





Menominee, Mich., Jan. 21. - Adrift on an ice floe for eighteen hours, with death staring them in the face every minute of the time, and subjected to a wind and snowstorm which cut to the skin, Lars Nelson and Peter Anderson, residing here, were rescued off Chambers' Island, Green Bay, by fishermen, late Thursday afternoon. The men were nearly frozen

and may die from exposure. men went out to lift some nets. They had partly completed their work when a strong wind blew up and started the ice, on which they were standing, at the university, at 8 o'clock; subject. moving. Before many minutes they "Euthology." were marooned on a chunk of ice several feet wide, and were separated from the strip touching the shore. They were helpless and had several times given up hope of ever reaching at 10:30; Hyde Park, at 3 p.m., and at shore alive.

When rescued both Nelson and Anderson were in a semi-conscious condition, and undoubtedly would have frozen to death, if not drowned, had help not arrived when it did. Nearly \$100 worth of nets and fish


