KAISER DECLARED MUST BE NO WAR

Generally Believed That a Settlement With France Has Been Reached. Paris, Oct. 23. - Although the pre-

to resent the cession of territory in the A Berlin correspondent telegraphs that pretty much the same conditions obtain in Germany, for, while German public opinion is inclined to regard the acquisition of territory in the Congo as a triumph, it regrets the renunciation

of potential rights in Morocco. Even the Chauvinistic pan-German-

Even the Chauvinistic pan-Germanists are completely resigned, since they have convinced themserves, first, that bouthern Molocco is lost, and, second, that there will be no war.

Both sides, in fact, are satisfied with metian details of the agreement, but, dissatisfied with others. This, to the fin-partial observer, is a clear indication that the arrangement is an equitable one, neither party to it being completely victorious, nor completely vanquisned.

It is the Kaiser who has achieved an unalloyed victory. From the beginning he has not swerved from his determination to settle the Morocco question amicably.

The Berlin correspondent says that when the Kaiser met the imperial chancellor and Herr von Kiderlin Waechter at the house of Frau Standt in Swinemunde in August, he held a long confetence with them on the Morocco question. At its conclusion he entered the breakfast room, where a number of French and English guests had assembled. Just as he opened the door they heard the Kaiser say:

"Do as you judge best, but there must be no war."

His firmness has triumphed, notwithstanding the covert opposition of the blundering of his lieutenants.

It is a pity the Kaiser did not declare his pacific determination frankly when the crisis first developed, for this would have obviated much anxiety, both in France and Germany, and deprived the British press of their opportunity, which it selzed with glee, to be gin another anti-German campaign.

This latter was the really dangerous element in the crisis, but luckly it was rendered innocuous by the Kaiser's patience.

The agreement, which is now a certainty, is a triumph for the German Emperor, and will probably prove the basis for more durable and friendlier relations betwen France and Germany.







THE EARL OF ONSLOW TAKEN BY DEATH

Was a Member of the Balfour and Salisbury Ministries.

London, Oct. 23.—The Earl of Onslot

William Hillier Onslow, fourth Furl of Onslow, had been chairman of the Commons committee and chairman of committees in the House of Lords since 1905. He was a Conservative. An ancestor, Sir Richard Onslow, was a parliamentarian. He urged Cromwell to assume the kingship, but afterwards assisted the Restoration. The fourth Earl of Onslow was born in 1853. He was twice a lord-in-waiting. He was under-secretary for the colonies in 1887-88; parliamentary secretary to the Board of Trade, 1888; governor and commander-in-chief of New Zealand, 1888-92; president of the Reard of Agriculture, 1903-5, in Lord Salisbury's and Mr. Balfour's ministry.

The fortunes of the family were founded by Sir Thomas Foot, who was lord mayor of London in the year of King Charles' execution, and was created a baronet, with remainder to his son-in-law, Arthur Onslow, at the Restoration. To Londoners Lord Onslow was chiefly notable as the very energetic and reactionary leader of the Moderate party on the county council for some years.

There was once a "ghost" at his residence, Clandon Park, near Guildford, Surrey, and the late Marquis of Bute and the Psychical Society wished to "investigate" it, but Lord Onslow declined their aid. 
