Not a single journal in the United Kingdum has a word to say in favour of the greatest crime which impexial power has yet perpetrated on the intelligence of France, and the case has been discussed and decided on its merits alone. As France has no voice of her own. our journals in discussing this question are simply speaking in behalf of her gaqged and
degraded press ; and in condemning the degraded press; and in condemning the
prosectution of $M$. de Monalembert, they are claiming for their neighbours that liberty which we our: elves possess, and of wh ch they are shamefuly detrauded. The offen
ce of M. de Montalembert is that he has diplayed to the world's disgust the dead and stinking carcase of French politites by coitrast with the viliali y of political life in Eingland; and how hie succeeded we kr ow learnt from this case. The first is, that in Erance it is highly criminal to ask for freedom, and the second, that the Emperor is selnsible of and trembles at the dangers which surround him. For seven years he has wielded the distinies of Erance ungon-
trolled; yet, after an apprenticeship to gotrolled; yet, after an apprenticeship to go verniment he admits liat he can rust onoHivity, and dreads the gaze of his subjects.
