**Brilliant European Swindler**

**HEADED AS HABITUAL CRIMINAL**

BERLIN, April 11.—Stephen Otto, near Brussels, who posed as a soldier in the Belgian army in 1919 and decorated Major General Henry Ullrich, commander of the American army at Coblenz, with the Belgian army medal of honour, and who has been arrested as a swindler in all a dozen European cities, has been classified by Berlin detectives as a "habitual criminal." Despite this, Otto is not in any prison because no specific crime has been filed against him. He has a high priced car on the pretence that he was a member of the Reichswehr Commission of Control in Germany.

He has associated with high officials in Paris, Vienna, Constantinople and other cities, and the story is even told that on one occasion he actually spent a night in Buckingham Palace.

**Fish Plan Post Office**

**FROM PRODUCER TO CONSUMER.**

St. John's.—(A.P.)—The Free State Government has decided to introduce an early date legislation on the matter of living. There is universal consent of profiting by retail dealers, and it is admitted that farmers and fishermen get only a trifling percentage of the price at which produce is sold to consumers. It is argued that, nevertheless, the farmers are not found to be making profits, and the explanation is that the reason is the multiplication of small traders in Irish cities where there are hardly any big grocers for miles.

It is suggested that the Government may consider as part of its programme the possibility of establishing contact between producer and consumer through the post office, and the farmers to sell goods direct to consumers by parcel post on the cash delivery system.

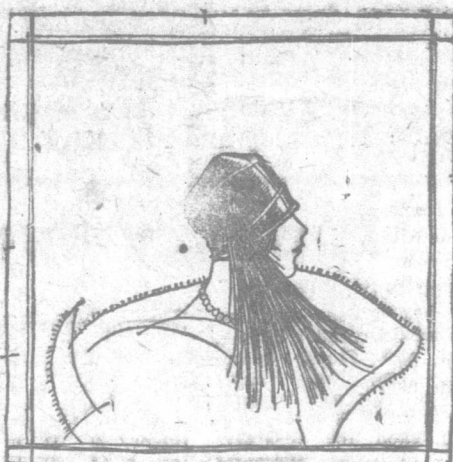

## The Sin of Buying Ice Cream

Mr. Bumble on one historic occasion remarked that "the law is a ass," and the fact that selling ice cream and mineral waters to the public between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and midnight is forbidden suggests that Mr. Bumble's drastic judgment was not undeserved. A gallant effort is now being made to remove this ridiculous prohibition by a private Bill which has been introduced under the ten minutes rule in the House of Commons. It is an astonishing fact that this little innocent, harmless measure was at once opposed by a Socialist, Mr. Hoffman.

Not only is the public forbidden by puerile and vexatious regulations to buy ice cream and mineral waters between 9.30 p.m. and midnight, it is also forbidden to buy chocolate, cigarettes, and matches. The object of such legislation can only be to make people uncomfortable and unhappy. There is nothing morally wrong in buying ice cream at 10 p.m.; and certainly there is nothing wicked in purchasing chocolate at that hour. But the sale is forbidden, and let it not be supposed that the penalties are light when this grotesque legislation is infringed. An unfortunate shopkeeper at Cymmer, South Wales, in September 1922 was fined £20 for selling a penny box of matches after 9 on a Saturday night to oblige a customer. His assistant was fined 20s. for aiding and abetting him in this heinous offence.

## Bank Messenger Held up in Montreal

The sensational hold-up in Montreal on April 1st, when a chauffeur and three messengers of the Banque d'Hochelega were robbed of \$142,288, the driver of the bank automobile killed, one of the bandits shot to death, and a bank messenger wounded, has added another to the many such crimes reported in Montreal recently. The banks are fully covered by insurance on such occasions, but they are undoubtedly to be censured for the loose manner in which currency is placed in automobiles, as if it were of being placed in a steel compartment in the body of the car. The times are not normal, and while extra precautions are necessary, the police force of Montreal which is already undermanned by about 100 per cent. should not be expected to assume the entire responsibility of protecting each bank's property. No matter how leniently the matter may be viewed, successful hold-ups should become less to impossible, or otherwise they are a reflection on each bank involved.—The Chronicle, Montreal.

