GREATEST BATTLE OF WHOLE WAR NOW RAGING FIERCELY ALONG LENGTH OF WESTERN FRONT

FRENCH ON MONDAY REACHES 11,000.

Violent Artillery Fire Feature of Recent Engagements Many Villages Taken on Line from Soissons to Rheim -Greatest Battle of War is Now Developing.

Paris, April 17.—Continuing their terrific attack against the German positions between Soissons and Rheims and east of the latter place today, the French carried German first line positions over many miles of front, captured powerfully organized heights, occupied the important village of Auberive, and on this part of the front, about two miles in extent, took more than 2,500 prisoners.

According to the official statement from the war office strong German counter-attacks were repulsed. The number of German prisoners taken by the French Monday is now placed at 11,000. The text of the statement reads:

"We enlarged our action today east of Rheims and attacked the man lines between Prunay and the road between St. Hilaire and St. plet. Notwithstanding violent gusts of rain and snow, our troops ved themselves irresistible. They carried on a front of 15 kilomes (nine and a third miles), despite the resistance of the enemy, all first German position south of Moronvilliers.

"Pushing beyond this position our troops brilliantly carried, on a not of eleven kilometres, a line of heights solidly organized from Carnillet, as far east as Vaudesincourt.

TO BE EXTENDED UNTIL NOVEMBER

House of Commons Passes Extension Bill on Second Reading by Vote of 286 to 52-Bonar Law Leads Those who Oppose War Time Election.

London, April 17—All possibility of the country being disturbed in the near future by a general election was removed tonight, when, by a vote of 286 to 52, the House of Commons passed on second reading the bill for the extension of the life of the parliament until Novamber. The Nationalists party in the House of Commons could rightly be taunted with the fact that it could not speak for freland. At the root of the terrible situation in Ireland today, Mr. Dillon said, was the fact that the Nationalist party's work, extending over thirty-five years, of instilling into the minds of the Dill, on the ground elaborated by John Dillon, member of East Mayo, that no solution of home rule for Ireland had yet been announced. Andrew Bonar Law, member of the British war council, in concluding the debate on behalf of the government, admitted that a solution of the home rule problem would be a great advantage in the prosecution of the war. 

EIGHT LOADED RELIEF SHIPS



REFUTES CHARGES THAT BRITISH SUNK 2 AMERICAN SHIPS

Senator Hitchcock Replies to Mr. Norris on the Evelyn and the Carib.

Washington, D. C., April 17—Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Dem., of Neraska, refuted charges made by his colleague, Senator George W. Norris, during the recent Senate debate on the war resolution, that the American ships Evelyn and Carib were sunk by British mines planted in the North Sea and not by the Prussians.

Mr. Hitchcock asked that a note from the German Embassy be printed in the Congressional Record, which explains from the German standpoint that the Evelyn and Carib were sunk because they did not obey the orders of the German Admiralty to keep in safe waters.

The correction of Senator Norris' statement was requested by Robert Lansing, Secretary of State, who sent a letter to Senator King, of Utah, Secretary of the Democratic Steering Committee, together with a translation of a letter from the German Embassy dated March 1 to the Secretary of State, and following that another letter from the Germany Embassy dated March 26, 1915 to the Secretary of State.

"I shall not ask to have these documents read," said Senator Hitchcock, "but I should like the privilege of saying that they have been prepared and were sent to Senator King for the purpose of correcting certain inaccuracles which developed here in debate and which have been widely published concerning the mining of the North Sea and the highways of the ocean."



THOSE IN FAVOR AND THOSE AGAINST THE CONTINUATION OF THE DAYLIGHT SAVING SCHEME IN ST. JOHN agree on the common ground of nationalization. Those in favor want to have the extra hour no matter how much it upsets the legitimate business plans of men with large interests at stake. Those frank enough to state their objections are once more willing to gracefully bow to the will of the majority. On the other hand the merits of the "anti" case must in all fairness be acknowledged. In the matter of the odd-hour day St. John is an island. Everybody around us uses the regular time. The railways refuse to upset their timetables for St. John only. Result—confusion, risks and losses to some people. Why not therefore nationalize the scheme? St. John has done well to lead the procession but since other sections are not following suit some of our people are suffering. Let all hands therefore get together and urge the legalizing of the plan for the Dominion as a whole, or suspend it in St. John until that can be accomplished. 
