His visit is described as follows by his own official paper, of May 11th:—"Directly after the arrival of the Emperor and Empress at Orleans, they proceeded to the cathedral, where they were received by Mgr. At the railway station the Mayor of Orleans made a sy ech to their Majestites, in which, after recalling the past glories of the city, he said that although Orleans was now a place of industry and commerce, loving peace and appreciating its benefits, yet if France, "strong in her right and jealous of her honor," were compelled to draw the sword, the inhabitants of Orleans would be found worthy of their ancestors. In reply the Emperor said: "I accepted your invitation with pleasure, because I am always happy to find myself again in the midst of a city which, whilst religiously maintaining such glorious memories and patriotic sentiments, devotes itself with ardor to the struggles of labor and industry. I was desirous to ascertain for myself your progress, and to encourage it, convinced that amid the general tranquility of Europe, it may be developed with confidence. I thank you for the sentiments you express towards the Empress, my son and myself.

At the entrance of the cathedral the bishop of Orleans addressed their Majesties He made bold to say, he observed, that in all France the Emperor had never visited a city more noble, more Christian, or more French. Twice it had rean the last rampart of the country against foreign invasion. Paris, which he named with respect, had allowed her gates to be forced several times by the foreigner—Orleans never. London, June 1—Sullivan and Pigot, the two Dublin editors who have been imprisoned there for some time, for alleged seditious articles, have been released from confinement on a writ of error.

New York, June 2nd.—The Herald's Abyssinia special to 30th April conveys important but rather melancholy news of the present effects produced by the British expedition on the political and social consequent anarchy, reigned all over the territory at the date of writing. The native chiefs, released from the sway, of Theodorus, many of them set personally free from his dungeons, had organized and raised armies to fight against the new dynasty of Gobayzz, the nom'nee of the British as the successor of the defunct monarch. Gobayzz called out all his force in order to imminian his position. His commanding general, named Mashesba, set out at the head of a strong force in pursuit of a released chief named Alfa, who was in active hostility against the sovereignty of Gobayzz. The opposing forces met, and a furious battle took place between them on the 26th of April. Gobayzz's forces, Mashesba, had many good soldiers of the Walda-Gallas country in its ranks, but as soon as the Walda men beheld their old chief, Alf, they immediately reversed their spears in the very heat of the engagement, rushed to him with joy, turned their weapons against Mashesba was made a prisoner by Alf. Queen Mustevati, supported by 13,000 horsemen of the Gallas country, has possession of the site of Magdala and the ruins evacuated by the British soldiers.
