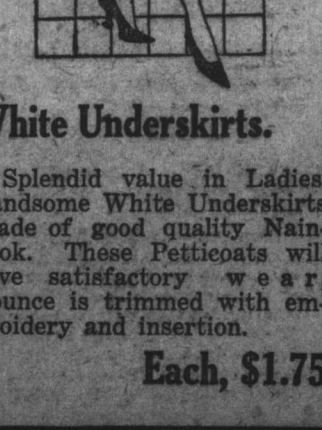

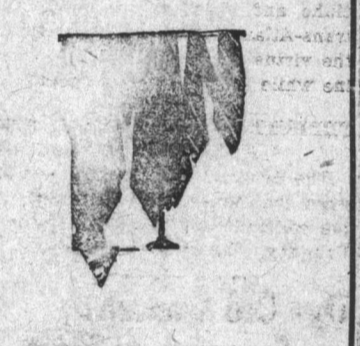

Allies Hold Germany to Their Terms.

Lloyd George Confident Genoa Conference Will be Successful—Irish Conference Again Adjourns.

8,000 HOMELESS. BELGRADE, April 20. Several hundred persons were killed and one thousand wounded, and thousands made homeless by an explosion of war material stores at night.

WAR MATERIAL EXPLODES AT MONASTIR. ATHENS, April 20. Reports from Salonika report great loss of life at Monastir as a result of explosion of war material. Hundred children were buried in the ruins of a church in which the shells and it is believed 1,800 soldiers perished in the ruins of a barracks.

AGREES TO EXCLUSION. PARIS, April 20. The conference between Free States and Republicans adjourned at 4:45 this afternoon until next Wednesday. No agreement was reached. Those present were Lord Mayor O'Neill and Archbishop Byrne, the sponsors for the conference, Michael Collins, Arthur Griffith, Eamonn de Valera and Cathal Brugha.

YESTERDAY'S CASUALTIES. BELFAST, April 20. Casualties in to-day's disorders were five killed and fifteen wounded.

AN INSURGENT STATEMENT. DUBLIN, April 20. The army is not responsible to any political leader, says an official statement on behalf of the insurgent Republicans, adding "Our men cannot

be allowed to go hungry because they uphold the principles of the republic for which they fought and which others are seeking to subvert. The Irish people will settle matters when the opportunity offers."

DEATH OF CANADIAN POETESS. VANCOUVER, April 20. Miss Marjory Pickethall, Canadian Poetess, died in Vancouver General Hospital last night. A blood clot caused death at the end of a brief illness. Miss Pickethall was born in London, England in 1883, and came to Canada in 1890.

WAR AGAIN IMMINENT. PARIS, April 20. The German Government says Emlie Buire, in the Eclair, has sent twelve thousand "shock troops" into the Rhur and announced readiness for resistance in Upper Silesia. Meanwhile Russian Red Armies are threatening the Polish and Rumanian frontiers. There is no time to lose if we want to avoid war, the writer comments.

LEYLAND LINER IN DISTRESS. HALIFAX, April 20. The Leyland Line steamer Oxonian, of Portland, Me., for Liverpool and Avonmouth, is in distress in Latitude 40.42 north long., 48.33 west, with rudder stock broken. The Winnifredian of the same line is going to her assistance.

LABOR MANIFESTO. DUBLIN, April 20. A labor party manifesto demands that the Dail Eireann asserts its authority and unite the Irish Army under a single command or confess impotence.

WINSTON CHURCHILL INJURED. LONDON, April 20. Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, Colonial Secretary, was severely shaken up by a fall from his horse. It is hoped he will recover in a few days.

WILL RECEIVE NEW MACHINE. LISBON, April 20. A new hydro-aeroplane will be shipped by the Government to St. Paul's Rocks to enable Naval Captain's Coutinho and Sacadura to resume their trans-Atlantic flight, interrupted by the virtual destruction of their machine while landing at the Rocks.

