FAIR IN HILLSBURG.—As will be seen by advertisement a bi-monthly Fair will be hereafter held in the village of Hillsburg on the second Tuesday of March, May, July, September, November and January. FIRE IN HARRISTON.—Markle's Royal Hotel was burned to the ground on Wednesday afternoon. The contents were nearly all saved. The fire started in the kitchen chimney, which is believed to have burst, and the wind was so high that all efforts could not save the building. The insurance is \$2,000, in the Gore Mutual and Provincial. The loss is not known yet.

GETTING ALARMED.—"The local" of the London Free Press is evidently becoming alarmed. SABBATH SCHOOL MEETING.—The anniversary meeting of the children attending the Sabbath School of the First Congregational Presbyterian Church was held on Wednesday night in the Town Hall. There was a large attendance of young people, besides a number of the parents and others interested in the Sabbath School. The ladies of the congregation provided an excellent tea for the young folks, to which they did ample justice. They then adjourned to the Hall, where suitable addresses were given by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Torrance, by the Rev. Messrs. Hogg, Wardrop and Clarke, Mr. Savage, the Superintendent, and Mr. Clowe. At intervals during the evening the young people sang some hymns very nicely under the leadership of Mr. Anderson. The meeting, which was of a very pleasant character, was brought to a close at a seasonable hour.

Attempted Rape Case in Pilkington.

The Prisoner Committed for Trial.

Chief Constable Kelly arrested and brought into town last (Wednesday) night a young man who gave his name as Levi Gillies, on a charge of committing an indecent assault, with intent, on the person of Mrs. Elizabeth Husson, wife of one of the section men on the W. G. & B. Railway, in the Township of Pilkington, about four miles from Elora. Prisoner is a young man, very ragged in his clothes, and has the appearance of being somewhat weak in the intellect. He says he belongs to Tilsburg, and had been working on the railway.

He was brought before the Police Magistrate this (Thursday) morning, when the following witnesses were examined: Elizabeth Husson, being sworn said:—Lives in the Township of Pilkington near the track of the W. G. & B. Railway; know the prisoner by sight; never saw him before yesterday; am a married woman; have no family; prisoner came to my house yesterday about a quarter to 12 noon; he came down the railroad from Elora; he knocked at the door, and when I opened it he asked for a drink; after that he said he would wait till the train passed; he stood at the door, and after some time came in; did not invite him in; he leaned against the wall after he came in; after a while he asked for a needle to mend his coat; I gave him one; he then stood up beside the stove; I was attending to my own work all this time; he remained at the stove for a time, then he caught me as I was coming from the door; had got alarmed and went and looked out to see if I could see any one; he caught me as I was returning by the shoulder; we struggled; can't remember whether he said anything or not during the struggle; he then threw me down on the floor; I began to scream; he told me he would shoot me if I made any noise; had no weapon with him that I saw. Witness then described how prisoner tried to effect his purpose; he did not succeed in his object owing to the resistance I made; I begged him to let me go; after a little he got up, when I went out and ran to Mrs. Nickinson across one field; my husband was away at the time working on the railway; Mrs. Nickinson sent her son after my husband; I returned to my own house with her; she remained with me till he came; I informed him of what had happened as soon as he came home, in Mrs. Nickinson's presence; he at once went in search of the prisoner, whom I saw going down the track towards Guelph; he felt very sore from the shoulder to the small of the back; my neck is also very sore, being the effect of the prisoner's assault on me; knew nothing of the prisoner before; there was no one in the house at the time he made his attempt. Matilda Nickinson, sworn, said she was a widow, and near neighbor to Mrs. Husson. Have known her for a year. She bears a very respectable character. When she came to me yesterday she was in a dreadful state, and in great distress. She was crying. She told me that there was a man came into her house and tried to commit a rape on her. I accompanied her to her house, went from that to my place, and sent my son for her husband. Then returned to her house, and stayed till her husband came. Her husband came in about two o'clock. She informed him of what had happened in my presence. He took his coat, and along with my son, started down the railway in search of the prisoner. Never saw the prisoner before. Edward Osborn being sworn, said, as he was going to Elora on Wednesday forenoon he met the prisoner going down the track the way of Mrs. Husson's house. From the time I saw him, prisoner had plenty of time to be at her house at the time she named. The charge was then read over to the prisoner, and he was asked whether or not he was guilty. He did not seem to understand its nature, but replied he was subject to it, and "if they said it was so, he supposed it was."

He was then committed to stand his trial.

Alabama Claims Question.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 21.—The loss occasioned by the burning of the machine shops and engine house of the St. Paul & Sioux City Railway at Shakopee yesterday morning was over \$100,000, of which there was an insurance of but \$30,000.

