OTTAWA, May 30.—When the House
opened to day the Secretary of State reblied to a reference which Mr. Lister made plied to a reference which hir. Lister made to him during the all-night session on the 19th inst., that the campaign in North Perth was carried on in behalf of the Government by subscriptions from Tory Senators, and that the Secretary of State did not go to North Perth without the necessary "influence." The Parliamentary opponents of the scheme to further gerrymander the constituencies, so as to stifle the voice of the public, have not up to the time of writing made public their "plan of campaign." Some people are under the impression that they will endeavor to fix the enormity of the crime against the liberties of the people by strong opposition and persistent exposure in the House of Commons. No doubt those tactics would put the unscrupulous engineers of the gerrymander on the defensive, and prove that the bill honest measure, and that its effect would not be to equalize the which they desire to pass is not an constituencies, while preserving, as far as possible, the municipal boundaries. The exact reverse can easily be proved. Yet after all has been said and done, the Par-liamentary objectors to the "loaded dice" legislation will be confronted with the fact that a gerrymander as bad, if not worse, was forced through Parliament in 1882, after the most persistent opposition that could be offered to it by experienced representatives of the people, with Hon. Edward Blake at their head. The Conservative leader merely instructed his supporters to stand by the emasculation of the constituencies, and they stood. Many of the men now in the House of Commons owe their election to that gerrymander. They could not be elected in the constituencies if the county boundaries had been un-broken, and if the townships and villages even had not been tossed about to establish for them an unfair advantage over their opponents. With such a knowledge is it very probable that these men will be critics of the new gerrymander bill, which in more than one instance is intended, first of all, to make safe seats for servile followers of Sir John Thompson?

Our belief, therefore, is that despite the protests of every independent newspaper in the country and the protests of independent church courts the Parliamentary majority will see the Gerrymander Bill through if Sir John Thompson says "That

We have suggested, as a method fair to everyone, that the redistribution of seats should be made by an inde-pendent, non-partisan body, as in Great Britain. If the Government will not consent to that proposition, and will not hand over the rearrangement of the constituencies to the Supreme Court of Canada, as it has full power to do, then the public must reach the conclusion that Sir John Thompson and his associates mean to do their worst, and that no redress can be obtained from the men whose very political life may depend, no doubt in many cases does depend, upon the improper redistribu-

It may be said that though such an appeal for justice to a Government that, in a large measure, owes its life to a following representing gerrymandered constituencies, will fail, there as still an appeal to the people. But with party spirit so strong as it is in Canif an appeal is made in a gerrymandered constituency against the crimes of a gerry-

mandering Government?
We are believers in Canadian independence, and if Canada were independent to-day, and its constitution permitted the perpetration of gerrymandering, we would give our public men no rest till they amended a constitution that perpetuated so outrageous a system. Our constitution was not the work of Canada but of the Imperial authorities, who apparently did not foresee how great an injustice might be done to one half the people by the improper manipula-tion of the provisions regarding the rearrangement of the Parliamentary constitu-

CAUTIONED BY THE THUNDERER. Lord Salisbury hoped to divert attention from the Irish question and from the numerous social questions that have forced themselves to the front in England in recent years by suggesting that the time has come for adopting a mildly retaliatory trade policy towards certain of the European continental countries which have adopted high taxation on imports, to the injury of their own people as well as to the deteriment of British manufacturers. That was the trend of the Conservative leader's address at Hastings a couple of weeks ago. The subject has since been thoroughly discussed in the British papers, but even the journals that ean most strongly towards the general policy of Lord Salisbury take the ground that his retaliatory propositions would hurt rather than help the country. The London Times, for example, in unqualifiedly terms condemns the proposed tariff war. It tells the Prime Minister that "the country has long since resolved that, great as are the difficulties created by the hostile fiscal policy of foreign Governments, it would be on the whole far worse for our commerce to plunge into tariff wars, with all the complexities and changes of duties levied for coercive purposes and not for revenue. Lord Salisbury tells the electors that they should be guided by common sense, and not by tradition or authority. The conditions, however, which he treats as indispensable are so unlikely to be realized that the decision of common sense, apart from any economical theories, can hardly be doubtful. We cannot, he admits, levy retaliatory duties on food supplies or raw materials. Therefore we cannot touch the United States, which has carried the protective system to the most injurious point. But he contends that, while the worst offenders are thus allowed to wage war on our trade without retalia tion, we might tax luxuries, such as wine, silk, lace, and so forth, coming from France, Germany and Austria-Hungary. This lop-sided scheme would involve us in angry conflicts, and would leave the most serious part of the wrong untouched. Moreover-Lord Salisbury sees that no change in the fiscal policy of this country could be carried into effect, or would produce any

A Free Library for the Whole City.

