### EMPRESS THEATRE XMAS PROGRAM

Among the most realistic illusions ever obtained for the screen are those accompanying the burning of the orphanage sets in "Forever," George Fitzmaurice's great Paramount picture, starring Elsie Ferguson and Wallace Reid which comes to the Empress Theatre next Monday. These sets were erected on a lot behind the studio, and to provide more realistic effects, they were burned at night.

Because of their size the sets were erected one at a time, and the company, including many children who played inmates of orphanage, worked through two entire nights.

In the interior scenes, in which the "Duchess of Towers," played by Elsie Ferguson, succumbs to the flames, parts of the woodwork and furniture were soaked with gasoline.

The Long Island fire authorities had been notified in advance of the pre-arranged conflagration, and had issued a permit, but city firemen were at hand to prevent the blaze from getting beyond control.

In the exterior scenes, the fire apparatus of sixty years ago, is drawn to the burning building by firemen in queer costumes of that day.

An additional corps of watchmen was obtained by the studio to keep sightseers off the lot while these scenes were made. Hundreds of residents of the neighborhood watched the blaze.

### AT OPERA HOUSE CHRISTMAS DAY

"Beneath the spreading chestnut tree  
The village smithy stands,  
The smith a mighty man is he,  
With large and sinewy hands—"

Longfellow thus immortalized the man of the anvil in verses that will ring in school rafters as long as there are schools and graduating exercises.

A decade or so ago Hal Reid, playwright and publicist, made a stage hero of the village blacksmith by writing a stirring drama around just such a man. That play was "Human Hearts," which achieved immediate popularity and was one of the best known melodramas of its time, outclassing even "Way Down East," "East Lynne," and other such favorites.

Now Universal has made a screen hero of the blacksmith in a feature adaptation of Hal Reid's play. House Peters, one of the most rugged characters of the screen, was selected to play the leading role. Advance reports indicate he has made the smith a mighty man indeed. The story concerns the wholesome romance and the dramatic climaxes in the life of Tom Logan, small town blacksmith.

It is said to be filled with thrills, heart interest and gripping suspense. "Human Hearts" is scheduled to be shown at the Opera House on Xmas Day and the day following.

Snitz Edwards will be recalled by many of the older generation as one of the funniest comedians on the stage. His antics always kept a theatre in an uproar, and he keeps up his record in this production.

### Sullivan 8 Months Albert 2 Years

The Supreme Court adjourned last Thursday afternoon until Jan. 3rd. The two criminal cases were finished before the court adjourned.

The criminal case The King vs John Sullivan charged with attempted murder of a Trappist Father at Rogersville was completed.

Sullivan was sentenced to eight months in jail and bound over to keep the peace for two years.

In The King vs. Vincent Albert, charged with wounding George Royal at Grand Downs, Albert was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

### Skating Races At Moncton On February 19 & 20

Montreal, Dec. 17—Dates for the international outdoor amateur speed skating circuit events were definitely fixed at a meeting of the members of the International Skating Union of America held here over the week-end February 14th, 15th and 16th were decided on for the international championships scheduled for St. John, N.B., while Feb. 2 and 3, were set for the Canadian National eleventh championships. Elimination events will be held at Chicago, January 26, 27 and 28. Other dates announced are, Moncton, N.B., Feb. 19 and 20. Adirondack gold cup championship at Endicott-Johnson City, Jan. 12, 13 and 14. Plattsburg, January 17, 18 and 19; Lake Placid Feb. 8, 9 and 10, and Saranac Lake, January 30, 31 and Feb. 1.

Murphy, of New York; Bobby Hern, of Brooklyn; George Pickering, New Jersey; Chas. Jewtree, and Val Blalas, Lake Placid, and Orle Gretn, Saranac Lake.

The Sternmetz brothers, of Chicago will fight against one another in the coming international championships at St. John, according to L. B. Judson, member of the Board of Control of the I.U.S. of A.

### New C. N. R. Head Unable To Visit Newcastle

**WILL AID GIRLS OF GASPE COAST**

The Presbytery of Miramichi held a quarterly meeting on Tuesday in the United Church of St. Andrew and St. John, Rev. J.H. A. Anderson was elected moderator for the ensuing six months, and Rev. W. McN. Matthews clerk. Arrangements were made for the induction of Rev. W.W. McNairn of Westville, N.S., to the pastoral charge of St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton, on January 4. Revs. C. F. McLennan, L.H. MacLean and A.D. Archibald are to take part in the service.

