STEEL STRIKERS WILL "FIGHT TO BITTER END," DECLARES LEADER, WHO CALLS FOR GREATER TIE-UP

LONDON CIGARMAKERS ADVOCATE GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF THE INDUSTRY THROUGHOUT CANADA

Delegates at the Trades and Labor Congress at Hamilton Indorse Action of United States Steel Workers, Who Are On Strike in Support of the Principle of Collective Bargaining.

Hamilton, Sept. 24.—The trades and labor congress this morning indorsed the action of the United States steel workers striking in support of the principle of collective bargaining. A resolution to this effect was introduced by Herbert Lewis, Toronto, and business was suspended to permit the taking of a vote. A telegram will be sent to the executive of the steel workers approving their action. A resolution which had for its object the securing of better working conditions for hotel and restaurant employees was adopted. Government control of the cigar industry in Canada was advocated in a resolution by London cigarmakers, who desired that it "should conduct the same for the benefit of the cigarmakers and the public interest."

STRIKE SITUATION

STEEL STRIKERS WILL "FIGHT TO BITTER END," DECLARES LEADER, WHO CALLS FOR GREATER TIE-UP

William Z. Foster Says That Workers Will Not Consider "Peace Plans" At Meeting Today—Will Discuss the Advisability of Extending Strike To Include Seamen and Trainmen.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 24.—Interest in the national steel strike which has been in progress since last Monday's meeting in the Mahoning Valley of Ohio, the national conference of iron and steel workers. Those in close touch with the strike are of the opinion that the session called yesterday by William Z. Foster, secretary-treasurer of the committee, will bring out important facts relating to the outlook of the thousands of workers who heeded the call of their leader.

RUMANIANS ARE READY TO LEAVE OCCUPIED AREAS

Premier Bratiano Gives an Answer to the Allied Note.

Paris, Sept. 24.—In the answer given by Premier Bratiano of Rumania to the allied note delivered by Sir George Russell, the premier offers to give the Allies all the satisfaction in his power with regard to actions connected with her occupation of Hungary territory, according to the Echo de Paris today. Rumania is ready to evacuate Budapest or to maintain order, if the Allies in the meantime, the note declares.

STEEL STRIKE CONSIDERED AS START OF BIG INDUSTRIAL WAR

Washington, D. C., Sept. 24.—Congress is inclined to view the steel strike as the first skirmish in industrial warfare, possibly only the prelude to a capital and labor struggle which has been predicted to come in the near future. The open statement by some of the strike leaders that the strike is the first step in a movement to socialize the basic industries of the country, coupled with the fact that the railway workers' union has proposed, in the so-called Plumb plan, that the transportation highways be regarded in congress as very significant.

CORPORATION OFFICIALS DECLARE MEN ARE RETURNING TO WORK

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 24.—"We feel very much encouraged," said the steel company's officials today after the day shift went to work in the plants of the Carnegie Company which are in operation. The executive body of the railroad men this morning sent an ultimatum to the Government rejecting the standardization offer made by the latter, and intimating that unless a favorable reply was received by noon on Thursday, the men would be ordered to cease work.

FIUMAN NAVY FORMED BY D'ANNUNZIO FROM SHIPS THAT DESERTED

Four Italian War Vessels Are Named As Units.

Pola, Monday, Sept. 22.—Four Italian warships, the battleship Dante Alighieri and the destroyers Ribellio, Nittia and the torpedo boat, the "Fiuman navy," in a proclamation written by Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio and published in the city. The proclamation praises the men of the ships for their loyalty to the Fiuman cause, and extols them for their "valorous acts." It is stated here that because of the desertions of these four vessels from the regular Italian navy that allied commanders had decided to withdraw from the harbor of Fiume, which was considered unsafe while the Dante Alighieri was in the harbor and was loyal to the d'Annunzio cause.

CARRANZA CALLED TRAITOR BY VILLA

Rebel Chief Seeks Volunteers for New Campaign.

Washington, Sept. 24.—Francisco Villa, general-in-chief of the revolutionary forces in Mexico, in a manifesto for the nation, a copy of which has just reached Washington, assails Carranza as a traitor, and calls upon Carranza to join him in a new campaign against the regime of the "En Comandante" in Durango, Mexico.

