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# CONSTITUTION

OF THE

# Youn Scotia Eastern Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1st.—This body shall be called the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and shall consist of Delegates representing the Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of one of those churches, together with Delegates from Corresponding Association, not exceeding five from any one Association; and such others as may, by the Association, be invited to sit in Council; none but delegates being entitled to vote, and such only as represent churches being elligible to office, or to vote for officers.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{ART}}$  2nd.—Each church connected with the body may send five Delegates besides its Pastor.

Art 3rd.—The object of this Association being the cultivation of Christian Union, the promotion of individual godliness, and by mutual consultation, to seek, in the use of Scriptural measures, the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom—it disclaims all authority over churches, and shall in no case interfere with their internal concerns, or their entire scriptural independency. Yet it may dissolve its connection with any church that, upon sufficient examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from Scripture principles or Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 4th.—This Association shall meet at such time and place as it may appoint, and the meetings shall be opened with devotional exercises.

ART. 5th.—The Officers of the Association shall be—a Moderator, who shall preside at all the meetings, nominate all the Committees not otherwise provided for, and perform all the duties naturally connected with such office; a Clerk who shall keep a record of all the business transacted, prepare the Minutes for the press, and attend to their distribution; and a Treasurer, who shall receive all the moneys contributed for the purposes of the Association, and dispose of them according to its direction. All the officers shall remain in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. 6th.—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed in the "Articles of the Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia."

ART. 7th.—The Association may receive any Church which, by letter, shall apply for admission, and shall give satisfactory evidence of its faith and order, in agreement with the religious sentiments of this body; and each Church belonging to this body shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history for the year preceding, particularly of its additions and diminutions, with its number then in fellowship,—also, money to assist in publishing the Minutes. Any Church that for three successive years omits sending any Letter, Delegates, or money, shall be considered withdrawn from the Association, and shall be discontinued from the Minutes, unless sufficient reason may appear to account for the omission, or provided it may appear desirable to make some inquiry, by committee or otherwise, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ART. 8th.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members at any annual meeting of the Association.

# RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall be handed to the clerk, who shall retire and make out a list of the delegates—the Moderator meanwhile shall conduct devotional exercises.

2nd.—From the list so prepared the Moderator shall be chosen by ballot—no brother shall be chosen two years in succession.

3rd.—The first letter read shall be from the Church with which the Association is assembled.

4th.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded, and no person shall speak on any subject more than twice unless by consent of the Association.

5th - When any Church is received, the Moderator shall give to one of

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its delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th.—At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the preceding one shall be read and approved, and of the last before the final adjourment.

7th.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered by the Association.

8th .- All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

9th.—Each meeting for business shall be commenced and concluded with prayer.

10th.—The Committee of Arrangement shall, in addition to the provision for the "order of business," provide also for the discussion of the more prominent topics, Education and Missions, by appointing one or more persons to speak upon them. Said Committee shall further recommend the place for the succeeding Association, the preacher of the Associational Sermon, and the writer of the Circular Letter.

11th.—No delegate shall leave the Association before the business is finished, without permission of the body.

12th.—These Rules shall be read by the Moderator at the commencement of each annual session of the Association.

Resolved, That Brother Selden be requested to published the same number of copies of Minutes, and at the same rate as last year, together with the constitution of the Home Missionary Union, and the Minutes of the last Session of the Missionary Union, and that 50 copies be reserved for the use of the next Annual Session of the Association.

Resolved, that Revds. J. B. McDonald, J. E. Goucher, E. B. Corey, and Brethren Jos. Dimock, and J. Rushton be a Committee to select a place for the next meeting of this Association and that this Committee report if possible, during this session of the Association.

Resolved, That Brethren Wm. Cummings, Lyman Walker, and Wm. Faulkner be a Committee to provide reduced fares to persons attending the next Session of the Association.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association by given to the Railway and Steamboat Authorities for the accommodation to delegates attending this Association.

A motion for adjournment having been carried, the session closed with prayer by Rev. Isa. Wallace.

## Monday Morning, July 13th.

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The Association Sermon was preached by Rev. W. B. Bogge, from Luke xxiv. 47.

The Moderator having taken the chair, prayer was offered by Dr.

Sawyer. The Minutes were read and approved. The reading of Letters

was resumed. Bro. I. Wallace presented the report of the Committee on (See Appendix A.)

Moved and seconded that the report be received.

After an address by Rev. Isa. Wallace, it was Resolved, That the time for adjournment be extended ten minutes.

The discussion of the report was then continued by Rev. M. Normandy.

Adjourned with singing, and prayer by Bro. Burgess.

### Monday Afternoon Sertion.

Opened with prayer by Rev. H. Eagles. Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The reading of Letters was next resumed.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of this Association be requested to pay over all monies received to the several treasurers of the Funds for which they have been designated.

Bro. Normondy was next called upon to resume his address, and was followed by Rev. J. B. McDonald, G. F. Miles and S. Selden, after which the report on Missions passed.

Bro. Steele moved and Bro. Goucher seconded the following,

which was passed unanimously.

Resolved, That this Association record its gratitude to the God of grace for his loving kindness and tender mercy vouchsafed to our infant Independent Foreign Mission during the past year; and that we commend its members to the continued sympathies and support of the churches, and also

Resolved, That we commend our esteemed Bro. Boggs, the Foreign Missionary elect to the grace of God, praying that he may have a safe journey to Siam, and that he may be an instrument in the hands of the Most High in turning many to righteousness.

Bro. J. B. McDonald presented the report on the Circular Letter, recommending that it be read.

Voted, That the report be accepted.

The Circular Letter having been read by the writer, Rev. Jno. E. Goucher, it was resolved that it be adopted and printed in the

Minutes and in the Christian Messenger.