A strong delegation was present to represent the interests of the school home project in New Carlisle. Rev. L.J. King, principal; M.C. Hewitt, J.S. Gordon, Rev. J.F. McCurdy, and Dr. James Ross, home mission superintendent, supported the proposition to appeal to the Home Mission Board for sufficient grant from the Forward Movement fund to erect a schoolhome for the accommodation of at least sixty girls. It is regarded as a most promising project in the interests of the educational work of the Protestant children of the Gaspé Coast.

Important home mission matters received attention, including the co-operation with the Methodists in some of the districts of the board.

**Six Cardinals Are Given Their Symbols**

Rome, Dec. 13.—Six of the eight newly created cardinals today received from the hands of Pope Pius the symbols of their offices, in the form of the red hat, or berretta, and the elaborate surplice called the rochet.

Cardinals Locatelli and Casanova were not present, being respectively in Portugal and Spain at their former posts, where they were to be invested by the heads of the states:

Cardinal Bonzano, former apostolic delegate to the United States, acting as dean of the new cardinals in Rome delivered the address of thanks for the high honor bestowed upon them.

He alluded to the additional responsibility resting upon the sacred college at this time, owing to the strenuous efforts being made by some nations to prevent a return of peace among the Christian peoples.

**Profits Half Million Out of Liquor**

Profits to the extent of more than half a million dollars have apparently been realized by the province of New Brunswick during the past fiscal year from the distribution of liquor under the Prohibition Act by the New Brunswick Liquor Commission and receipts under the New Brunswick Liquor Exporters' Tax Act. Estimates presented at the last session of the Legislature showed \$350,000 as the anticipated receipts from each of these two sources during the fiscal year and the Gleaner says that the gross amount has more than been reached, although no figures have been made public.

**ELECTION NOT UNTIL FEBRUARY**

Gloucester Contest, if Any, Stands Over

FREERICTON, N. B., Dec. 7.—The by-election in Gloucester county to fill the vacancy in the Legislature caused by the election of John G. Robichaud, one of the members for Gloucester, to the House of Commons, will not be held until February.

Proposals to hold the by-election almost immediately have been abandoned, it was learned to-day, and the suggestion of getting the by-election over before the new year will not be followed. Hon. P. J. Veniot confirms the report this morning that the election would not be held immediately.

**Rural Conditions In The Maritime Provinces**

There is a general lull in business among farmers all over the Maritime Provinces, which is causing many who would otherwise carry on progressive measure to hesitate. The most favorable statement we can make on the situation is that the big financial men in the cities have been forced to realize that it is not in the interest of general industry that the present state of affairs should continue. There is no more favorable indication as to the future outlook of agriculture than the somewhat tardy, but now quite definite recognition of the situation by financial leaders. In this connection we note from an editorial in the Breeder's Gazette, published in Chicago, issue November 23 "We are pleased to have an opinion frequently expressed in these columns as to the relative recompense of farming and industrial workers confirmed by so high an authority on trade and finance as John Moody of New York City, who, in a recent Chicago address, said: 'The present general average purchasing power of the American farmer is only about 65 per cent. of that of pre-war times, whereas the purchasing power of labor in the industrial sections is still from 100 to 140 per cent. of pre-war times. The farmer represents about one third of our total population. His normal contribution to the wealth of the country is more than this. Either farm prices must rise or labour costs and other living costs must fall in the long run.'

The last sentence is the 'nub' of the whole business. The parish must be re-established before permanent prosperity can be depended upon. As we have always pointed out, the rise has come in feedlot products and grains are doing better, but the spread between the wages of labour and the farmer's wage is still too great."

**NEW STAMP TAX ON RECEIPTS**

Another of the new taxes, imposed by the King Government's budget legislation at the last session of Parliament, will become operative at the beginning of the new year. This is the stamp tax on receipts given in acknowledgement of payment of sums of ten dollars and upwards. The tax is not a graduated one like that on cheques. In the case of receipts a two-cent stamp is to be affixed to each instrument regardless of the amount involved.

Preparations are being made for the enforcement of the receipt tax legislation and the collection of the revenue from that source. According to the statute, the only receipts exempted from taxation are those given by the Dominion and Provincial governments and those which like voucher cheques, are taxable under another section of the Revenue Act. Receipts given by municipalities in acknowledgement of payment of local taxes, those given by corporations, mercantile houses and private individuals, apparently would all be subject to the tax. The working out of the regulations governing the operation of this feature of the taxation legislation, however, involves the settlement of some nice questions and is not yet completed.

The tax on receipts, like the heavy increases in the sales tax and the taxation on cheques, serves to measure the fullness or insincerity of Liberal pre-election promises to lighten the burden of taxation. However, there is one consolation. The receipt tax, like that on cheques is payable in stamps. It may, therefore, like the taxes on cheques, give Hon. Charles Murphy, the Postmaster-General, another opportunity to rejoice over the increased revenue his department is collecting from the public.

