During the debate on the Naval bill this year members of Congress particularly interested in the Navy became satisfied that, while there were two extreme factions, one advocating appropriations for two or three first-class battleships a year, and the other with "no battleships" as a logan, an overwhelming majority in both Houses could be counted upon to vote for a single Dreadnought. This situation has been impressed upon the general board, and as a result the permanent building programme may be revised to a one Dreadnought basis, with provision for adequate colliers, destroyers and other sunliary oraft.

This one battleship, however, will be a monater. With a displacement of 40,000 tons she would be just about one-fourth larger than any ship yet authorised by Congress, and would easily rank as the largest and most formidable orar of war in the world. 

How their condition came to be so desperate is explained by the prolonged chims which retarded the vessel's progress, delaying her two weeks later than the average time sail craft take in coming up from Barbados. The day after they left the island with a rargo of molasses a storm was met. This was followed by calms in which practically no wind stirred to propel the Mersey onward. About midway up her course a hurricane sprang up lasting for forty-eight hours. Its force snapped off the schooner's bowsprit, which had been weakened at Barbados, when rammed by a towboat during a collision whereby the turs funnel was carried away. There were five passengers and some seamen on board the Mersey.