Rev. Dr. Cramp, in the absence of Bro. Welton, Chairman of the Committee on Education, presented their Report, which was spoken to by Revds. Dr. Sawyer, Jas. Meadows, J. B. McDonald, M. D., C. M. Kierstead, Wm. Cummings, Moses Lowe, D. A. Steele, and S. Selden; and passed. (See Appendix B.)

Brother S. Selden presented the following which was unanimously

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Whereas, attacks both open and covert have been made upon the non secretarian school system of this Province, and demands made to have it superceded by Roman Catholic Separate Schools sanctioned by law.

Be it therefore Resolved, That we hereby re-affirm our demands by all lawful means in our power to prevent any such unjust and injurious appropriation of public funds.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association be tendered to the Messrs. Barker and Robinson, of Windsor, for the use of one of their rich toned Ogans from the "Smith American Organ Company."

The Secretary having stated that the churches of Tatamagouche and River John, had failed in sending Letters to this Association for the term of three years. Bro. Isa. Wallace undertook to visit them and report.

Moved and carried that the Association adjourn to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer by Brother McGregor, Licentiate.

### Tuesday Morning, July 4th.

Opened with singing, and prayer by Bro. J. Davidson, Licentiate. Rev. J. B. McDonald read a letter from Bro. John P. McDonald of Pictou, relative to subscription of Mr. H. R. Narraway, to Baptist Mission property there. As it appeared that Mr. N. is dissatisfied with the disposition of the money donated by him to the mission property; it was, after discussion,

Resolved, That he be paid his percentage of the balance remaining from the sale of said property, which money is now in the hands of our committee; viz., Jno. P. McDonald, Richard Upham and George Davidson.

Reading of letters was then completed.

Committee on Nomination and Arrangement recommend the Rev. J. B. McDonald preach the next Association Sermon; the Rev. J. Meadows be his alternate; and that Rev. Geo. Armstrong write the Circular Letter.

Bro. McDonald presented the following: Your Committee appointed to name a place of meeting of Association next year in view of the fact that no invitation has been received, recommend that the question be left open for two months; and that such churches as wish to accommodate this body communicate in the meantime with our Moderator, Bro. McKeen, and that such invitations as may be given be submitted by him to the ministers of this and the adjoining county at their meeting at Oxford next September; and further, that their decision be made known in the Christian Messenger at as early a date as possible.

The Report of Committee on Sabbath Schools was next presented by Rev. T. B. Layton, Chairman, and was spoken to by Brethren T. B. Layton, J. E. Goucher, H. Bool, W. Cummings, Edward Davidson, J. Walker, J. B. McDonald, and J. Meadows, and

adopted. (See Appendix C.)

Resolved, That the Baptist Teacher be recommended to our Sabbath Schools.

The following resolution on the Christian Messenger was submitted by Brother L. J. Walker and adopted:

Resolved, That we commend the Christian Msssenger to every Baptist family in this Association. As a faithful exponent of Baptist Principles. And we rejoice to know that with the judicious ability that it is now conducted it has gained the confidence of the denomination at large.

It was unanimously resolved, That the thanks of this Association be tendered to the brethren and friends of Parrsboro, for the generous accommodation afforded the members of this body.

Treasurer submitted Report of monies received at this Association

which was adopted.

The minutes of this and the previous session were then read and

approved.

A motion for adjournment to meet at the call of the moderator having been carried the Association closed with singing of union hymn and prayer by the Moderator.

# Circular Tetter.

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#### CONDITIONS OF SPIRITUAL GROWTH.

THE CIRCULAR LETTER OF THE NOVA SCOTIA EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, TO THE CHURCHES OF WHICH IT IS COMPOSED.

Dear Brethren,-

We would affectionately solicit your attention, in this Annual Letter, to some of the Conditions of Spiritual Growth, a subject intimately associated with the glory of Christ and lying at the foundation of all church and Denominational as well as individual prosperity and usefulness. Intellectual, numerical or pecuniary enlargement will prove a very doubtful blessing without a corresponding spiritual, developement, though the latter will become a

safe and helpful handmaid to to the former.

During the past year, God has greatly blessed many of our churches with additions to their membership. It becomes those churches so favoured to realize their increased responsibilities. and institute careful inquiry as to how these new recruits may be made to answer the design of their new birth and best subserve the interests of Christ's Kingdom. We greatly fear that religious life is too often stifled at the outset and religious growth stinted and dwarfed for want of the employment of proper means to promote it. scriptures call upon us to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." To "be also enlarged." To "press forward to the mark," to "go on to perfection," &c. The sacred writers nowhere countenance a stand-still policy in the christian life, they represent that life as a race to run, a field to be cultivated and a journey to be taken. The church is the mystical body of Christ, every true christian is a member of the body, and the body as a whole can only be developed by the growth of its members. This truth should be well understood and acted upon by all the senior members of the church and zealously taught to the younger as soon as they enter our ranks. Instead of allowing the impression to strengthen, that, after the first act of consecration to Christ, the main part of the work is done, which young Christians are very apt to entertain, every effort should be made to correct such an impression and make them feel that their life work is just begun.

This should be attended to immediately, there is no time to lose. The first three months after conversion will, as a rule, very largely determine the whole future of the christian as to usefulness in this life. Some say, be cautious in bringing the hardships, dangers and duties that lie across the christian's path, before his mind at the outset. You will discourage him, let him find out for himself. This

is cruel and unseemly caution. It is like an individual who has passed over a dangerous way, saying of his fellow who has just entered upon it, let him find out the difficulties and dangers as he goes along. Would it not be more kindly to apprize him, that he might prepare? Don't allow the christian to feel as that young man, who has come, gloved and slippered into undisputed possession of a large estate, for which another has toiled and sweat, and now has nothing to do but eat, drink and be merry. Rather make him realise that he is a new settler with only a small cleared spot, scarcely large enough to pitch a tent, while broad acres of gnarled forest trees surround him, that if he would enlarge his spiritual possessions, if he would make this soil produce a rich harvest to the glory of God, he must fell these knotty giants of the forest and "break up this fallow ground." In a word, if he would realize Spiritual growth, he must fulfil this inevitable condition

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#### HE MUST WORK.

