As to the outcome at Ottawa, there is fair certainty. For whatever reason, the Government has set its face towards Washington and away from true Canadian and Imperial ideals. Oromocto Lumber Company and F. S. Scott Cutting Three Million Feet in Vicinity of

Rooth Station.

Rooth Station, York Co., Jan. 28.—
F. Lowe, of Amherst, junior partner of the Oromocto Lumber Company, visited one of their camps on the Yoho on Tuesday last. Mr. Armstrong is in charge of a crew of 45 men, who expect to cut nearly a million and a half.

Ed. Carter, of Amherst, with twenty men, mostly from Amherst, has a contract of cutting this lumber into long deals and laths. He is turning out nearly 18,000 feet per day. This is being hauled to Rooth Station and shipped to market.

John S. Scott, of Fredericton, is also operating in the neighborhood of Rooth and so far is doing a fair season's work. He has a logging crew of about 50 men with Blanch Price as foreman, who are hauling lumber to his mill where it is sawn into long lumber and laths. Mr. Scott has a valuable mill in the woods in charge of Harry Rankine of Fredericton. He will probably cut this winter in the vicinity of a million and a half.

Mr. C. Day, of Gibson, is the government inspector for this concern and the Oromocto Lumber Company.

Most of Mr. Scott's lumber is being loaded and shipped to the American market.



U.S. BANK LOANS SHOW LARGE GAIN

New York, Jan. 29.—Revival of buying in lesser volume than attended the recent upward movement, lifted Sagurday's stock market from the apathetic condition of the past few days. 




