Most of these products were produced not by the ordinary isherman-farmer, but by those in the

districts like St. John's and St. George's, where the farming industry is more developed than it is in other parts of the Island, and by those who can afford, through having leisure and means, to devote themselves to it. 

LONDON, April 23. John Passmore Edwards, formerly proprietor of the Echo, a publicist, philanthropist, and advocate of national peace, is dead at the age of over 88. He was a journalist of world-wide repute, and a co-worker with Cobden and Bright. Over 70 public institutions were founded by him, and he received the freedom of several cities. As far back as 1848 he was delegate to the Peace Congress at Brussels, in 1849 at Paris, and the next year at Frankfort. Twice he declined the honor of knighthood.

Special Evening Telegram,

LONDON, April 23. The first instalment of the work of improvement to the Port of London, under the Act by which the Government took over all the docks and vested them in the control of the Port of London Authorities, is about to be taken in hand. The whole undertaking will occupy years, and is destined to place London on an equality with Liverpool, Southampton and other ports in respect to modern equipment. Commencement has been made on the construction of the South Albert Dock, the expense of which will be about \$12,000,000. The dock is designed to accommodate the largest ships afloat. The scheme includes straightening of the River Thames.

A Terrible Accident.