To the Editor of the ADVENTISER:

I have followed with much interest the discussion in your valuable paper on the "Free Library" question. With much that has been said I find myself in fullest sympathy, whilst other, much has been asource of deepest regret. There are a certain class among our "workingmen" who always have the impression when they write or speak that none but those who handle pick or shovel, saw or plane, etc., do an honest day's work or earn fairly whatever of salary may be theirs; and that of all followers of professions those of the ministerial get theirs the easiest. Others there are who never seem able to think that ministers never seem able to think that ministers can oppose anything for any other purpose than having their own way. I have felt during the former part of this discussion that it was easier for some to misunderstand than otherwise. The Ministerial Association wants a free library, but they want it by the whole city, and so for the whole city, and in such a way that every young man, and every young woman, and every boy, and every girl old enough to know how to use and take care of a book, shall feel they have an unqualified right to participate in its benefits. Now, there seems to be an impression abroad that when the people's taxes get into the hands of the seems to be an impression abroad that when the people's taxes get into the hands of the Council, the Council is perfectly free to do as it pleases with them. Hence we have had the spectacle of taxes voted to street parades, the sole benefit of which accrued to the societies getting up the parade. And I remember it was said at the time, "if one or two societies, why not others?" And so if one society's free library, then why not those of the churches, for they are free? And so let in on a small scale the prenicious principle of state aid. I imagine that did the Council grant the request they might find them

of state aid. I imagine that did the Council grant the request they might find them selves blocked by an injunction. Now, I sincerely hope our "workingmen" will not let this matter drop until we get what we want. In the Mechanics' Institute and the "Free Library" we could have the neucleus of a good library. Then if I mistake not the Leonards, with laudable devotion to a revered father's memory, offered \$7,000 towards a swimming bath, which I understand it has been found impracticable to go on with. Perhaps they might feel inclined to devote that towards a free library in every way worthy of the eity.

THE BAPTIST PROTEST Discussed by the Ministerial Association of Toronto.

TORONTO, May 30.—At the Ministerial Association meeting to-day the matter of the protest of the Baptist ministers against the granting of aid to Methodist schools for Indians in the Northwest came up incidentally, and called forth remarks from a number of ministers present.

Rev. G. B. Carr, a Presbyterian visiter from Scotland, said the Baptists were right in the ground they had taken, and argued that a body of ministers should never approach the Government claiming to voice the sentiments of a whole denomination and ask for special legislation or special treatment.

Some farmers mow their meadows as close as possible, and make the turf lock as if it had been shaved with a razor. Of all grasses timothy probably suffers the most from too close mowing. It should not be cut below the first joint, and better still above the second. When cut through the bulb, or too near it, the plant is often killed. The meadow will start much quicker if the grass is cut about two or three inches high, than when below that height, and the pasturage which will be three inches high, than when below that height, and the pasturage which will be gained, will much more than balance for the extra amount of hay of doubtful quality that is obtained by close mowing. Finer grasses can be cut lower than coarse ones, and lowland meadows suffer but very little from being cut close, and possibly benefited, as the sun can thereby reach the ground, and dry out the excess of moisture.



A Jowish Pestival.

The great and ancient Jewish festival of Pentecost will begin at sunset to-day, the 50th day after the first day of Passover, and continue to-morrow. It will be celebrated by the Jews throughout the world. Pentecost is called "Shabuoth" in the Hebrew language, and occurs on the sixth day of the month of Sivvan. It is the anniversary of the Sinaltic revelation, given, as described in the Book of Exodus, when the Lord descended in fire upon Mount Sinai amid thunderings and Lightnings and delivered the Ten Commandments to Moses. Pentecost, or Shabuoth, is referred to several times in the New Testament. It is narrated in the Book of Acts that on the day of Pentecost the Spirit descended upon the apostles in Jerusalem, enabling them to speak in the many languages of the people assembled there. In the same book it is told how, upon one occasion, Paul made hears in his traveles coexists. assembled there. In the same book it is told how, upon one occasion, Paul made haste in his travels so as "to be at Jerusalem the day of Pentecost;" and again, in the First Epistle to the Corinthians, Paul wrote that he "would tarry at Ephesus until Pentecost." The feast of Shabuoth was observed by the Jews at that time, as it had been long before and as it is yet, in memory of the revelation on Mount Sinal.

—Do not dose animals with medicine when it can possibly be avoided. The thing has been carried quite too far, and the most monstrous doses have been poured down the throats of poor quadrupeds just because they could not help themselves. Good food and sanitary care will in all but extreme cases obviate the need of the horrid dosing and drenching.

—The food of dairy cows should be abundant, and of that kind calculated to make bone and muscle. The calf, especially if a heifer, should be taught to drink and be fed by hand. Warm new milk should be fed for a week, in such quantities as will not overload the stomach. As the stomach and its food capacity is the foundation of the future cow, it should be kept vigorous and healthy from the first. Many breeders like to see their calves fat and sleek, with a small belly, and bring them up to cows in this way. They may look better, but the calf that has been fed less fat-producing food and more bulk, will be in better condition to store a large quantity of food and isset it. A calf should look like a little cow, and should come in not later than D months old. Then let them go farrow and grow. In this way the milking quality is developed and retained, and they make better cws than if kept fat and growing 1.5 years old before calving. It is much easier to breed and develop beef qualities than dairy, and a naturally first-class dairy before call may, by the manner of rais:
