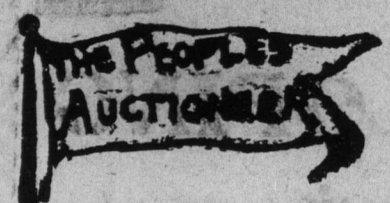

Sponge your face lightly with cool—not cold—water.

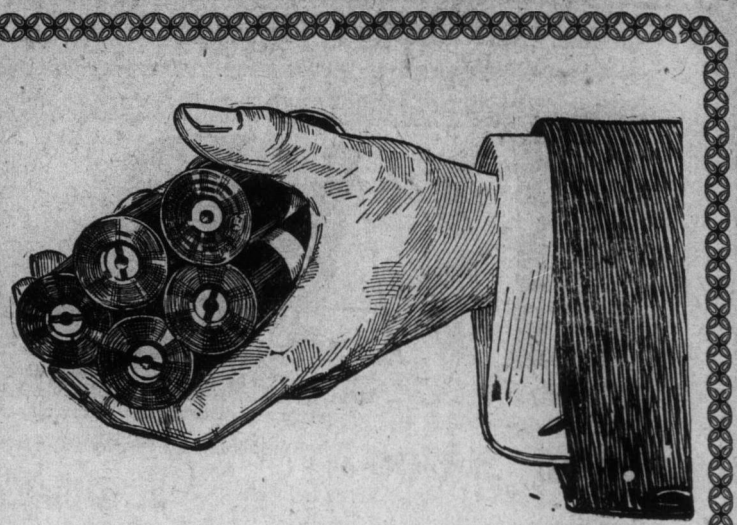
Dry your face downward. Perhaps you don't know that by careless rubbing upward you can very soon spoil the shape of your nose.

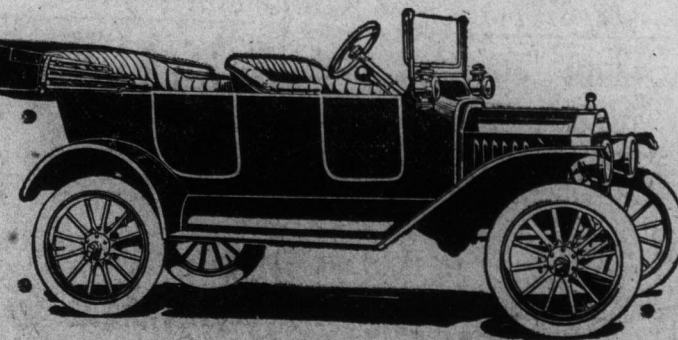

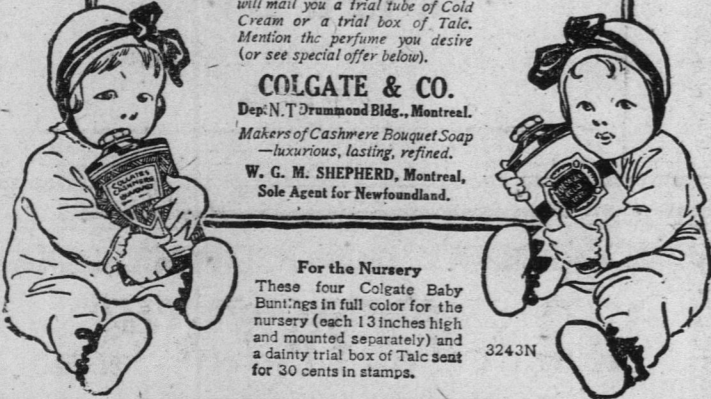

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

JOFFRE ATTENDS CONFERENCE IN LONDON.

LONDON, June 9. General Joffre is in London. He attended an important conference at the Foreign Office to-day with Paul Cambon, the French Ambassador, Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary, and the members of the War Council.

MUST SELL OR DEPOSIT THEIR SECURITIES.

LONDON, June 9. Americans domiciled here, who are subject to the income tax, must sell or deposit with the British Government their American securities under penalty of an extra two shillings tax. This information was given out to-day by an official of the American Dollar Securities Committee. The ruling holds whether securities are held here or in America.

GERMANS LAUNCH GENERAL ATTACK.

PARIS, June 9. The Germans have launched a general attack along the entire front on the right bank of the Meuse, and have penetrated the French lines at one point, but were repulsed elsewhere with heavy losses, according to an official statement to-day.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, June 9. The point where the Germans entered the French lines is in the neighborhood of Thiaumont farm. The Germans also made two small attacks southwest of Hill 304, but these attacks, the statement says, were repulsed.