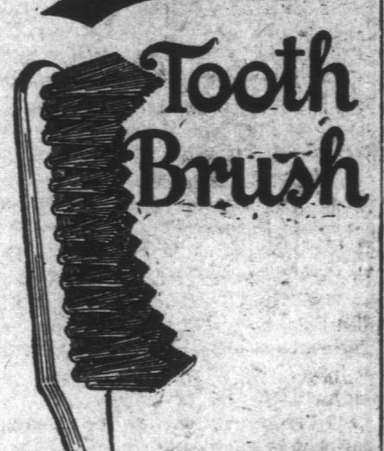

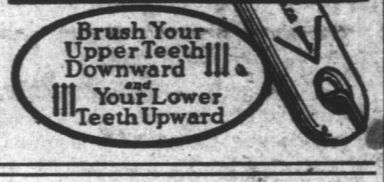
See Nikko and Die. A CITY OF BEAUTY AND CHARM. TOKIO, (Associated Press)—One of the most delightful places the Prince of Wales is to visit in Japan is the beautiful city of Nikko, 90 miles north of Tokio, of which the Japanese say, "One cannot appreciate the word 'beautiful' until one has seen Nikko." The city is one of the most popular resorts in the country and attracts hundreds of visitors at all seasons of the year. Within the immediate neighborhood are many objects and places of interest. Best known of all is the famous Red Lacquer Bridge spanning the river Dajra which originally none but the Shogun and one travelling as a special messenger for the Emperor might cross. A short distance from the Sacred Bridge are what the floods have left of the once numerous images of Buddha which lined the bank of the river along the Gammanga-funchi pool. The tale is told that these stone images come and go invisibly, the number never being twice the same. For a number of years, with orders to spare no expense, the pick of Japanese artists and artisans, gathered from all parts of the country, labored to create at Nikko a memorial worthy of the founder of the Tokugawa Shogunate, Iyeyasu, and to surround his tomb with such works of art as would leave it unrivalled. The site of the tomb of the First of the Tokugawa Shoguns, on the slope of the forest-clad mountain, itself is one of the premier beauty spots of a superbly beautiful district. In creating the great memorial, each of the Daimyos of Japan was assessed to the limit of his capacity to pay, thus obtaining a fund estimated as the equivalent of \$12,500,000.

description. In them are magnificent carvings, mural decorations from the brushes of the greatest artists of the day, gifts from the rulers of China and Korea. Unalloyed gold was lavishly used in the profusion of gilding to be seen everywhere about the buildings and the colors were made fast by the use of crushed gems. One of the most noted carvings about the temple is the "Three Monkeys" the "See no evil—Speak no evil—Hear no evil" trio, known throughout the entire world. The beautiful gate known as Yomei-mon is one of the most striking pieces of wood carving in the world. It is estimated by experts that this portion of the temple alone which has a surface about 422 square feet is valued at 2,400,000 yen (nominally \$1,200,000). In this gate one of the pillars has its carving upside down. This was done, it is said, owing to the superstition that the flawless perfection of the whole structure might bring misfortune to the house of Tokugawa.

At the House.

MODEL FARM CRITICIZED—NO REDUCTION IN EDUCATIONAL ESTIMATES.

The Estimates occupied the attention of the House during yesterday's session. The vote for the Department of Agriculture and Mines was passed without any strenuous objections.

MODEL OR STOCK. Some argument took place over the Model Farm and it was discovered, after it had been in existence for three years, that it is really a Stock farm. This as Mr. Moore and Mr. Bennett took pains to point out, does not alter the fact that it is an expensive toy and by no means justifies its existence at the present time.

Mr. Bennett in a brief but forcible speech showed that not the slightest benefit had accrued from the organization of this Stock farm, and if it were immediately wiped out few, if any, would suffer. He quoted statistics to show that our agricultural products were decreasing in many cases. In 1921, we produced 5000 barrels less of potatoes than in 1901, and yet a Canadian expert had told him that we should be one of the greatest producing countries in the world.

AN UNATTRACTIVE SERVICE. He suggested the removal of the vote of \$980 for a court in the Imperial Institute. Mr. Bennett was glad to hear from the Prime Minister that no discrimination had been shown in connection with the salaries of officials of the Agricultural and Mines. It would have been fair to them if this had been done. Mr. Bennett referred to the valuable service rendered by Mr. P. B. Rendell who recently left the Civil Service to enter commercial life, and he regretted that the service could not be made more attractive for men of ability. Mr. Bennett made some observations on existing conditions and thought the Banks should assist in supplying for the fishery. It is announced his belief in co-operative marketing of our fish products.

Mr. Vianleombe spoke briefly, lauding the work of Mr. A. J. Bayly, Secretary of the Department. The Vote passed Committee.

ABOLISHING ILLITERACY. The Educational Vote next came upon the taps. The silent head of that department was most apologetic. He would, of course, be delighted to see the Estimates reduced but his own department oh, impossible—the most valuable office in the Government must be left untouched. The vote of over \$400,000 must stand. The ordinary labourer was better paid than the teacher, said Dr. Barnes. Although statistics showed that in 1911 the standard of illiteracy was 17 per cent, he thought it should be 33 per cent. He concluded with a few plaintive references to the country's apathy to his efforts on behalf of Education.

VALUABLE SUGGESTIONS. Mr. MacDonnell made some valuable suggestions which the Minister would do well to consider. The suggestions were:—
1. Wipe out the department altogether.
2. Let Dr. Barnes go as principal of the Normal School.
3. Do away with inspection. The schools were never inspected and this would mean a big saving.
4. Enforce compulsory education. Otherwise results would never be obtained.

In concluding, Mr. MacDonnell said the department was a fancy and a sad, and as such, he would not vote for it. **EDUCATION AND BOLSHIEVISM.** Mr. Fox had a few trite remarks to add to the discomfit of Hon. Dr. Barnes. The increase of over \$250,000 in the Educational Grant in 3 years, was unwarranted. The Minister had said that Education offset Bolshevism. What was responsible for Bolshevism if not the Government, which had made a happy and prosperous people into a poor and depressed one. Hon. Mr. Brownrigg said conditions

were no worse here than elsewhere, but when challenged to confirm his statement, the Minister fell down badly.

Mr. Fox with biting sarcasm, decried Mr. Brownrigg's argument. Reduction in taxation was needed to move the wheels of trade. He asked that the vote should stand over. The Committee rose and reported. The amendment to the Municipal Act with reference to the Parade Ground was deferred when it came up for second reading. The House meets at 3 p.m. to-day.

A Vote of Censure.