**To Race Bill Sharen Over Half Mile Tracks**

Bill Sharon, 204 1-2, the Fredericton bred trotter, is to be raced over the half-mile tracks by his new owner, Dr. Farley, of Kentucky. Word to that effect has been received here from New York where Bill's sale at \$900 was one of the surprises of the Old Glory sale last week, and his racing career will be watched with interest by horsemen of the Maritime Provinces.







### Suits Against Insurance Co's

Over Lumber Destroyed By Fire

Several insurance cases of unusual interest come up at the January sitting of the Northumberland Circuit Court. The plaintiff in four cases is the Royal Bank of Canada and in one case Leander W. Buckley et al, and the defendants in all cases are insurance companies. The actions concern a quantity of lumber belonging to the David J. Buckley estate, at Newcastle which was destroyed by fire in July, 1921. The total amount claimed is about \$108,000. The main question involved is the amount of lumber for which claims should be paid, as part of which was destroyed was the property of the British government. The defendants submit that the lumber outside of this amount is only a small percentage of the whole.

The insurance companies were anxious to submit the matter to arbitration, but the plaintiffs desired to get a jury decision on the matter.

In four cases in which the conditions of the policies contained arbitration clauses, a stay of proceedings was obtained and these will be placed before a board. E.A. Kelly, K.C., appears for the plaintiff in all cases and J.H.A.L. Fairweather for the defendants.

Mr. Justice Chandler presides at the Court.

### CHALLENGE AGAIN? SURE, SAYS LIPTON

If Not Next Year, in 1924 for Certain

After a severe cold forced him to postpone his departure on three occasions, Sir Thomas Lipton sailed from New York on Saturday for Southampton on the White Star liner Homerli, a little hoarse but confident he would challenge for the cup next year or 1924 at the latest.

"There is nothing definite about the challenge," Sir Thomas said, "but it is likely it will be arranged for next year. If not you can count upon a challenge in 1924 for certain. So long as I am alive I shall not give up the hope of lifting the America's Cup, which has been my ambition for more than a quarter of a century. Everything comes to him who waits.

"During the voyage I shall send instructions by radio to my manager in London to prepare 100,000 parcels of a value not less than five shillings each, to distribute among the unemployed at Christmas through the various labor organizations.

"I have been delayed in leaving by my cold, the first real one I have ever had, which is a marvellous record when one thinks of the English climate.

### Montreal Brokerage House Goes Into Liquidation

Montreal, Dec. 7.—The brokerage house of Bryant Bros. Limited, 86 St. Francois Xavier street, went into liquidation this afternoon. A notice to this effect was posted on the door of the establishment stating that the firm had assigned in favor of E. H. Merrill, Norris P. Bryant is the president of the defunct concern.

### Birds And Animals Share Christmas

Christmas is not merely a festival celebrated by and for man alone. Among the folk lore of other countries are several quaint stories in which animals and birds give evidence of their adoration. A well-known Bosnian legend offers a version of world adoration—they claim that on the holy day "the sun in the east bowed down, the stars stood still; the mountains and forests shook and touched the earth with their summits, and the green pine trees bent; the grass was bowflowered incense sweet by myrrh pervaded upland and forest; birds sang on the mountain tops and all gave thanks to the great God."

In Bosnia on Christmas day a sheaf of rye is put into birds' nests and bird houses for the bird's Christmas. A stranger, stranded in a Michigan town was once startled to see a sheaf of rye in a bird box. He knew immediately that one of his kind lived there and was keeping Christmas in the old way.

An old Indian legend tells us that on Christmas night all the deer in the forest kneel in adoration before the Great Spirit. Woe to him, however, who tries to spy on them. He is punished with perpetual stiffening of the knees.

Many people of the old world claim that on Christmas night animals are gifted with speech, but none must trespass or eavesdrop.

### BUILT TOWER AT ESCUMINAC

William Skidd of Skidd Bros., Chatham, has finished a steel tower at Escuminac, built under contract for the federal government, for use by the meteorological department.

The tower is 46 feet high and has been electrically wired for the instruments which are under Mr. K. R. McLennan's charge at that point.

### SITUATION HAS GROWN BETTER

Paris, Dec. 15.—Premier Poincare told the Chamber of Deputies to-day that the general situation had recently grown better instead of worse, and he expressed surprise at the feeling of fear and anxiety he had found when he returned from the London conference of premiers. He asserted he had followed faithfully the programme he laid down for the government when he took office.

