THE NORTH AMERICAN INDIAN.

A Tale of Woe.

Extraordinary disclosures have been made in a report on the physical condition of the six million children attending school in England and Wales. The report is contained in a Blue Book issued by the Government. Broadly it states that half the school children have some disease, and that a considerable percentage are half starved. "Here is the tale of children's illness set out in cold figures, as obtained by the inspectors:—

Defective vision (serious)	600,000	10
Defective hearing	180,000	3
Suppurating ears	60,000	1
Adenoids	360,000	6
Decayed teeth (extensive)	2,400,000	40
Rhineworm	60,000	1

Heart disease	60,000	1

Total cases of disease 3,780,000 . . . 63

Children Wanting Food. As to malnutrition, here are some figures from different parts of the country. They are divided into four classes: (1) Good, (2) Normal, (3) Sub-normal, (4) Bad.

Taking counties, here are the figures showing the percentage of children showing a "sub-normal state of nutrition": Bedfordshire, 20.1; Dorset, 14.4; Somerset, 15.0; Staffordshire, 19.2; Surrey, 12.5; taking urban areas, Darlington, 21.0; Ipswich, 26.3; Kingston, 12.6; Tynemouth, 27.0.

It is to be wondered then that labor unrest prevails in England and Wales, when conditions are so hard that such a state of things can be shown in regard to children. All this cannot be put down to drink. Most of it may be put down to low wages and the hard struggle for life which ensues from straitened circumstances.

To-day a drunk was discharged. A disorderly for the fourth time this season was fined \$4 or 14 days. His Honor was merciful this morning and let three other drunks go. A fourth, however, being an old offender, was fined \$2 or 7 days. Three men who were convicted of larceny of cash were sent down for 3 months.





Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 24.

Apparently fearing that the delay in the statement Sir Edward Grey will make in regard to Anglo-German relations would increase anxiety in Germany and Britain, and would develop further ill-feeling, the Government has put the olive branch into the hands of Sir J. A. Simon, Solicitor-General, with instructions to waive it publicly in a speech at Bath last night, after disavowing any intention of forestalling the statement of the Foreign Secretary, the Solicitor-General said: "We rejoice in a good, firm understanding with France, but the fact that we are friends with France does not mean that we are the enemies of anybody. The Democracy of this country does not allow such distortion of our relations with one Power as would involve us in any unpopularity with another. Let us send the Democracy of Germany a message that we are holding the same faith as a majority of them, and cannot tolerate even the idea of mutual ill-feeling." The speech was interrupted frequently by enthusiastic cheers.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 24.

Not for a generation have foreign affairs aroused so much intense excitement in parliamentary circles as at present. Grey's statement as to the Morocco incident on Monday next is anticipated with the liveliest interest, and is not untinged with anxiety. The Minister's resignation is regarded in many quarters as the possible outcome of the situation, but his position is strengthened by the fact that his retirement from the Cabinet will be signalled by Germany as a decisive triumph, comparable only with that which was achieved in the case of M. Delesclapart. The immediate danger is a further outbreak of resentment at Berlin, which many say will sweep Germany's Government from the Pacific standpoint it has held. The reception of Sir Edward Grey's speech is thus a matter of grave moment as regards the question of Europe's speech.





Appeal for Mt. Cashel.

We have been handed the following for publication:

CIRCULAR LETTER.
 Rev. Dear Sir,—During the past year the Boys' Orphanage and Industrial Home at Mount Cashel has passed through a severe ordeal.

An outbreak of diphtheria developed in the early part of the summer, and continued for several months. Although the type of the disease was not of the severest, yet it was such as to demand the closing down of the schools and the industrial works of the boys.

Owing to the strenuous and untiring efforts of the Brothers, and their intelligent action in seconding the work of the Officers of Public Health, the disease was so far conquered that only one death occurred. The sincere thanks of the community are due to Dr. Breim, Public Health Officer, and his attendants; also to Dr. Mitchell, who gave his services gratis throughout the whole time of the prevalence of the epidemic.

The greatest loss to the Institution, financially, was the forced discontinuance of the sale of milk from their splendid herd of over twenty milch cows. This industry was one of the principal sources of income to the Institution. It can easily be imagined then what a loss both directly and indirectly accrued from the stopping of this channel of income.

It is also to be mentioned that at the time of the outbreak the Brothers were at work in the erection of the new building.

"The Slattery Memorial Hall."

The work on this wing was so far advanced that it could not be discontinued. The prosecution of the work, besides increasing expenses, added not a little to the anxiety and mental worry of the Rev. Brother Superior, Brother Finbar.

Thanks, however, under Providence to the wise and energetic management of Brother Finbar (Mr. Emma) the epidemic of diphtheria has been completely tramped out, and the new wing finished. It is now since some time occupied by the boys and contains a suite of dormitories unequalled in any similar institution in America.

During all this time the number of boys in the Orphanage has been regularly increasing, until they reach at the present time the number of 115. The proportionate numbers from the different Dioceses are as follows:

St. John's (Archdiocese), 85 boys
Hr. Grace Diocese, 17 "
St. George's Diocese, 13 "
115 "

Owing to all these circumstances the Brother Superior, though reluctantly, has found it necessary to appeal for some extra assistance to meet present liabilities. We promised him that towards the end of the year we would make a general appeal upon the Priests of the Outport Parishes to give some assistance towards this good work. We may say that there are very few Parishes in the Archdiocese which have not their contingent of boys in the Orphanage. The same may be said of the other dioceses. We therefore request that on some Sunday between this and the end of the year a special collection be taken up at the Church doors, or, if more suitable to the circumstances of the Parish, a house-to-house collection be made towards this object.

The amounts collected may be sent either to the Chancellor's Office at the Palace, or to the Brother Superior at Mount Cashel.