We grant the courtesy of our columns to-day to the Local Council of the Fishermen's Protective Union at Port Union, in the publication of a series of Resolutions, passed unanimously at a recent meeting held in that place. As will be seen by perusal, these Resolutions severely censure the Board of Trade, and as can only be expected, back up the Government. Whether they have been inspired or not is another matter, but it is obvious from their tenor that there is a strong desire to have the Government again become guarantors of fishery supplies for the coming season. The loss made on last year's transaction does not appear to have made any impression whatever on the gentlemen who, according to the covering letter, voted unanimously for the resolutions. Neither does the fact that a very large sum on account of supplies against which the guarantee was given yet remains to be returned to the Treasury from the place where the men responsible for the resolutions reside. Is it the determination of the North to insist upon the public monies being again spent in their sole interest? The Port Union resolutions would permit of drawing that inference.

Again these resolutions in one section actually commend the Government for its refusal to revert to the tariff of 1914, yet admits in the very next sentence that a revision "to the extent of further lightening the duties on the common necessities of life" is urgently necessary. Further along there is an expression that the Government make the personnel of the Tariff Revision Committee more representative (a suggestion with which we are in complete accord) and in the same paragraph a prayer that the Government will "consider the advisability of making some reduction in duties on Gasolene, Kero Oil, Sugar and Molasses for this year." When it is considered that all the efforts of those who favor tariff revision have been in the direction of reduction in the rates on the necessities of life only, in order that the fishermen may be enabled to prosecute their avocation, a set of Resolutions of the nature of those commented upon, attacking the merchants, comes with very poor grace indeed. If this is the beginning of the resurrection of that ancient cry "Down with the Merchants" then it is high time to choke it off at the source. Hysterical ravings of that nature are of no value to-day. To prosper all must pull together, merchants and fishermen, employer and employee. The Government must be shown in what way they can do that which is asked of them for the betterment of conditions all round, and if a reasonable decrease in present duties can be made, it should be insisted upon. Construction not obstruction is

the need of the hour, co-operation and mutual assistance are more than ever necessary, but resolutions of the nature of those under review, will not have the effect of bringing about such a happy result.

Great Flying Feat.

TO LABRADOR AND BACK IN NINE HOURS—MRCOTTON MAKES ANOTHER RECORD.

From Botwood to Labrador and back in nine hours, after delivering mails at three places, is the new record which Mr. Sydney Cotton has set up. This wonderful flying feat was performed yesterday and the return to Botwood brought Winter flying to an end here for this year. This is probably the greatest achievement which Mr. Cotton has to his credit. Despite the many difficult flights he has made since his arrival here last fall, leaving Botwood at 10.15 a.m. yesterday, Mr. Cotton made his first landing at St. Anthony, where mails were delivered and others taken. He then proceeded to Labrador, but being unable to land at Battle Harbour, where the ice was broken, he came down at Hoop Hole Cove. Return mails were taken from Labrador to Botwood for transit to St. John's. The time table of the flight was: Botwood, depart 10.15; St. Anthony, arrive 12.30; St. Anthony, depart 1.10; Over Battle Harbour 2.30; Landed at Hoop Hole Cove 2.50; Hoop Hole Cove, depart 3.25; St. Anthony, arrive 4.10; St. Anthony, depart 4.25; Botwood, arrive 7.05. Mr. Cotton will come to town on the express. He may do some flying during the summer with floats. Mr. V. S. Bennett and Mr. A. S. Butler are now in the city. The latter leaves by the Rosalind en route to England. Mr. Martynside is the only machine which can be used as the Westland cannot be repaired until certain necessary parts are received from England. Mr. Cotton has good reason to feel satisfied with the experiments which he conducted this winter. While from a financial point of view his flights may not have been a success, he has demonstrated the value of an aerial mail service in this country, and he has accomplished achievements hitherto unequalled in aviation circles. Moreover, he has served to advertise Newfoundland as a result of his great feat. Next year, it is to be hoped that the value of Mr. Cotton's services will be more readily recognized, and that full advantage will be taken of them.

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An Open Letter on Railway Matters.

To R. C. Morgan, Esq., C.E., of Winnipeg, in the Dominion of Canada, and of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, City.