## Game Fish From America

TO STOCK ENGLISH WATERS.

LONDON, March 26 (A.P.)—Thousands of American game fish will be imported into England to fill the depleted streams and add to the limited variety which now make up the angler's bag. The plans of several angling clubs are carried out. The fact that their membership has gradually fallen off and there has been little interest in angling caused many of the clubs to look about for the reason for this very un-English interest in the home of angling.

The clubs soon found out that there wasn't a game fish within 50 miles of London, and even where the fish are fairly plentiful they are confined to roach, dace and perch. There are plenty of fishing streams throughout England and Scotland which could be filled with game fish and the clubs owning them are preparing to refill them with fish from the United States.

Most English fishermen are well acquainted with the various kinds of American fish and they are anxious to import some of the better known species which it is known will settle in English streams. Some of the clubs, paying attention also to the eating qualities, therefore have decided to import black bass, silver bass, strawberry bass, crappies, pike and pickerel, and certain species of trout.

The fish will be purchased from American breeding associations and brought to England in specially built tanks.

## Unfit to Plead DELUSIONS OF A CANCER CURE?—MINER'S ACCOUNT OF A DIVINE VISITATION.

There was a pathetic ending to the case in which a former miner, who claimed he had found a cure for cancer, was charged at Leeds Assizes with inflicting bodily harm on a number of persons and obtaining money by false pretences. The man in question, David Williams, 59, was found insane and unfit to plead, and was ordered to be detained during His Majesty's pleasure.—Sir H. S. Cautley, prosecuting, explained that prisoner, without any medical qualification, took money from patients for his alleged cancer cure, and supplied them with ointment and liniments which were used for curing horses, causing the patients intense pain and suffering.—Dr. Worsley, of Armeley Prison, told the Court that Williams asserted that he could cure cancer, in spite of all the medical evidence to the contrary, and would undertake to cure 99 cases out of 100. He also stated that he had been offered £100,000 for his cure, but had refused it, and he thought that the Government would give him more. He claimed that he was a descendant, in a direct line, from George III., and that he was a prince and owned two-thirds of Wales, and was entitled to millions of money, which the Government would not let him have. Letters were handed to the judge who read extracts:—

God visited me in this cell on Sunday night and He called me twice, saying, "David, I put my head under the clothes, and I heard a second call. When I spoke I said, "Here I am, Lord."

He replied, "Why didst not thou speak at first? Be at rest. Have no fear. I am with you. You have no earthly friend. I will be with you on the day of your trial and place. My words on the end of your tongue."

"I have chosen you to be My servant, now and for evermore." The doctor added that as a result of four months' observation he gathered Williams was suffering from delusions and was insane.

### Some Notable Springs And How They Received Their Names.

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

It is well known to those in my time of life that the Irish people who came to reside in this country always calculated their ages and notable events from so many years before or after the great rebellion of 1798, so it has been with our people in Newfoundland, who calculated and settled important disputes, as to dates, by referring to them as having occurred so many years previous or subsequent to one of our historic Springs. For instance, we have had many of these Springs, handed down from generation to generation, and they were quite familiar to the whole of us until the past quarter of a century. Now very few remember the circumstances. I shall name the most important Springs, such as the Spring of the Sheets (when the ice was in large sheets)—the Frosty Spring (1857 when hundreds of men were frost-bitten)—the Spring of the Cats (when very small seals were brought in)—the Spring of the Growlers (huge lumps of ice floating about)—the Spring of the Cobblers (when several vessels were lost in that locality)—the Spring of the Wadhams—the Green Bay Spring—the Spring of the Flowers—the White Bay Spring (the seals went up in the Bay), and several others. The three or four of the first named Springs were in the forties and fifties of the past century, in the days of the great seal-killing, whose names occupy a prominent place in the history of our great industry, as well as of our country; such as Captains Ned

