COMING UP AT THIS SITTING

The Dundonald Mattter to be Dealt With in the **House of Commons**

Original Documents on the Case Concealed and Withheld by the Government.

Ottawa, Ont., June 22.-It was decided in the House this afternoon to bring on the debate on the Dundonald episode at to-morrow's sitting.

THAT FLAG INCIDENT.

Col. Kaulbach, Lunenberg, N.S., referred to the flag incident which was yesterday brought to the attention of the House by Mr. Bourassa. In at patriotic speech he related the circumstances under which Canada obtained the right to fly the British ensign with the Canadian coat of arms on ships registered in this country. Vantsialin (undated), via Liao Yang, Tuesday, June 21.—It is rumored Gen. Oku is following up his intention to join General Kuroki, who has moved out to meet him. Cossacks are watch-ing the enemy's movements. Every school in Canada should have that flag on its walls, Col. Kaulbach declared. He recited the stirring lines, "Only a Bit of Bunting," and declared that it was Canada's right and duty to take a patriotic pride in the flag that has been authorized for use on Canadian vessels, ...

Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that all the facts in connection with the flag incident had not yet been ascertained. As soon as the Government obtained full information it would communicate with the Imperial authorities in regard to this important subject.

THE DUNDONALD MATTER.

Mr. Fisher referred to the requests made by Mr. Monk in the House last Monday for the originals of certain letters connected with the Diindonald matter and other correspondence not submitted to the House. WHAT THE OFFICIAL CHANGES MEAN.

Two Ministers and two high officials have come into conflict with the ruling politicians at Ottawa, and there have been two resignations, one dismissal disgraceful to the country, and a threatened abandonment of office. It is important to note the principles involved in each of these cases. The facts are these:

Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works, resigned, but, according to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was dismissed-because he advocated the policy of Canada for the Canadians. Hon. 'A. G. Blair, Minister of Rail-

ways, resigned, although asked by his colleagues to retain his office, and thus to deceive Parliament as to his opinion, because, as Minister of Railways, understanding the question at issue, he regarded the transcontinental railway scheme in the altered shape presented by Sir Wilfrid Laurier as "folly," and a sheer waste of \$150,000,000 of public money, without one redeeming feature."

Right Honorable the Earl of Dundonald, General Officer in Command of the Militia, refuse to resign, and was therefore dismissed, and described as a "foreigner," because he proposed the adequate defence of the country, and opposed the introduction of politics into the militia, to the injury of the country's defenders, and in wiolations of the King's regulations. John Lorne Macdouzall, Auditor-General of Canada, independent of the Government, resigns, because the supervision of the expenditures imposed upon him by law is contested by the Ministers, and because a bill has been introduced to render his check upon the accounts ineffective, and his attempts to prevent stealing useless.

The Minister or the official who proposes what is right and opposes what is wrong cannot remain in touch with the Laurier, Government, and must step aside.-Mail and Empire.

The bad taste of these vulgar displays of wealth is not their wors feature. It is by such means that revolutions are bred. The fetes at Versailles had a direct relation to the social upheaval in France.

FUTURE OF THE INDIAN

THE RED MAN'S GOOD POINTS AND HOW HE SHOULD BE EDUCATED.

Given Teachers Who Realize That Life Is Spiritual, and the Mind Can Form It and the Indian's Nature Now Unspoiled by the Errors of Civilization Will Easily

It is customary for the western ranchers to ridicule the interest and sympathy always shown by travelers in the Indian. But the intuition of the tourist—called by the residents superficial observation—is right, whereas the resident taking note mostly of their weak points and making no allowance for their past mode of life and their present environments, judges his red brother too-severely. No uncivilized race answers as readily and creditably to education as the red man. One has but to recognize that they need stimulation and guardianship to solve the difficulty of the Indian's lack of ambition and his so-called laziness. As has often been observed, they are but grown-up children. They are about as ignorant of the value of money as they were in the days of selling their land, when they had it to sell, for yards of calico and a few hatchets. It does not seem possible that they can ever be made a commercial people, but something must be done with them in that line. They cannot live a life apart—it is not for their good; they must make part of the nation. Some one must labor with them must make part of the nation. Some one must labor with them along the lines in which they are de-ficient. They are ficient. They are keen in some ways that will serve them well when they come to compete and mingle with the whites. Watch an Indian as he intently studies the face of the persen with whom he is talking. He is

with whom he is taiking. He is judging his character.

