MISS NIX CONTRADICTED

Foreman of Jury Says He Saw Her With Accused Since the Fire.

Uxbridge, Nov. 25. - Archie Mc-Lachlan, the young man whom a coroner's jury yesterday accused of murdering his wife and two baby boys, was this afternoon sent on for trial by Magistrate Hamilton on the charge of wife-murder.

Wm. Foster, the foreman of Coroner Bascom's jury, was a witness this afternoon. He swore that he saw Mc-Lachlan and Miss Nix together on some date later than Oct. 20. The meeting between them was in the door of Miss Nix's home. Asked to further recall the date, said it was Oct. 23 or 25.

Miss Nix stated yesterday that she nad not seen McLachlan since the fire or three weeks before the fire. The prisoner had another attack of weeping this afternoon. The cause of it was a photo of his dead wife reproduced in a Toronto paper. It had been ipped out, and as he sat looking at it ne tears began to flow, and they connued flowing for some time. 



THE LION OF LUCERNE.

The Lion of Lucerne, that inspiring monuent to heroism, is in grave danger of destruction from the action of the elements. Already disintegration has begun in what was supposed to be a wall of everlasting rock, and it is learned from information given by a correspondent of the London Times that the effigy of the dying lion "is in a condition that leaves little hope of its preservation." Masses of stone have been falling from the face of the rock, and efforts to stay

The Lion monument was executed by the Swiss sculptor Ahorn, after the design by Thorvaldsen, in the year 1821. "It is an object of national pride with all Switzers," and it has been a source of inspiring interest to the people of all countries. It commemorates the heroism of the Swiss Guards who were killed while defending the French royal family during the attack on the Tuileries in 1792.

In the defense of Louis XVI., Marie Antoinette and the Dauphin, 26 Swiss officers and several hundreds of soldiers were killed. The names of the killed are carved on the face of the rock, which bears the main commemorative figure. The effigy of the lion is 28 feet in length and 18 feet in height. It "is impressive in its simple majesty so thoroughly in har-mony with Thorvaldsen's genius. Mortally wounded by a spear planted in his side, he stretches out his paws at the last gasp to protect from injury the escutcheon with the royal fleur-de-lis." 



Measure to Restrict Appeals to the Supreme Court Defeated in House.

Ottawa, Nov. 25, - Mr. Lancaster's bills to amend the railway act came up for second reading today. The first of these proposes to make clear that the railway commission and it alone shall have the right to adjudicate as to the kind of contract to be made between railways and shippers.

To illustrate his meaning he specified the case of a man who had shipped a consignment of horses valued at \$16,-000. The railway refused to accept them unless the contract for the horses were given at the value of only \$1,200. The shipper had to accept this. The horses were destroyed in transit and the shipper could only collect damages on the \$1,200. He sued for the larger amount, but the Ontario court of appeal held that the form of contract was sufficiently like the authorized con_ tract to be legal. The point involved is the practice of partial contracting out of damages in return for a lower rate. Mr. Lancaster seeks to obtain for the shipper power to choose whether he can pay the higher rate and have full recourse for damages in case of oss, or the lower rate for partial liability. > Mr. Graydon's Letter. Mr. Graydon's report was as follows: Nov. 25, 1909.

Chairman and Members of No. 2 Committee: Dear Sirs,-In reference to the trimming of trees on the city streets by reason of the erection of the hydroelectric poles, I would recommend that you appoint a thoroughly capable man, well skilled in such work to take charge of it.

The hydro-electric poles on some streets are on the same line as the London Electric poles, and on other streets are on a different but parallel inc. The first-named poles are about 10 feet shorter than the latter, and, therefore, the trees will have to be trimmed both below and above for both lines; and on such streets that the hydro-electric poles are close to the curb line and the London Electric poles further back, the limbs of the trees next the street will all have to be cut back for the hydro-electric wires and cut on top for the London

Electric wires.

I foresee that when this work is commenced you will have grave proests, and, doubtless, much litigation from the property owners throughout nearly the entire city, as it appears to me that a vast number of the trees will be rained in appearance at least, if not altogether, when they are trimmed to give clearance to all these wires, and it is for this reason hould select a man well versed in forestry and possessing tact and diplonacy to take charge of the work, as might by his superior knowledge tree lore be able to save many trees and trim to the greatest advantage and least lossible injury to the trees and detriment to their appearance. This work will involve a large exenditure which must be borne by the hydro-electric department, as No. 2 committee have no money for such work. It will require at least a superiatendent, two men and a team steadily for some three or four months get over the city.