BOLSHEVIK FORCES CAPTURE SEAT OF ALL RUSSIAN GOVT.

London, Sept. 24.—A Bolshevik wireless message received today from Moscow says that Red troops, commanded by General Lukobko, are reported to have occupied Tomsk, 500 miles east of Omsk, the All Russian seat of Government, on the trans-Siberian railroad line.

GARIBALDI ON WAY TO FIUME TO MEET CAPT. D'ANNUNZIO

Paris, Sept. 24.—"As a nation we consider the Fiume matter settled, because we have actual possession," said the minister of Foreign Affairs today in the house of Commons yesterday, as inquiry among leaders of the railwaymen's union during the morning recess was said to be an important mission, from which he would go to meet Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio, who was reported to have just landed in Fiume, and to be in possession of the town. It is stated here that d'Annunzio is not going in, but that he will be in Fiume within fifteen days. If President Wilson were moved by the right spirit, he added, the world would be a better place than it is now.

NEW STEAMERS ARE ORDERED FOR TRADE ON ATLANTIC ROUTE

Montreal, Sept. 24.—In addition to the taking over of enemy passenger and freight vessels, there has recently been a large amount of shipping ordered for transatlantic and other commerce, including vessels for the Canadian lines. It is announced that the Dominion Line has ordered six new steamers for the Atlantic trade, and that the Anchor Line is to build two vessels for their Glasgow and Montreal route. During the war the Dominion fleet suffered heavily from enemy action.

FORMER GOVERNOR TO SEEK SETTLEMENT WITH D'ANNUNZIO

Rome, Tuesday, Sept. 23.—It is announced by the Italian government that Admiral Umberto Cagni, who was appointed governor of Fiume shortly after the capture of the town, has agreed to proceed to that city to set the government's propositions with regard to Fiume before the d'Annunzio. A dispatch to the Messaggero from Fiume quotes d'Annunzio as declaring that he is ready to accept the project of assigning Fiume to Italy, and turning it over to the Italian government, across the bay from Fiume, to a small buffer state.

CLEMENCEAU TO CALL FOR RATIFICATION OF PEACE TREATY TODAY

Paris, Sept. 24.—Premier Clemenceau is expected to go before the chamber of deputies this afternoon and call for a vote ratifying the peace treaty with Germany. The premier's demand, according to the forecast, would be made after he had addressed the chamber on the treaty. Foreign Minister Fichon also was expected to speak and make a similar demand.

COWPUN PURCHASES 90 ACRES ON DUNDAS STREET EAST, AND WILL CONSTRUCT RACE TRACK

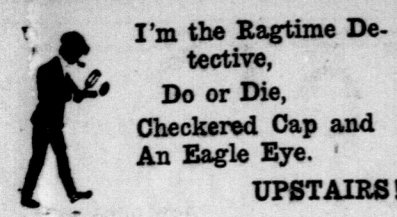

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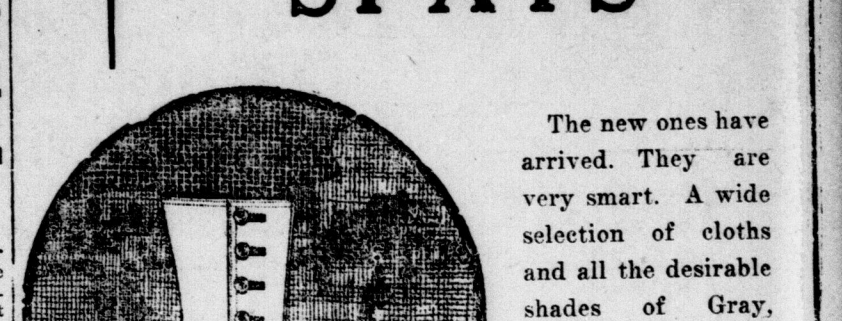

