Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Savings bank deposits increased during August by approximately twenty million dollars. They now stand at \$1,196,632,931, a figure which is regarded as promising well for the success of the coming Dominion loan. During the month, according to the bank statement issued by the department of finance, call loans increased, showing a small increase; call loans outside, a decrease. FIUMAN NAVY FORMED possibility through to-day's SHIPS THAT DESERTED

Named As Units.

Pola, Monday. Sept. 22.-Four Italian warships, the battleship Dante Alighieri and the destroyers Mirabello, Nulla and Abba, are named as units of the "Fiuman navy," in a proclamation written by Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio and distributed in this city.

The proclamation praises the men of these ships for "their loyalty to the Fiuman cause," and extols them for their "valorous acts." It is stated here it was because of the desertions of these four vessels from the regular Italian navy that allied commanders were forced to withdraw from the harbor of Fiume, which was considered unsafe while the Dante Alighieri was anchored there, and was loyal to the d'Annunzio cause. warships, the battleship Dante Ali-

Dispatches from Fiume soon after Capt. d'Annunzio's coup stated that the Dante Alighieri was unable to leave that port because her machinery had been damaged by the crew, but more recently it has been reported she had departed, having on board Admiral Cassioniva, who was placed under virtual arrest in Fiume when he landed and attempted to interfere with Capt. d'Annunzio's control of the town. There is no record in available lists of the three destroyers named in the foregoing dispatch, and it is probable they are vessels which have been built since the beginning of the war. CAPT. D'ANNUNZIO

Paris, Sept. 24.—"As a nation we consider the Fiume matter settled, because we have actual possession," said Gen. Giuseppe (Peppico) Garibaldi to an Associated Press representative here this morning. Garibaldi had just reached Paris from Rome, coming on what was said to be an important mission, from which he would go to meet Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio, the insurgent Italian leader in possession of Fiume.

"Had d'Annunzio not gone in," continued Garibaldi, "we would have done it within fifteen days. If President Wilson were moved by the right spirit," he added, "he would permit the whole question to be decided by Great Britain, France and Italy. In that case, we are satisfied that our rights would be recognized by the majority of Americans."

FORMER GOVERNOR TO SEEK SETTLEMENT WITH D'ANNUNZIO

Rome, Tuesday, Sept. 23.—It is announced by the Idea Nazionale that Admiral Umberto Cagni, who was appointed governor of Fiume shortly after the armistice was signed last fall has agreed to proceed to that city to set the government's propositions with regard to Fiume before Gabriele d'Annunzio.

A dispatch to the Messagero from Fiume quotes d'Annunzio as declaring he rejected in advance the project of assigning Fiume to Italy, and turning over Abbazia and Volosca, across the bay from Fiume, to a small buffer state.

CARRANZA CALLED TRAITOR BY VILLA GERMANY NEGOTIATING

Rebel Chief Seeks Volunteers for New Campaign.

Washington, Sept. 24.-Francisco Villa, "general-in-chief of the revolutionary forces in Mexico, in "manifesto for the nation," a copy of which has just reached Washington, assails President Carranza as "a traitor," and calls upon Mexicans to join him in a new campaign against the regime of Carranza. This manifesto, which is dated "En Campamento," in Durango, begins:

"To the large number of crimes against the democratic regime, against the tranquility of the country and against the security and welfare of its inhabitants. Venustiano Carranza has only now added a new offence against the dignity and sovereignty of Mexico."

This new offence consists in permitting American troops to cross the border into Juarez last June, for which Villa blames Carranza and General Francisco Rodriguez Gonzales.

Rumania is ready to evacuate Budapest or to co-operate there with the Allies in maintaining order the note declares.

Those in close touch with the strike are of the opinion that the session called by William Z. Foster, secretary-treasurer of the committee, will bring out important facts of workers who heeded the call of their leaders.

Mr. Foster declared that the committee will not consider "peace plans." but will discuss the advisability of extending the strike to include seamen on Great Lake carrier vessels and union trainmen. The question of financing the strike will come up, and Mr. Foster says he will bring to the attention of the committee the "unprovoked assaults" by state troopers on strikers. According to the secretary, the union is preparing for a long struggle, and declares the workers will "fight to the bitter end."

One member complied with the request, and a disposition on the part of some to hoot was drowned by the applause of the majority for the courage of the

majority for the courage of the comrade.

No one responded to the second question, which was that all in favor of the restoration of the epon bar should rise. The third seked by Col. Hunter was: "How many et you think your views could be changed by unlimited discussion?" None thought so, and the following resolution was carried with three dissenting voices:

"That when we went abroad there was in force in Ontario a stupid License Act under which whiskey was sold over the open bar, and when we returned we find in force an atrocious Act which has already made a hundred times more criminals than Fagin the Jew; that in the meantime we have had experience of a rational system, under which the French authorities keep a tight hand on the dangerous alcoholics, and allow free access to beer and wine; that under the French system immoderation is exceptional, and drunkenness almost non-existent.