AUSTRIAN FRONT COMPLETELY BROKEN.

LONDON, June 9. Information has reached the Russian Embassy in Rome that the Austrian front has been completely broken along a length of 94 miles to a depth of 37 1/2 miles, according to a

despatch to-day from the Italian capital.

RUSSIANS CAPTURE LARGE NUMBERS OF PRISONERS.

PETROGRAD, June 9. While directing action in one section of our offensive, General Mikouline was seriously wounded. The number of our prisoners is constantly increasing. In addition to those already announced we took in the course of yesterday's fighting an additional 185 officers and 13,714 men, making the total captured recently in operations, 1,142 officers and over 64,714 men. On Wednesday evening enemy artillery bombarded violently the regions northeast of Krevo and south of Smorgnen. The bombardment extended farther north. On Thursday night the enemy in strong force opened an offensive, but all attempts to approach our positions were repulsed. In the region of Molodchue station, enemy aeroplanes dropped four bombs, and five German aviators raided the town of Toglichine, north of Pinsky, dropping 50 bombs. One machine was brought down by our artillery inside the German lines. In the Trebizond region our skirmishers dispersed the Turks from a convent, south of the village of Hortokop. We repulsed all enemy counter attacks.

ENEMY'S LINES CRUMPLED.

PETROGRAD, June 9. Five days' furious fighting by forces under General Brusiloff have crumpled the enemy's lines from the Kovel-Sarny railway line to Bukovina, driving them back an average of 15 miles. In the Lutsk sector the Russians appear to have completely broken through, turning the left flank of the Austrian armies, and the right flank of the German forces, and capturing Lutsk, the centre of a number of radiating roads and railways. At several points the attacking Russians crossed the Ikwa and Stry Rivers. Further south they are approaching Strypa. These victories are attributable to the avalanche of gun fire which swept away dozens of lines of entanglements and opened the way for the troops who swept through. In some places the Russian barrier of fire cut off large Austrian units which surrendered. This accounts for the large number of prisoners officially reported captured.

GREEK GOVERNMENT NOTIFIED.

PARIS, June 9. The Official Press Bureau states that the Entente Allies have notified

the Greek Government that, as a result of its negotiations with Bulgaria and Germany, they would take all measures necessary to enforce the treaties safeguarding Greek unity and the Greek constitution. These treaties moreover, are binding on the reigning dynasty, Greece is informed. In consequence the Greek commander of Salonika has been replaced by a French naval officer, and entry to the port has been refused to Greek ships from Kavala. Moreover, an embargo has been placed on Greek ships in French ports.

PREPARED AND EQUIPPED.

LONDON, June 9. A despatch from Amsterdam says that a statement has been issued from the Dutch Army General Headquarters, stating that the army is thoroughly prepared and equipped for any possible war.

SMALL NAVAL ENGAGEMENT.

LONDON, June 9. A brief engagement between small British and German warships off the coast of Belgium yesterday, was made known to-day in the following official: On Thursday morning a British patrol force, composed of monitors and torpedo boat destroyers engaged, off Zeebrugge, torpedo boat destroyers of the enemy which, on being fired at by our monitors, returned into port. There were no casualties, and no damage was done to our ships.

GERMANY DENIES STATEMENT.

BERLIN, June 9. It is understood here that there has been published in England, a statement according to a wireless despatch received in London from Berlin, the German Admiralty admit the loss of the Dreadnought Westfalen in the North Sea battle. Authoritative and specific information given to the Associated Press to-day indicates that this report is without foundation, and the Westfalen, which had led the line of the German battleships, returned safely to her home port. A despatch from London last Saturday gave a wireless report that the German Admiralty admitted the loss of the Westfalen, a battleship of 18,602 tons. This has been denied by the German Admiralty.

IRELAND'S TROUBLE.

DUBLIN, June 9. The Irish Unionist Alliance has adopted a resolution to the effect that the present time is inopportune for any large change in the Government of Ireland, as that would encourage the seditious element and imperil Ireland and the Empire. It is absolutely necessary, the resolution says, that martial law will be continued for some time.

The Three Worst Emotions.

Jealousy, remorse and a sense of injustice of all the painful emotions that we are called on to experience, I think these are the most painful. Which is the worst of the three I wouldn't presume to judge. They are all bad enough. And any one of them is together too bad for a kind-hearted woman to visit upon a child.

And yet how many women do make their children smart from a sense of injustice because they, the mothers, will not take the time and pains to find out in every childish squabble just where justice lies.

