

DELORME TRIAL Evidence Submitted to Show Many Members of Family Insane.

BE DEFENCE IN

PRISONER INDIFFERENT

Jury Sworn In 30 Minutes Consists of French-Canadians.

Montreal June 15.-The mother of Adelarde Delorme, whose trial for the slaying of his half-brother, Raoul, began in the court of king's bench before Mr. Justice Monet this morning, was discharged from an asylum three days before her death. One of her sisters, an aunt of the accused, was also committed to an asylum, while a third sister, although now living at home, was ordered to be committed to an asylum, it was brought out when the question of the sanity of the prisoner was being considered at the opening o the case.

Records from the St. Jean De Dieu Asylum were submitted to the jury dating back forty years to show the extent of the spread of insanity in the Delorme family, on both the other's and father's side.

Delorme was brought to the courtnouse at a quarter to ten this morning from Bordeaux jail in the gov ernor's automobile, but was not admitted by the customary entrance. Instead, he was taken into the building by the superior court entrance, 9 St. James street, from thence proceeding to the third floor, later being brought down in the elevator to the ground floor and given a seat just outside the cells adjoining the police

Declares Council Has Been Warned Repeatedly of Menace to Life.

WARNING SIGNS POSTED

New Structure, With Breakwater, to Cost \$140,000, Defeated in Vote.

Declaring that the Ridout street bridge "is liable to go through at any time," and that he has repeatedly warned the city council of this menace to the life and property of London's citizens, City Engineer H. A. Brazier now declines to assume any responsibility in case the bridge does collapse.

The engineer informed The Advertiser today that the alleged strengthening of the bridge during the past two years merely consisted of replanking the roadway and tightening up a few struts to prevent hem from rattling. In his opinion, no strength was added to the bridge by this work, excepting that the new lanks "lessened the impact."

Following a statement made by Ald. Drake at a meeting of No. 2 committee of the city council Tuesday, to the effect that a private engineer had pronounced the bridge unsafe. Mr. Brazier was interviewed regarding the situation. When informed of the private en

Declare 1922 Outing Beats gineer's statement Mr. Brazier said: "Several engineers have expected the bridge to go through before now, but it is one of those inexplicable things of life that their prediction has not FOUR HUNDRED ATTEND yet been fulfilled."

The private engineer was deputed o inspect Victoria Bridge, as this structure is officially known, by a ratepayer of South London, who was anxious to obtain an unbiased re-

"Ridout street bridge is liable to go through at any time," the city engineer admitted to The Advertiser. LOWER ENGLISH DISCOUNT RATE

Bank of England Makes Reduction of 1-2 Per Cent.

Traders Pleased That Drop Came When Business Is Expanding.

London, June 15 .- The Bank of England today lowered its discount rate to 31/2 per cent, a reduction of one-half per cent from the figure established on May 18 last.

The bank again took Lombard stree by surprise in making this reduction in the official minimum rate. Its action is believed to have been largely taken through a desire to bring the rate more in line with the short loan market which recently has had large funds unemployed at from 1 to 2 per cent while the bank rate stood at 4 per cent.

Treasury bills were also available a easier rates, and as conditions in the United States were easier, the retention of so high a rate here was regarded

Another reason given for the change is that the authorities wish to assist the new Indian loan of £12,500,000 which is being floated today.



Each of these bodies retains the full measure of autonomy conferred on it by statute, and is perfectly free to accept or reject any recommendations of the board of estimates, as it may see flt. It would seem, from the suggested personnel of the proposed board, that the city manager's idea is to avoid an unwieldy organization. His proposal is that the board of education appoint one member; the Public Library board one member, and that the city council be reprsented by the chairman of the finance and industrial committee, as the member of that body best posted on financial matters.