This may not be the first, but it is undoubtedly a condition of growth. God has constituted us physically, mentally, and spiritually for work. In neither sphere can it be dispensed with without a manifest hindrance to developement, simply because in such a case one of the most important laws of growth is violated. It would be perhaps startling if the aggregate of weaklings in our churches, from this cause, were revealed to us. A successful ministry is not always to be inferred by the number of sermons preached or family visits made, or even by the number of reported baptisms, but rather by the workers sent out to strengthen the outposts of Zion and bless a needy world. Large additions to churches sometimes prove a source of weakness rather than strength. If allowed to fold their hands in indolence, they soon become fruitless branches, and hang a dead weight to bear down and stop the growth of the living tree.

The church in her activities, should be made to resemble the bee-hives in your garden, where industry is the watchword of the entire family, where drones must either become inspired with the spirit of work or be expelled from the hive. Another condition of growth in the physical and mental domain, is proper

#### ATTENTION TO DIET.

We must have food, and food of a certain kind. Man is not expected to live on what forms a staple diet for inferior animals, he must have an aliment adapted to his constitution. The mind, too, must be nourished and expanded by food corresponding to its powers. So, also, if we have spiritual development, it must be by the observance of a law analogous in the spiritual sphere. For man to be without food is not good, simply because he must starve. For the soul to be without knowledge is not good, for the same reason. Knowledge is the pabulum upon which the soul feeds and grows. Here too, attention to the quality is a most important consideration. All kinds of knowledge will not conduce to spiritual growth. Bible knowledge is of the first importance. The more extensive the

better. In these days in most of our churches, there is no valid excuse for ignorance. Bibles are so numerous and the facilities for acquiring a tolerably correct knowledge of the scriptures are so great that ignorance is shameful. Yet what pastor does not know, what Sabbath School Superintendent is not aware, that ignorance of even elementary truths prevails to an alarming extent in our membership. Why is it so difficult in many quarters to obtain an efficient staff of Sabbath School Teachers? Is it for want of disposition to work for Christ in this department? or is it owing to a felt deficiency of qualification to enter this responsible arena of christian effort? We believe, in a large proportion of instances, the latter is the true cause. How then can we expect, if the foregoing be true, a large measure of spiritual growth, until this palpable ignorance of bible truth is removed? This may seem a reflection upon the excellent pastors of our churches, but it is not so intended. If a share of blame fall upon them, then the writer of this must come in for his full proportion. But in these days, when none but half-hour sermons will be tolerated, it is hardly supposible that the masses are to be indoctrinated wholly from the pulpit. Our Sabbath Schools are doing a good work, but it is largely elementary. We ought to have Bible Schools, or Bible Meetings, not confined to the Sabbath, where the pastor can preside and furnish a course of iustruction which must tell with powerful effect upon the growth of our people. Here too, we affectionately call upon the older portion of our membership to arouse themselves to exertion in this direction and so assist pastors in their efforts to feed the masses with the bread of life. If the sheep regale themselves in "green pastures and beside still waters," the lambs will draw much nourishment from them. But Religious Literature apart from the Bible is a matter claiming consideration here. 'Tis true you now and then meet with a broad well developed christian whose meat and drink have all been derived from the Holy Scriptures. Ruin by the fall, Redemption by Christ, and Regeneration by the Spirit, have formed a solid basis for christian character, and all kindred truths have been so studied and digested as to become part and parcel of the inner man. But these specimens are rare as they are valuable. There are undoubtedly books that throw light upon bible teaching, and greatly assist the mind in understanding it. These works should be obtained and read by our people. Christian Biography is a study calculated to stimulate the soul's better passions, and so promote Spiritual growth. Church History should not be overlooked, especially should Baptists seek to become acquainted with the struggles and triumphs of their brethren in the past ages. Cramp's History ought to be in every Baptist family, not simply to ornament centre tables, but to nourish and strengthen by its careful perusal, christian souls for the conflicts of the way. Attention must be given to the study of our principles, and every help to such investigation within the reach of our people, procured. Wayland's Principles and Practices of the Baptists, will prove an invaluable aid in this direction, and should be in the hands of all.

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Books are multiplying, the intelligence of the people owing to constantly increased facilities to stimulate it, is on the march. The young people are acquiring a taste for reading, and much of their leisure will be so occupied. But chaff and wheat nestle side by side in the same heap. Other than useful books are constantly issuing from the mammoth publishing houses of the present day. These earnestly invite the attention and waste the time, if they do not by their weight tax the powers of the reading public. No uncertain note should be sounded by the teachers and preachers of this Association in the ears of our young people, on this question. Our lives are too short, and too much earnest work devolves upon us to kill time, enfeeble intellect, and dwarf our spiritual powers by giving attention to the trashy serials and disgusting novels that are deluging every part of our land.

The religious newspaper, as an educator and promoter of spiritual growth, demands more than a passing remark, though the length to which our letter has already grown reminds us that we can give it nothing more. Were it possible or proper to draw a comparison between those families who avail themselves of its advantages and those who do not, no further argument would be needed in its favour. It is a small family library in itself. It courts attention and awakens interest by its freshness and variety. Its discussions touch every religious question without, and every religious sensibility It tells of the labours and triumphs of God's servants in all lands, and puts us into universal sympathy with the sacramental host of God's elect. It maps out with faithful hand all departments of christian work, and renders invaluable aid to all classes of christian workers. No family in our Baptist brotherhood can afford

to be without our weekly religious newspaper.