interest in the seal-fishery. Vessels were owned or partly owned, and fitted out by coopers, tailors, carpenters, etc. Amongst them in St. John's I may mention Patrick Jordan (tailor and clothier), John Brail, (Cooper); who gave the famous Capt. Terry Halloran the first vessel he ever took charge of to the seal-fishery; Blake (Tinmith), who had his residence and-shop where the Bank of Montreal now stands. Father Rawlin's grandfather, a ships carpenter, had a vessel out several Springs, but I do not know her name, and to cut it short, the Hon. Lawrence O'Brien, one of the most enterprising merchants in the country was a cooper by trade. I could give others, but the above is sufficient to prove that our great industry—the seal-fishery—sprang from the people themselves, and they were interested in it, and carried it on either directly or indirectly. Even the disciples of Esculapius were represented, for it is a fact that Dr. William Sterling—a well known and very skillful medic of the first half of the past century, sent out his splendid little brigantine Suir to the ice-floes, and a fortunate little vessel she was. I think she was lost the Spring of the Wadhams, or it may be a little later. She was then commanded by Capt. John Ryan, who purchased her from the old physician.

It is really wonderful how quickly men, in the ordinary course of life, spring into wealth and prominence, during the days of our great sealing fleet. I shall confine myself to one in this issue. There was Capt. Richard Hennebury of Bay Roberts, who lived in St. John's during his early days. He started a poor boy, went to the seal-fishery as boy and man, and when about 25 years of age he was appointed commander of the topsail schooner Thrasher out of McBride's employ, where the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. now have their office, and the first year he loaded the ship to the hatches. After comparatively few years, he was in charge of his own splendid brig Estelle, and after she was lost he purchased the large brig Anastatia. He was wonderfully successful, and carried on business at Barenec for several years. He subsequently purchased a large mercantile premises in Bay Roberts, extended his business, conducted one of the largest fishing stations on the coast of Labrador at Indian Tickle, and at the time of his death he was owner of the Anastatia, Brighton, Fond Mother, Alice H. and several other vessels. Of course there are scores of others who forged ahead in the same manner by their energy, industry and natural ability, but the above was a most remarkable man. He had no learning, but there could get the upper hand of him, in business matters, in the value of a cent. He cared for none of them, and if they, in any way, endeavored to overcharge him for any material, he would quickly point out where they were wrong, and would have nothing more to do with that firm. The well known Labrador pilot, Mr. Richard Hennebury, of this city is a grandson of the old Viking, successful business man and enterprising planter.

Some years ago I came across a few old records in connection with the seal-fishery which should be of interest, and they give the total number of seals brought in from 1804 to 1915 a period of 111 years, at thirty-four

millions three hundred and forty-nine thousand, five hundred and ninety-eight. The records state that this amount does not include the seals captured by landmen. I am sorry I cannot get at the value of this enormous number of seals, but the value of the seals for 1830 was \$946,680; for 1831, \$1,269,600; for 1839, \$157,740; from 1885 to 1892 (eight years) \$4,397,100; from 1900 to 1915, \$7,179,281.95.

The following is the catch of seals for St. John's for 36 years:—

The skins and oil for the year 1830 were valued at \$786,400 and for 1831 at \$1,068,000.

The year 1835 was noted for the loss of the schooner Union, Capt. John Delaney, with a picked crew of 28 men from Trinity. She was built by old Charles Newhook, of New Harbor, Trinity Bay for John B. Garland, merchant. The vessel capsized while under full sail. The schooner Active and Avon took some of her seals and towed her for two days. The total catch for that Spring was 651,370 seals. I have no doubt your most interesting correspondent, Rev. Canon Lockyer, can tell us all about the Union, in fact there are few affairs of interest that he has not referred to, and I trust he will be spared many years to tell us a great deal more.

