ANOTHER AIR RAID.

LONDON, Sept. 24. Hostile airplanes attacked the S.E. Coast of England this evening. According to an official statement the raiders came to different places in Kent and Essex. A few of them followed the Thames and attacked London. Bombs were dropped at several points. The casualties so far reported are six persons killed and about 20 injured.

WAR SUMMARY.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24. Violent attacks by the soldiers of the Crown Prince against the new French positions northeast of Verdun, on Monday, were checked with heavy losses by General Petain's men, and the Germans gained nothing. The assaults began with an attack on a front of about a mile and a quarter north of Bois De Chaume. Only in the centre of the assaulting lines were the Germans able to reach the French positions, artillery dispersing them elsewhere. The French fought valiantly and remained masters of the situation, after inflicting heavy losses on the Germans. Simultaneously the German Crown Prince threw forward two secondary attack ing forces, one north of Bezouvaux. south of Bois de Chaume, and the other southeast of Beaumont, northwest of the wood. Here the French did not wait for the Germans to reach their trenches, but went out to meet the attackers, who were driven back with losses. Later in the day the Crown Prince hurled two new attacks against Bois de Chaume only to meet with further failure. Again the French drove back the Germans with casual-




