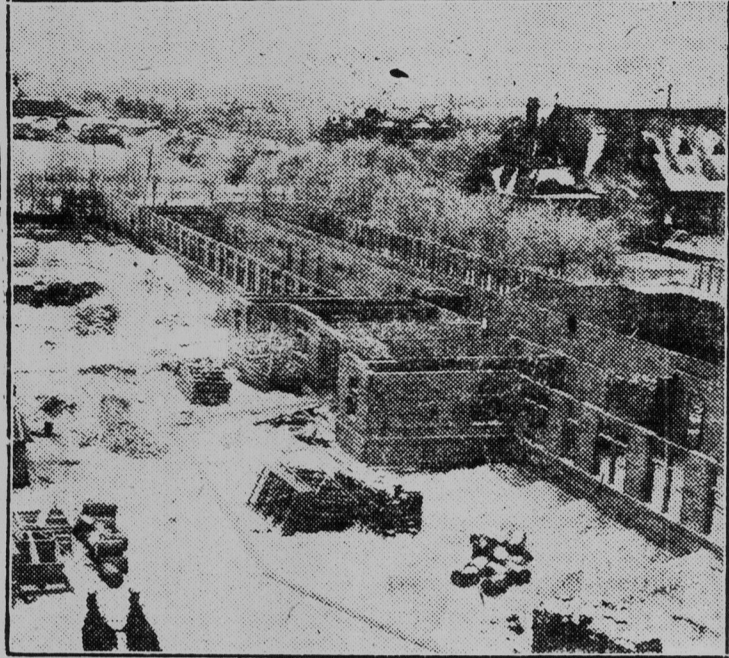

The plant when in full operation will employ 150 persons, and be able to turn out plugs at the rate of 40,000 a day.

USE MOVIES IN EXPORT CAMPAIGN

British Trade Propaganda Scheme That Indicates Possibilities of Education for Export Purposes.

Exhibitions of industrial films has been promoted by British manufacturers with a view to developing export trade. In this connection a world tour has been mapped out starting January 1st, embracing Western Europe, North and South America, with special reference to Canada and Mexico, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, India and Egypt. Plans were under way immediately before the war to conduct a campaign of this nature, and now that the opportunity can be taken up again, British Industries Limited propose to carry out the enterprise in a comprehensive manner. The aim is to show the world through moving picture films what British industry can do. Since normal activities are again being resumed in Great Britain and the productive capacity

of that country is being increased, the question of extending export markets has become of vast importance. In view of the fact that a similar movement is being considered by Canadian manufacturing interests, the British campaign is of special interest. The solution of the economic difficulties with which we are faced makes it imperative that we should use every endeavor to develop our export trade as far as possible," says The London Times in referring to the moving picture exhibition. The motive of the campaign is to carry on an industrial propaganda scheme by means of moving pictures such as has never been attempted before on such a scale. Herbert the cinema film has been primarily the hand maid of amusement, but it is now being demonstrated as the advance agent of the British manufacturer in the reconstruction of trade and industry.

The production of various plants will be shown from ship-building to the making of pins and needles, from plate and cutlery to Worcester sauce, from cotton spinning to wire rope making, from port and harbor facilities to calendar making, etc. Explanatory matter in English, French, Spanish and Portuguese will be included, and competent linguists will accompany the films in order to make explanations in the language of the country visited. The tour is being divided into three sections for the first year. The first of these is Latin America, the second is South Africa, Australia and the Far East and the third is Western Europe, United States and Canada. Special invitations will be issued in each of the ninety-seven cities visited, to assure the attendance of actual buyers, and provision is made to

have inquiries dealt with methodically. The British campaign is of special interest in view of the fact that Canadians are considering a similar venture. The importance attached to the moving picture presentation of industrial processes may be calculated to impress Canadians with the possibilities that lie in this direction.

Canadians Also. Development of a policy regarding the use of educational industrial motion pictures was decided upon at a recent meeting of the executive council of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, held in Hamilton. Arrangements have been concluded whereby trade sections of the association may obtain Canadian-made films at a reasonable price and have all their rights and interests protected. In a circular letter being issued by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association to its members, it is pointed out that industrial interests in the United States and Great Britain have already seized upon this means of circulating information about their capabilities of production, and many of these films are now being shown throughout Canada and in various other countries. Industrial manufacturers throughout the Dominion are asked to communicate with the secretary or chairman of the trade organization with which they are connected.

CANADA'S FIRST SPARK PLUG FACTORY OPENED. Canada's first spark plug factory, that of the Champion Spark Plug Company, was officially opened in Windsor, Ont., this week. Mayor Winter turned the first sod for the factory on June 10, 1919, and handed back the spade. This is the first factory of its kind in Canada. Hitherto all spark plugs have been imported, principally from the United States.

How Labor Plans To Win the Government

Can American Labor elect a Labor Government without the aid of a Labor party? For nothing less than this, in the opinion of the New York Times (Dem.), is the purpose behind the non-partisan political campaign of the American Federation of Labor. If the Federation could control the votes of one-third of its membership "it could dominate the situation," remarks the Baltimore News (Ind.). The Federation's plan, the Chicago Unionist reminds us, is another application of the methods by which the Anti-Saloon League won its overwhelming victories after the Prohibition party had failed to get political results. In Congress, Representative Blanton, of Texas, characterized the American Federation of Labor pronouncement as "the greatest menace ever sounded." For, said Mr. Blanton, "when an organized minority of less than five per cent. of the people can control legislation, and now threaten to elect a Congress of serfs, it is indeed a national crisis, threatening the institutions of the country." According to the Indianapolis Union, however, "the American Federation of Labor does not seek to govern; but it is eminently right in taking steps to educate its members as to which side their political bread is buttered on."

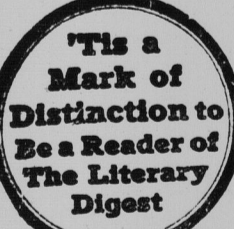