A friend of mine has two children, a little girl who is almost invariably very sweet and good and obedient, and a boy just as sweet in his way, but with all the instinctive wilfulness and mischievousness that makes a boy child so much more difficult to deal with than the average girl.

The Boy Of It And The Girl Of It. He teases his little sister and she breaks and destroys things and is perpetually getting into mischief of one sort or another.

His little sister is used to seeing him punished, and I am afraid she enjoys it, for she has lately developed a habit of running to her mother with news of her brother's misdeeds, especially offences toward herself.

"Brother pulled my hair"; "Mother, brother stepped on my foot," she says. And—whereby hangs my tale—almost without investigation, brother is scolded or punished, because he usually is guilty.

Once I happened to be a witness of one of these little fracasces and I knew that sister had been just about as much to blame as brother for the scrimmage that resulted in her rushing to her mother. Yet, had it not been for my testimony, he would undoubtedly have been the only one punished.

Tattling Makes Prigs Of Children. Incidentally, tattling is just as much a sin as hair pulling and should not be encouraged. Of course there are times when a child must tell in self-defence, but too often they get the habit and develop into self-righteous little prigs.

We do not easily forget injustice. A man of forty tells me that he has never ceased to burn with hate when he thinks of a nurse girl who unjustly put the blame on him in a dispute between him and one of his sisters. He says he will never forget the fury he felt when he heard her refuse to corroborate him in his true story.

The Unfairness Broke His Heart. In an article on child's suicide is an uncanny story of the youngest suicide ever known. A child of three was playing with his younger brother when his mother came into the room with a tub of scalding water. There had been some fracas between the two children, and without a question as to the right, the mother picked up the younger child and petted it and rebuked the elder. Whereat the three-year-old, in a passion of resentment, threw himself into the tub of water.

A horrible story, isn't it? But it shows how keenly even the youngest child can feel injustice and should make the mother judges even more zealous how they deal out justice in the little court where their power is absolute.

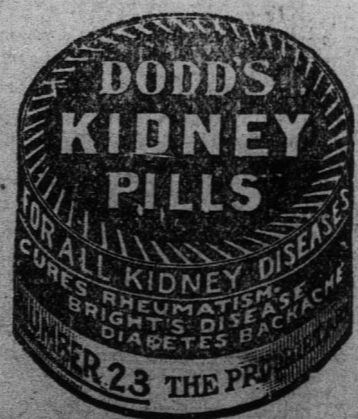

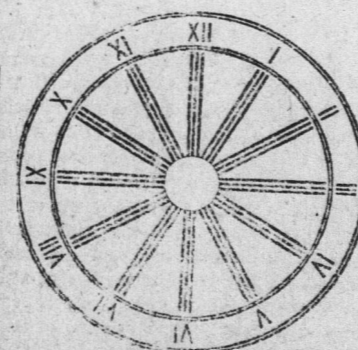

Resurgent Russia.

We expressed the opinion yesterday that the renewed activities of the Russian armies were the herald of great events. To-day's messages go far to confirm that opinion. The centre of interest in the fighting-lines has shifted with dramatic suddenness from Verdun and Trentino to the Russo-Austrian front, with Lutsk and Lemberg as pivotal points.

The design of the great advance seems now to be far larger than the mere relief of the Allied armies in the West, and to aim rather at a business-like invasion of Austria over the familiar ground of the Carpathians. Already we learn that the Russians have driven a wedge between the German and Austrian armies at the point of junction near Lutsk. If this is true, if they have effectually turned the flanks of both armies, it is a fine achievement, and in General Brusiloff the Russians must have a leader of the very first order. Last year the Teutonic armies endeavored repeatedly to effect the same end, and by piercing the Russian line to split their armies and separate them from their separate. But the rapidity of the Russian retreat saved them time after time and their line was held intact.

The suddenness of the attack, evidenced by the large number of prisoners captured, and the reported intensity of the Russian artillery bombardment, are both very significant. It was precisely by these methods that they were themselves worsted so often by the Germans last year, and it seems that they will prove apt pupils of their conquerors. The fact also speaks volumes for the work of preparation that has been proceeding during months of military inactivity, and the Russian success will be received with particular satisfaction in Britain, where an enormous amount of that preparation has been done. It is a new and refreshing thing to learn of the Russians overwhelming the Austrians by artillery.

One thing is certain. If Lemberg and Przemyśl fall once more into Russian hands they will not be again restored unless as a term of peace. Behind them lies the Carpathians; across the Carpathians the plains of Hungary; beyond the plains of Hungary the end of the war.