Dear Sir,—Let us come to facts in respect to the Branch-Line Railway policy. Who is primarily responsible for that policy? That is an all important matter. If, as you appear to postulate,—the policy was forced upon the Reid Newfoundland Company—then, your recommendation, that whereas "the Branch lines were built without any hope of remunerative traffic," and whereas "the Branch lines were constructed without warrant, through failure to properly forecast their earning possibilities, unless maintained as public charges, they should be closed down," is intelligible if not convincing. I beg to remind you, however, that your first postulate,—in respect to the operating of the Main Line Railway, was that the Contractor did not "foresee, appreciate, or understand, at the time the Contract was entered into," what he was doing. To follow what you have advanced, in both instances, to its logical conclusion, both the Main line and the Branch lines, "unless maintained as public charges," should be closed down. Do you really mean that? After a very close study of your Report, I am convinced that that is precisely what you do mean. It might be accepted as very sound and excellent advice, if the people of this Country had not to realize what you have failed to realize, namely, that the Reid Newfoundland Company have been paid by the Government a very large subvention in advance, as I have endeavoured to make perfectly clear to you. For each mile of the Branch Lines of Railway constructed under the Contract of 1909, the Contractors received in fee simple four thousand acres of land, and a subsidy of sixty-nine dollars and fifty cents per annum for every mile of Branch Railway constructed. But to return to the query, who is primarily responsible for the Branch Line Railway policy? The fact is to be searched for in history, from 1898 to date. I have proved, by quoting from historical records, that between the years 1898 and 1900 there was created and established in this Country a Political Machine. That Machine has never ceased to operate, but, it becomes particularly active before a General Election in this Country, usually twelve months before. It was hoped, that after the passing by the Legislature of the 1901 Railway Contract, and the remarkably generous and conciliatory speech of the introducer of that measure, an extract from which I have quoted for your information, that the operations of the Machine would cease; but, you shall have proof abundant that it did not. In the year 1903, the year before a General Election, the Reid Newfoundland Company proposed to the Government of the day, in a letter dated April 28th, the construction of a number of Branch Line Railways. The proposal was accompanied and garnished with several attractions,—the establishment of a paper mill at Grand Lake, Cold Storage on the West Coast, and the exploration of Coal areas. These trimmings to the Branch Railway proposal were, however, only to be entertained if the Government guaranteed Bonds to the extent of Three Million Dollars at four per cent. The Government refused to entertain the proposal. Here is a copy of the refusal. "THE GOVERNMENT'S REPLY. 7th May, 1903. "Dear Sir,—Referring to the proposition submitted by you under date of the 28th-ult., I have the honor to intimate that the Government have taken the same into careful consideration, and have been obliged to arrive at the conclusion that they would not be warranted in placing upon the Colony the very heavy liability involved therein. I have the honor to be, sir, Your obedient servant, (Signed) R. BOND, Colonial Secretary. "W. D. Reid, Esq., Vice-President of the Reid Newfoundland Company." The refusal by the Reid Newfoundland Company is of much importance, in view of present conditions. Here is a quotation from it:—"I must submit that the question is not whether there is a heavy liability involved in the acceptance of our proposal, but taking into consideration the express purpose for which the Railway was built, the development of the Colony's resources, whether the Colony is not involving itself into a much heavier responsibility in rejecting it."

