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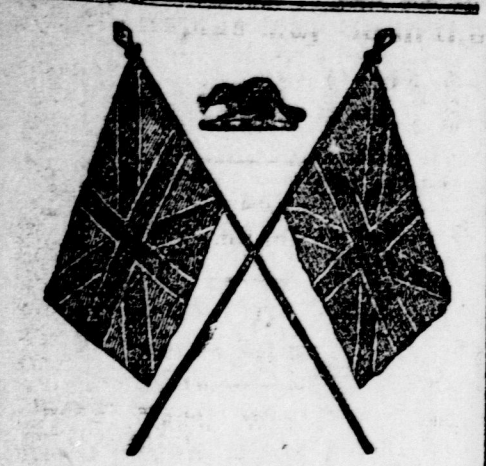

London as an Inland Revenue Contributor.

From the annual report of Sir Henry Joly, Dominion Minister of Inland Revenue, it is made evident that London is one of the leading revenue producing centers in the Dominion. In the manufacture of cigars, this city ranks away ahead of every other place in Canada, Montreal alone excepted. The last-named city leads, with a revenue of \$252,736 87; London comes second with \$130,941 81, and Toronto third with \$38,348 17. The following general statement of the revenue collected at this city is interesting: Balance due July 1, 1896, \$2,589 24; Spirits, \$8,900 74; Malt liquor, \$300 00; Malt, \$9,297 11; Tobacco, \$4,672 83; Cigars, \$38,911 81; Petroleum inspection fees, \$10,610 24; Setares, \$4 00; Other receipts, \$19 00. Total, \$374,655 97.

The duties collected in London were nearly a third larger in amount than the total received in either the Province of New Brunswick or Nova Scotia. Of malt, 4,412,391 pounds were manufactured in this city. The manufacturer of licensed maltsters in London is stated to be six, and they consumed in the year 3,661,172 pounds of malt liquor. Of this quantity, 3,401 gallons were exported to be used by her Majesty's army and navy. Toronto and Montreal alone produced more malt liquors than London. The importance of London as a cigar manufacturing center is shown in the fact that here we have fifteen factories, which last year turned out 21,246,245 cigars, from which a revenue of \$23,328 33 was obtained. In producing these 370,400 pounds of tobacco was used. Over 120,000 packages of petroleum were inspected here during the year, bringing \$10,610 24 into the Dominion treasury. With the exception of less than 5,000 packages, this oil was of Canadian manufacture.

The Canadian Military Gazette announces that Major Robert Cartwright, of the permanent infantry in Toronto, formerly of Wolsley Barracks here, will be appointed assistant adjutant general at Ottawa. The general officer commanding, it is stated, has selected Major Cartwright for his fitness, and from the belief that he can best promote greater efficiency in militia administration. Those who know how Major Cartwright has risen from the lower ranks by sheer force of nature, ability and hard study and investigation, both in Canada and at the British military board centers, will agree that if he is now further advanced he will do good work for the service. He is an enthusiast in his profession, thorough and capable.

A Tribute by an Opponent. My politics are opposed to the Government of Ontario, but I must say that in Mr. Dryden, the present Administration has a most competent man. When he asked me to come to Toronto to look over his bill, I and those with me expected to find that we were necessary to the perfection of that bill. But we were not. The bill had been drafted, and was submitted to us for our approval. We found the ground well covered, and instead of teaching the Minister how to preserve the fruit, we found ourselves listening to Mr. Dryden's plans. It would be impossible to find a more capable Minister of Agriculture in the Province. We were delighted with him—Mr. Fay, a leading grower in the Niagara Peninsula.

Weather Eccentricities.

We have been having somewhat cold weather lately, but if we take into account that January was milder than usual, a balance will probably be established in meteorological conditions before the day of the provincial elections. T. Shaw Chapman, who has taken the place as weather prophet for the Dominion, formerly occupied by Vennor, maintains that the northern ice field will get down in the neighborhood of Newfoundland about the 20th of this month, and consequently he expects long and well sustained winter weather, followed by a cool and rather backward spring. Mr. Chapman is very careful in predicting the nature of weather that will prevail next summer. He will probably not be far out in his prophecy. We will have frequent changes after May, with short heated spells in July and August. Here are a few thoughts of importance by this expert on the probable causes of changes in atmospheric conditions: "When we read occasionally of the southern seas being encumbered by enormous numbers of flat-topped icebergs and fields of ice 400 miles in length, and the average northern drift of the ice is almost entirely within sight of the Cape of Good Hope, the New Zealand coast, we may reasonably conclude that the southern sea which caused this northern drift of the ice was the result of an unusual cold down to the Mediterranean sea and the Gulf of Mexico, we may also conclude that it is the result of an abnormal amount of solar heat north of the equator. In these grand results of solar heat we see the wisdom and beneficence of the Creator, in the magnificent results flowing from the light and heat of the sun, a grand rotation of both atmosphere and ocean from the highly heated equatorial belt to the vertical rays of the sun, and is hotter than the poles; consequently the warm expanded air rises in consequence of its lightness in continued and enormous volume and flows off towards the poles. These vast floods of heated air, in their journey in the higher regions of the atmosphere, steadily cool, descend toward the poles, and return toward the surface of the earth to the equatorial belt, to repeat the same round perpetually. In this general law of the atmosphere is contained the mysterious problem of the weather."