The Municipal Elections

The news, reported elsewhere in our columns, that Mr. Gosling and other members of the Commission intend to offer themselves as candidates at the forthcoming Municipal elections will be received with satisfaction by the public, and more definite information awaited with interest. It seems to us the only logical outcome of the position, which is peculiar in many respects.

The purpose of the appointment of these gentlemen was to give trial to a system other than that which had obtained theretofore, and as far as possible to discover what system of municipal government was best adapted to this city. The original length of the trial, one year, was found to be quite insufficient, and was accordingly extended by the Legislature for the space of an additional twelve months. In addition to the work actually done by the Commission during their tenure of office, of which there is abundant evidence and to which we need not refer here, they have presented the opinions of the majority of their number upon every department of civic government, in the form of a proposed charter. This charter has proved to be altogether too voluminous, and to contain too many changes, to permit of its being adequately discussed during the past legislative session. This had to be deferred until next year. But meantime the Commission itself ceases to exist; in a few days an election has to be made of a new Council, who, in effect, a reversion to the old order of things. It is obvious that if the Commission

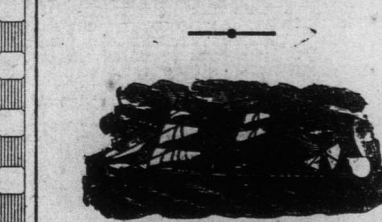

THE THOUGHTS OF THEOBALD.

\$100,000,000.00
The five battle cruisers which the United States are going to build are to cost twenty million dollars a piece. They are to be the most powerful and fastest ships afloat and able to go one-quarter as fast again as the fastest British or German ships. The British and Germans have ships that steam 29 or 30 knots an hour, and which have engines of eighty-seven thousand horse-power. The American ships will steam 35 knots and have a hundred and eighty thousand horse-power. They will make a formidable fleet indeed in battle and will also be able to show a clean pair of heels, if the fighting does not suit them.

DR. JOHNSON.
Dr. Johnson who went down in H. M. S. Defence in last week's naval engagement practised at Trinity for a while just previous to the war. The people there grew very much attached to him, although he was in some ways so different from their own loved Doctors White, whom he succeeded. He had a way of his own to cure some cases, and would suggest mental remedies in language sufficiently energetic. One patient who had kept her arm in a sling so long that she was losing the use of it, and wondered what was the matter, was told to go to the hospital to take the sling off, rub her arm and not look so miserable. The result was that she looked a new woman a minute after, and her arm was almost well again.

Another story goes that Dr. Johnson was called away a long distance to visit a child not two years old, who had a serious affection of the throat. The Doctor took the child back to his own home and performed the difficult operation needed and he and his wife nursed the little fellow till he was well enough to go home. Mrs. Johnson was always a great help to him in his practice.

At another time, a child was brought to him, and after finding that it was diphtheria, he made up a bed for the little chap in his surgery, but with all his skill, could not save him and the boy died there.

Dr. Johnson was a most skilful surgeon and it was in this branch of

terrible epidemic in the city and save the little ones, it ought to be done at once.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

Some people are of the opinion that the lack of prospective nominations in this month's civic elections is caused by the uncertainty of our municipal laws caused by the suspension of the New Charter for a while.

If this is true, then I differ altogether with those who hang back at this time from seeking election. More than at any other time, the present is most opportune for men with policies, and with practical plans for the government of the city. Their ideas will test the opinions of the people, and the man who is elected on a definite civic platform will have more right to advise concerning the New Charter than any of those who have not been elected. That is, of course, if we are willing to admit that the "people" have really the most right to a say in their government. So then, it is not sufficient for a candidate for Mayor or Councillor simply to say that if elected the problems of the city will receive "his earnest consideration," or any such platitude. He must come with definite ideas. He must say: "Here is my platform. These things must be remedied, and here are my methods for doing so."

At the present juncture there is plenty of room for new ideas, and many years will elapse before such an opportunity will come again. Therefore I cannot understand what there is to deter any candidate from coming forward simply because the New Charter is under revision. And, at the same time, if the Charter is not to go to the people, the only way to test its provisions is for the Commissioners, or at least some of them, to stand for election. I think that some of them would be elected. It is known that the New Charter is not altogether a unanimous finding, and it would be a highly desirable method if each Commissioner came out with his own ideas if they did not appear in the Charter.

MUSIC EXAMS.