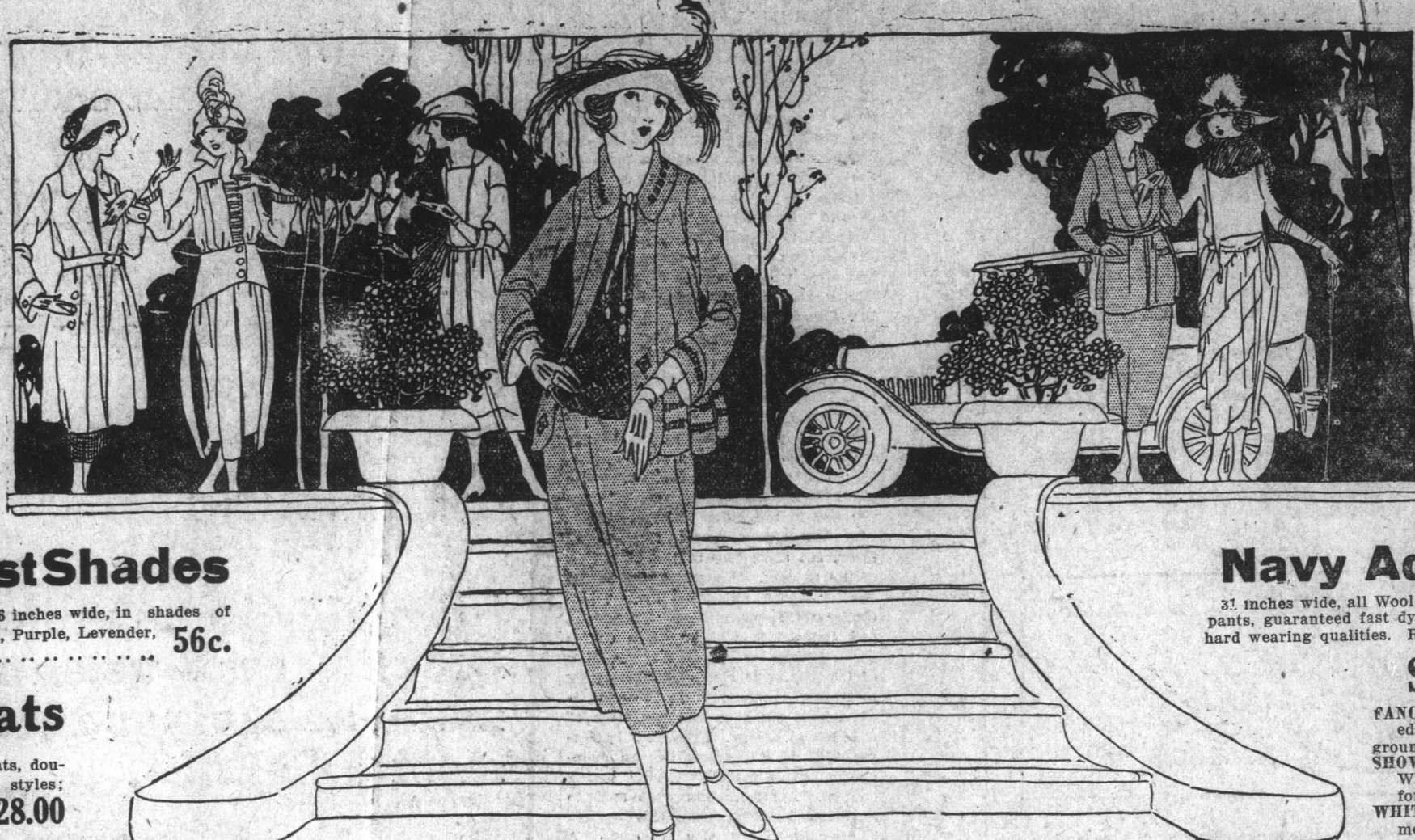

**Trade Union's
Outburst Quelled.**

In 1834 it was agreed by the Trade Unions at large that a grand assemblage of all the trades should take place in Copenhagen Fields on April 21, to procure the recall of the Dorsetshire labourers, who had been indicted at Dorchester Spring Assizes, under an obsolete statute, for belonging to an agricultural union, and sentenced to seven years' transportation.

It was among these Trade Unionists a little band of ferocious conspirators—the "Glorious band," as they called themselves—who carried out, and determined to seize the minister at the Home Office at the moment of reception, let in others, like the other officers, take the King and Queen prisoners, secure the Bank of England and the Tower. Lord Melbourne received warning of this and the Duke of Wellington made preparations. On the Sunday night twenty-five pieces of artillery were brought and placed on the roof of the Govern-

ment offices to command the streets, while large bodies of troops were brought in, and placed ready for action. By Monday morning all the public offices were strongly guarded, the police stations filled with armed men, and five thousand householders sworn in as special constables. The Under Secretary—Mr. Phillips—received the despatch, and informed them that Lord Melbourne could not receive a deputation accompanied by a procession of thirty thousand men. So the petition was placed on a car

all blue and crimson, and carried away, to be presented again in a quiet and orderly way, by a small deputation. The procession then repaired to Kensington Common, and soon after broke up; and so ended the day of the Trades. No soldiers were seen in the streets, and scarcely a policeman; when London slept that night, the artillery and soldiers were conveyed away; and the next day the great city was as if nothing had happened. Public opinion bore so strongly upon the Dorsetshire Labourers' case that a free pardon was sent out to them, and they returned from Van Dieman's Land in 1837, to be escorted through the streets of London by another procession of the Trades.

Nfld. Poultry Association

MARCH EGG LAYING CONTEST.
At the regular monthly meeting of the Poultry Association held in the Board of Trade Room on Monday, Mr. R. J. Kroner was admitted to membership. This gentleman is going into the poultry business commercially, having recently purchased a farm on the Torbay Road owned by Mr. Courtney. He is now arranging to erect a model plant. Mr. Kroner will raise White Wyandottes. President G. R. Williams welcomed the new member after which Secretary W. D. McCarter read the following report on the Association's Egg laying competition for the month of March:— (1) White Wyandottes, 23%; (2) Rhode Island Red, 22; (3) White Wyandotte's, 17%; (4) White Leghorns (2 pens equal), 13%; (5) White Leghorns, (2 pens equal), 12%; (6) White Wyandottes, 9%; (7) Anconas, 8%; (8) White Leghorns, 6. The above is the average number of eggs per hen in the different pens. These pens contain different number of birds, fed according to the discretion of the owners. The plans of a model poultry house, submitted by Mr. McCarter were unanimously accepted, and the public will be given copies for a nominal sum. Mr. James Pike of Crabbes, was elected an Honorary Member of the Association in recognition of his work on the west side of the Island. Hon. President LeMessieur, C. M. G., presented the Association with a prize for the egg laying contest. Arrangements were made to advertise hatching eggs this Spring. These will be sold at a low cost. A very interesting debate was held before the meeting adjourned.

An Imperial Shrine.

MAGNIFICENT MEMORIAL TO BE LOVED EMPEROR.

TOKIO, (Associated Press)—A visit to Japan's magnificent memorial building and park, dedicated to her beloved Emperor Meiji, is included on the program to be followed by the Prince of Wales during the week he will spend in Tokio, as the guest of Prince Regent Hirohito and the Imperial Government. Although Emperor Meiji died just a decade ago, his mausoleum and the beautiful four-mile park surrounding it has taken a place in the hearts of the Japanese that is not rivalled by the reverence America holds for her Arlington Cemetery or England for her Westminster Abbey. This may be traced to the fact that the Meiji Shrine, unlike the national memorials of most other countries, is a product of the present generation. The millions of yen to construct it were raised by popular subscription and the tremendous amount of labor entailed was given by the young men of the nation.

JAPANESE MECCA.

The buildings are of pure Shinto architecture. The massive pillars and cross beams of the Torii, at the entrance to the shrine, were cut in the Arisan mountains of Formosa and brought to Tokio. Scores of giant trees, gnarled and twisted by centuries, were taken bodily, with tons of their native earth, from the high-road between Kamakura and Kyoto and transplanted in Meiji park. Volunteer workers and freely given funds accomplished this almost Herculean task. Although the park was first opened to the public less than a year ago, millions of pilgrims from all parts of the empire have come here to pay their tribute of homage and respect.