I have done my best to preserve and hand down the glories of the past in connection with our great industry, from the days of the gallopers to 1836, showing the evolution, and giving details of this source of wealth and employment. I have endeavored to describe the daring and heroism, the success and failure of our old Vikings, as well as, at different periods, give sketches of their lives and labors, and I think, that under the greatest difficulties, I have succeeded in handing down to posterity a fairly good account of the great sealing fleet, as well as those who commanded and took part the argosies in search of the Golden Fleece; but the thought now presents itself—how will it be prosecuted in the future? It is only natural to suppose that our wooden fleet of steamers of to-day will not last many more years. Will they be replaced? Will the same interest be manifested by our merchants and men? Are we going to permit our great industry to fall into the hands of strangers, or will our feet be increased as a consequence? We have all modern improvements—large ships propelled by steam, telegraph offices, lighthouses, wireless telegraphy to keep in daily touch with the fleet, but the question presents itself are herds becoming depleted, or have the seals sought other resorts? One thing is certain we do not hear of our feet striking the "main patch" nowadays as we used to in the past, notwithstanding all do the science and modern improvements that have been bought into requisition in the prosecution of our great industry.

## War Veterans Gather in Strength

### Striking Address on Public Matters by the President.

The spacious Star Theatre was filled to its utmost capacity last night by ex-service men who had come from the city and the out-lying districts for the address by the G.W.V.A. Rev. Colonel Nangle, delivered a stirring address on the subject of the ex-service men's position in the country. The speaker was warmly welcomed by the Hon. Mayor Cook, W. J. Higgins, Esq. The Government was unavoidably absent.

Following the opening ceremony and Nangle made the following address, the verbatim report of which was the work of pupils and pupils of St. Patrick's School:

#### ADRES AND GENTLEMEN:

Years ago to-night there laid on the slopes of Monchy Le and Infantry Hill in front of the Verre, Bois du Sart, 330 of our comrades, dead and dying. To this island home of ours there were those who bear on their bodies the scars and scars of their engagement. We naturally ask ourselves why we are here? Why this suffering, why this break among their relatives in Newfoundland? Why did we go? We enlisted for Justice, Right, Freedom, we enlisted as we were for all those who recruited, in the fight for the freedom of the other nationalities. To-day that fight exists just as strong as it existed. Those ideals are just as strong as ever they were, but are we playing the same game? We are not. We are not the same men we offered ourselves to when we enlisted for our homes. We did weeks here in St. John's. We went to the United Kingdom, we went to Scotland or England and we went through months of severe physical training. We went out to Gallipoli, France and we sailed the seas. We went through hardships, mud and slush, and we carried a weight on our backs. We were hungry, cold and for what? We offered our bodies as the bulwark of democracy and freedom but of you who came back did your duty finish when we were here? It is for that purpose that we are here to-night to see if those good principles are still the old spirit is lacking. If we prepared to forget those principles we are forgetting that we are a part of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment.

I also know of cases where men went overseas and when they came back they found others in their positions. They had to begin lower than where they left off and to-day they are working under bosses who before the war worked under them and who when this Conscription Act came in you could not see them for dust. Hundreds of our young men are leaving the country through the lack of opportunities, and have to seek employment in foreign fields. We demand that every ex-service man in this country be given the right to work for his living without having to go abroad to do so. Another thing we are fighting against is sectarianism in the Civil Service. If I am a Catholic and I retire from the Civil Service the next man to be a member of a Church of England although he may have been in that position for 10 or 15 years he is very often passed over for no other reason than his religion and another man placed over his head. This sectarianism was unknown to us in France. All we knew of a man over there was that he was white or otherwise if he was white we treated him white, if he was otherwise we knew how to handle him. As soon as we returned through the Narrows we became smugged with the tax of sectarianism. Let us get back to the old days of France again, and if the 8000 ex-service men of this country stand by that principle we will go a long way in wiping out sectarianism which for generations has kept our people apart.

It was noted in France that a large percentage of our men were illiterate and according to our census returns about 17 per cent. of the population are in the same class. Now this can be remedied only by compulsory education, in fact some of our so-called educationalists, states that we are more educated than the United States but the only remedy for the children of ex-service men so far as we can see is a system of compulsory education.