The exercise of Christian benevolence, is another condition of spiritual growth, which it would be almost unpardonable in us to over-The principle underlying such exercise, love to God and man, is the root from which springs green and glorious, the tree of practical Christianity, with its sheltering branches, its nourishing fruit, and its "leaves for the healing of the nations." Where this principle is covered by worldliness, or smothered by covetousness, there can be no growth in the individual, none in the church, and consequently

none in the Denomination.

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If we are christians we have the principle, but if we are to retain anything more than the name, we must live in its perpetual exercise. Those who complain of the repeated calls made upon them for benevolent contributions, complain of one of the means which God has designed to promote their spiritual growth. Whatever will assist in killing selfishness, and lead us to live for him who died for us, will develope our spiritual powers.

The habitual exercise of christian benevolence will do this. Taking for granted that the religious teachers of this body will make this principle prominent in their teachings, will show the wide and ever widening field for it to operate upon, and the best method of systematizing its operations, we leave the whole matter in their

hands.

Were it not for making our letter too lengthy we would gladly notice other important conditions of growth in our churches, such as Scriptural Discipline, Union and the like. But prudence forbids. In conclusion, brethren, we would remind you that the condition of conditions of spiritual growth, is our continued looking to and dependence upon the Holy Spirit. That has ever been a principle cardinal in the Baptist faith, and the glory will have departed from us if we ever lose sight of it. We may have our church and denominational machinery perfected, our educational institutions well furnished and equipped. Our Missionary enterprise Home and Foreign prosperous in men and money. Our churches supplied with an educated ministry and our creeds groaning beneath the weight of an unexceptionable orthodoxy, but unless all be energized by the Holy Spirit, it will prove a dead mass or like the bones in Ezekiel's Valley, "dry, very dry."

Here lies the greatest danger of our times, not in too much machinery, not in too much learning, but in placing our dependence in them. In substituting the outward and visible for the inward and spiritual. In losing sight of God the Spirt, and trusting in ain arm of flesh. Brethren, be on your guard, an insidious foe is crouching near, while we plead for all outward helps, for the consecration of our best talents to the service of Christ, and for the best possible training for our work, let it never be forgotten that talents and training will only serve to heighten the emphasis of condemnation, if we are found relying upon them instead of the Holy Spirit. God's ancient rule was, to "choose the weak things of this world to confound things that were mighty." He has given us no intimation by revelation or otherwise of an intention to supersede that rule. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit saith the Lord."

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# REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions beg to submit the following Report:

1. They would recognize God's gracious providence over our Foreign Missionaries who have left our shores during the past year. These brothers and sisters have safely reached their destination and are now busily engaged in acquiring a knowledge of the languages of the people for whose spiritual interest they are to labour. They learn with pleasure that the Rev. W. B. Boggs, A. M., late Secretary of the Foreign Missionery Board, is about to leave our shores for the Foreign field; and they would commend him and the dear brothers and sisters now in Tavoy and Siam, and the Independent Mission entrusted to their care, afresh to the prayers, sympathies and benevolence of our Churches.

2. The Report of the work of the late Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society during the past year is highly satisfactory. That Society being now merged in the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union your Committee would record with gratitude to God, the measure of success that has attended its efforts during the past 17 years, the term of its existence and labours, and also this acknowledgment of the selfdenying efforts of the officers and

members of its Executive Board.

3. The Report of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union read before the Annual Meeting of that Society on Friday last, affords the utmost cause for thanks giving. It will be seen by reference to that Report that upwards of 400 persons have been baptized during the year, and a vast amount of work has been performed, not only in the fostering of weak churches and in carrying the Gospel to the destitute, but also in the dissemination of much valuable religious literature in connection with the Colporteur department.

4. The French Mission, a department of the work of the Union, is represented as being in a hopeful state. Four have been baptized by our French Missionary during the year, 2 French and 2 English, and others are awaiting baptism. Another Missionary for the French population of our Province, is becoming a matter of

increasing necessity.

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5. In view of the great scarcity of ministers to fill the many important and inviting fields now white unto the harvest, and imperatively calling for help, your Committee would suggest to the churches that special and continued supplication be offered to the Lord of the harvest for more labourers.

Finally, your Committee recommend that in view of the increasing responsibilities and demands both in connection with the Home and Foreign Mission resting upon our denomination in this Province, that our churches manifest increasing benevolence and consecration to God's service. Let all our brethren and sisters so give, and pray, and labour that the Master may ultimately say-" Well done." Respectfully submitted.

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### (B) REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report that four young men completed their course in Acadia College, and took their first degree on the fourth of last month: three of them are preachers of The propects of the gospel, and are now engaged in mission work. the incoming year in regard to students are encouraging.

Some steps have been taken towards affording facilities for the education of the young women of the denomination. A scheme for erecting buildings, capable of accommodating 100 young ladies, has been initiated by H. N. Paint, Esq., of Halifax, on the joint stock principle, has received the approval of the Governors of the College, and stock lists are now ready for signature.

The Committee appointed to nominate teachers for the two departments of Horton Academy hope soon to be prepared to announce to the public the names of an efficient staff for these positions.

Your Committee are glad that provision has been made by the Missionary Union for a larger amount of instruction in the Theolological Department of Acadia College. There are now in the College and Academy about 30 students having the ministry in view.

The spiritual blessings which have fallen on our beloved Institutions of learning during the past year call for hearty thanksgiving and praise to the God of all grace. Your Committee would finally express the hope that the denomination will remember these institutions in their prayers and contributions.

ANTIGONISH,—Church is in harmonious working order. The lators of our Pastor, Rev. J. B. McQuillin, among us, have not been in vain, and in an adjoining field where he has labored a part of the timr have been manifestly blessed.

BROOKFIED.—Church in a lukewarm state. We have the services of Rev. J. Meadows one third of the time whose labors are highly appreciated.

