thoroughly warme, on that side. They are thawed out, and the bark becomes soft, sappy and pliable. Then, when the sun goes down and the tempera-ture falls again to zero, the bark is again frozen tight. The next day the same thing happens, and so day after day the young bark freezes and thaws, and by this means is torn to shreds. When spring arrives the bark is kil-led and broken open. Then various kinds of fungi get in and the damage which begins by freezing and thaw-ing ends with spread of canker and other troubles about the trunk of the tree. The best preventives of sun-scald are low heads and veneer and paper cylinder protectors. High-head-ed trees, which are of doubtful value anywhere, are undesirable in places where sunscald is bad. The protec-tors of paper or wood veneer recom-mended above for mice and rabbits will also give practical immunity from sunscald. This trouble is a very seri-ous one. It is not uncommon to find young orchards runds from it. 

A considerable crowd assembled at Market Square yesterday morning at the recruiting meeting conducted by Bishop Richardson and Sergeant Knight. His Lordship stated that New Brunswick could send many more men to the front, and the utmost sacrifice would be necessary before victory was won. He regretted that his own responsibility prevented him from going, but he was doing every-thing in his power to aid the cause. He paid a slowing tribute to Sergeant Knight and his work in recruiting. Sergeant Knight made his usual elo-quent piea for men and gave direc-tions to all who wished to enlist. The honor roll, he said, had amounted to twenty men a day this week and he urged the men of St. John to keep up the average. During the meeting three cheers were given by the crowd to Lieut. Frank Tingley, who was vounded at the front, and is now recuperating preparatory to going back. The 104th band was present and provided music during the meeting. While it was, he said, an established fact that the use of strong intoxicating, alcoholic beverages, such as whisky and brandy, had done much to promote tuberculosis by lower-ing the vitality of the persons who took them. Lager and mild ale were forms of liquid beefsteak, which undoubtedly imparted power and strength to the system. He could not see why the laboring man should be deprived of this neefful stimulant, and argued that care ought to be shown in legislating against liquors, thus to protect the working classes.