Another thing the G.W.V.A. stands for is the enforcement, amendment or abolition of the present Prohibition Act. Over across I have seen men of the Newfoundland Regiment get their ration of rum, and it stopped there, but when they got back some of them dragged themselves down, and I know that there are many mothers and fathers here who would rather have seen the bones of their sons rest under the poppies of Picardy than to sink to the level which some of them have. If any of your comrades have fallen by the way in this respect, it is your duty to give them a helping hand out of the gutter, and if they don't respond try somewhat sterner methods.

These gentlemen are some of the aims and ambitions of the G.W.V.A. Now are we to attain them? First join your Association. If this organization is to go ahead, every ex-service man should be a paid up member of the G.W.V.A., the fee is one dollar, and if there are any mem-

bers who have not paid let them come forward and pay up. You may have paid last year or the year before, but why not pay now? We are at present living on charity, but if we have sufficient membership fees, we can become an independent body, and can act for ourselves in any way we may choose.

The next thing to attain our object is loyalty to your Association. If you are not loyal to this we will get nowhere. Loyalty to one another, the same loyalty that you gave to one another in France and on your ships. Loyalty to me as the head of your organization, loyalty to yourselves in maintaining your own self-respect, loyalty to your old regimental spirit and to your old naval spirit. You have to keep that old naval and military discipline and your Association will be harder on wrong-doers in its own ranks than any outsiders. Loyalty to your comrades in arms who fell by your side in fighting for the cause for which we are still fighting to-day.

We must also be industrious, we must give an honest day's work for an honest day's wages. While building our Memorial base on the Beach I fired 14 ex-service men for loafing on the job. We want industry and honesty from our ex-service men.

Many of our ex-service men have brought down the egot name of their comrades by want of sobriety. We have cases of men working on relief and spending their money on liquor while their families come to us looking for relief.

We must have integrity from our ex-service men in whatever walk of life they may be in. We want to attain our objects. Remember you are not for sale; you are not to stoop to some of the methods at use in this country to-day. With these ideals before us, Comrades, we can get anywhere. We have the men, we have the strength, we have the guts, what we lack in brains we will make up for in common sense and sincerity. If these aims and ambitions I have outlined are followed out we will be an honor to Newfoundland, and to our honored dead. We shall be unchanged to meet our honored guest, Comrade Earl Haig, who is coming to visit us in a few weeks. Your Association has approached the Government for free transport for ex-service men to come to St. John's for his visit, and I am now going to ask you to help me by putting up an out-harbour comrade even if it is only a shake down in the front room.

And if you men of St. John's help me in doing this, if you are able to make some kind of an arrangement to put up an ex-service man you are helping me and your Association you are helping some out-harbour man to come for the celebration, you are doing a good turn, not only for the Association but to everybody, in waking up the population of Newfoundland to the fact that there was a Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve and a Royal Newfoundland Regiment.

With these few remarks I am going to close by asking those who have not yet paid this year's subscription to hand it over now, and at the same time I would ask the Executive to collect from the members present the signed slips of billeting accommodation for July week. I ask you again to come along with the goods, to help me to do this and you will not be sorry for it. I have to thank those gentlemen who came to-night and who had to listen to my tirade. They are from all sides of politics, but we have no politics. Newfoundland is our only politics and by that we are prepared again to stand or fall.

It has been rumored that we are forming an ex-service men's party, but we do not at present intend to form any such party, although we have the machinery to put in motion to cleanse our politics from sectarianism and corrupt practices. We have our own work and we are going ahead with that. No matter what side of politics you are on your Association is always neutral and working for the betterment of you and all ex-service men and their dependents in Newfoundland.

Colonel Nangle then requested the Prime Minister, Hon. W. R. Warren, to address the gathering, and in a brief speech he strongly supported the ideals and privileges which had been outlined by the President. In referring to the visit of Earl Haig in July, the Prime Minister stated that free passages would be provided by the Government for all ex-service men, and that special rates would be arranged for those of their relatives who wished to view the celebrations. He stated that Earl Haig had informed him that he was eagerly looking forward to the visit, but had stipulated that he should be allowed to

return home in time at least to spend part of the summer with his children. "We should remember," said the Premier, "that we are having the biggest man the Empire has produced as a guest, and we must make the Newfoundland visit an occasion worthy of the honour."