CAPE CANSO.—Church has been revived, sinners converted and a number, (28) added to membership by baptism. Sabbath School and Bible Class are interesting and encouraging. The labors of our Paster, Rev. Geo. Thomas have been abundantly blossed.

CENTERVILLE AND MOUNT PLEASANT. Not so prosperous as in other days. Our meetings of late have been full of interest, and we hope for better days. Have had very little preaching during the year. Visited occasionally by County Missionary.

TRACADIE.—Without preaching for some time. Our Prayer and Conference meetings and our Sunday School are still kept up. Bro. Bigelow left us last Autumn. We feel the need of a pastor. We send \$4 to the Association.

WALLACE.—Have not had a regular pastor for nearly three years. We have had the labors of Bro. Corey and others which have been blessed. Nine have been added by baptism. Our Sunday School is not so prosperous as usual.

WENTWORTH.—Our new meeting house has been opened for service and the Church has been blessed during the year. Five have been baptized and admitted to the church. Brethren Miles, Morton and Corey have labored with us during th year and we now have the services of Bro. Armstrong.

GLENVILLE AND RIVER PHILIP.—The past year has been in some degree marked with discouragements, inasmuch as we have, for the most part, been deprived of one to go in and out before us. Our deficiency has, however, in a measure, been made up by the appearance of Bro. I. J. Armstrong among us. An awakening of some of our members has been manifested, and we have been led to hope for better days.

LOWER ECONOMY.—We feel our weakness as a church very much. We are thankful to God that we have good seed sown in our midst by an earnest and devoted servant of Christ, and we trust we are humbly looking to God for the blessing. We have a very interesting Sabbath School.

DILIGENT RIVER.—Our Pastor, Rev. Samuel Thompson, labored with us one-fourth of his time, until the second day of last November, he was stricken down by disease so that he has not been able to preach since that time. We have an interesting Prayer Meeting Sabbath morning, and one in the back settlement Wednesday evening. They are both well attended. We hope that the Home Missionary Union will assist us in getting a pastor for part of the time.

GOSHEN.—We are happy to write that the Lord has visited us in mercy. The church has been revived, backsliders have returned, and souls have been saved. \Bro. McQuillan has labored faithfully among us during the year. We are trying to erect a place of worship. 22 have joined our church, and we look for more.

GUYSBORO AND MANCHESTER.—We are able to report but few additions, yet we have not been without some tokens of the divine favor. Rev. J. P. Beel came to us, and commenced his labor on the 1st of May last, for which we desire to express to the Board of the Home Missionary Union our grateful thanks.

MACCAN.—We acknowledge with regret that we have not been so earnest in seeking the prosperity f the cause of Christ as we ought, but we are praying and hoping for a better state of things. We feel encouraged by an increased interest in spiritual matters manifested both by the members of the church, and others who attend upon the means of grace.

LOWER STEWLACKE.—We cannot rejoice as can so many of our sister churches throughout the Province over special manifestations of the power of God in our midst; yet we believe seed has been sown which in God's own time will bring forth fruit to the honor and glory of His name.

Hawkesbury, C. B.—We do hope that God's tidal wave will, during the coming year roll powerfully eastward. We have much to encourage us in external matters. Having been without a pastor for two years, we were in providence permitted harmoniously to renew that relation last January. There are serious inquirers among us, whom we hope soon to see brought to Christ. Upon the missionary branch of this field when our pastor labors one quarter of his time the cause of Christ is looking hopeful.

LITTLE GLACE BAY.—Our candle has been kept burning, though dimly. We have been, to a large extent destitute of regular preaching. The church has done little more than to hold its own. UPPER STEWIACRE.—We still enjoy the labors, to a certain extent, of Rev. O. Chute. We cannot report a state of revival progress such as many of our churches have enjoyed during the past year. Instead of this we must say our prospects are very dark. We are building a new house of worship.

# NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY UNION.

PARRSBORO, CUMBERLAND COUNTY.
Friday Afternoon, July 10th, 1873.

The Second Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union, convened at the Baptist Meeting-house, Parrsboro, July 10th, 1874, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

The President, Rev. J. M. Cramp, D. D., in the chair.

The meeting was opened by prayer by Rev. Zechariah Morton, and others.

Resolved, That Rev. Isaiah Wallace be associate Secretary, pro. tem., with Rev. M. P. Freeman, Secretary for the Union during the past year.

tine that the Reports presented, be received.

A motion for adjournment to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock, having been carried, the Session closed with prayer by Rev. P. R. Foster.

### Friday-Evening Session.

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The Union resumed business, in accordance with the previous resolution of adjournment, with prayer by Rev. D. A. Steele.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

The discussion of reports presented at the previous Session was opened by Bro. D. McN. Parker, M. D., and continued by Brethren H. Bool, A. E. Ingram, Wm. Cummings, Isa. Wallace, Dr. Tupper, and G. F. Miles; after which, on motion of Brethren E. O. Read and G. Ballentine, the Reports were adopted.

Dr. Day, having addressed the Union on the subject of ministerial supply, presented the following resolution, which was seconded by

Bro. P. R. Foster.

In view of the great lack of ministerial labor in this Province, and the importance of having men trained for the great work of the ministry,

Therefore Resolved, That this Union engage to supervise the raising of \$1000 per annum to sustain a Theological Professor in Acadia College, with the understanding that the donations for this object shall be kept separate from the general fund.

This resolution was spoken to by Brethren C. Goodspeed, Dr. Sawyer, Geo. F. Miles, Dr. Tupper, Dr. Parker, D. McKeen, Wm. Cummings, J. E. Goucher, D. A. Steele, Jas. Parker, W. B. Boggs, John Coombs, Moses Lowe, and W. G. Parker. After a most animating and interesting discussion the motion passed.

Adjourned to meet  $8\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock to-morrow morning was carried.

