HOSTON AS A FIRLD FOR CHRISTIAN WORK.

It is a general impression that Boston is a city especially well supplied with Christian churches and institutions. Dr. Law-con read a paper, the other day, before the Baptist Social Union there which has done much to dispet this illusion, and which has aroused much attention. Among the facts brought out are the following: A radius of ten miles from the State House would ensirele 726,000 people, one-third of all in the State. One-fith of all live in Boston, 390,398 people in 24 wards. We have 233 churches, chapels and missions, a seeming proportion of 1676 persons for each. Subproportion of 1676 persons for each. 
