Turn it out, leaving but a spoenful or two in the skillet, then pour in water or milk, and thicken while boiling, with a little flour and water rubbed till free of lumps. With the addition of salt, this makes a wholesome and palatable gravy. Gravy should be made in the same way for all fried meats. Fried meats usually, however; absorb too much fat to be strictly heatthful. Meats broiled on thd gridiron or baked in the oven are more digestible.
