



OYSTERS TO P. E. ISLAND

The decline of the oyster business in the maritime provinces and also the hope of restoring it was illustrated by a shipment of oysters which passed through a few days ago consigned to Summerside, P. E. Island. There was a time when sending oysters to the Island would be in the same class with sending coals to Newcastle but the lack of care in preserving the fisheries and the thoughtless exploitation of the beds have changed conditions. Twenty years ago the annual shipments from the island amounted to about 50,000 barrels. now reduced to a few thousand. The shipment mentioned is being imported from New Haven, Conn., by James Morrison for the purpose of restocking one of the depleted oyster beds.

LORD MAYOR TO HEAD **DELEGATION FROM** BRISTOL TO HALIFAX

Tablet to Be Presented on Occasion of Dedication of Memorial

London, May 15—Bristol is taking great interest in the dedication, by the Duke of Connaught, of the tower in Halifax to commemorate the birth of British parliamentary government in Nova Scotia. The lord mayor has received an invitation from the mayor of Halifax to associate Bristol with the national memorial.

It was in Nova Scotia that John Cabot landed on his memorable voyage from Bristol in 1497 in the ship "Matthew," under the authority of King Henry VII., for the express purpose of exploring the unknown lands of the western ocean.

Obviously, the Lord Mayor of Bristol says, it is in every way appropriate that Bristol should participate in this function, and that nothing should be left undone to cement the friendship between Bristol and the capital of Nova Scotia. Bristol has accepted the invitation, and a tablet will be presented by its citizens depicting the departure of John Cabot. This will be executed in bronze and placed on one of the internal walls of the memorial. It has also been suggested that the city should send a delegation to present the tablet and a facsimile of the banner and ensign which King Henry VII placed in the hands of John Cabot to enable him to properly carry out his memorable mission.

The lord mayor and lady mayoress contemplate heading the delegation to Halifax, which it is hoped will include the Sheriff of Bristol and Mrs. Bush, the master of the Society of Merchant Venturers and Mrs. Savile, the president of the chamber of commerce and Mrs. Palliser Martin, and Henry Riseley and Miss Riseley.

The building committee was given power to act in dealing with the recommendations of the grand jury with regard to conditions in the jail, including the addition of another story, the cost not to exceed \$10,000, and also to instal shelves in the registry office. The provincial by-law requiring junk dealers to take out a license costing \$25 to do business in the county was adopted and an order passed to pay the councillors who are members of the roads boards \$20 a year for their services.






