[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Oct. 17 .- "There is no offense disclosed in that indictment," said Mi T. C. Robinette, when Tom Lewis was charged with perjury during the investigation into the London bye-election. "The crown must particularize."

"Oh, we will give all particulars," replied Eric Armour.

"I think it will take a small volume," commented Magistrate Denison, " think I shall get Magistrate Kingsford to try the case, however, as I have heard evidence in the investigation." Lewis pleaded not guilty and elected

to be tried by jury. The question of bail was then raised. "He won't get bail as far as I am concerned. I'm tired of this continua