Premier Poincare after sketching briefly and optimistically the progress of the reparations and Turkish peace negotiations, said he was ready to withdraw "graciously" if the chamber thought it had ready another cabinet better qualified than his to work for France.

### TELLS OF VAST N.B. LUMBER SUPPLY

Fredericton, Dec. 7.—Speaking before members of the Fredericton City Club on the Forest Resources of New Brunswick, G. H. Prince, chief forester of the crown land department, said that while the average Canadian passing through the province by rail, road, or the tourist by automobile, this province would appear as chiefly an agricultural province, due to the fact that the main lines of transportation followed through agricultural districts. New Brunswick is essentially a forest province.

This fact is practically well known to lumbermen, guides and sportsmen, who penetrate the forest depths of the province, he said, while the presence of 415 up-to-date saw mills and five pulp mills is an indication of the immense resources required to maintain a perpetual supply of raw material. Over 70 per cent. of the total province area is composed of forest land, said Mr. Prince, with an average of 32 acres of forest land per capita, while over half of the forest area are crown lands, the property of the people of New Brunswick.

Speaking of the increased interest shown in forest resources during recent years, Mr. Prince pointed out that over seven and a half million acres, the greater portion of which is located in the northern and central counties on the Restigouche, Nepisigut, the Miramichi and Salmon Rivers, comprises the crown lands of the province.

This, he said, represented a vast resource, a money value totalling over a hundred million dollars, a capital investment which, under properly regulated management may produce through growth and utilization an annual interest without reduction of the principal. Efforts for further conservation are at present being confined to two main channels, said Mr. Prince organized effort to secure accurate information regarding crown lands through accurate mapping and the creation of a permanent organization to carry out the present cutting regulations, the scaling of the annual log harvest and protection from fire.

The problems of vital importance today are the losses, mostly of fire, the question of the relation of the annual growth to annual cut and the matter of fire protection.

### DESIRES TO HAVE AGREEMENT MADE

Belfast, Dec. 15.—Hope for a speedy meeting between the representatives of Ulster and of the Irish Free State to reach an agreement on the questions affecting both sections was expressed by the Duke of Abercorn, the new governor of Northern Ireland, in his first speech to the Ulster parliament recently.

"I desire," he said, "to express the earnest hope that the time may not be far distant when the executive of the Irish Free State and the executive of Northern Ireland may meet to settle in amicable fashion those questions outstanding which affect both areas."





## MORE DRASTIC OATH

The A. A. U. of C. has endorsed the stand taken by the Maritime Provinces' branch and in future all Canadian amateur athletes will have to take an affidavit more drastic than that originally introduced by A. W. Covey, president of the maritime branch. The affidavit was prepared by five western lawyers, headed by W. G. McNeill, Winnipeg, and approved by Judge Jackson. It was passed by delegates from every branch in Canada. Messrs. Covey and A. C. Millie Halifax, representing the M.P.B. It has not been decided whether athletes here who took the Covey affidavit will have to take the other one. The Union will now govern women's sports, also junior and intermediate and inter-scholastic events. A clause has been inserted calling for a two month's residence in the town for which an athlete competes, instead of thirty days. All contestants must be amateurs, and those who fall from grace in accepting cash in any way cannot be reinstated.

## Arrested For Theft And Trial Now On

Early last Wednesday morning W. L. Durick's drug store was entered and a quantity of liquor and chocolates stolen. The police immediately got busy and as a result, John Gallah, a young man about 25 years of age was arrested. From information received from Gallah, Robert Shaw, aged 17 was arrested, and a little later Charles Galley, aged 20 years was also apprehended. After these arrests were made, Galley and Shaw gave information which led to the arrest of Alfred Grossman and Robt. A'Dair. Grossman was arrested for having in his possession cigarettes-stolen from O'Brien's store, which were taken by Galley and Shaw, while A'Dair was arrested on information given by Galley of having the stolen liquor from Durick's drug store in his possession.

The five prisoners were lodged in jail on Saturday night, and yesterday afternoon a preliminary examination was held before the Police Magistrate. The charge of breaking and entering O'Brien's Tobacco store was read to Galley, and the evidence of William Murphy, William Hogan, Arthur Doran and Robert Shaw was taken. The case was further adjourned until two o'clock this afternoon.

Gallah is well-known in this vicinity for numerous breaks, and served three years of a ten year sentence in Dorchester for a break made here some time ago. Galley is also an old offender and had a suspended sentence of two years in Dorchester placed on him for a similar offence. Shaw is apparently a new beginner and has got himself in bad company. It is hoped that a clean up to the many thefts in this town will be made through this investigation.