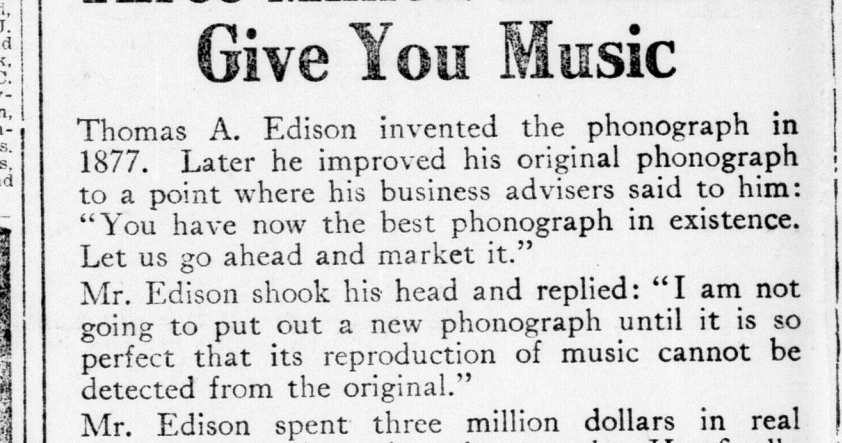

HON. CHARLES MURPHY SAYS ROWELL'S REPLY FULL OF FALSEHOODS

Vigorously Answers Statement of Privy Council President - The Speaker Repeatedly Interrupts With Calls For "Order" - Will Return to Subject Next Session.

OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—It was just about eighteen months ago that Charles Murphy delivered his speech in the House on the political career of Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council, that Mr. Rowell made reply thereto. It was just twenty-four hours after Mr. Murphy read Mr. Rowell's reply in Hansard, and at the very first opportunity presented to him, the member for Durham replied to the reply. He was by no means the interruptions from the Speaker he succeeded in placing on Hansard a sufficient amount of matter to render almost imperative on the part of the president of the privy council to prepare a further reply. For the present, concluded Mr. Murphy, "it is evident that the honorable member for Durham is not saying any more. I can, however, assure the members of this House that I will return to this subject next session."

The member for Russell was in his seat and there was fire in his eyes as he waited for the speaker to rise and sit to be cleared away. His eyes arose to a question of privilege. "When I returned to the city Saturday evening," he said, "I was informed that during my absence the honorable member for Durham, after incubating for eighteen months, had been making statements to which he objects, and they then if I desire."

"I will quote from the series of evasions, half-truths and absolute falsehoods which the honorable member characterized as a reply to my speech of March 19, 1918, went on Mr. Murphy: "I will reply to such of these as are of a personal character. The rules of this House prevent me from dealing with the falsehoods of a general character contained in the speech, but I will deal with them more fully at the first opportunity at the beginning of the next session."

Now, in reading Hansard of the 17th instant, the honorable member for Durham charges an attack. Mr. Murphy's speech of March 19, 1918, was a review of the general policy of the government of the day, and in part was a reply to an attack made by the honorable member for Durham in a speech delivered at North Bay on the 19th of March, 1918, in the name of certain French religious writers, the alleged lack of which Mr. Rowell referred to the honorable member. Mr. Murphy was merely to compare his speeches with those of the people whom he attacked during the general election in unexcused Hansard. Mr. Speaker—Order. I refer to the honorable gentleman to order, but he is not within the rule at the present moment. It is preliminary, not objectionable that a preliminary statement should be made, but the honorable member is, in effect, making a reply to a speech, whereas he should simply read any specific statement with which he wishes to take issue and then make his denial thereto.

Mr. Murphy—I was just about to do that, but I did not think that either you or I were fully seized of the denial unless I made that preliminary explanation. Rowell knew. The member for Russell then referred to the statement of Mr. Rowell that he had been absent from the House when the "attack" was made upon him. Mr. Murphy, had been in the House in the afternoon, and was aware of the fact that Mr. Murphy had the floor at 6 o'clock.

The honorable gentleman knew that I had the floor, but he says that he was indisposed, and did not show back that evening. At this point, Mr. Speaker again intervened. "I wish," said Mr. Murphy, "to deny the advantage was taken of the honorable gentleman, either through his absence or through his illness. I wish to say that the honorable gentleman was not in the House on the next day, but he did not rise to a question."