The second part of the programme was one which vividly recalled to many and brought home to all the tragedy which was enacted in France and Flanders during the years of that unprecedented struggle. The pictures thrown on the screen depicted the battle familiar to many in the smallest detail, how and where they prepared for the fray, the billets they occupied, the villages through which they had passed, the places in which they had found rest and recreation, and the grim spots where they had met the enemy and held fast. The film taken two years after the cessation of hostilities showed the ground, torn by shell and high explosive, now covered with grass and shrubs, but the ruins of many a stately building still stood, grim monuments of the ruthless destruction of the Hun. The immensity of the areas occupied by those who rest awhile was probably as great a revelation to those who were familiar with the country as to those who were not, and the work proceeding in the cemeteries showed that the duties undertaken by Colonel Nangle and his colleagues of the War Graves Commission to make the resting places worthy of heroes, were being well and truly performed.

It was interesting to mark the way the Regiment had gone by the local names which had been given to various places, such as Rawlins' Cross, Seldom-Come-By, Greenpond, Pugh-through, Come-by-Chance, etc., but perhaps of all the historic scenes shown none had a stronger appeal than the Ypres salient, which for so long was grimly held by the troops, and in which the ghastly ruins of the once famous buildings testify to the devastating fire of the enemy to which they were exposed.

Colonel Nangle announced various arrangements which were being made by the G.W.V.A. to meet expenses in connection with Earl Haig's visit, and expressed his thanks for the support which had already been given by the public. The S.L.B. Band, under the management of Capt. Morris, rendered several excellent selections during the evening which were highly appreciated. A vote of thanks to the lecturer and to Messrs. Condon and Jackman for other favours was moved by Comrade

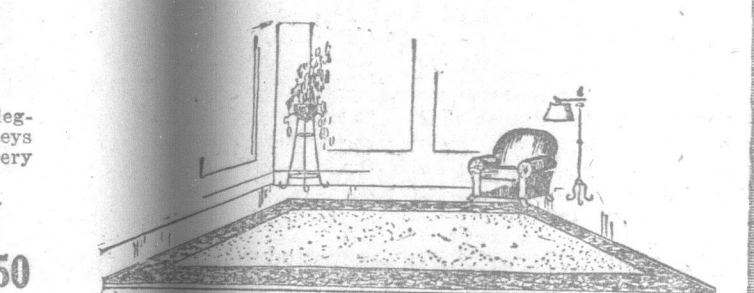

### The Blind Vicar

HOW GREAT HANDICAP IS OVER-COME.

After being curate-in-charge for nine years, the Rev. George Frayer Whittleton has just been nominated first vicar of the new parish of St. Jude's, Thornton Heath, near Croydon. He is one of the most remarkable personalities in the Church of England, for he has been blind from childhood. "The only help I require," he remarked the other day, "is that of a secretary, who will read to me and attend to my correspondence. My wife generally acts as my secretary. When I preach away from my own parish, which is not very often, I get someone to assist me into the pulpit, but I know my own church as well as I know this room." And the blind vicar turned his face round in the direction of the four walls of his study where his sermons are prepared, and in which he uses an ordinary typewriter. In the celebration of Holy Communion he is helped by the side-men. It is the duty of one of them to tell him how many people will be present for Communion, and so he knows how much bread and wine must be consecrated. When Mr. Whittleton first came to Thornton Heath, he told his congregation that he would

Not Be Able To See Them next time he met them, and they must greet him in the street. This plan has worked admirably, and the parishioners have always led their blind vicar know when he is approaching them. Before he came to Thornton Heath, and while he was still at Plumstead, his father made for him a relief map of his new parish. Thus the blind clergyman was able to familiarize himself with the streets, and when he arrived in Thornton Heath he found his way from the station to his rooms unaccompanied. Mr. Whittleton lost his sight when quite a child. He was born in the West In-dia, and at the age of 14 was sent to the Royal Normal College, Nor-wood to become a teacher of the


