At Little South-West the sisters hold a mothers' meeting once every two weeks. Thus far it has proved a success, in giving encouragement and strength to those who attend.

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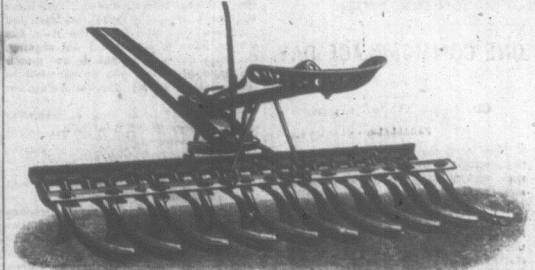
