



NEW EXHIBITS NEW ATTRACTIONS

Many improvements compared with past years will be found to have been made on the grounds. Several structures have been removed and others extended, while a handsome new Art Gallery and a capacious, well-arranged Dairy Building have been erected. In

The New Art Gallery

will be found arrayed the choicest works of Canada's brilliant coterle of artists as well as a large and extensive loan collection. In appreciation of the new building and the excellent light and arrangements afforded, the display of Works of Art will be thoroughly representative and the best ever made in Canada. A magnificent exhibit of photographs, to which both amateurs and professionals are invited to contribute, will be one of the features of the Art Gallery.

The New Dairy Building

It is, however, upon the New Dairy Bullding that the attention of the vast agricultural communities of two countries will be centered, for it is the proud boast of Toronto Exhibition that it attracts people from the United States as well as from the rural districts of Canada. This will be understood and appreciated when it is stated that

Upwards of 300,000 People

attend annually, and that excursions are run on every railway and steamboat line that has connections with Toronto from the south, west, east or north. The Dairy Building is 192 feet in length and 80 fect wide. It contains large refrigerating plants for cold storage and is thoroughly equipped for demonstrations in butter and cheese-making. which will take place twice daily in a large hall in the center of the building, provided with seating capacity for 600 people in amphitheatre form. There are butter and cheese rooms, and conveniences for an extensive exhibit of utensils and appliances used in the dairy. In short, farmers will here have an opportunity of seeing all that is latest in the art of butter and cheese-making, and of being instructed in the advancement that is being constantly made in those industries. Lectures will be delivered by the most eminent professors in the country, who will also conduct the daily demonstrations. The cheese exhibit will be open all the time of the Fair. The butter-making will start on Tuesday, September 2nd, and continue until Thursday, September 11th. Over \$200 will be awarded in prizes for the butter-making competitions, while the prizes in the rest of the Dairy Department aggregate close upon \$1,000.

Field, Farm and Factory

Turning to other industries and exhibits, every building on the grounds will be found full to the limit of manufactured articles and of the product of field, farm and factory. There will be not a few exhibits from other countries than Canada, notably a large and varied collection of the Products of the West Indies, which will cover a space of more than four hundred feet. Processes of manufacture in various lines will also be on view. In short, in his industrial features the Exhibition of 1902 will prove remarkably comprehensive of the arts of peace, of the labor of the husbandman, and of the products of the loom, the workshop, the mine and the soil.

As to the Live Stock

Toronto Fair is know the world over for making the greatest display of all kinds of live stock, and this year will be no exception to the rule. The dates were put back a few days in order to suit the convenience of farmers and breeders, and the number of entries shows that the course pursued has heen appreciated, for the catalogue will be found the fullest yet issued. The Maritime Provinces will be represented as well as British Columbia, Manitoba, the Northwest Territories, Ontario, Quehec, and several States of the Union.
