

To Be Seen at the World's Columbian Exposition.

The process of aeration is itself an inter-esting feature of the exhibit. Air is introguced at the bottom of the tank under high pressure, and rises through the mass of water like steam or smoke. Most visitors think these sprays of air, which are as white as silver, are hot water jets or steam introduced for the purpose of warm-ing the tanks. The streams of air are very slender, being forced under pressure very stender, being forced under pressure through the pores of wooden valves. They permeate the mass of water and rise to the top in clouds of bubbles, the process add-ing a new beauty to the aquaria as well as giving the thousands of inhabitants of the tank the oxygen which is necessary to the maintenance of their life






