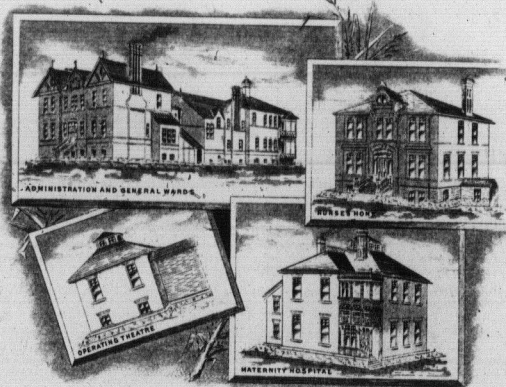

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ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1890.

The Board of Directors of the Winnipeg General Hospital beg to submit the following report of the affairs and business of the Hospital for the year 1890.

The annual general meeting of the members of the corporation will be held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Monday, the 9th of February, 1891, at 3 o'clock p. m.

At the last annual meeting it was stated that the retiring Board had decided to apply for an amendment to the Act of Incorporation, providing that, instead of the whole fifteen members of the Board retiring at the end of each year, the Directors should be elected for three years, and that five Directors only should retire annually. This amendment has been passed by the Legislature, and it is provided, as was arranged at the meeting, that of the fifteen Directors who were then elected, Messrs. Hespeler, Archibald, Mr. Justice Bain, and Messrs. Sprague and Aikins should hold office for three years, Dr. Lynch, and Messrs. Drewry, Nairn, Moore, and Nanton, for two years, and Messrs. Maulson, Champion, Whitcher, Carruthers and Stobart, for one year.

In September last, Mr. Whitcher resigned his position on the Board, as he was leaving Winnipeg to reside in Ottawa. Mr. Whitcher had been a member of the Board for a number of years, and always took a warm and active interest in the Hospital, and the Board very much regretted that they were losing his services.

In the amendment to the Act of Incorporation, a provision was inserted that, in case a vacancy should occur on the Board, the Board should thereupon elect someone from among the members of the corporation to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting, and in pursuance of this power, the Board elected Mr. G. F. Galt to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Whitcher's resignation.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board held last month, a communication was received from Mr. Champion,



stating that, from want of time to give to his duties as a Director, he was compelled to resign from the Board. Mr. Champion has been a valued member of the Board since 1888, and his resignation was accepted with much regret. As the annual meeting was so near, the Board did not elect anyone in Mr. Champion's place.

The Directors who retire at the annual meeting are, therefore, Messrs. Maulson, Carruthers, Stobart and Galt; and the election of their successors, and of someone in succession to Mr. Champion, will be for a term of three years. All retiring members of the Board are eligible for re-election.

The thanks of the Board are due to Mr. Aikins, Q. C., for drafting the amendments to the Act of Incorporation, and to him and Mr. Isaac Campbell, Q. C., M. P. P., for attending to the passage of the amendments through the Legislature.

The number of patients treated in the Hospital during the year was 982, as against 1020 in 1889. The aggregate number of days of treatment, however, exceeded those of 1889 by 2530. It may be interesting to note that of these 982 patients, 612 came from the City, 294 from various other places on the Province, 30 from the N. W. Territories and British Columbia, and the remaining 46 from Ontario and the United States. The number of out-patients treated was 660.

The usual financial statements are appended, viz :

No. 1. A general cash statement, showing the receipts during the year from all sources, and showing how the money received has been disposed of.

No. 2. The working account for the carrying on of the Hospital, showing the amounts paid under the various items that make up the annual expenditure.

The accounts have been duly audited, and the report of the auditors is printed in the appendix.

In the appendix will be found a list of all who have given cash subscriptions and donations during the year, and lists are given of the several Municipalities who have contributed to the support of the Hospital and of the amounts contributed by each, as well as of the Churches in which collections were taken up on behalf of the Hospital, and of the amounts collected. The amount received from Municipalities

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is less than was received in 1889, by \$153.88, and the Church collections exceed those of 1889 by \$124.89.

The instalment of principal, \$2000, and the interest, \$385, that fell due on the 1st of January on the mortgage to the London & Canadian Loan & Agency Co., on the Maternity Hospital and the Nurses' Home buildings, were duly paid. There now remains due on this mortgage \$3,500, with interest.

