The Liberals Capture Thirty-Three Seats That Were Held by Conservatives.

Through writing at an early hour this morning, we are unable to give a definite statement of the general result of yesterday's Dominion contests, and for full particulars we must refer our readers to the telegraphic reports on another page.

The fate of the Toty Government is trembling in the balance, if indeed, the Administration is not deprived of anything like a working majority. A large number of its best men have been defeated, three Ministers and two prospective Ministers have lost their seats, and demoralization of the high tax forces is apparent on every hand.

While the Liberals would naturally have preferred to carry the country by an unmistakable majority, and while we have no doubt it would have been greatly to the advantage of the people, there is another side to the matter that is worthy of consideration. When last the Liberals attained power, they were unforstely confronted with a period of un-

al depression of trade, not only in Can-, but in the United States and all over .id they fairly be held responsible for s state of affairs, their opponents did not ple to turn the hard times to account to make political capital out of

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financial troubles. In some ects, and we much regret being comlled to acknowledge it, the effects of the trictionist policy as provided for in Conevative legislation on the one hand and the McKinley Bill on the other, will be highly detrimental to this country's interests, and it would hardly be out of place that the men responsible for this te of affairs should experience its full ects before final dismissal by the outaged electorate. Whoever is at the head of affairs in the next few months will be onfronted with much trouble, renered possible by the bungling of the ties cannot be evaded. They must be faced, and perhaps it is just as well that the men who are responsible should, for the time being, bear the burden of popular disfavor for a little longer.

He is beloved by all with whom he comes in contact, and if need be could have schieved election in a dozen coustituencies. The star of the silver-tongued statesman of Canada is indeed in the ascendant.

ASPECT OF COMMERCE.

Lord Salisbury's Speech at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet - The Labor Question.

Labor Question.

London, March 5.—At the Chamber of Commerce banquet last evening Lord Salisbury congratulated those present on the improved aspect of commerce. Hostile trails and excess of protection feeling were tariffs and excess of protection feeling were the only clouds visible. He referred especially to France and America. In the former the Government struggled with a violent popular feeling. In American ultra protection had been checked by the people in the late election. When a country raised a tariff against us with the deliberate purpose of the exclusion of our goods, should well protest, they would reply that that was what was intended. Therefore, he would not fall into the snare and offer a protest. He humorously dilated upon the puerility of protest to foreign nations, the result of which, he said, was generally the reverse of that intended, unless, of course, the protest had something behind it. There was another dark generally the reverse of that intended, unless, of course, the protest had something behind it. There was another dark shadow due to the same protection ideas—so curious a phenomenon in our time—which was based on an endeavor to win the race by preventing an opponent from race by preventing an opponent from running. That was the struggle between which was based on an opponent from race by preventing an opponent from running. That was the struggle between labor and capital. Unions were the natural growth of steam and electricity. We must hope for perfection of growth when union meant an endeavor to do the best for ourselves and the community, but a corollary of union is absolute liberty of refusal to unite, and it is the duty of the Government to do its utmost to preserve this liberty. That principle lies at the base of our national character and instincts. He declined to believe that the aystem of submission to union which had been swept away by the French revolution would ever be revived. Facts are stronger than sophistry, and the eight-hour proposal attacked a vital principle of individual liberty. Parliament had no right to interfere. He would be no party to legislation to the individual effort to cramp the freedom of trade. If the eight-hour day were conceded to miners it would not be right to withhold it from other trades, and once we pass the rubicon separating us from the domain of socialism, commercial and industrial supremacy would be lost and difficult to recapture. He declared he had consented to the labor commission, not because the Government had any doubts in their minds, but in order to facilitate discussion to expose the fallacy of socialistic ideas.

Going Backward.

Paris, March 5.—M. Meline, in the Chamber of Deputies to-day presented the report of the Tariff Committee. The report affirms the necessity of protecting the agriculture industries and the manufacturers of France, and argues that such action would benefit the consumers as well as the producers. An increase in the tariff, says the report, would augment the public revenue and develop home trade.

Shetland Ponies.

The conventional Shetland pony, the animal represented in picture books—namely, about 40 to 44 inches high, very tight jointed, and with an impossible growth of hair all over him—is just about as bad a type of this famous race as can be well imagined. A South Mainland specimen, on the other hand, long and rakish in build, hard grown, as the saying is, and clean limbed, will far surpass his companion in staying power.

One of this hardy breed—in our opinion the ideal Shetland pony—has been known to travel from Shumburg to Lerwick and back the same day, with a tolerably heavy riding weight, say 56 miles altogether of extremely hilly road. But, minor differences apart, there are certain characteristics—unfailing tests in their way with the experienced judge—which go the "make-up" of a Shetland, as distinguished from an Iceland or Farce, popy—e.g., a certain unmistakable breadth of build, set of pasterns, and, more particularly, an apathetic air which no other breed possesses. The following remarkable story, told by an eye witness, is entitled to a place among the instances of intelligence among the lower animals. A cook was much annoyed to find his pastry shelves attacked by ants. By careful watching it was discovered that off they came out twice a day in search of food—at about 7 in the morning and 4 in the afternoon. How were the pies to be protected against the invaders?

