The Fast Atlantic Service.

As we intimated some time ago there is no doubt that there is a strong desire on the part of the Laurier Government and the Liberal party to throw cold water on the fast Atlantic service.

Mr. Tarte's paper, is strong evidence of this desire. That paper recently made the statement that there was no tender for the establishment of a twenty knot service between Canada and Great Britain. This statement called forth from Messrs H. & A. Allen the following vigorous letter, published in the Montreal Gazette:

Sir,—The article on the Fast Atlantic line, which appeared in the Cultivator of Saturday and which you quote today, contains misrepresentations of such a character that we cannot allow them to pass without contradiction. It is stated that our proposition consisted in simply saying to the Canadian government: "If we succeed in placing our project on the money market within a certain time, we will accept your subsidy."

Unsworth was the favorite from the start. His appearance on the track elicited enthusiastic applause, and in his splendid performance he fully justified the expectations of his friends. In the one mile bicycle race, amateur, seven started. This race was contested in a down-pour of rain. As the racers were coming towards the wire the wheels of Unsworth and Cook were leading, slipper.

Unsworth was thrown headlong to the ground. B. C. Prowse was following closely behind, ran into the other two and shared their fate. Carbonell won the race. Unsworth picked himself up, grabbed his wheel and ran under the wire winning second place. In the one mile race for boys under 16, W. Davison, Moncton, second and L. W. Pearson of Charlottetown, third. In the slow race, Percy Morris was first and Clifton Rice second. In the 100 yard race, amateur, Humphrey of Moncton won, W. Edmonds of Charlottetown, second, and Duffy of Charlottetown, third. Time 1:12. The 100 yard foot race, professional, was won by H. M. Harris of Charlottetown, V. Douse, second, and L. McDonald, third. Time 1:1.5. In 100 yard flat race, open to members of both bicycle clubs, L. A. Sells won, V. Robit second, and H. B. Large third. Time 1:12. The quarter mile foot race, professional, was won by L. McDonald, second, H. M. Harris, and third, O. McLellan, Moncton. Time one minute. The quarter mile foot race, amateur, was won by W. Edmonds, second, Cyrus McLellan, and third, H. Bethune. Time 55 seconds. In the half-mile foot race, amateur, L. B. McMillan won, Cyrus McLellan second, and A. Riggs third. Time 2:33. There was, by this time, a regular down-pour of rain, and the track was in a wretched condition, so the remaining events, a three mile bicycle race, amateur, a two mile bicycle race, handicap, and a five mile bicycle race, were postponed till yesterday afternoon.

The bicyclists had charming weather and a good track yesterday afternoon for the winding up of the tournament. There was a very large attendance of spectators, and the races were very much enjoyed. The three mile race was judged by laps; that is the man coming under the wire first each lap scored 3 points, the second 2 points, and

In the course of his speech, during the debate on the address, Mr. Hackett, of West Prince said: Referring for a moment to the speech from the throne, I must say that I cannot see very much in it to commend. It contains no very little, and that little has been so much commented upon by hon. gentlemen who have preceded me, that there is scarcely anything left for me to say. But my speech was prepared in the belief that it would be a most unwise and unstatesmanlike thing to hand over these valuable fisheries to foreign control without receiving due compensation.

In reply to Sir Charles Tupper on Tuesday last, Premier Laurier said: Responsibility was going on with the imperial government respecting the fast Atlantic service, and that it was not just now expedient to make public the facts of the situation. Mr. Bell of Pictou resumed the debate on the motion to go into supply. He followed up Sir Hilda Tupper's denunciation of the fact of Hon. Mr. Davies in summary dismissing the alleged charge of offensive partisanship, and in earnest language protested against the minister's course in setting on the American press that "in the view of the people," a practice that was repugnant to the good sense of the people of Canada.

Mr. Bell made a fine impression as a speaker and proved himself a valuable addition to the debating strength of the Conservative benches. His question of the Montreal Witness editorial in condemnation of Mr. Davies' system of political brigandage, was received with loud applause. Hon. Mr. Foster followed. He took the ground that silence on the part of the first minister did not comport with the importance of the debate to go into supply had assumed. The offices had already been parcelled out and every office holder made uneasy. A policy of intimidation had been pursued in Queen's and St. John's and in other parts of the country as well, and the utterances of the minister of marine pointed to the introduction of a spoils system in the treatment of public employees similar to that which prevailed across the border.

Hon. Mr. Laurier replied, taking the ground against the spoils system, but asserting that whenever an official dabbled in politics the liberal government would give him his walking ticket. Sir Charles Tupper, replying to Hon. Mr. Laurier's remark that he had when high commissioner entered the political arena, showed that so far from the charge being correct, he had come out to this country as Sir John McDonald's request, at a time when the liberals were doing their best to hand over the control of her tariff to Washington and to strike a fatal blow at our connection with the mother country.

Sir Charles completely turned the tables on the liberals when they challenged his assertion by quoting Edward Blake's letter in the London Times that he had refused to follow the liberal party in its policy of annexation. Sir Richard Cartwright, who dearly loves to attack Sir Charles, vigorously assailed the opposition leader's position, and incidentally upheld a modified application of the spoils system to the civil service. Hugh John McDonald, the man who defeated Martin in Winnipeg, got a rousing reception. He spoke to packed galleries and an attentive house. His exposure of the rights of the civil servants to the exercise of their citizenship at the polls was a calm logical treatment of the question, in marked contrast to the threatening partisan utterances of Sir Richard Cartwright and his associates. After a brief passage at arms between Colonel Donville and Hon. Mr. Foster touching appointments, the motion to go into supply was adopted without division.

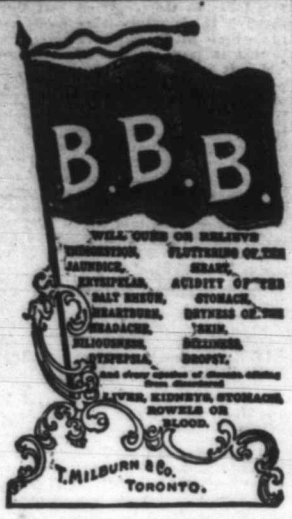