Why should the Indians be other than they are? Why should they be ambitious and wish to live after our methods when no attempt is made to convince them of the desirability of such a course? Where the attempt has been mede-sconscientiously, and


Masses and styles of living even now prevailing, making comparison easy. When California was discovered, the native Indians were found to be of the lowest type, and in different secthe lowest type, and in different sections of the state, in Arizona and in New Mexico, the Indian can still be found with no ideas beyond mere living, and filthy living at that. Then there are those residing in the vicinity of white people who dress in a half-way decent manner, sell baskets and pottery, and have a glimmering of the desirability of progress. Another class are the descendants of those whom the Spanish mission priests labored with while they possessed the country. They they possessed the country. They show the effects of faithful but restricted methods. No ambition or energy results. Then come the Indians of the better reservations who have the beauties of nature about them, acres that they call their own, attractive school-houses and intelligent agents. The agents, instructors and matrons, if they do their duty, will show the parents what effect decent surroundings and good example have without intellectual knowledge. They will impress upon the children the comforts and success to be gained through education, and instill a desire to enter the busy world and compete with others. world and compete with others. Last come the pupils of the big Government schools, who have almost all the advantages of the public and

boarding schools, and whose appearance and attainments silence all criticism.

Given teachers who realize that life Given teachers who realize that lite is spiritual and the mind can form it, writes Mary Atwood Harding in The Country Gentleman, and the Indian's nature now unspoiled by the errors of civilization will easily become beautiful. There is a good work being done on many of the reservations at the Government school, but the effects, naturally, are not as noticeable.



THE LAMAS OF THIBET Men Restored to Vigor

NECESSARY TO UNDERSTAND THEIR POWER TO UNDERSTAND THIBET.

nastic Life Finds Its Complete Triumph in Thibet...The Buddhis Luther and His Reformation-Really Two Buddhist Popes, One Tempora Ruler, the Other Spiritual.

In order to understand Thibet, it In order to understand Thibet, it is necessary to know what the dalai lama, the pope of Buddhism, represents and how great is his power, for he is the temporal head of the church, the pant-chen being the head in spiritual matters. With these two popes it should be understood that Thibet—the only really theocratic country in the world—is the country where the church and the state are in fact one organization, the priests being public officials and the pope

in fact one organization, the priests being public officials and the pope the king.

Long before the Christians adopted monastic life, the Buddhists had invented it, and in Thibet it found its complete triumph. Without it this arid and repellant country would still be in a state of absolute barbarism, inhabited only by nomadic tribes. It is not a matter for surprise, therefore, that one does not find to-day in the whole length and breadth of the land a single lay city. Ever since the middle ages the more important Buddhist monasteries have compelled the less important to unite with their orders, thus forming a few powerful groups or communities with with their orders, thus forming a few, powerful groups or communities with different interests and dogmas. In the thirteenth century the great Mongolian Emperor, Khoubilai, who found the temporal influence of the church necessary to establish his Empire in China, conterred superior titles on the monastery of Saskya, which accordingly became the Rome of Thibet. of Thibet.

Thibet also had its reformation in the fourteenth century, when Tsongkhapa, who was something of a Buddhist Luther, preached a re-turn to celibacy and austere morals



PANT-CHEN-ERTENI-RIMPOTCHE, Spiritual Superior of the Dalai Lama. from the looseness into which high ecclesiastical circles had fallen. He scclesiastical circles had fallen. He also founded a new monastry in the country of Lhassa whose chief dogma was that of "reincarnation." This asserts that God—or rather His different "emanations"—is incarnated in the human body in order to animate it, and that after the death of the body the "emanation" is impediately reincarnated in a new-host

mediately reincarnated in a new-horn child. These "portions of the divine soul" naturally choose for places of residence on earth the bodies of the directors of the affairs of the church, so that the high priests of the Thib-etan church are immortal. Although these priests die, they teach, it is these priests die, they teach, it is merely at apparent death—in reality the divine soul simply leaves a wornout body to enter that of a newborn. It is easy to see the importance from a political standpoint of such a doctrine since it raises the directors of the church above the ordinary dwellers of the earth and discards the mudden integers in discards the mundane influence in

of laymen. This new church adopted as its dis-This new church adopted as its dis-tinctive symbol the yellow bonnet, the old church keeping the red bon-net. The reform, however, soon absorbed the old church and the head of the "yellows!" was made the chief of the most powerful monastery. chief of the most powerful monastery of the Lhassa country, the monastery of De-pong. This head of the church chose to reside in winter in the "vatican" of Potala and in summer in Gladan, the new monastery founded by Tsongkhapa, and received the title of dalai lama or "ocean priest." Still later the disciples of the reformed church established in the memory of the Buddhist Luther the monastery of Tachi-hono. about formed church established in the memory of the Buddhist Luther the memory of Tachi-Ihonpo, about two hundred miles to the west of Lhassa and, inasmuch as Tsong-khapa had given to Potala all of its authority, it was considered that the director of Tachi-Ihonpo, who was the reincarnation of Tsongkhapa as well as the reincarnation of Amitabha, who was the deity of this sect of Buddhism, should be the spiritual superior of the dalai lama, who was the reincarnation of Avolokita, a Buddhist personage of similar nature to Christ in the Christian religion. The ruler of Tachi-Ihonpol was called the pant-then lama. There are thus in Thibet two popes, one of whom, the dalai lama, alone governs, while the other, the pant-chen lama, while the other the matters of dogma and spiritual guidance.

