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





LONDON, Sept. 24. Early in the afternoon, Minister Geddes replied to the railwaymen's ultimatum declaring that the action of the men's executive was unjustifiable, and in order to meet their demands freight rates would have to be advanced, probably 50 per cent. He declared that the increased pay demand would mean an additional per-manent expenditure by the railroad companies, amounting to forty-five million pounds annually, as compared with the pre-war expenditure.



The Relief of Lucknow. Perhaps one of the darkest pages in the history of the British Empire is contributed by the Indian Mutiny, when our greatest and wealthiest possession was torn asunder by a huge revolt which was only quelled after desperate fighting and considerable bloodshed. It was not so much the

of life amongst our soldiers that makes the Mutiny such a sorrowing corner of the globe has, more or less, inured us to heavy casualties, but it is the awful atrocties perpetrated by the savage mutineers on defenceless mains indelibly fixed in our memory. From the beginning of May, 1857, when the smouldering fires of rebellion burst into flame, the whole mutiny is one long, sad story of murder, rapine and treachery-officers shot in the back by their Sepoys on parade, civilians foully murdered in cold blood, and defenceless women and children outraged and butchered by men whom hatred had turned into wild beasts. What wonder, therefore, that the British soldiers, rendered furious by these atrocities, fought with a desperation never before or since equalithe corpses of women and children lying mutilated in the blazing sun mutely calling for vengeance, and it was with a feeling of revenge in their hearts that the white troops proceeded to quell the mutiny. Many of the officers and men had lost all they cared for in this world—their wives and infants having been cruelly slaughtered-and these men fought as only fanatics fight. They were only too glad to throw away their lives on the battlefield provided they could account for one or more of the murderers before they died. In every town and station where there was troops, desperate fighting took place. At Cawnpore the English were hopelessly outnumbered, and were froced to capitulate to the notorious Nana Sahib, who having given his word that all lives would be spared treacherously slaughtered the women and children. To the lasting glory of the British officer and soldier, never was heir bravery, coolness, and resource more magnificently displayed than during these terrible times, fighting against overwhelming odds, and holding out until relief came. After months of fighting the help so much needed