The honorable gentleman is really making a statement, I referred to the Speaker. "He is not making a denial."

ber will not be in order in reading any correspondence at all. He must deal with the specific statement to which he wishes to make a denial or take exception. Mr. Speaker—Then I shall merely read an extract from Hansard. The extract is from Mr. Rowell's speech known anything about provincial affairs he would have known the statement regarding the fund to be untrue, and that in any case he had received a letter which informed him that it was untrue. After I made that speech in the House, said Mr. Murphy, "I received hundreds of letters, all of which approved what I said, in two of the fact that I was in error in saying that the honorable gentleman had been paid a salary. I at once corrected that mistake, and I purposed reading an extract from a letter I wrote to Mr. Rowell, whom the honorable gentleman mentioned in that speech, but I was precluded from doing that, therefore, I shall merely say that this statement, which I stand by what I said on March 19, 1918, is untrue."

A Second Letter. "I am not in the habit of making here or elsewhere statements that are without foundation or that I cannot prove when called upon to do so. After having received further information on the subject I wrote Mr. Rowell on October 31, 1918, a second letter in which I elaborated the proofs as to the correctness of my statement, but again, I am precluded by your ruling from observing that the honorable gentleman, Mr. Joseph Westley Flavelle was a contributor to the fund, but he denies for his denial, and in order to formulate another charge against me, this evening, that Sir Joseph Flavelle was a Conservative. That is not an evidence commercialized Christianity in pursuit of a political end."

Mr. Speaker—Order. I regret that wandering far afield from his rights, will be no question of privilege in respect to Sir Joseph Flavelle, or any other gentleman. The honorable member, may, if he wishes to do so, take by an honorable member in this House, Laurier's Letter.

Mr. Murphy—I bow to your ruling, Sir, and I do not wish to begot even the appearance of being in conflict with the honorable gentleman, but I wish to say that I am precluded from making any specific denial that I wished to make. On page 409 of unexcused Hansard of Sept. 17, the honorable gentleman referred to my charge that he had been engaged in a conspiracy to suppress the Liberal party, and in order to hurl a charge of untruth and falsehood against me, he read this extract from a letter written to him by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after he had joined the Union Government.

Mr. Murphy then referred to the claim of Mr. Rowell that he had received a friendly letter from Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "That may be," said Mr. Murphy, "but I beg to state that he received no more letters from Sir Wilfrid Laurier than I did after I had my speech here in March, 1919."

Mr. Murphy then referred to the visit of Mr. Rowell to the front and the latter's suggestion that if Mr. Murphy had

ONTARIO ELECTION WILL BE HELD ON OCTOBER TWENTIETH

Premier Hearst Makes Announcement Setting Definite Date.

TORONTO, Sept. 23.—Writs are being sent out tonight for the general election, nominations October 13, polling October 20.

TORONTO, Sept. 23.—Official announcement that the provincial general elections will be held on Monday, October 20, the same date as the vote on the referendum, was made this afternoon by Sir William Hearst, prime minister of the province of Ontario. Nominations will be held the previous Monday, October 13. The date of the elections was generally anticipated, but it was not till after a meeting of the cabinet this afternoon that the announcement was made.

The premier has issued an appeal to the voters of the province, stating that he has followed in the footsteps of James Whitney, whom he succeeded in the premiership on October 2, 1914, and Government reasons why he thinks his announcement should be returned to Arthur E. Ross, for several years the representative of Kingston, will be taken into the cabinet immediately, in order to carry out the Government's plans with regard to the soldiers' aid commission and the soldiers' settlement. The men and the soldiers' settlement free land and training are provided. Labor Department.

Premier Hearst refers to the Government's having established a department of labor, and states that the Government's policy is to avoid unnecessary expenditure of labor shall sit in the cabinet as head of the department, and full ministerial power and authority. Sir William, however, does not state who the minister is to be. As to the matter of holding the elections on the same day as the taking of the referendum, Premier Hearst says, "We have adopted this course in order to solicit the largest possible vote on both issues; to avoid unnecessary expenditure and disturbance of business; their constitutional rights and powers at the earliest possible opportunity." Under the able and energetic direction of Sir Adam Beck, the hydro-electric power policy has made substantial advances. The Government intends that the advantage of cheap electricity shall be made available to all classes and all sections of the districts.

Two score firemen were in constant danger from falling electric wires and fighting the fire when two floors and the roofs fell crashing through the building. The fire was eventually extinguished after the following firms had suffered: Candy Company, Silver Footwear Company, Dominion Embroidering and Printing Company, J. S. Fry Company, the York Trading Company.

