

Care of Shrubbery.

be clipped about June, or a little later. One may preach against formality and artificial outlines, but the majority of people are pleased with nicely rounded or conical specimens, whether singly or in groups. As a little short, well-rotted manure should be annually dug into the flower-beds, it will cause a strong growth especially in coleus, consequently the tops should be frequently clipped. There is wide difference between beds so treated and those permitted to grow at will. If the beds are in regular designs the shears should frequently be used to shape the outlines. If dry, bring hose and sprinkler into requisition, as plants set thickly in beds rapidly absorb moisture from the soil.

Worth Repeating.

The way to grow sour grapes is to le all the bunches grow that set. I know, for I tried it once. Now I pinch off all but two bunches on a cane and see to it that there are not too many canes. Where more than one cane grows from bud the extras are broken off soon after they start. On my soil I never get too little wood. Variety, seil and age of vine will determine the best mode of vine will determine the best mode of summer pruning. Rose bugs will crawl through a very small hole. Bags to pro-tect grapes from their ravages must be pinned tight around the stem or cane, otherwise they will get in and devour the young fruit. I bag mine as soon as they bloom.—Farm Journal.

Seed Production Weakening.

A small apple full of seeds, or a puny bunch of grapes with many seeds, makes fully their desires and requests. a greater drain on the tree or vine than a large, juicy fruit consisting more of pulp than seed. For, as in the animal kingdom, the production of progeny weakens the parent, and the rarest elements go into the seeds that are to yield it. Grapevines are much given to overbearing, and the way to grow sour grapes is to let all the bunches grow that set. After having pruned at least half the wood away in October or November, we pick off half the bunches in May. 
