MAGISTRATES COURT.—On Monday last Mrs. Peffers, widow of the late Joseph Peffers, was brought before Geo. Clinch Esq., charged with having committed an aggravated assault upon Mr. W. L. Kelly, who is an executor of the estate of her deceased husband. Mrs. Peffers appears to have conceived the idea that the executor should administer the estate in accordance with her will, irrespective of the conditions of the will of her late husband; this she executed very naturally objected to. On Saturday evening Mr. Kelly, who is not lacking in "determination of character," assaulted Mr. Kelly at his own residence, inflicting an ugly cut on his head with an iron. Mrs. Peffers admitted having made the assault, and the magistrate imposed a fine upon her of \$30, which she refused to pay; she was also bound over to keep the peace for two years, in the sum of \$500 on her own recognizance.

PEOPLE SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular meeting of the Board was held on Tuesday evening, 2nd inst.; members present—G. Towner, Chairman, and Messrs. Fennell, Bradley, Newman and Adams. The business of the evening was opened; the tender of H. Schim for 75 cords of wood, as advertised for, at \$1.50 per cord, was accepted, his tender being the lowest. Mr. B. S. Davis, who was present at the meeting of the Board, to make arrangements for teaching vocal music in the school, was heard, when it was moved by Mr. Towner, seconded by J. P. Newman, and resolved, that Mr. Davis be engaged to teach vocal music in the school for the coming year at the salary of \$200. Mr. Davis to devote two days in each week, appointing time for each department as may be deemed advisable, and that he be allowed the same holidays as the other teachers, and to be engaged in same terms as other teachers. The places for holding nomination and election of Public School Trustees, and the returning officers, were appointed as follows: East Ward, town hall, McBeth Green, returning officer; Centre Ward, old school building, Lewis Bolton, returning officer; West Ward, Alex. Morrow's store, Alex. Morrow, returning officer. Nominations will take place on Wednesday, 7th January, 1880.

A SWINDLE.—The *Freeholder Sentinel* Reviewer expresses a wish which is being extensively advertised in Canadian journals. We understand that some of our speculative inclined townsmen got wind of the fraud just in time to escape being victimized. The *Sentinel* Review says: "An advertisement which has appeared in a local paper here in reference to the sale of lots in Denver for \$1 each appears to be one of those sharp Yankee swindles that are sure to receive a large number of fools. We have observed on exchanges that many have been taken in by the same ad. elsewhere, and that agents for these mythical lots have been operating around Stratford. A gentleman here has had the curiosity to write to Denver to a responsible attorney about the matter. He has received the following reply:—'In answer to yours, enquiring about North Denver, in which lots are sold for \$1 a piece and in which letter you enclose an advertisement from the *Freeholder Sentinel*, I have to inform you that the whole thing is a swindle and the perpetrator is now under arrest. Denver is in an agricultural country, and North Denver, in which the advertisement refers to, is in West county, about 25 miles from Denver, is out on the prairie, and is entirely void of water. You can see the thing through as a swindle of the 'first water.'

A FREE MARKET.—The long talked of and much vexed question of a market has at length assumed a degree of definiteness. The Council having concluded to act upon the suggestion of a petition laid before them on Monday evening. The old school buildings are to be permanently used for the purpose, and the market is to be opened on Saturday 13th inst. We think that there are few, if any, who are opposed to the establishment of a market in the town; and a question of location, however, has been a bone of contention which has hitherto prevented a decision from being reached. Perhaps the site which has been at last "temporarily" fixed upon is the most suitable that is just now available. The main objection to it is on account of its position not being as central as some would wish. However, as the present situation is somewhat experimental, its suitability can be ascertained in a few days, and if our townsmen wish to see a good market established, their "liberal patronage" will be required.

RAILWAY LEGISLATION.—Application will be made to the Legislature of the Province of Ontario at its next session to empower the Stratford and Huron Railway Company to extend its main line and branches from any point in Great Montfort Island to Saul's Ste. 26, 35 Vic., as a similar section is amended by section 17 of 41 Vic., cap. 54, which provides that the Stratford and Huron Railway Company, where entitled to vote, shall have the same number of votes as they would have if the amount of bonds they held were a like amount of stock; to empower the Stratford & Huron Railway Company to declare preferential charges on the Railway between Stratford and Warton, to empower the Company to be formed by amalgamating the above Company with the Stratford and Warton Railway; to confer on holders of bonds of the Stratford and Warton Railway, the right to vote; to confer on the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railway Company powers similar to those mentioned in 41 Vic., chapter 54, sections 8 and 29; to amend the preferential bonds therein mentioned prior to bond previously issued; and to amend the laws of municipalities granting aid to the Stratford and Huron Railway Company not heretofore confirmed by the Legislature, and to amend a branch from the main line of the Stratford and Huron Railway in the counties of Grey or Bruce to the town of Walkerton.

TOWNS COUNCIL.—A regular meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday afternoon, 1st inst. Present, T. E. Hay, Reeve, J. A. Hacking, Deputy Reeve; and Messrs. Nichols, Heppler, Macdonald, Freeman, Treiman, Austin, Page and Binning. The Mayor being absent, the Reeve took the chair. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The annual accounts were read and referred to a Finance Committee. It was moved by J. G. Treiman, seconded by Adam Austin, that the expenses of D. B. Campbell, J. W. Scott and D. B. Hay be defrayed out of the Town Treasury. A communication was read from the Council recognizing them as a town band, and to make an annual grant of \$100 to them, and offering their services to the town for six days in the year. It was moved by J. A. Hacking, seconded by A. Macdonald, that a committee, consisting of Mr. Nichols, and Messrs. Binning, J. Lee, Heppler and Lewis Bolton, be appointed to interview the town band in regard to reserving the instruments of the town, and that said committee be empowered to deal with the petition of W. C. Smith and others.

CARRIED.—A petition was read from W. G. Hay and 49 others, in regard to establishing a market in the town and utilizing the old school building for that purpose. Mr. Hay assumed the responsibility of getting up the petition; that he had found that the establishment of a market was approved of by the townsmen generally, and that the farmers were also in favor of it. He considered that it would be a great advantage to the town to have a place where the farmers produce could be taken for disposal.