REFUSES HIGHER FARES. WINNIPEG, Sept. 23.—The public utilities commissioner has declined to allow the street railway company to boost car fares to six cents, which the company asked to be allowed to do, as new wages secured by the men had added \$400,000 to the company's pay-roll.

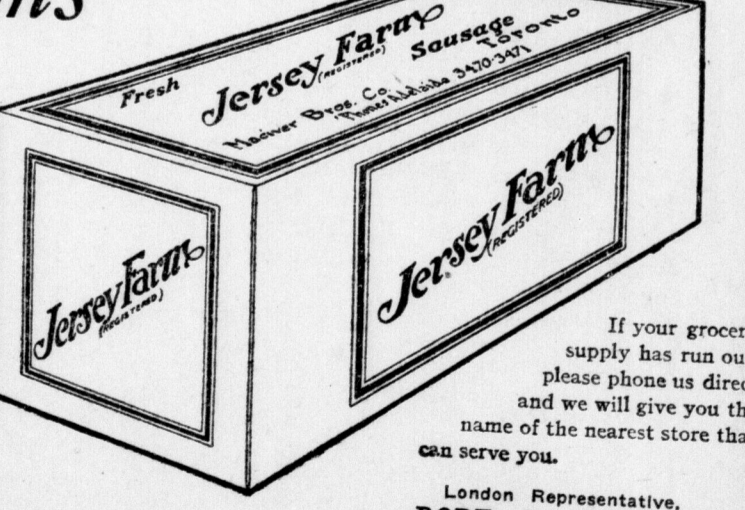

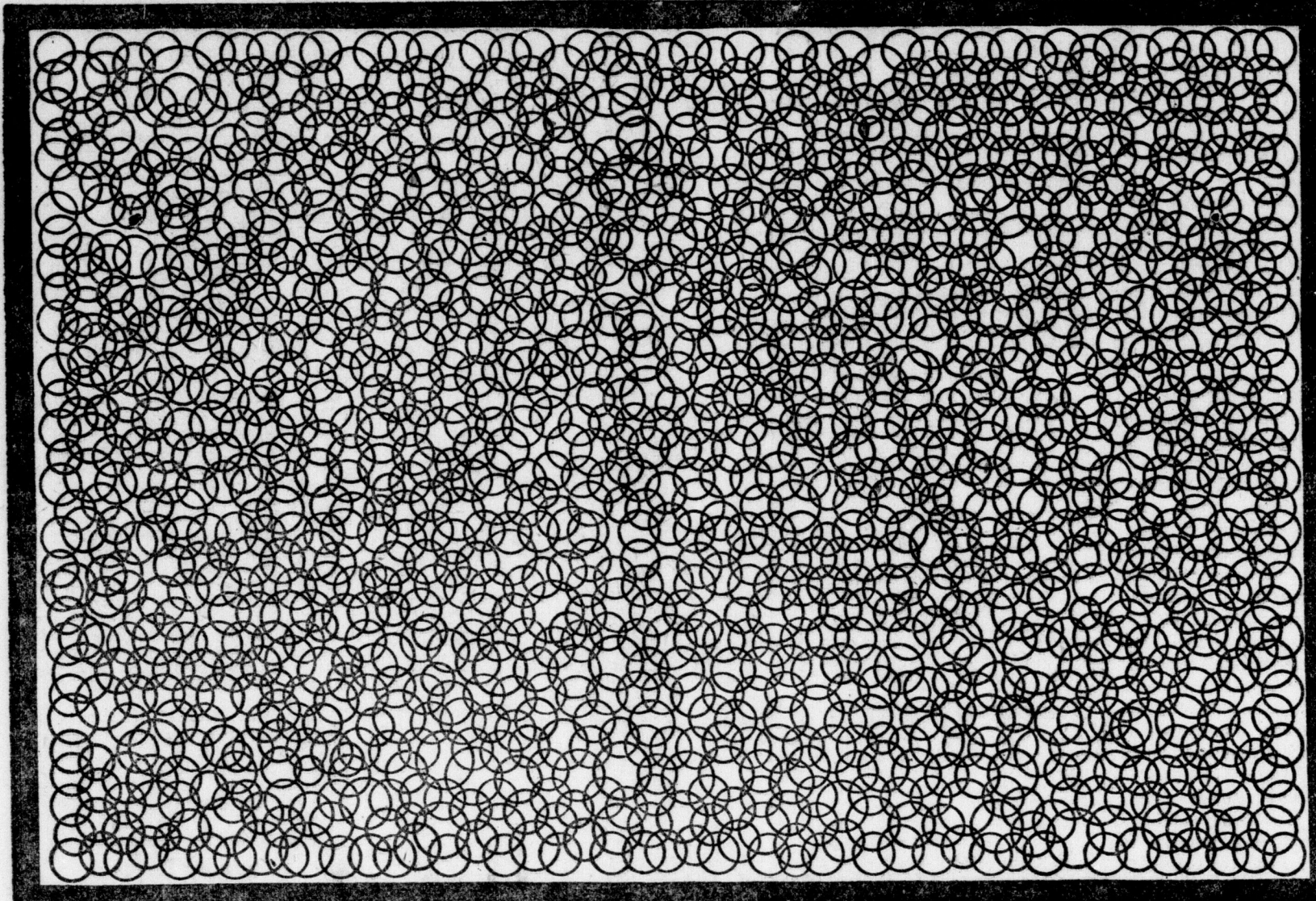

PAYING CANADA'S DEBTS.

In an address before an audience of young businessmen at Ottawa a few days ago Hon. Sydney Fisher drove home some facts regarding the economic situation in Canada, which have been covered to a considerable extent recently in Advertiser comment, but which cannot be repeated too often at the present time.

Obviously this is a situation which cannot continue. There is a limit to the country's borrowing capacity, and every dollar borrowed adds to the nation's obligations in interest and principal.

How would a businessman go about solving this problem? Mr. Fisher asked, and he offered three alternatives: Repudiation, annexation to the United States or "a manly determination to do in peace as well as our boys have done in war."

Only by getting down to business in the matter of production can this country finance its way. Hon. Mr. Fisher would have 20 per cent of the people now engaged in distribution and other non-productive employments, turned over to productive work, he would apply scientific methods to business, eliminating waste and developing short-cuts wherever possible.

THE INFLUENZA.

Already the predictions of medical men that we would have a return of the influenza are being verified. Cases have been reported near Port Burwell and in other places about London and through the province.

With ample warning given a repetition of the epidemic in serious form should not be allowed. By using sprays, gargles and disinfectants its spread can be prevented.

U. S. LABOR LEADERS CONDEMN O. B. U. IDEA AT LABOR CONGRESS

Declare Principle Is Fallacious and Plan Impracticable.

