The Town Election.

In a very few weeks now we shall be having our civic election for Mayor and Councilors. This is an occasion of more than ordinary interest and should in no way be neglected by the patriotic citizen.

Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with Mayor Chambers in the chair and all the members of the Council present.

The Finance Committee reported receipts during December \$3406.36, and expenditures \$1103.86. The debit bank balance at the end of December was \$1975.29.

The report of Dr. G. E. DeWitt, Health Officer for the past year, was read. The reports of the various standing committees and the report of the Mayor to the Provincial Secretary were read and passed.

The report of the recent installation of a meteorological station here in connection with Acadia University and the need of a light on University avenue in that vicinity. On motion it was decided to place a light as desired.

On motion J. W. Selridge was elected returning officer and A. E. Coldwell poll clerk for the ensuing town election, which takes place on Tuesday, Feb. 4th.

A Great Convention at Halifax.

The annual convention of the salesmen and managers of Brandram-Henderson, Limited, was held at Halifax just before the end of the old year. It was attended by all the firm's representatives east of the Great Lakes, but not by those from farther west.

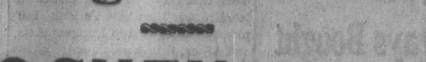

Good for the Provinces.

WHAT THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE IS DOING FOR THE MARITIME FARMING INTERESTS.

The Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, is occupying a portion of the Christmas holidays in the preparation of his new agricultural bill, which was introduced at the beginning of the session. The bill has for its purpose the co-operation of the Dominion in the spread of agricultural education throughout the provinces of the Dominion, and contemplates the appropriation for a period of five years of thereabouts of a large sum of money for that purpose.

The bill, says the minister, will be far more comprehensive than that introduced last year, and it is understood will contemplate the encouragement of education in agriculture, the establishment of experimental farms in various parts of the Dominion, the holding of seed fairs, the encouragement of thoroughbred live stock raising, and various other phases of farming.

The minister does not contemplate much opposition to the bill in the House, and it is confident that it will go through with little amendment. It is expected to be chiefly popular in the Maritime Provinces, where agriculture has not been as progressive of late years as is desirable, and where the agricultural population has shown serious decline. The measure, however, is intended to benefit the whole Dominion.

Canadian Pacific Will Reconstruct Dominion Atlantic.

HOOR STABLE BRIDGES WILL BE FEATURE OF WORK UNDERTAKEN BY THE C. P. R.

It was officially announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway at Montreal on Saturday that the Dominion Atlantic Railway, which is controlled by the C. P. R., will be practically reconstructed. At Yarmouth, the terminus of the D. A. R., extensive operations are to be commenced immediately consisting of a new 500 foot modern wharf with an up to date warehouse. Along the line ten wooden bridges will be replaced by modern steel structures. Much of this bridging will be difficult and expensive work over tidal rivers, where in some cases there is a rise and fall in tide of from 30 to 40 feet.

Moose River bridge will be 918 feet in length, Avon bridge at Windsor is to be a steel structure of 1,100 feet, and the Bear River bridge 1,655, with sixteen spans.

The superstructure of these bridges are all of concrete, and they are designed to carry the heaviest locomotives.

Though this extensive work is being carried on, no announcement is forthcoming as to when the company will start operating the D. A. R. in the name of the Canadian Pacific Railway.