The Session closed with prayer by Bro. McKeen.

### Saturday Morning, July 11th.

The third Session of the Union met on Saturday morning at 8½ o'clock. Opening prayer was offered by Rev. G. F. Miles.

The minutes of previous Session were read and approved.

The Corresponding Secretary presented a communication from

Rev. Jno. Davis, President of the P. E. Island Baptist Home Missionary Board, asking this Board to send an agent to meet with theirs to consider the question of Union between the two Provinces in Home Missionary work.

Dr. Day then moved an amendment to Article 3 of the Constitu-

tion, to read as follows:

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The object of this Union shall be to promote the spread of the gospel throughout the Provinces of Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, and the Island of Newfoundland, the fostering of feeble churches, the planting of new ones, and the dissemination of denominational literature.

After remarks by Brethren S. Selden and D. A. Steele, the

article as thus amended was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the Board be located in Yarmouth during the coming year.

Resolved, That the Board of this Union be the same as last year, the names being as follows:—A. C. Robbins, Samuel Brown, W. A. C. Randall, M. D., J. H. Haley, P. D. Kinney, W. R. Doty, G. E. Day, P. R. Foster, W. H. Warren, J. A. Stubbert J. Rowe, J. H. Saunders and J. Williams.

Resolved, That the Board have authority to fill any vacancies that may occur during the year.

The ballot having been taken for President, Dr. Cramp was

declared re-elected President for ensuing year.

The following Vice Presidents were next elected—Western Associan, Rev. W. G. Parker; Central Association, Rev. D. M. Welton; Eastern Association, Rev. D. A. Steele.

Moved that M. P. Freeman and A. Cohoon be Secretaries for the year. Bro. R. N. Beckwith was chosen Auditor.

The following were chosen the Board of Directors:-

For the Western Association—Revds. Edw. Whitman, J. A. Durkee, G. D. Cox, G, N. Ballentine, J. M. Parker, Dr. Tupper, Brethren John Clark, and B. H. Parker.

For the Eastern Association—Brethren T. M. King, Nelson Dobson Moses Lowe, Wm. Cummings, J. R. Read, Amos Atkinson, A. McDonald of Pugwash and Rev. D. McKeen.

Moved that this Union adjourn to the call of the President. Closed with prayer by Rev. J. F. Murray.

### Saturday-Evening Session.

The fourth Session of the Union convened Saturday evening at  $7\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock. President in the chair. Prayer was offered by Dr. Sawyer.

Resolved, That Brethren Isa. Wallace, D. A. Steele, J. B. McDonald, Z. Morton, and S. Selden be delegates from this Union to the P. E. Island Association, to confer with the brethren there on the subject of union with Nova Scotia in Home Missionary work.

On Motion, Bro. Ruhland was requested to provide railroad and steamboat accommodation for delegates attending the next annual meeting of the Union in Halifax.

The following was submitted by Dr. Day, and unanimously adopted:-

In view of the many years of service of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society, and the great work it has done for the denomination, and the cause of Christ in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island:

And whereas, That society has transferred its work, funds and property to the Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union, and has this day by resolution ceased and determined.

Therefore Resolved, That we record our thanks to Almighty God for the success that attended the officers, members and agents of that Society in proclaiming throughout the field of its operations the gospel of our Lord Jenus Christ.

The following resolution was moved by Dr. Parker, seconded by S. Selden, and supported by J. B. McDonald:

That the thanks of this Union be tendered to its Executive Board, and especially to Rev Dr. Day, the Corresponding Secretary, for the continuous effort and ability displayed in its organization and management during the two years of its existence.

Passed unanimously.

Bro Wallace then presented the following:

Resolved, That in view of the marked manifestation of God's favor in connection with the efforts of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union during the past year, this body hereby express their heartfet gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, the source of all success in his service; and that in view of the increasing responsibilities and labors of the Executive Board, their agents and efforts be commended afresh to the divine guidance and blessing.

This resolution was carried unanimously by a rising vote, after which the President led in prayer.

Bro. Day moved the following:

Whereas, Great destitution prevails in these Maritime Provinces in regard to the preaching of the word. Therefore Resolved, that this Union sympathize with our brethren in New Brunswick in their Home Missionary efforts, and that it will be pleased to consult with the New Brunswick brethren in relation to a union with us in Home Mission work.

And further Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by this Union to meet with the New Brunswick brethren at the time of the Convention in August next, to see what arrangements can be made that looks towards union, and to report at the next annual meeting of this body.

The motion was duly seconded, and after being spoken to by Bros. Wm. Cummings, Dr. Sawyer Isa. Wallace, G. F. Miles, C. Goodspeed, Dr. Cramp, and S. Selden, it was passed by a majority of 12 to 6.

Resolved, That in pursuance with the above resolution a Committee be appointed to be composed of Revds. G. E. Day, Isa. Wallace, and J. M. Cramp, D. D.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Union be tendered to the friends in Parrsboro who have so kindly entertained the delegates to this Union.

Adjournment was then moved and carried, after which the Session closed with prayer by Rev. J. B. McDonald, and benediction by the President of the Union.

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# SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

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OF THE

# A. S. Baptist Home Alissionary Union.

The Executive Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union beg to present their second Annual Report. At their first meeting after the Anniversary of the Union, your Board re-elected the Officers of last year. On the removal of Rev. W. H. Porter, the Recording Secretary, W. A. C. Randall, Esq., M. D., was elected to that office.