GOVT. HOUSING SCHEME Criticized by Delegates At Big Convention At Hamilton.

HAMILTON, Sept. 23.—J. W. Hayes, president of the label trades department of the American Federation of Labor, was introduced to the Trades and Labor Congress today by President Moore, and spoke of a recent trip made through the western provinces. He said that he had endeavored to dispel the idea prevailing in the country that international officers did not visit the local unions in Canada because they were of no great importance. He emphasized the fact that the international officers had not visited frequently it was because of pressure of business. He said the local unions in the Western States of America suffered in the same manner.

COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA AND THE O. B. U. IDEA

Mr. Hayes then denounced the attempt to organize the United Front in Calgary early this year. The principles of the organization, he claimed, were fallacious and the idea an old one, which had been tried in the United States several years ago with scant success.

NOVITY ATTRACTS

At this juncture the speaker stated that all new ideas found a certain number of adherents, and this was the case with the propaganda circulated in the West.

UPROGUE USE OF REASON

Mr. Hayes was followed by Matthew Wall, fourth vice-president of the union label department, and he showed himself even more bitterly opposed to the O. B. U. idea than his colleague.

OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—The question of giving the Great War Veterans' Association a right to counsel before the special committee of the House of Commons on soldiers' civil re-establishment was considered when that body met this afternoon. A letter was read from G. M. McNeill, secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association, asking that they be allowed this privilege. After some discussion a motion was passed that the committee be asked to consider the matter.

