FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.

On Tuesday morning Mr. McPhillip's Bill to abolish Judges Fees in the Supreme Court, was carried by a majority of one vote in Committee, but defeated on the question to accept the Report of the Committee. One or two members, who had remained longer at their breakfast than the other gentlemen present, happened to drop in at the time the vote was taken, and being opposed to the principle of the Bill, voted in favour. In this manner many important measures are carried or defeated—often by a mere accident to our Legislators. Mr. McPhillip's Bill was carried by a majority of one vote in Committee, but defeated on the question to accept the Report of the Committee. One or two members, who had remained longer at their breakfast than the other gentlemen present, happened to drop in at the time the vote was taken, and being opposed to the principle of the Bill, voted in favour. After dinner, Hon. Mr. Gray's Bill to provide for the Adjudication in Courts of Law of claims against the Government, was once more taken up. The Bill was supported by Messrs. Chandler, Gilmer, and Gray, and opposed by Messrs. Smith, Watson, McAdam, Tilley, Johnson, Tapley, Brown, Mr. Gray, in closing the Debate, made a capital speech, and the injurious results of the Bill, (if passed), were depicted with great force by the gentlemen who opposed it. As the Surveyor General remarked, "a great deal can be said on both sides." The vote was taken on this its post-ponement for three months; Yeas, Smith, Brown, Watters, C. Peley, Wright, Tyler, Brown, Kerr, Lewis, McCallan, McMillan, McPherson, Tapley, Cudlip, Hammington, Montgomery, McAdam, 17. Nays: Messrs. Gray, McPhillip, Williston, Botsford, Allan, Scovil, Gilmer, Chandler, Gilbert, McIntosh, DeBrisay, Tibbitts—12. Hon. Mr. Fisher introduced a Bill relating to the University of New Brunswick, and the Provincial Secretary a Bill relating to Grammar and Superior Schools. The "want of confidence" debate will not come on until after Tuesday next. The Hon. John H. Gray—who has been re-installed "Leader" of the opposition—being absent in St. John, until that day.

Mr. Chandler, member for Charlotte, at the suggestion of Hon. Mr. Mitchell, made a statement of the financial position of the Railway Company, and promised that the Line would be actually completed to Woodstock by the time now fixed, Oct. 1862. The explanation appeared satisfactory to members of the House, though it struck me that there was not a great deal of new light shed upon the subject.

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The Bridgetown Register understands that there is quite an array of lumbermen, who are now busy in the southern and wilderness section of that County, cutting saw-logs. We extract from a Halifax Journal the following account of a recent adventure in Nova:— An extract from a letter in a contemporary from a gentleman of this City, who had recently visited Nova, gives an account of what he had seen in the woods of that Province. He says that he had seen a man who had been a serious if not a fatal accident, while in that city. Two angry fellows confronted him in a narrow passage, holding each a knife to his throat. As he retained his composure one sheathed his knife and commenced scuffling, but proceeding rather too far, the gentleman's blundering blood got upon the man's "left," and down went the ruffian with the knife and the other followed suit. In the struggle, however, he lost his balance and fell, but was not near the street the ruffians dare not attack him again, but made off.

It seems that an American adventurer named Porter C. Bliss has been making a feigning expedition in Nova Scotia, ostensibly for the purpose of collecting material for a new edition of Sabine's "British Loyalists," but it has since been proved that he had no authority whatever from the publishers of that work. He succeeded, however, in collecting quite a number of records belonging to the old settlers of Shelburne, Yarmouth, and other places, some of them of great value. Whatever his object may have been there is no doubt but that the former proprietor will see these MSS. no more. It is a great pity to have such material for a future History of the Province go out of the country in such a way. A Halifax contemporary proposes that the Legislature should take charge of what documents of this kind are left, and have them published. Were this done and the way prepared, an improvement on Halliburton's History would probably be at once undertaken.

Canada.—It is rumored that Sir Allen McNab, Bart., will be appointed Governor of Barbados, vice Mr. Hicks to be promoted to the Governorship of Jamaica. The Victoria Cross was recently presented to Surgeon-General Canadian born near Perth in the County of Lanark, for distinguished conduct at the storming of Delhi while serving with the 61st Regiment.

Mines of yellow ochre have been discovered in the Townships of Williams, County Middlesex, and Brooke, County Lanark, and the ochre is said to be of excellent quality. In an item headed "Princely Manifesto" the Montreal Gazette says that Mr. William Melson of that city has announced his intention of building the western wing of the McGill College. Some time since Mr. Melson and his two brothers gave £5,000 to endow a Professorship of English Literature in the same Institution. Such an honor is an honor to any country. Would that we had a few in these Lower Provinces. The Council of the County of Drummond have passed an ordinance prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in that County. The city of Hamilton has a population of 19,107.

The Postmaster of Berlin C. W. has absconded with \$10,000 belonging to the Post Office Department. The steamer Ruby arrived at Port Sarra on 11th March from Detroit, being the first boat of the season. RED RIVER.—Three or four years ago when everybody was talking of Frazer River and the gold discovered there, when the Government of Vancouver Island was placed on a permanent footing and the colony of British Columbia founded, the necessity of opening up the vast countries on the Red River, Lake Winnipeg, and the Saskatchewan for settlers was much talked of in the English Parliament. It is probable that Sir E. Bulwer Lytton remained in office the government of these vast territories would have been taken out of the hands of the Hudson Bay Company long since. But the present Government do not seem inclined to take any step for the purpose. The "New Western," a paper printed in Red River, says—So far as the future of Red River depends upon imperial legislation, we are as yet in the dark. There is no gleam of light to relieve the gloomy prospect—none certainly to satisfy the excited hopes and just expectations of the people. And if this be true of our governmental concerns, it is doubly true of our trade and commerce. There is not the slightest business activity at present, in this Settlement. All is dullness and deadness. There is little or no work for the producer of the farmer; and no market for the goods of the merchant; and the money circulation is as limited as ever. It was known to be before. Nobody can gain the palpable fact that, at this moment, the condition of Red River is wretched, and its prospects dark to something worse still. We cannot continue as we are. Our condition must change for the better or for the worse; and it is time we should appreciate this.

It is said that a large portion of the population here if they had the opportunity would vote at any moment for annexation to the United States. THE PACIFIC COLONIES.—The steamer Oregon arrived at San Francisco 4th March with dates from Victoria V. I. to 23 Feb. The American squatters on the disputed island of San Juan seem determined to remain Americans as long as possible. They pay taxes regularly to the Sheriff of Whitcomb county, Washington territory. A jurisdictional controversy exercised on the island by Washington territory, will be discontinued, and Captain Fickett's authority will be absolute. The colonies of Vancouver and British Columbia will be represented at the World's Fair in 1862. Harrison White, proprietor of the Fort Hope saw-mill, had been murdered by the Indians. The murderer of Price had been captured. The mines on the Similkameen are reported better than before.

ARRIVAL OF THE "AFRICA." New York, April 1st, 1861. The Africa arrived at this port yesterday. The Duchess of Kent died on the 30th. Parliamentary proceedings unimportant. Bullion in Bank of England has increased £27,000. Consols closed 92 1/2; Money 92 1/2 a 91 1/2. Cotton closed eight-penny advance. Flour quiet but steady, at 22s. a 21s. Wheat and corn firm. Provisions quiet.