A Spiritualist Converted.

Dr. A. D. Watson, a former president of the Toronto Society for Psychological Research, author of "The Twentieth Plane" and "Life Through Death," has changed his views on spiritualism. Some time ago, it was announced that he had severed relations with Louis Benjamin, the medium known by the "Twentieth Plane." Now Dr. Watson expresses the opinion that messages from mediums are usually unreliable or "faked," and that engaging in spiritism is positively dangerous to health. He will write another book giving expression to his revised opinions.

If it were possible for one person with a strong vitality to infuse into another person who lacked strength some of her life blood and vitality every little while, and customary to do this, how strong people would be if they would permit it. And they wouldn't. And yet it seems to me that a very similar process goes on between the person with a strong personality and a sympathetic disposition and the people about them. For instance, a nurse with too sympathetic a disposition will wear herself out quickly. Her patients will feel her tendency to sympathy and will make undue demands upon it.

Sympathy Greediness.

For that is the effect that the person with the sympathetic disposition always seems to have; she brings out the sympathy craving tendency of people about her. Practically all of us are sympathy greedy and the minute we find anyone who will give sympathy we bring out all our troubles and put our worst foot forward in order to extract all the sympathy we can get.

Just as people who are generous about money draw about them a circle of financial sycophants so those who are generous with sympathy have a circle of sympathy sycophants.

And yet to advise anyone to control the tendency to be generous with sympathy seems a terrible thing because sympathy is so beautiful and so rare that it seems sad there should be any less of it.

Sympathy at the Right Time.

One day when I had made a bid for sympathy, of which I was very much ashamed afterwards, I was discussing the subject with a woman who has had a tremendously hard time and out of it has developed a fine character. I said it seemed to me that much as we craved sympathy we got along better without it, perhaps it weakened us and we developed more strength within ourselves if we did not get it.

Can It Be True?

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir.—In glancing over the report of proceedings in the House of Assembly yesterday, as given in the Daily News this morning, I was amazed to find Messrs. Higgins, Bennett, Vinnicombe and Fox advocating that the Parade Ground be reserved for sports instead of inter-denominational education. I say "amazed," because I had hoped that these gentlemen could be depended upon to work for the best interests of their city, especially in matters of this kind. And surely none of them will claim that sports are of greater value to St. John's and Newfoundland than education. St. John's is not by any means lacking in pleasure resorts; but, so far as I know, not one foot of land has been reserved for interdenominational education. And to have our representatives in the House of Assembly place sports before education in this twentieth century is scarcely creditable to them or to the city they represent. That they represent the intelligent people of St. John's in this respect I refuse to believe. The intelligent people of St. John's recognize that our greatest need to-day as a people is more educational facilities. Here then is an opportunity to show just where the city stands respecting it. In my opinion, Mr. Editor, what is left of the Parade Ground should be sacredly reserved

for interdenominational education. Our young people in Newfoundland need the benefits of science; they need technical education; they should be instructed into the most effective methods of pursuing their vocations in Newfoundland instead of being educated away from those vocations and driven to other lands; and our legislators should plan accordingly. May I venture then, to plead with these gentlemen to reconsider their action and give their personal influence to the future progress of this community.

VILLAGE CRONIES ENTERTAINED BY PREMIER.

CRIGGIETH, Wales (Associated Press)—Premier Lloyd George, is never so happy as when swapping stories about his boyhood days with old cronies of his native Wales. During his last visit here he gave a tea party to 19 ancients who were his father's pupils at Treedyrall school more than 60 years ago. The senior "old boy" was John Jones, 91, who still works as a carpenter. Next to Jones was William Davies, an assistant teacher under the Premier's father, who testified to the latter's headiness with the cane on occasions. Another guest was John Williams, now blind, who used to carry love messages between the Premier's father and mother. The "old boys" told their host many stories of his father he had never heard before, and all were in the best of spirits. Old John Jones made the premier roar with laughter by the quaint way he told a story of the local indignation many years ago, when a minister preached from a text which another minister had used the previous Sunday. Mr. Lloyd George always tries "to take things easy while here, but members of his cabinet and newspaper men seldom let a day go by without appropriating part of his time. Getting up late in the morning, working in the garden, and listening to Welsh music are his chief pleasures during his visits, and when the weather is threatening he sits on his covered balcony wrapped in a gaudy shawl. "They say," he remarked on his last visit, "that I must go back to school in a few days. They say I am playing truant. Yet they all followed me, including the newspapers. I wish they would leave me alone for at least a fortnight; it would be better for them, and certainly better for me."