One parent has voiced a complaint against the treatment of those who recently took the music examination. This year there was no room in which the candidates could warm themselves and otherwise compose themselves before going before the examiner. At the best, examinations are no absolute test of ability and in the case of music, cold fingers do not conduce to a favourable or natural condition of a pupil. Unfortunately this matter is typical of the general attitude in some schools in regard to music. It occupies an inferior place to all other studies. I suppose it is because it is not termed a practical subject and interferes with the study of the C. H. E. subjects which have to take up so much of the scholars' time.

It is a remarkable thing that the Christian Brothers' Schools which have nothing to do with the C. H. E. examinations, find time to produce many school operettas, and it is a regular event each year with them. The children are instructed in singing and learn to sing many of the good old songs. But with some of the Colleges I know, singing and playing are placed in a secondary position altogether. And in so much are the schools being contaminated by this practical, materialistic century of ours. When the fine arts are looked down upon by our educationists, what hope have we? Of all the arts, music is the only one which is mentioned as being in Heaven. And yet some people find no use for it in our schools, and we crowd our halls in order to hear the latest trampety live-for-a-month nickel song!

THE GLAD MONTH.

I love the balmy month of June, when all the sunlight plain is strewn with handsome growing things; when every bird's so full of glee it takes its perch upon a tree, and humps itself and sings. 'Tis then the world seems at its best, for it is Dame Nature's mild behest, it sheds its hoary years, and seems scarce old enough to vote, as 'twas when Father Adam smote his pair of brindled steers. From my den window I can see a poor old dead and withered tree, that lightning hit one day; but June is draping it with vines, and each green tendril, as it twines, will hide some small decay. June has the warm, reviving breath; she hates the sight and chill of death, and hides the tombs with grass; Old Winter wounds and mauls and mars, but June, she covers up the scars—which come again, alas! June says, "Forget all thoughts of doom! Yours are the fragrance and the bloom, the roses blushing red, enjoy this month while it endures, enjoy the world while it is yours,—you'll be a long time dead!"

J. J. Hill Was Worth Over \$200,000,000.

Had Immense Interests in Railway Bonds and Stocks, Mostly in Great Northern and Northern Pacific Roads.

St. Paul, Minn., June 1.—James J. Hill's wealth is estimated from \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000. He was probably worth between \$200,000,000 and \$250,000,000. An estimate of Mr. Hill's wealth was provided when the European war began in July, 1914. He called his bankers together from the First National Bank and the Northwestern Trust Company, of St. Paul, and more than \$100,000,000 in securities was said to have been in the boxes Mr. Hill laid before them.

"There should be no trouble," said Mr. Hill, "but if there is, this amount is at your disposal."

The First National Bank there borrowed from Mr. Hill \$10,000,000 worth of Great Northern R. R. bonds.

Mr. Hill had the absolute control of the First National Bank and Northwestern Trust Company, which have a combined capital and surplus of \$6,500,000.

Mr. Hill was a large owner of stock in the Chase National Bank of New York and the First National Bank of Chicago and the Northwestern National Bank in Minneapolis. He also had a large interest in the Great Northern Pacific Steamship Company.

The greatest portion of Mr. Hill's wealth, however, was in the stocks and bonds of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroads.

That control of the First National Bank of St. Paul from James J. Hill to his son, Louis W. Hill, two years ago, became known Monday. Mr. Hill is understood to have told his son that he was more responsible for its rapid growth and development than any other person, and that he was entitled to the reward of his efforts.

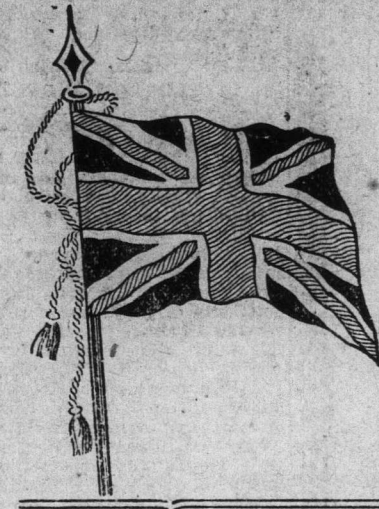

ROOSEVELT'S PROBABLE NOMINATION.

CHICAGO, To-day. Theodore Roosevelt will be nominated for President to-morrow by the Progressive National Convention, unless there is some political miracle, such as an agreement between its conferees and those from the Republican Convention, or a direct emphatic word from Roosevelt himself that the Progressive nomination would not be accepted. For hours to-day the leaders of the Convention staved off the nomination, which every delegate in the hall knew was rushing forward with the hours themselves. It can no more be stopped than an avalanche, if the Convention is assured that the last hope of peace with the Republicans was gone. After three sessions that ran through the gamut of emotions, from hysteria for Roosevelt to calm dispassionate discussion of the planks in the platform, the Convention adjourned until to-morrow.