The Kangaro

What interests me most is the kahgaroo. I had an idea that all kangaroos were alike before I came to Australia. I now know that there are forty-nine varieties, ranging in size from the great gray kangaroo, the male of which measures over seven feet from nose to tail tip, down to the kangaroo rabbit and kangaroo rat. In Sydney and Melbourne they have nearly every variety. I saw some there that were taller than a man, jumping around in fields inclosed by wire fences. They have enormous hind legs, which send them flying along as though they were moved by steel springs. They can leap thirty feet at a jump and can gallop over the country faster on two legs than a horse can on four.

The largest of the kangaroos are the red and gray varieties, which are found all over Australia, being hunted and killed by the thousands. Horses and dogs are bred for the sport. The dogs are a cross between the greyhound and the deerhound, very fleet of foot and very flerce. The big kangaroo is dangerous when brought to bay. It will attack a dog or a man. It backs itself up again a tree and waits for its enemy. As What interests me most is the kan

or a man. It backs itself up again a tree and waits for its enemy. As the dog comes up it grasps it with its forepaws and hugs it tightly, while it disembowels it with the single long-nailed claw which it has on each of its hind feet. These claws are as hard as ivory; they are three or four inches in length, and moved by the force of the steel-like legs they

by the force of the steel-like legs they cut like a knife.

Sometimes the kangarpos jump into the water when they are hunted, and if the dogs follow then they selze them with their hazds, pull their heads under and hold them there until they are drowned. The kangaroos can swim as well as run, and they take to the water when possible.

The kangaroos go about in pairs. The kangaroos go about in hairs. You usually see a male and female together, and often spy a little head of a baby kangaroo sticking out of the mother's pouch. The animals are vary small when born and they live for eight or nine months in the pouch. It leaves the pouch only when it weighs eight or nine pounds, at which time it becomes too heavy for the mother to carry.—Frank . Carpenter.

SIR WILLIAM HOWLAND.

Father of Confederation Who Has At-tained His Ninety-Third Year.

Partly because of his great age and partly because of the eminence of the man and the prominence of his domestic circle, the ninety-fourth birthday (30th June, 1904) of Sir William Howland is a notable public event. He is only half a dozen reasts volumes than our centenarian

lic event. He is only half a dozen years younger than our centenarian statesman, Senator Wark of New Brunswick, and, though he is not a member of the Senate, he is quite as competent to discharge the duties of that position as some far younger men who occupy it.

Sir William is a native of the State of New York, but he came in early life, with his parents, to settle permanently in the vicinity of Toronto. The family was a businessone, carrying on the operations of farming, milling, and storekeeping. It was quite natural that Sir William out the state of the

Sir William was the only member of the original family to enter public life, but he has seen his two sons filling at different times the honorable position of Mayor of Toronto.

to recall the political condition o the old Province of Canada in the early sixties do not need to be in-formed that Sir William Howland formed that Sir William Howland was then a prominent Liberal member of Parliament, the intimate associate of George Brown, John Sandfield Macdonald, Oliver Mowat, Antoine A. Derion, William Macdougall, Thomas D'Arcy Magee, Michael Foley, Skeffington Conner, and others of less prominence, and that he found himself in opposition to John A. Macdonald, George E. Cartier, Alexander T. Galt, John Cartier, Alexander T. Galt, John Rose, John Hillyard Cameron, and many others who were then less known. He did his share of the campaigning which resulted in the deadlock-that became the occasion of confederation. All the prominent Parliamentarians above mentioned, except Mr. Macdougall, have gone over to the majority before him; may he long survive them to enjoy the respect of a later generation.—Toronto Globe.

Herewith will be found a portrait of Capt. Peter Paterson, the oldest native born resident of the City of Toronto. He was born seventy years ago, May 30th, 1834, at what is now the north-east corner of King and Victoria streets. His life has therefore been coincident with that of Toronto, which was incorporated

Crabs That Eat Cocoanuts

Crabs which live upon cocoanuts which they pick for themselves are found in the Coral Islands. Nature has provided this crustacean with claws and nippers of enormous strength, and it is supposed that the crab climbs the cocoa palms and de-taches the nuts. It reaches the meat of the fruit by picking and rapping with its claws at the end of the nut where the three small holes are to be found till a slight breach is made. be found till a slight breach is made. Then the nippers are brought into use for the rough fibres which surround the shell. These he shreds with his nippers and conveys to his burrows, where they form a comfortable bed for the crab while he is changing his coat. Some of these crabs attain a length of over two feet, and live in holes which they have made in the earth at the robts of tropical trees.