Expenditures for July 31 were \$31,146 of which \$2,725,353 was for administration. 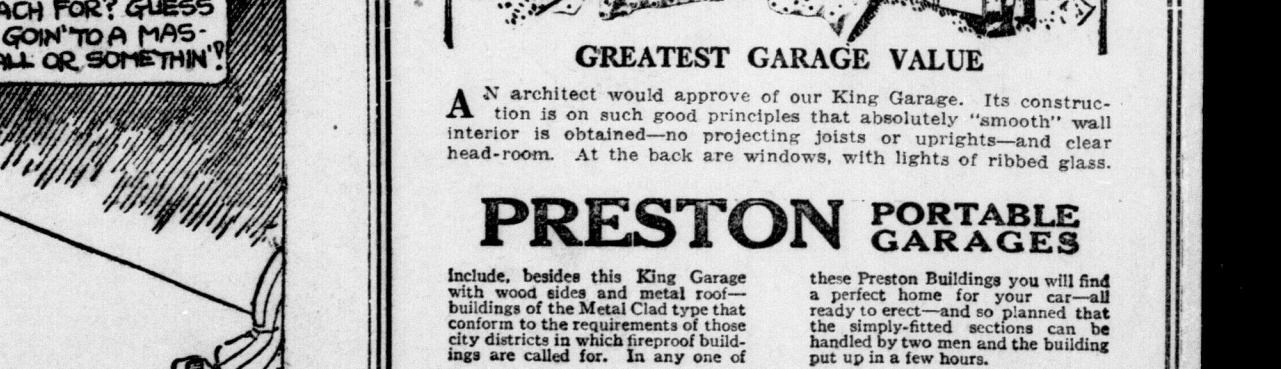

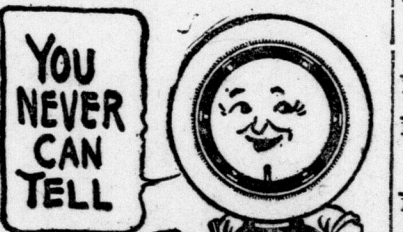

Those Who Fought Endorse the Citizens' Liberty League

Extract from Toronto Star Sept. 10th, 1919.

VETERANS ASK SALE OF BEER AND WINES

Oppose Return of Open Bar, But Would Learn From French System.

Denouncing the License Act as "stupid," and the Ontario Temperance Act as "atrocious" and "a maker of criminals," and affirming their intention of resisting "the tyranny of petticoat government," Parkdale G.W.V.A. went on record last night as favoring the sale of beer and wine, and advocated an affirmative answer to all four questions on the forthcoming referendum, as the means of attaining that end.
There was no discussion on the motion, Col. A. T. Hunter, president, expressing the opinion that every phase of the subject had been fully considered at the last meeting. By way of demonstrating this fact to the members, he asked three questions. The first was that all opposed to the sale of beer and wine should rise. One member complied with the request, and a disposition on the part of some to hoot was drowned by the applause of the majority for the courage of the comrade.
No one responded to the second question, which was that all in favor of the restoration of the open bar should rise. The third asked by Col. Hunter was: "How many of you think your views could be changed by unlimited discussion?" None thought so, and the following resolution was carried with three dissenting voices:
"That when we went abroad there was in force in Ontario a stupid License Act under which whiskey was sold over the open bar, and when we returned we find in force an atrocious Act which has already made a hundred times more criminals than Paris in the Jew; that in the meantime we have had experience of a rational system, under which the French authorities keep a tight hand on the dangerous alcoholic, and allow free access to beer and wine; that under the French system immorality is exceptional, and drunkenness almost non-existent.
That we should hate to admit that we are inferior in self-control to the average Frenchman, and we do not admire being treated like Indians on a reserve or inmates of a jail farm. That the use of beer and wine is a man's business, and we do not in any event, having rejected the tyranny of Wilhelminian government, propose to submit to the meanest of all tyrannies, the tyranny of petticoat government.
That the only way to clear the issue is to vote yes on all four questions on the referendum; that in our opinion, the statesman who cannot express the popular desire for rational temperance legislation by drafting an Act that will be neither the stupid License Act nor the atrocious O.T.A., is mentally too lazy to continue as a public servant, and that the aspiring legislator who cannot distinguish between beer and whiskey is not sufficiently intelligent to remain in public life."