Delay in making appointments.—While your Board were awaiting the action of the Committee at Windsor, which was to consummate the Union or make it for a time a comparative failure, they thought it best not to make many appointments. The call, however, was so imperative to send a Missionary to Shelburne that they at once appointed Rev E. N. Archibald to that field. The results of brother Archiba d's labours in Shelburne and vicinity have convinced the Board that the appointment was exceedingly judicious. The little Church at Shelburne which had almost lost its visibility has been greatly revived. Several have been added to its number. beautiful house of worship has been built and nearly paid for. At Sand Point brother Archibald was also instrumental in getting a new meeting house carried forward to completion. The cause at Sand Point, at Jordan River, and in fact in all parts of the Shelburne field, has been so much revived during the year, that, had little else been done by their Missionaries, your Board would be disposed to thank God and take courage.

The General Agency. - After our Union had been consummated at Windsor, your Board believed that it was necessary to put a General Agent immediately in the field, whose work it would be to examine into the destitution that prevailed and report thereon. The Rev. Isaiah Wallace was selected for that important and arduous work. Although brother Wallace was beloved by his Church and congregation, and pleasantly situated, he felt the appointment of the Board to be the call of God. He entered upon the General Agency work about the first of September last. As your Board wished to have as much as possible of the Eastern section of the Province surveyed before the approach of winter, their General Agent started at once for the Eastern extremity of Cape Breton. After he had visited the different counties in that Island and succeeded in grouping small Churches and in making arrangements for the settlement of Missionary pastors, he directed his steps to Guysboro, Antigonish, Pictou, Halifax, Lunenburg and the southern part of Queen's. Subsequently he visited the northern districts of Queen's, and his

labours were blessed to the conversion of many souls and to the up-building of the cause of Christ in Kempt and Maitland, Middlefield, Greenfield, and Chelsea. He then passed through Annapolis and a part of King's. At Berwick he felt it his duty to remain for a time. The cause there was in a very low state. The ways of The circumstances were such that the Board con-Zion mourned. sented for brother Wallace to remain a few weeks. And soon, under his faithful and zealous efforts, there was witnessed one of the most remarkable displays of divine grace ever seen in this Province. The General Agent then passed on and surveyed rather imperfectly Hants, Cumberland, Colchester, Digby, and Yarmouth. In all the places he visited he seemed to be very successful. Board think that the beneficial effects of his labours in awakening an increased interest in the cause of Home Missions, in grouping small Churches, in reviving large ones, and in giving advice to

Ministers and Churches, cannot be overestimated.

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Lack of ministers and efforts to obtain them.—In view of the many destitute fields in the Province and the lack of ministers to supply them, the corresponding secretary of your Board opened a correspondence with Dr. Stock, editor of the London Baptist. That correspondence called forth many enquiries from brethren in England, which in turn led to the settlement of Rev. P. Gallaher, at Milton, Yarmouth County; Rev. J. P. Beel, at Guysboro and Manchester; Rev. John Clark, at Bridgetown; Rev. John Brown, at Cow Bay, C. B., and brother A. E. Ingram, at Mahone Bay. The Board are glad to learn that these brethren are pleased with their fields of labour and are preaching with acceptance to the people. Your Board are persuaded that, as a general rule, provincial men are better adapted to the wants of Nova Scotia than others. lack of ministers was so great and the cry for men from destitute fields was so urgent, that your Board felt it to be their duty to make an effort to supply as rapidly as possible the demand for ministerial labour. To do this they wrote not only to England, but to Canada, and the United States. They also endeavoured to induce our men who were studying at Newton Theological Institution to return to the Provinces. In this latter undertaking they are sorry to report that they have been but partially successful.

As it was the aim of your Board to do the very best they could for the cause of Christ generally and for individual churches not only for the present but also for the future, they felt it their duty to appoint to Mission Stations nearly all the ministerial students at Acadia College and Horton Academy that made application to them. They hoped that by encouraging our young men in this way, they would be more strongly inclined to give the benefit of their future

labours to their native land.

The French Department.—Your Board are enabled to report that considerable progress has been made during the year in connection with the French Mission. The Missionary has been working

faithfully and his labours have been blessed. Two have been added to the French Mission church by baptism. Several have professed conversion. Some have died rejoicing in hope. Others are beginning to seek for the truth. The word of God is being studied, Its effects are coming to light. The missionary still meets with opposition in several places, but he is generally respected and his

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influence is acknowledged to be good.

An attempt has been made to build a meeting house at St. Mary's Bay for the accommodation of the English and French families residing there who are connected with the French Mission Church. Considerable progress has been made in building. But as there was strong opposition to the work by a neighbouring church, it was thought best to let the matter rest until a full investigation of the affair could be made. The house is generally admitted to be a necessity. It will undoubtedly, therefore, be pushed on at an early date to completion. There are two Mission premises belonging to the French Department of Home Missions. One is situated at Tusket, the other at Saulnierville. They are probably worth The one at Saulnier-The house at Tusket is rented. ville is occupied by our French Missionary.

The Book Department .- Your Board felt the growing importance of having our own literature more extensively circulated in the Province, and occupying a more prominent place in our Sabbath School Libraries. To carry out their cherished plan in regard to this matter, they appointed to the colporteur work Mr. A. H. Lavers. He commenced operations in the County of Shelburne, in December last. But the weather was unusually stormy, money was very scarce in that section, and the people visited were generally poor. The sales made by the colporteur, therefore, were not so extensive as the Board anticipated. But a good work was done for the Master. Many denominational and Awakening tracts were distributed, cheap books were given to the poor, and a considerable number of books was sold. Many families were visited who seldom or never had heard the voice of prayer. The poor in several parts of the county had the gospel preached unto them, who scarcely ever had heard the good news except from the lips of our colporteur.

In the early part of April, Gardiner Tufts, Esq., who had been in the employ of the British and North American Tract Society, entered the service of your Board. He has ever since been labouring indefatigably and with the most gratifying success. He is circulating very extensively in the counties of Digby, Annapolis,

and King's, a pure Baptist literature.

