MINUTES,

The Association met with the Bear River Church pursuant to adjournment, at 9 o'clock A. M., and was called to order by the Rev B. Smithers. After singing and prayer, the Rev. H. Jackson, was chosen Moderator, Rev R Preston, Secretary, and Rev J Thomas Treasurer. The following Committee was then appointed to examine the letters, and read them,—Revs R Preston and J Thomas,

Met pursuant to adjournment, at 11 o'clock, A. M. Rev Henry Jackson preached the introductory sermon, from the Book of Psalms, chap. xvii, 15th verse. "As for me I will behold thy face in righteousness; I shall be satisfied when I awake with thy likeness."

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was taken; afterwards the Association resumed its business.

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Voted that the Ministering Brethren be requested to visit Churches in our connection as often as they can, and that the Churches be requested to collect monies once a week for Missionary purposes.

Voted that the Churches of the Association be requested to offer up solemn prayer to God for the blessings of the past, and for the further spread of the Gospel through the whole earth.

Voted that no trustees or other officers be appointed over Churches belonging to this Association while they continue members of other churches.

Voted that the 'next meeting of the Association be held with the Hammond Plains church, and that the Rev Benson Smithers, Preach the introductory sermon, and Rev J. Thomas, his alternate.

Voted that the Revs R Preston, J. Thomas, B. Smithers, superintend the printing of the Minutes, and that they be requested to have the names of Ordained Ministers and those of Licentiates, as well as Deacons, and counsel men placed on the minutes.

sociation be hereby presented to the Baptist congregation in Bear River, together with the friends of other denominations, for the kind and noble manner in which we have been entertained during our session,—after which the ministers and Delegates joined hands together, the Rev R Preston addressed the throne of Grace, and the Dovology was sung; the association then adjourned, to meet with the Hammend Plains Church, on the 1st Saturday in September, 1860, at 2 o'clock, P.M.