SELBORNE ON THE NAVAL FIGHT.

LONDON, To-day. Earl Selborne, President of the Board of Agriculture, speaking in London last night of the recent battle in the North Sea, between the British and German fleets, said: How precipitate was the flight of the German fleet was shown by the fact that only three men were wounded in the whole of Admiral Jellicoe's fleet, and that not one of his ships was able to get into gunfire for more than six minutes. The only one of the ships to suffer was the battleship Marlborough, which was torpedoed by a submarine but reached

harbor safely. No sensible man ever expected anything from the Germans but great efficiency. In the first two phases of the action the German sailors fought well. Their strategy was right in retiring at the beginning of the third phase of the battle, when Admiral Jellicoe's fleet arrived, for if they wanted to preserve their fleet it was necessary to avoid deliberately challenging us for the mastery of the sea at this time. But after that to proclaim a great victory and a school holiday, and to publish a speech like that of the Kaiser's, was making the German Navy ridiculous.

BRUSSILOFF'S BRILLIANT ATTACK.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Operations began in the vicinity of Olyka, where skirmishing has been frequent lately. Both sides appeared to have been feeling for a weak spot in their opponents' line. The Russian advance from this point, which is 25 miles from Lutsk, was accomplished in two and a half days. During the period of inactivity the Austrians constructed strong fortifications in this section. The topography of the country formed a strong natural defence, and military observers regard the operations as extraordinarily brilliant achievements which emphasize the able leadership of General Brussiloff, who has conducted the Carpathian campaign and has made a record for prisoners, guns and munitions captured. Lutsk is an important link of connection between the southwestern region and northern section. Possession of it by the Russians is regarded as a valuable step towards recapturing the lost territory. The possession of Lutsk is a direct menace to Lemberg, upon which place the Austrians are now massing their forces.

AUSTRIANS TAKEN BY SURPRISE.

LONDON, To-day. Reuter's Petrograd correspondent sends the following concerning the Russian offensive against the Austrians and Hungarians. "Wounded Austrian officers assert that the Russian attacks against their armies were totally unexpected. One eve of the attack the enemy were celebrating the German victory in the North Sea with champagne and Cognac, but the opening of the Russian bombardment ended the festivities. From other sources

comes the tale of how the Russians seized by surprise an Austrian railway station with its personnel. Fifteen minutes later a military train with troops and supplies arrived, and all the Austrian supplies were captured. One hour later a railway train load of shells arrived and fell into the hands of the Russians. Complete Austrian divisions including two Generals surrendered. The only person to resist was a Hun Sister of Mercy. She fired a revolver but was afterwards disarmed without difficulty."

LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. The Germans after their successful thrust at Thiamont Farm have ceased for the moment their infantry attacks against this section of the Verdun front. Paris reports that the artillery bombardment continued heavy in the regions south of Thiamont Farm, Chapite Wood, Fumin Wood and South Damloup. On the left hand of the Meuse several attacks by the German infantry against Hill 304 have been repulsed by French. Under pressure of artillery attacks the Italian troops have withdrawn to new positions in the zone east of Asiago, and east of the Campo Milo Valley. This is admitted by Rome. The Vienna official claims further gains on the Asiago highlands. The Austrian-Hungarians report the aggregate Italians made prisoners since beginning month to be 12,500. King Constantine has signed an order demobilizing twelve classes of the Greek Army amounting to 150,000 men. Paris considers this action to be the result of pressure by the Entente Allies. The demobilization order reported from Athens may bring about the downfall of the Skondovits Ministry.

CONVENTION ADJOURNED.

CHICAGO, To-day. After taking two indecisive ballots for the presidential nomination the Republican National Convention adjourned until to-morrow. The second ballot showed Hughes 328, half Root 98, half Fairbanks 88, half Cummings 85, Roosevelt 80, Weeks 79, Burton 76, half with balance, scattering the necessary choice of 495.

ACTIVITY ON BRITISH FRONT.