The appointment of J. Albert Walker, Esq , of Antigonishe, dates from the first of May. He will canvass the counties of Antigonish, Pictou, Guysboro, and Halifax. He entered very hopefully and energetically upon his work, and bids fair at the present time of being successful in the colporteur department.

Your Board believing the colporteur work to be of immense

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importance, regret that they did not see their way clear to put more labourers in the field. As the enterprise was but in its incipient state they wished to feel their way along and make the Book Department as nearly self-supporting as possible. The corresponding secretary had so much other work to do for the Board-nearly 800 letters to write during the year—that he found it impossible to enlarge the Book Department as he wished to do. It is the firm conviction of your Board, however, that an excellent work has been done in this department. They further believe that if a larger number of suitable colporteurs were found and a proper person obtained to take charge of the Department, an incalculable amount of good would be done to the denomination and to the public, and the Department would be very nearly self-sustaining. During the short time our Colporteurs have been at work, nearly 3000 volumes that teach the truth as we believe it have been circulated, and about \$100 worth of denominational and other religious tracts. estimate the amount of good this literature has already accomplished? And who, before the destinies of eternity are developed, will know how wide a range the influence of these volumes has taken?

Act of Incorporation.—Your Board found it necessary to prepare again a Draft Act of Incorporation. They forwarded this Draft to the Legislature during its last session. And on the 7th day of May last it passed the Legislature and received the assent of the Lieutenant Governor. The following is an exact copy.

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly as follows:-

1. George E. Day, William H. Warren, W. A. C. Randall. James A. Stubbert, John Rowe, Joseph H. Saunders, John Williams, Paoli R. Foster, Abel C. Robbins, Samuel Brown, William R. Doty. John H. Haley, Pearl D. Kinney, and such other persons as are, or shall become members of such Union according to the rules and bye-laws thereof, shall be and hereby are constituted a body corporate by the name of "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union," with power to accept legacies and donations, to purchase, take, hold, possess, and enjoy real and personal estate, and also, by deed or other proper conveyance duly signed under the hand of the Chairman and Corresponding Secretary of the Executive Board of such Union, or such other officers as may from time to time be duly appointed for such purpose, and under the seal of such Union, to give, grant, sell, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of the same or any part thereof, and to dispose of the rents and proceeds thereof for the benefit of such Union, but according to the intention of the granters, or donors, and to execute all other things in and about the same as shall or may be thought. necessary and proper, and also shall have full power and authority to make and amend such constitution, bye-laws, rules, and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of such Union, the choosing of officers and generally for the obtaining of the objects of such Union.

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2. The Board of Managers of the French Mission of the Western Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and the Domestic Mission Board of the Western Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, incorporated respectively under Chapter 47 of the Acts of 1868, and Chapter 59 of the Acts of 1865, by vote or resolution of a majority of the members present at any regular meeting of such respective Boards, and the Board of Management of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society, which society was incorporated under Chapter 68 of the Acts of 1865, on a vote or resolution of a majority of the members present at any regular meeting of such Board, may be and are hereby empowered to transfer their work, funds, and property to the corporation hereby established, and thereupon the existence of such Board, or Boards, Society or Societies, or either of them shall cease and determine, and the Act or Acts creating or incorporating them or either of them, shall be, and is, and are hereby repealed, add all the real, personal, or other estate, which such Board or Boards, Society or Societies, or either of them is, are, or may be interested in or entitled to, shall be vested in the corporation hereby established, and every conveyance, grant, bequest, devise, or gift, of any land or other real, personal, or mixed estate whatsoever, that may have been made to any or all of such Boards or Societies, or may hereafter be made to them or either of them shall be deemed to be made to and vested in the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union hereby incorported, in the same manner and as fully to all intents and purposes as if specially given, granted, bequeathed, devised, or conveyed to such Union by its proper title; and such Union shall have full power and authority to sue for and recover the same either at law or in equity, and to assign, transfer, sell, encumber, lease, convey. charge or otherwise dispose thereof, but shall appropriate the sums, proceeds and profits thereof to and for the purposes and objects for what the same was or were specially given or intended to be given by the donors or grantors.

3. The Constitution and Bye-Laws of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union now in force shall be valid and effectual nntil altered, repealed, or amended in accordance with the provisions of such constitution and bye-laws, and the officers of such union appointed at its Annual Meeting shall remain in office until others shall be appointed in accordance with such constitution and

bye-laws,

By the authority conferred by this Act, and in accordance with the request of the Western Nova Scotia Baptist Association at its session in 1873, the Western Domestic Mission Board transferred to your Board two Provincial Debentures at £100 sterling each. The Acadian French Mission Board also transferred their property consisting of premises at Tusket and Saulnierville to your Board. The Board of Management of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society, according to report of the Secretary of said Board, have ordered a transfer to your Board of their property consisting of two Provincial Debentures at £100 Sterling each, provided we would assume their liabilities. Your Board agreed to assume such liabilities on receipt of the Debentures.

Your Board beg to report that they have had during the year 56 different persons under appointment, 10 of whom have been re-

appointed, making in all 66 persons employed.

SUMMARY—56 Agents, Missionaries, and Colporteurs have been in commission during the year. 10 others have received appointments as second time. Together they have failoured 473 weeks; travelling 18,068 miles; soid 2830 volumes; given away about \$25 worth of books; distributed 3304 tracts, about completion 4 meeting brones; organized 10 miles; and 6123 fail with a second 417; organized 5 subbath schools; built or carried to completion 4 meeting brones; organized 10 miles of 8 subbath schools; built or carried to amount sent by the General Agent to the Treasurer, and which appears in his account.

Your Board further report, that that in addition to the appointments they have made, they introduced Rev. H. Bool to the Churches at Maccan and River Hebert, and that he settled with them. They also introduced Bro. Isaac S. Skinner to Rev. D. A. Steele and the Amherst Church, and that Bro. Skinner was accepted by the Church to assist their Pastor.