Mars Not Very Cordial

PROFESSOR DECLARES NO CANALS ON PLANET

STOCKHOLM (Associated Press)—Planet Mars—and old, dying Mars—is receiving altogether too much attention from earthy scientists these days and nights, while the coming young planet Venus is waiting for a chance to know us

better. This is the conclusion of Professor Sten Arhenius, Nobel Prize winner and one of Europe's foremost scientists and astronomers, who lectured here on the prospect of wheeling from the heavens the secrets of some of our celestial neighbours, and especially Mars, when the planet swings into closest proximity to the earth two years hence. "If scientists and long distance radio fans really want to communicate with some ce-

lestian neighbour, Professor Arhenius said, they will not find Mars very cordial, for the old fellow—dying or already dead—is covered with hard frozen sand and is so dry that its only rain is meteoric dust. Perhaps a few sea weeds still exist, he said, but it is highly improbable that even low animal life could find enough to sustain it. He described as "fantastic" the belief that so-called canals observed on the planet were the work of en-

gineers and attributed them to earthquake fissures.
PATIENCE WILL BE REWARDED.
Venus on the other hand, offers potential possibilities to the patient astronomer, Professor Arhenius declared. By "patient" he meant about a billion years, he explained. At the expiration of this period, he thought a flourishing colony of intelligent beings might be discovered on the bright

little planet. "Everything on Venus is dripping wet," he continued. "The planet is covered by constant rainclouds 10 kilometers thick, preventing any rays from the sun penetrating the bottom of the air-strata. Life on the planet of love is short and intense." Living organisms, he thought might be found at the polar regions, where the temperature was slightly lower than other parts of the planet. "When the earth is extinguished," he concluded, "it will be Venus, queen of the heavens, that will take over the role as carrier of culture."

Lunenburg Fleet Arrive.

WITH EXCELLENT CATCHES.

The chief news to-day is the arrival of the first Lunenburg vessels back from the first baiting trip with excellent catches. So far six vessels have come home with from 600 to 1000 quintals apiece, indicating an average catch of about 700 quintals. As there are about 70 vessels fishing, it should mean approximately 49,000 quintals of fish, which would be a record catch for the early trip. Last year there were only 4000 quintals caught, as very few of the vessels went out for the early trip last year; whereas this year, practically the whole fleet went out. There is therefore, every prospect of full supplies of bank cure this spring.

The consuming markets remain steady. There is a continued good demand from Cuba and Porto Rico, so that the markets will likely remain firm. The fishermen's idea of price is around \$8.00, and the exporters' idea around \$7.00 to \$7.50, depending on the total quantity of fish landed. In any case, there is no doubt that the Lunenburg fishery will be vigorously prosecuted, and with good catches, vessels should show good profits. There has been very little change in European conditions. Most of the markets are still well filled up with Newfoundland shipments. It is felt that those stocks will be cleared up by the first of June. This, however, has very little bearing on the Nova Scotia situation, as stocks held in Nova Scotia are very light, so that when new cure comes on the market practically all the old stock will have been cleaned up. It is felt that everything can be handled to advantage.—Maritime Merchant, April 13.

The minister was beginning to feel quite proud of his power of drawing a congregation, and said—
"Do you stay over the night after going to church?"
"No, I just walk back again."
"That is a very long walk."
"Oh, ay, it's a bit gude walk; but ye see I think a deal o' your precentor."

It was the minister here—in a rural parish the old preacher felt out of sorts one Sabbath, and to provide a rest for himself before delivering the sermon, he gave out a long psalm to be sung, not taking into account the precentor's bad cold, which was a chronic complaint. The first four verses were finished not so badly, but at the fifth Tammas stuck, and no amount of tuning could get him started again. At last the minister had to step to his feet, and in no very pleasant mood. Accordingly, leaning over the pulpit, he addressed the precentor thus:—"Tammas, if ye mak' sic a wark about skirlin' out four verses o' a psalm noo, hoo do ye expect ye're to manage to sing through a' the ages o' eternity?"

The story of "The Foxes' Trails," so admirably elaborated to the dimensions of a public "reading" by Dr. Moxey of Edinburgh, I was accustomed to hear, more than twenty years ago, as having transpired between a country minister and his precentor, Sandy Johnston; and in this way. In the course of a two-handed crack one day, the minister had ventured on some friendly criticism of Sandy's singing, whereupon Sandy retaliated by remarking that he thought the singing would compare favourably with the preaching any day.

"Don't let us quarrel, Sandy," said the minister; "we may each benefit by the other's criticism. Now, tell me candidly, what the chief faults of my preaching are?"

"Ou, I'm no sayin' I ha'e ony faults till't, but just this, that I've noticed ye-weel-that is to say-ye exaggerate a wee."

"Well, Sandy, if I exaggerate the truth in the pulpit, I am certainly not aware of it."

"Ye, do't a' the same, though," insisted the precentor.

"Sandy, I respect your opinion," said the minister, "but I am satisfied that I am innocent of the charge you have preferred against me, that I now call upon you, if ever on any future occasion you shall hear me exaggerate in the pulpit, you will pull me up there and then, just by emitting a low, thin whistle."

Sandy agreed to this arrangement. Several Sabbaths passed, and nothing out-of-joint was said or heard. The precentor, however, still kept his "lug on the cock," and at length his patience was rewarded. Lecturing one day on that chapter of the Scripture which describes Samson as catching three hundred foxes, tying them tail to tail, casting firebrands in their midst, starting them among the standing corn of the Philistines, and burning it down.