It was found to be necessary last spring, in order to maintain the sanitary condition and comfort of the Main and Administration Buildings, to take out and discard all the baths and water closets that had been put into these buildings when they were first erected. New baths and closets of the most suitable pattern that could be found were put in their place, and the pipes and plumbing connected with them were carefully over-hauled and refitted. Durable hard-wood floors were also laid down in the bath-rooms and closets, and the worn out flooring in the kitchen was replaced with a hard-wood floor. The cost of these necessary improvements makes up the principal part of the item of \$2202.06 that appears in the account for "repairs."

In April a contract was entered into with the Manitoba Electric & Gas Light Co., for the lighting of all the Hospital buildings with Incandescent Electric Light; and the cost of wiring the buildings, supplying lamps, etc., is included in the item of \$761.47 for "light." The electric lighting has been found to be satisfactory and convenient, and it was a great relief to the Board to get rid of the numerous coal-oil lamps with which the buildings had previously been lighted, as the risk of fire with so many lamps in use was a serious and constant danger.

The Board deemed it necessary, during the year, to call the attention of the City authorities to the fact that in the event of a fire taking place in the Hospital buildings, there would be difficulty in obtaining a supply of water; and the Board are under obligation to the Mayor and Council for promptly taking action in the matter by directing the construction of a tank at the corner of McDermot and Nena streets, adjacent to the Hospital property.

In May last, Dr. O'Reilly resigned the position of Medical Superintendent, which he had held since 1887. The Board

appointed as his successor Dr. W. S. England, who had been one of the house surgeons in the Montreal General Hospital, and who was recommended to the Board by several of the leading physicians and surgeons connected with that institution. The Board are glad to be able to express their satisfaction with the manner in which Dr. England has discharged the exacting and difficult duties of his position, a position that demands not only competent medical skill and experience, but also administrative and executive ability in no ordinary degree.

In April last the Board decided that the appointment of a supervising or head nurse would tend to increase the efficiency both of the Hospital and of the Training School for Nurses, and the appointment was offered to and accepted by Miss M. C. Laidlaw, who had received her training as a nurse in, and was one of the first graduates of, our own Training School, and the Board are pleased to be able to say that all the advantages they hoped for have resulted from Miss Laidlaw's appointment.

The staff of nurses in the Hospital now consists of the head nurse and four trained nurses, all of whom have graduated from our own Training School, and twelve pupil nurses, who are now taking the course of instruction in the School. As regards the Hospital itself, the Training School in connection with it has proved to be a very great benefit, and that it also is felt to be a benefit to the public, apart from the nursing it provides for the patients in the Hospital, is shewn by the fact that during the year 120 applications were received for nurses to attend patients in private houses. Nurses were available, however, to supply only sixty-one of these applications.

The report of the Medical Superintendent, and the medical and surgical statistics of the Hospital for the year, are printed in the appendix. Dr. England calls attention, as did Dr. O'Reilly last year, to the necessity of enlarging and improving the laundry, and steps will have to be taken at once to provide better laundry accommodation. As Dr. England points out, the number of typhoid fever cases in the Hospital last year was nearly 100 less than there was the year before. Had there been as many cases last year, the Hospital could not have accommodated the patients that would have been applying for admission, for, as it was, the general wards, and

It is evident, then, that as soon as funds are available, the capacity of the Hospital should be increased, and probably this could not be done to better advantage than, as Dr. England suggests, by erecting a separate building for infectious cases and taking the present isolated wards for fever wards. The demand for private wards is also continually increasing, and already is often greater than can be supplied. But the Hospital has no endowment, and it will depend entirely on the liberality of the public whether or not these urgently needed additions and improvements can be made. It may be mentioned that during the present month there has been a large increase in the daily average number of patients, and there have been as many as 94 patients in at one time, and difficulty has been found in providing beds for all who apply for admission.

The Directors are able to express their full satisfaction with the manner in which the duties of the matron, nurses and the rest of the Hospital staff, have been performed, and they desire also to thank the members of the medical staff for the very valuable services which they render gratuitously to the Hospital.