He did not have long to wait, for at 6:30 o'clock he noticed that off in the left hand corner of the pantry was a line of ants slowly making their way in the ditection of the pies. They seemed like a vast army coming forth to attack the enemy. In front was a leader, who was larger than any of the others, and who always kept a little ahead of his troops.

They were of the sort known as the medium-sized red ant, which is regarded as the most intelligent of its kind, whose scientific name is formice rubra.

Some authorities on the subject maintain that it is attributable with the color of the subject maintain that it is attributable. solely to climate. In contradiction to this, however, other authorities prove that the dark color of the skin does not depend the dark color of the skin does not depend on geographical position, nor even alto-gether on racial purity, by the fact that the extremes of the chromatic scales are found throughout the whole negro domain. Dr. J. V. Shoemaker, the eminent der-matologist, of this city, in speaking of the Dr. J. V. Shoemaker, the eminent dermatologist, of this city, in speaking of the result of Dr. Ege's experiment, said that, in his opinion, a negro's skin grafted upon a white man would probably lose its color, the process of cutting disturbing the cells containing the coloring matter. Dr. H. C. Beeuning, demonstrator of anatomy at the Medico-Chirurgical College, also holds this opinion, but at the same time says it is imperative that the particles of skin'stransplanted should be very minute as in the case of Dr. Ege's experiment. Dr. Boeuning also said that while colored skin transplanted on a white man will lose its color and become white, white skin grafted upon a negro would never become black. From this it will be seen that although a negro might possibly be turned white, those white persons who are so enamored of the soft glossy unctuous epidermis of the negro as to desire a change are debarred by nature from indulging their peculiar taste.


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

The result of yesterday's Dominion elec-

tion in the city of London must be decidedly satisfactory to the Liberal party in the country, but especially so to the believers in a fair play policy of taxation in the Forest City itself. For over 30 years the city of London has

been dominated by the influence of Mr. Carling, and it is unnecessary to say not always to the advantage of the taxpayers. In recent years, however, London has become more and more Liberal, and less and less inclined to tolerate personal rulership. The citizens recognized the signal service which Mr. Hyman then performed by electing him to the Mayor's chair by a handsome majority. Conspiracy Formed to Seize the Government.

San Francisco, Cal., March 5.—A prominent Honolulu merchant who arrived vesterday brings news of a conspiracy formed by Col. Volney V. Ashford, commander of the Honolulu Rifles, to seize the Hawaiian Government and make the Queen a mere figure head. From inside sources he learned that the American missionaries, who are headed by Supreme Justice Judd, attempted to form a Cabinet which would be favorable to the sugar and other interests, but the Queen rejected this, as it was formed of Europeans, several of whom were opposed to any representation of Kanakas in the executive offices. Several cabinets were formed, but the Queen and her advisers could not agree on any. They finally settled on one with H. A. Widemenn as Premier, but when this was announced two members of the old Cabinet said if she named a new Cabinet on the day after the news of Kalakua's death war received her selection would have been approved. The delay has caused bitter feelings and trouble is sure to result. When the American Minister learned the details of Ashford's scheme he arranged to have marines landed from the Mohican and Iroquois in case any attack should be made on the Government House. It is reported that the Cabinet will refuse to make the young Princess Kalakauna heir apparent, as she desires to name her own son for this place. This son, however, is illigitimate, being a full-blooded Kanaka, so that the whites will object. The general opinion smong the foreigners of Honolulu, is that the new Queen is obstinate, and determined to have more power than Kalakaua enjoyed, but that she lacks decision of character, and will probably fail to realize her ambition by temporizing, as she has done in the matter of the Cabinet.



All through the week Peall, who was palpably unwell, was unable to do himself justice, except for a brief period on Tuesday, and consequently Mitchell, without doing anything sensational, took the lead at the outset, and, improving as he went on, scored more than twice as fast as his rival, so that on Friday night he was actually nearly 7,000 points in front at 12,501 to 5,613.

On Saturday, however, Peall recovered form in startling fashion, and in the evening had matters all his own way, for after scoring 123 he made 89, 281 (90 spets), 284 (84 spots), and wound up with a wonderful run of 1,043, which was still unfinished at 11:30 o'clock, and this contained sequences of 127, 83 and 173 spots. It was thus absolutely certain that the game could not be finished before midnight, as Peall was still in good position, and Mitchell wanted 741 to win. As, therefore, one of the conditions—that the match should start and finish within the week—could not be complied with, the game was declared drawn, and Peall, very luckily, will save his stake, final scores were: Mitchell, 14,259; Peall, 7,902. During the week Mitchell made 34 three-figure breaks, of which the best were 843, 801, 645, 705 and 650. Peall, apart from his unfinished run of 1,043, only made sixteen runs exceeding 100.

Macdonald Administration.