"My friends," said he, "you will be wondering in your minds how I could tie so many foxes tail to tail, for the best man in Scotland couldn't tie two of our foxes' tails together. Samson, however, was the strongest man the world has ever seen, and these Eastern foxes, travellers tell us, had very long tails—tails indeed, forty and fifty feet long. (Precentor emits a low thin whistle.) I should have said, continued the preacher, "that,—that—in the account given by the earliest travellers to the East, and that recent investigation has proved his inaccuracy, and that these foxes' tails, could not have exceeded about twenty feet in length. (Sandy whistles again) Twenty feet did I say," continues the minister, "yes! But the matter has very recently been commanding attention in scientific circles, and it is doubted whether foxes' tails, in any part of the world, ever at any time exceeded ten or twelve feet in—Sandy Whistles) At this crisis, the minister strikes his book with his clenched fist, and leans over the pulpit and exclaims, "I'll tell you what it is, Sandy Johnston, I'll no tak' anither inch aff these foxes' tails tho' ye sit and whistle till the day o' judgment!"

"Yes! As already stated here, the Scotch precentor is a decaying institution; yet luckily for his peace of mind there are still a respectable number in the land who think with the old lady who remarked, "Organa, nae doot, mak' unco grand music; but, eh! it's an awfu'-like way o' spendin' the Sabbath!"



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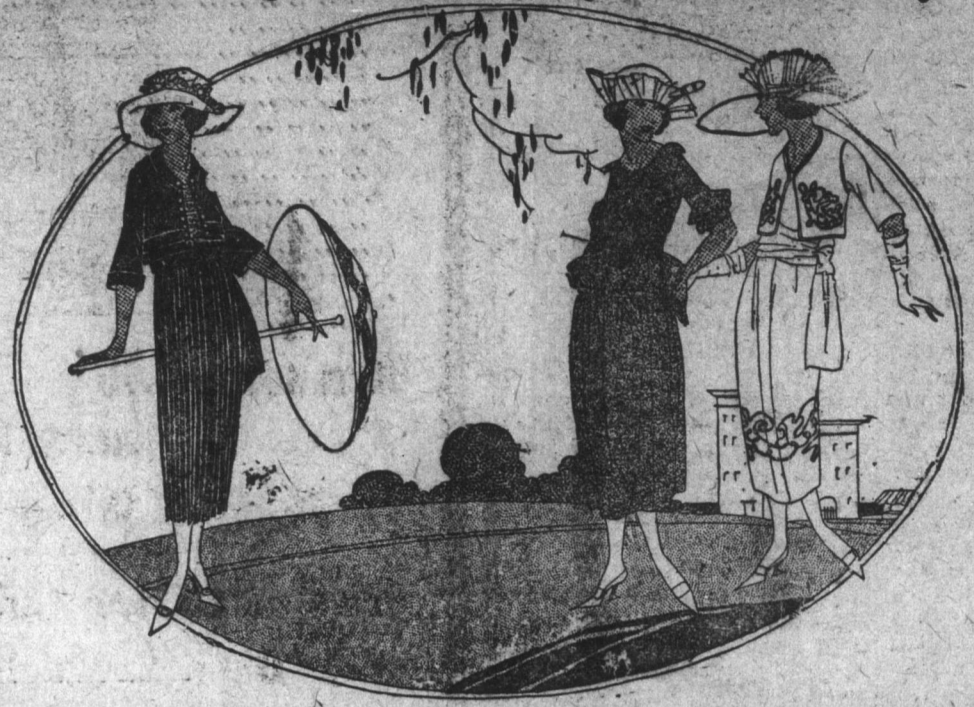

Not a Model Farm

At yesterday's session of the Assembly the Government Model Farm came in for some severe criticism. It was charged that the cattle had made such a mess of a quantity of stored hay that it had to be shovelled out as manure. The question was asked why was this waste allowed and why was it that hundreds of dollars were spent in buying imported feeds when the government policy in establishing the model farm was the encouragement of agriculture. The Prime Minister in reply stated that the place had been misnamed as it was purely a "stock farm" or a winter quarters for the government cattle. According to the plan adopted the male cattle would be sent to the different districts during the summer and in the fall they would be shipped back to headquarters. Out of the 47 head of cattle now at the stables 18 breeding animals would be disturbed in this way during the coming summer he said. Another fact brought out by the discussion was that nearly 2 million dollars worth of agricultural produce are imported every year.

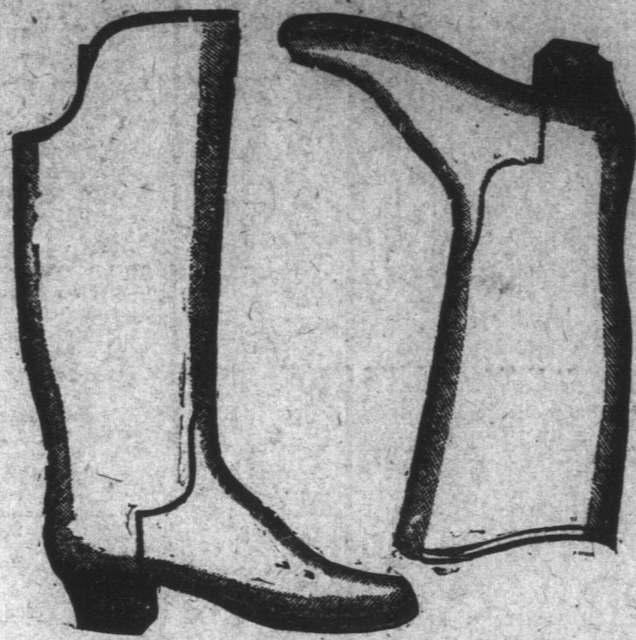
