SUGAR EATING NATIONS.

Figures That Indicate That Maritime

People Excel Its Consumption. The McKinley tariff established, between July 1, 1891, and July 1, 1905, a bounty to be paid by the United States government to sugar producers, with a view of stimulating the industry and compensating those engaged in its for the changes made in the duty upon imported sugar. Among scientists the opinion has been general that a moderate amount of sugar, like a moderate amount of salt, should enter into the dietary of each nation; but it is only when the figures of the consumption of sugar are examined that it is seen that the quantity consumed varies radically, and it is a curious fact that in those countries in which the maritime spirit—the spirit of navigation, commerce, travel and colonization—is strong, there is a very considerable consumption of sugar per capita, whereas in those countries in which these qualities are not predominant among the inhabitants, the consumption is smaller. In England, first among the maritime nations of the world, the consumption of sugar is 86

pounds a year for each inhabitant. In Denmark it is 45, in Holland 31, in France 30, and in Norway and Sweden 25, whereas in Russia it is only 10, in Italy 7, in Turkey 7, in Greece 6, and in Servia 4. The consumption of sugar seems to have very little connection with or relation to the production of sugar, for in Austria, the sugar product of which is large, the average consumption is only 19 pounds, while in Switzerland, in which there is no production to speak of, it is 44. And another curious phase of the matter is that there is a great disparity in the consumption of sugar in the two teadrinking countries. England and Russians. seems to have very little connection drinking countries, England and Russia. The large amount of sugar consumed in France it attributed, in part, to the fact that the French confectioners and candy-makers, and more especially those doing business in the city of Paris, use in their trade enormous







The San's Total Eclipse.

by Pilgrim Scientists.

An Omen Full of Evil to the Superstitious Chinese.

The story of the eclipse of 1878, which was visible in the Western States, which removed quite conclusively the questions of a possible Vulcan, is an interesting one. Two observers of skill and experience, Profs. Watson and Swift, each claimed to have found unknown with the other; Prof. Holden, however, the late director of the Lick observatory, had previously committed to memory all the known stars which would be visible in that part of the heavens in which the eclipse would take place, with such accuracy that he had mapped them all out repeatedly previous to the time of the eclipse. During the time of totality he was able to searce carefully over the whole of the sky area where there was a possibility of finding a hoped-for new planet, but finding nothing new, although all known stars were identified with ease. Although this was in reality negative testimony, his work has been tacitly considered as

final in the matter. While the strides of astronomical progress in the last few years have been many and great, it has been largely an adding to the sum total of our knowledge, and many of the problems presented to us by the body shining solar surface may be; it is probabl that it may not be far from 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit, which is far lower than Father Secchi's earlier estimate of 6,000,000 Centigrade, made when the properties of gases were less well understood. No means have yet been found to determine the somewhat lower temperature of the chromosphere-the envelope of heated hydrogen, helium and probably calcium and possibly other gases in a free condition, which is the nearest approach to an atmosphere possessed by the sun, although one of the brilliant discoveries of the last few years has been the finding in certain rare minerals of this same helium, which had been previously known in the sun by a certain well-defined yellow line in its spectrum, and had therefore bene named "Hellum," al-though it was supposed there was no

terrestrial element to correspond. The major part of the task set for themselves by the observers who had watched the eclipse on Jan. 22 last concerned the mysterious outermost atmosphere called the corona; never seen twice alike, silvery white in color, stretching out in various forms for dispers, and the dresses and the jewels and the guests were dissected in whole the spectrum which does not correspond to any yet observed in any other heavenly body or earthly substance; this has been ascribed to another hypothetical element, to which the name coronium has been assigned; this in common terms means that if the substance should ever be discovered on the earth, it will have been already named. Of its properties we know practically nothing, except that it is very light in weight. The phenomenon of a total eclipse is well worth a journey of hundreds of miles for even a novice in astronomy. Pioneer Gone.

Mr. Wm. Thompson Died at the Homestead Saturday Evening.

Has Lived in Middlesex County Since His Birth, 71 Years Ago-Highly Respected by All His Acquaintances.

Mr. William Thompson, of North Dorchester township, died on Saturday evening at the family residence, near

Mr. Thompson had been ailing for some months with bronchitis, and on Nov. 20 sustained a partial stroke of paralysis, rendering one side helpless. He remained conscious to the last, and although suffering much, bore all bravely. A change was noticeable in his condition on Friday evening, and at 6 p.m. Saturday he began to sink rapidly, passing away at 7:45. He was born in London township, on con. 2, in 1827, and spent several years on his farm in that township. farm in that township. In 1350 he settled on a forest farm in North Dorchester township, con. 2, where he resided till his death, enduring for some years the hardships incident to pioneer life. His father, the late Arthur Thompson, was a native of Fermanagh county, Ireland, and died at the age of 91 years in 1875.

Early in 1856, the subject of this sketch married Miss Jane O'Hara, of Costehill, county Cavan, Ireof Costehill, county Cavan, Ireland, who, prior to that time, had been residing for some years in Philadelphia, Pa., and who now survives, together with one daughter, Sarah A., and three sons. The eldest is Mr. Wm. Thompson, for some years city editor and later agricultural editor of The London Advertiser, who afterwards became chief editor of the Farmer's Advocate, and Pa., and who now survives, together

James D., the second son, resides on his own farm, near the homestead, and George B., living at home. Another son, Arthur, died in London in 1881.