LONDON, To-day. A British communication yesterday morning says: Last night a party belonging to the Gloucester Regiment entered the enemy trenches near Neuve Chapelle. After successfully attacking the garrison they captured a machine gun. Otherwise there was no infantry action. Yesterday afternoon our heavy artillery destroyed the railway station at Salome, east of La Bassée, setting a train on fire and damaging the track. Good results were obtained against strong points behind the enemy lines north of Hulloch. To-day (Friday) there was much artillery fighting east of Ypres, our guns engaging various enemy positions successfully, while the enemy carried out short bombardments at a number of points behind our front line between Ypres and Comines Canals and the Ypres-Roulers Road. South of Armentieres we effectively bombarded the enemy's trenches. East of Laventie and south of La Bassée Canal there was little activity. Near Souchez we destroyed the enemy trench mortar which was bombarding our lines. Mine warfare continues in Hohenzollern redoubt, south of Neuville, St. Vast and north-east of Albert. In the last 24 hours we exploded successfully six mines. The enemy sprung a mine without damage or casualties to us, and a small defensive mine with trifling damage. There was aerial activity yesterday.

DERFFLINGER SANK.

LONDON, To-day. The report that the German battleship Derfflinger has been sunk is reiterated in an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. It says that travellers arriving in Amsterdam from Berlin say they were told in Germany that the Derfflinger sank after the North Sea battle while being towed to Wilhelmshaven.

VIOLENT ARTILLERY FIGHTING.

PARIS, To-day. Violent artillery fighting was in progress on Verdun front last night in the vicinity of Avocourt, Thiamont and the Chapitre and Rumin Woods, no infantry attacks.

VICTORY WITHOUT PARALLEL.

LONDON, To-day. The victory won by the Russians is without parallel in military history, says a Petrograd dispatch to the Reuter's Telegram Co. The Russians now occupy the whole of the triangular fortified positions at Kolk, Lutsk and Olyka. Military writers dwell on the great strategic importance of this triangle, which includes some of the best Austrian communication lines and connects the centre between Polesie, Volhynia and Poland, and the roads to Galicia and Bukovina. The Russians fought their way to Lutsk, a distance of 35 miles, in three days, through forests and marsh lands over the battered defences of invincibility which the Austro-Germans were boasting throughout the winter and spring. There is still no response to the Russian thrust. Military writers declare matters begin to look serious for the whole enemy line in Russia. Col. Shumsky, military critic of the Bourze Gazette, declares the junction between the Austrians and Germans has been cut clean through, thus exposing the right flank of the Germans and the left flank of the Austrians, making them almost defenceless to further Russian attacks.

MORE STEAMERS SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch from Amsterdam says that a trawler has brought to that port thirty-two sailors, the crew of the Norwegian steamer Rickenda, sunk by a mine. A despatch from Copenhagen says that the Swedish barque Heidi has been sunk by a mine near Aberdeen. The British cruiser Hampshire was seen to be on fire before she sank off the Orkney Islands, according to statements of men trawled and steered away from her from the Orkneys. The disaster occurred last Monday night, only an hour after Earl Kitchener and members of his staff had embarked on the cruiser at the extreme north of Scotland. One trawler reported that the warship appeared to have blown up, although no sound of an explosion was heard, probably on account of the terrific storm that was raging. Twenty minutes after she was seen in distress and on fire, the Hampshire sank in between Mearck Head and Brough of Birsay, off the western coast of the mainland of the Orkneys. The raft from the cruiser which was flung ashore with twenty men from the Hampshire clinging to it, was discovered by a policeman who was searching along the rocky coast. The men were battered and exhausted, a few of them murmured Kitchener was on board and then fell asleep. About eighty bodies were found along the cliffs, many of them men in their terrific battle with the sea, the clothing of some of them had been torn from their bodies, their hands and feet had been mutilated in their desperate efforts to climb the cliffs. According to reports, Earl Kitchener and members of his staff were placed in one of the ship's boats which got clear of the wreck, but was swamped in the terrific sea raging.

IRISH NATIONALISTS WILL MEET TO-DAY.

LONDON, To-day. The Irish Nationalist Party will hold a meeting in Dublin to-day, to discuss the suggestion for a settlement of the Irish question. The Dublin correspondent of the Daily News predicts that important developments will result from the meeting and affirms positively that the Nationalists will reject any terms excluding the northern counties from operation of the Home Rule act by any other means than the vote of the electors of those counties; they say that the terms given in the newspapers as suggested as basis of negotiations give away more than was purposed two years ago.

THE GALLANT CAMPANIA.

LONDON, To-day. One of the ships engaged in the North Sea battle was the old Cunard liner Campania, which acted as a dispatch ship. When the cruiser Warrior was hit by a torpedo the German ships and unable to move, the Campania pushed herself between the German ships to aid the Warrior. She threw a torpedo and towed the Warrior for 10 hours, when the cruiser sank. The Campania was thus the means of saving the crew of the Warrior.

