Of these 1,000,000, 300,000 are colored people. The English Bishop of Huron has appointed Rev. W. M. Seaborn to have charge of Thameford and Lakeside churches in Ontario, which are in the Diocese of Natural Sciences in Helmut's Ladies' College.

The new British Parliament contains twenty-one Conservatives, six Liberals, nine Wesleyans, twenty-nine Episcopalians, nine Unitarians, nineteen Unitarians, thirty-eight Roman Catholics, and five Jews. The Rev. 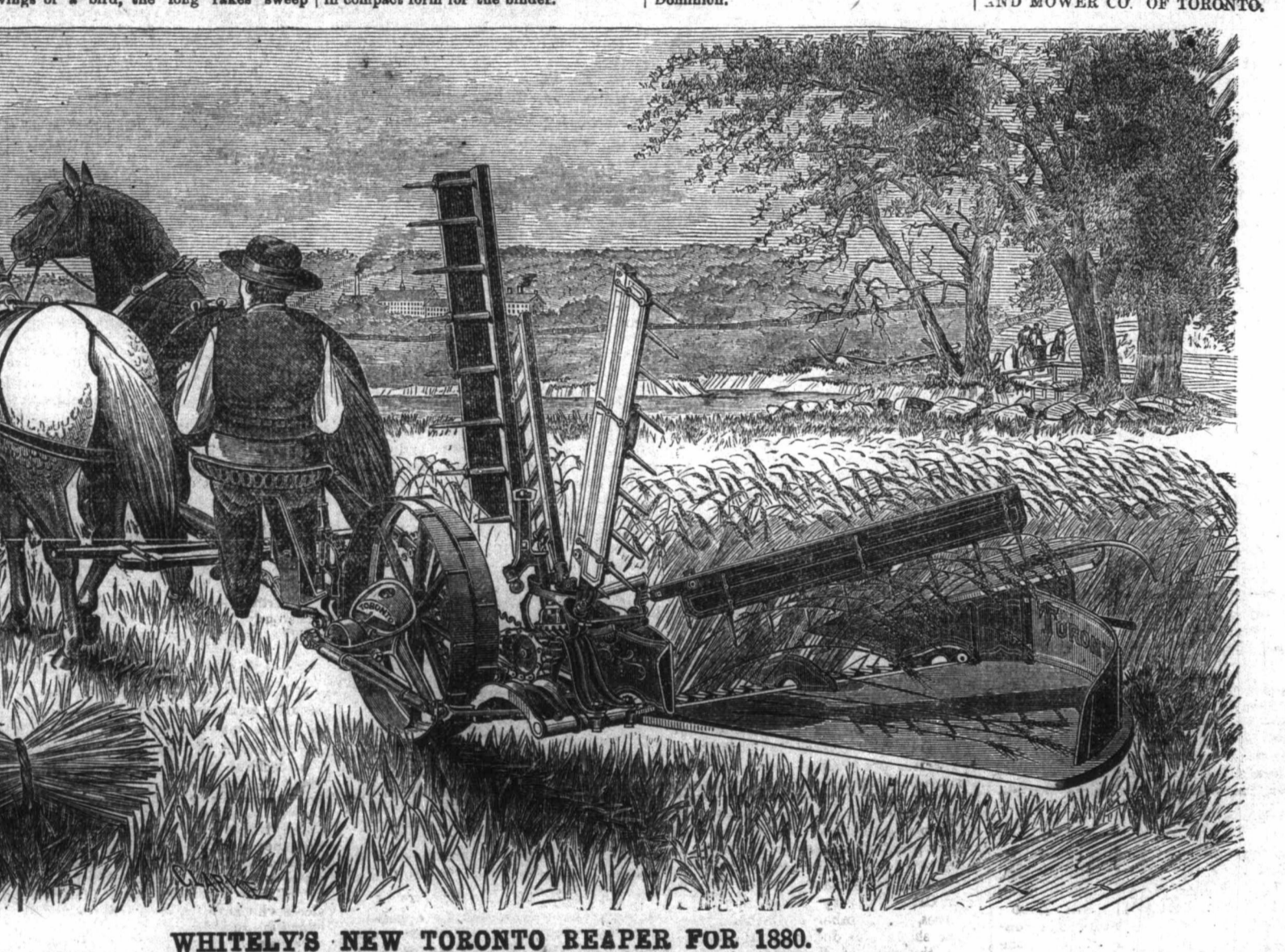
