

The only other lecture of the course was the one delivered in the evening by Henry Austin Adams, A. M., of Brooklyr, on the modern novel. Mr. Adams is perhaps one of the most famous lecturers on the platform today, his reputation havirg in a few years extended from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast. As an orator, his skill is unquestioned; his speech is marvellously fluent, his style clear and graphic. and his enthusiasm boundless: whether it be a simple little story or a great and enpobling idea that he is expounding, he seizes upon those points which are most striking and presents them with such simplicity and such power as to hold fixedly the attention of cach person in the place. His versatility and charm as a lecturer were never more enjoyed than on these occasions when he dwelt upon the history and scope of the modern word.


