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INVESTIGATION TO BE PUNISHED.

The Coroner's Jury Says It Was Murder, and the Police Will Try to Find the Man in the Matter.

Coroner Berryman held an inquest last evening on the body of the infant found last Monday on Corbett Bay. The police officer George Corbett testified to finding the body and taking it to the central station. Dr. McAlpine testified to his having made an examination of the body yesterday. The infant had been dead four or five days when he examined it. He found injuries on the face, legs and elsewhere. The right jaw-bone was fractured and a contusion was found extending from the mouth to the ear. It might have been occasioned by a fall or some animal, or might have been caused by the infant being thrown from a height upon some hard surface. He did not think that the wound had been caused by a blunt instrument. He observed blood only on this wound. If the infant had died just previous to being thrown from the height and receiving the injury the wound would have been as it did, but if the child had been dead 24 hours, there would have been no blood. There was a hole in the left leg, the size of the muscle next the bone. This had evidently been made after death. The tongue was entirely missing. The injuries which he found on the body were sufficient to have killed it. The broken jaw was one reason why he would suppose that the child had died from violence. The coroner in addressing the jury pointed out the fact that during the year just past circumstances and the matter were referred to investigation. The jury returned the verdict that "we were of opinion that the infant came to its death by violence, but at whose hands we could not say."

Iron in Nova Scotia.

In iron there is a veritable boom, good properties in favorable locations finding ready purchasers. This is not due alone to the rise in the price of iron, but is the natural outcome of the formation of several large companies to work our iron deposits, and the progressive action of Mr. Leckie, the Superintendent of the Lumber Industry, in seeking out new sources of supply. From Cape Breton to Digby County all available deposits are being tested and several have already changed hands. We have unlimited supplies of all grades of iron ore, and the only want is that of a market. In the Province has so long remained such a small producer of iron and steel. In 1887 we mined 41,000 tons and in 1889 45,000 tons, the increase in the amount mined being 10 per cent. In 1890 we are expected to produce 100,000 tons, and ten years from now these figures will have increased to 1,000,000 tons.