BORING FOR STEAM. (Law Digest.) The deepest well in the world will soon be completed near Pittsburg. It is now more than one mile deep, and when finished it may reach down two miles into the earth. It is being bored in the interest of science. The object is penetrating so deeply to determine just what the interior of the human footbed is like. It is the intention to continue the boring until something entirely new is developed. It has long been the theory that if it is possible to go deep enough to the new geologic condition or economic feature would be found to exist. He not only condemned liquors, but tea, coffee, butter and salt, and wrote a book to prove that the only bread to eat was made of unbolting flour. This resulted in the Graham-flour brand, called to this day in his honor. "Graham boarding-houses" were established everywhere, at which these doctrines were practiced. Horace Greeley found his bride at a Graham boarding-house, and for a time followed Graham's teachings. Graham advocated that following his diet would cause one to live to a biblical age, but he died at the early age of 35.

INDECENT THEATRICAL POSTERS

In decent theatrical posters have been brought into the Ottawa police court, and Mr. O'Gara has shown himself to be a magistrate competent with all or any of the clever side-issues which lawyers are ever ready to drag into matters of law. Mr. O'Gara realizes that there is such a thing as public decency, and that the magistrate of the country is expected to protect it. Among the various indecent posters that are being advertised or tolerated amongst us, the most conspicuous ones are those which are in the public eye, confronting women and children, and are in the nature of advertisements for theatrical performances. They are seen on the dead walls and in the shop windows. No one can avoid them, and they are a disgrace to the theatre one has to go there to see it; and generally the theatre-goer knows what to expect. But no one can be expected to avoid the vicious posters that so many of the Yankee houses direct on our streets. They have been put up with more of it than any other Dominion. It is time for a loud protest in this municipality.

SUGAR-EATING NATIONS.

Figures That Indicate That Maritime People Excel in Consumption. The sugar crop of the world amounts in a normal year to about 8,000,000 tons, of which the larger part, about 4,500,000 tons, comes from the West Indies and Cuba, 3,500,000 tons, from sugar cane. Of the latter the largest proportion comes from the island of Java, and a large amount from the island of Java. Among the countries producing beet sugar, the United States is first with about one-third of the total, and then Austria, with about as much, and then Canada, Russia and Belgium and Holland, with substantially the same quantity.

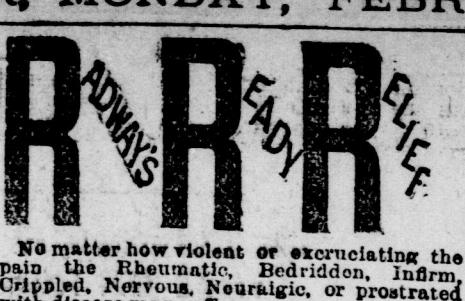
In respect of the production of beet sugar in the United States, there has been a vast increase since the establishment of the McKinley tariff in 1890. The total amount of sugar produced was 2,300 tons. Two years later it was 12,000 tons. Four years later it was 43,000 tons, and the product is on the increase. The McKinley tariff, established between July 1, 1891, and July 1, 1895, a bounty to be paid by the United States government to sugar producers, with a view of stimulating the industry and compensating those engaged in its production, was made in the duty upon imported sugar.

Among scientists the opinion has been general that a moderate amount of sugar, like a moderate amount of salt, should enter into the dietary of each nation; but it is only when the figures of the consumption of sugar are examined that it is seen that the quantity consumed varies radically, and it is a curious fact that in those countries in which the maritime spirit—the spirit of navigation, commerce, travel and colonization—is a very prominent feature, the consumption of sugar per capita, whereas in those countries in which these qualities are not predominant among the inhabitants, the consumption is smaller. In England, first among the maritime nations of the world, the consumption of sugar is 10 pounds a year for each inhabitant. In Denmark it is 45, in Holland 31, in France 20, and in Norway and Sweden 25, whereas in Russia it is only 10, in Italy 7, in Turkey 7, in Greece 6, and in Persia 5. The countries of sugar seem to have very little connection with or relation to the production of sugar for in Australia, the average consumption is only 13 pounds, while in Switzerland, which there is no production of sugar, the average consumption is 14. Voluntary Return of an Escaped Murderer

Who Had Received the Death Sentence—Telephoned the Sheriff to Meet Him.

Fort Scott, Kansas, Feb. 6.—A murderer under sentence to be hanged, who had escaped to a point 100 miles from his nearest pursuer, voluntarily surrendered to the authorities here yesterday afternoon, notifying them of his intention by long-distance telephone.

The convict was George W. Finch, of Kansas City, who followed young Frank Swainford here from Paolo, Kansas, and murdered him for a few dollars, hiding away in the bushes. Yesterday, Finch called upon Sheriff Wheeler by telephone from Lamont, Mo., and said he would be here on the evening train to help mend the bars that he had broken.

Finch escaped from the prison here on Tuesday last in company with seven other prisoners. Sheriff Wheeler thought Finch was bawling. However, when the Memphis train came in from Lamont, the sheriff and three hundred citizens were there to receive the convict. While they were waiting, the murderer arrived on another railroad, and, smoking a cigar, he walked leisurely up the street to the prison door.

UNCLE SAM SURPRISED

By the Latest Naval News From Barcelona.

New York, Feb. 5.—A dispatch from Washington to the World today says: A declaration of war from Spain would scarcely have surprised Washington more than did the news that the Havana seaman's club Ciudad de Cadiz is to be transformed at Barcelona into a cruiser to escort the Spanish torpedo boats to Cuban waters.

There has been no previous intimation that the Madrid government intended to utilize the merchant marine into preparing for war. State department officials are apparently of the opinion that the drafting of the Ciudad de Cadiz is regarded as an indication that matters are progressing toward an open rupture between the United States and Spain.