An important change in the by-laws in reference to the appointment of the attending medical staff was made during the year. Under the former by-laws the members of the attending staff were appointed for an indefinite period, and the result of this was that, practically, the medical staff had become permanent, and enjoyed a monopoly of the advantages of the Hospital practice. This position of matters was felt to be unjust to the medical profession of the city generally, as well as detrimental to the interests of the Hospital, and the Board, therefore, decided that, beginning with the present year, each new Board of Directors should appoint its own attending staff for the year. The by-laws have been amended to give effect to this decision, and it is provided that the term of office of the present members of the staff shall cease on the day of the regular monthly meeting of the Board in March, when the election of new members for the year shall take place. All the present members of the staff are, of course, made eligible for re-election.

The annual report of the "Women's Hospital Aid Society" is appended hereto, and shows the important and valuable assistance that the Society has given towards carrying on the work of the Hospital during the year. For this assistance the Board desires to express their warm and sincere thanks.

GENTLEMEN:

I beg to present the medical report of the work done in the hospital for the year ending December 31st, 1890.

Patients remaining from last year.....	71
Patients admitted during the year.....	911

Fifty children were treated during the year.

The aggregate number of days of treatment was 24,991.

The average stay per patient was 25.5 days.

One hundred and eighteen private ward patients were treated, an increase of 31 over the previous year; of these four were maternity cases.

Forty-six patients were confined in the maternity branch.

The number of operations for the year was 149 major and 158 minor. Total 307.

Eighty-two deaths occurred during the year; of these 11 died within 24 hours after admission.

Six hundred and sixty patients were treated in the outdoor department.

The number of ambulance trips for the year was 190.

It is worthy of mention that the number of cases of typhoid fever treated was particularly small as compared with previous years, being nearly 100 less than last year.

There have been numerous applications for private nurses during the year, sixty-one nurses having been sent out, and we had demand for about as many more.

The sanitary arrangements of the Hospital are in excellent condition, the latest improved baths and water closets having

been put in connected v

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been put in throughout the building. All the plumbing work connected with these is exposed, and so is readily accessible.

The city morgue, which is connected to the Hospital, requires a water supply and drainage, when all would be complete.

The electric light, which was put in early last year, is a great improvement on the former coal-oil lamp, both as regards usefulness and safety.

Before appending the classified lists of the number of diseases treated and operations performed during the years allow me to make a few suggestions:

1st. As to the advisability of building a separate hospital for the treatment of infectious cases at the south-west corner of the grounds where the laundry now stands.

The present isolated wards, although doing good service, are not satisfactory in many respects, and if a new branch were erected for infectious diseases these wards could be renovated at a small cost and converted into a fever department.

2nd. As to the unsuitableness of the present laundry, I have only to reiterate Dr. O'Reilly's suggestion in last year's report. It is inconveniently situated, too small, and inefficiently equipped.

3rd. The present number of private wards is insufficient, every available ward being occupied at times and patients having to go elsewhere for accommodation.

Again, there are over fifty students attending the hospital this winter, consequently when the attending and hospital staffs are present the operating theatre is found to be uncomfortably and inconveniently crowded. It is also expensively and unsatisfactorily heated.

The length of the corridor between the administrative and main building, also the corridor leading to the operating theatre, are unnecessarily long and inefficiently heated.

These difficulties must be overcome in time, and it would be an easy matter, providing the funds were forthcoming, to overcome them by extending the main building as far as the corridor leading to the operating theatre, and out as far as the east side of the theatre.

WOMAN'S HOSPITAL AID SOCIETY.

Since the last annual meeting, held January 7th, 1890, the society has expended \$519.44 in aid of the General Hospital, and has to its credit at the bank the sum of \$2663.96. Such a highly satisfactory state of affairs is due to the collections made this autumn, instead of giving the usual ball, by which a sum of \$2229.55 was raised.

The members have every reason to congratulate themselves on the result of the experiment, and gratefully return their thanks to the public who have so generously responded to their appeal. Hitherto the funds have been too limited to admit of the society doing all they desired, now they hope to be able in many ways to add to the comfort of the patients.

The matron has not required so many blankets this year, and six bedsteads, two lounges and some rubber matting were supplied in 1889 at a total cost of \$150.62.

In 1890 we have had no such demands, and supplies for the nurses' home and children's ward being new we have not had much to replace there.