ROME, To-day. The Italian transport Principe Umberto has been torpedoed and sunk in the lower Adriatic, with a loss of a large number of soldiers, according to an official statement issued by the Admiralty yesterday.

PRINCESS ARTHUR'S LITTLE SPEECHES.

LONDON, May 15, 1916.

Princess Arthur of Connaught, one of the smartest and best-dressed of our Princesses, is taking quite a big part in public life, and relieving her great aunts, Princess Christian, Princess Louise, the Duchess of Argyll, and Princess Henry of Battenberg, all of whom have worked hard in the past at Bazar-opening and such ceremonial duties. Princess Arthur, like so many of our modern women, has a pretty gift for speech-making. The elder generation of Royal ladies has been content with the stereotyped "I have much pleasure in declaring," but Princess Arthur can make a graceful and appropriate little address. She has a particularly pleasant voice, and is a very popular addition to our platform Princesses.

LONDON GOSSIP.

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GERMAN WAITERS.

It seems probable that the number of German waiters finding employment in this country after the war will be very much smaller than what it was in recent years. Hotel and restaurant keepers are not likely to force upon their customers, at any rate for several years to come, unwelcome services of a class who, like German dyes and chemicals, largely owed their ubiquity to a superior organization for turning them out. Hamburg and other German towns possess considerable colleges, where youths are trained as waiters and where even the opening and shutting of a door is taught as a fine art. In the London County Council technical schools British boys have for some time past been receiving instruction, and many of them are now in good employment; but there is little doubt that the Germans will endeavor to return to their well-paid jobs when peace is restored. With the object of preventing this, the Incorporated Association of Hotels and Restaurants on May 5th decided that the Council should use its influence among members to prevent the re-engagement of Germans as managers and waiters in hotels after the war. It was recognized that while members could not be bound, the influence of the Council would have the desired effect.

MEDICINES FOR SERVICE "DEPENDENTS."

Shortly after the outbreak of the war, the British Medical Association and the Pharmaceutical Society organized a scheme for providing medical advice and medicines free of charge to the necessitous dependents of sailors and soldiers. Doctors and chemists freely gave their services; no charge was made for the dispensing of medicines; but the chemists were paid out of the National Relief Fund for the cost of the ingredients. The extent to which this scheme has been utilized is shown by the fact that since it was inaugurated at least 1,200,000 prescriptions have been dispensed, though the actual number is above this, as many pharmacists have not required payment even for the drugs used, and have, therefore, not sent their prescriptions to headquarters to be priced. It is estimated, however, that if they had been remunerated for their services as dispensers on the National Health Insurance basis about £13,000 would have been received, and this sum may be regarded as a contribution by individual pharmacists to the State.

PRESERVING TRADE SECRETS.

Business houses possessing valuable trade secrets that have been carefully kept from the knowledge of rivals for many years are placed in an especially difficult position by the new military requirements. Anxious not to extend the circle of those of their staff in possession of the information, they are faced with the alternatives of taking this course or closing down. Firms so circumstanced will be interested in the solution of the problem arrived at by the manufacturer of a required article of soldiers' equipment. Having failed to obtain exemption for men of military age, though engaged on a war contract, the head of the concern has decided that, instead of engaging outsiders and revealing to them his secret process, he will fill the places of men called up by their daughters, in this way keeping the secret "in the family."

SHIPBUILDING DIFFICULTIES.

Though the Government are now doing what is possible to facilitate the output of merchant tonnage, progress continues slow chiefly because of the scarcity of labor for this class of work, and the difficulty in obtaining adequate supplies of material. Corn.

Corn is called king in a good many states, but this is saying a great deal too much for the king business. Kings are all right in their way, but no king has kept 30,000,000 people fat and happy by his own unaided efforts, or has stuck to his job for twenty-four hours a day through a long, hot summer. When a king dies his subjects drop a respectful tear and then send for the undertaker's wagon and a goldsmith, to cut down the crown to fit the next king. A small red pig, if allowed to eat a crib of corn, will produce enough ham and breakfast bacon to keep a family fat and financially busted for three months, and a thin cow with a backbone like the ridge pole of a cathedral, can so disguise herself by eating corn for a few months that the packer will mistake her for a silver mine and sell her for forty cents a pound. 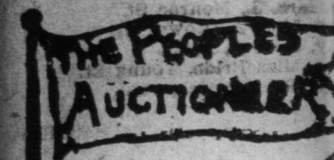