Havana, Feb. 21.—Advices from the City of Mexico, up to the 15th inst., state that the supporters of Juarez were confident, but that the revolutionists seemed to be greatly encouraged by their early success in the north. Military law has been declared in the States of Jalisco and Jalisco, where the Government troops had suffered some reverses. The execution of the revolutionary chiefs is continued. At the latest advices all the States except Chihuahua and Mexico were affected by the revolution.

London, Feb. 22, 6 a. m.—The excitement over the Alabama claims is rapidly subsiding. The Times, alone of this morning's papers, discusses the subject, and urges a diplomatic solution of the question. It is understood that John Bright approves the conduct of the Government in the controversy.

The Daily Telegraph pronounces the report of Lord Northbrook's appointment to the Governor-Generalship of India premature.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 21.—Baron Von Offenbergh, new minister to the United States, will soon proceed to Washington.

Milwaukee, Feb. 21.—At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce to-day the Lake Cable Committee made a final report, in which the project was strongly recommended in view of the great railroad interests now centering at Grand Haven, Mich.

Confession of a Murderer.

TRAVIS CONFESSES TO THE CRIME.

John Travis, who was executed on Thursday in Toronto for the murder of a man named Johnston in the Township of Gwillimbury, has confessed to the murder to the Rev. Henry Harris, of the Primitive Methodist Church. The following is his statement to the minister:—

The day before the murder I went to Johnston's house, about three o'clock in the afternoon, and stayed there till evening. That evening there was service in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Johnston's boys and I went. I had no intention of staying at their house that night, but intended going home, which was about a mile and a quarter further on. The boys wished me to stay the whole night, and I complied, as we were on very friendly terms. The next morning Johnston was going to some village or town to buy furniture for his house. (He, Travis, told me the name of the place, but I have forgotten it.) As Johnston had to go past my house, I got into the sleigh. I never asked him if I might ride, for if I had I believe he would have refused. He seemed to have such an antipathy against me, I cannot understand why, as I never did him or his family any harm.

Mr. Harris adds: The young man could only assign one cause for Johnston's bitterness towards him, which was this: Travis was a volunteer, and one of the finest men in his company, so his lieutenant says. The volunteers last summer were called out for camp duty. At that time the young man was working for Johnston, and he took his company to Niagara very much against the will of Johnston, and since then he took a dislike to him. He said that when he got into the sleigh he had no intention of shooting him, but as they went along a feeling of revenge laid hold of him, and he took the pistol out of his pocket, and without speaking a word, shot Johnston dead.

Travis has conducted himself very quietly up to the latest moment. During last Monday he wrote a letter to Mr. Daniel McLean, Superintendent of Alice Street P. M. Sunday School; and one to Rev. Mr. Harris, spoken of above, full of contrition for the crime he had committed. The execution was ordered to take place at 9 o'clock this Thursday morning, as up to last night at least, no instruction had reached the Sheriff of any commutation of the sentence.

The License Question

To the Editor of the Mercury.

Sir,—On Monday evening last I was in the Council Chamber hearing what was said for and against allowing billiard rooms being open until eleven o'clock at night, and after listening to what was said on both sides of the question, could heartily endorse a remark made to me by a gentleman who stood next me, who when the vote was taken that negatived the request of those who wished billiard rooms to be kept open until eleven o'clock, said, "that is a righteous verdict;" and I would add it was one that those who gave it will never regret having given.

But, sir, when listening to what was said about petitions, I thought that the real sentiments of the ratepayers could be obtained without much difficulty if the Council would pass a By-law requiring that previous to any license being granted for a billiard room, or for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any hotel, tavern, saloon or shop, a vote of the ratepayers be taken whether the license applied for be granted or not. And as the object of the party seeking to obtain the license is to enrich himself, all expenses incurred by taking said vote shall be borne by him, sufficient sum to defray expenses being deposited by him in the hands of the Town Clerk before any action shall be taken in the matter.

Execution of Traviss.

His Deposition on the Scaffold.

Confesses his Intention to Murder Mrs. Johnson.

Toronto, Feb. 22.

Travis rose very early this morning, and, along with Rev. Mr. Rice and others, was occupied in prayer. At seven o'clock the burial service was read in the chapel in the presence of the prisoner. Travis afterwards partook of a light breakfast. About half-past eight he was pinioned, and seemed quite firm and composed, shedding, however, a few tears. He addressed those present, numbering about one hundred, who had been admitted by ticket. He stated that it had been his intention to have murdered Mrs. Johnson also, but that God had mercifully prevented him. He expressed his confidence in his Saviour, and hoped to meet his mother in Heaven. He knelt on the trap while the executioner was adjusting the rope. Rev. Mr. Curtis offered a short prayer. At a signal from the sheriff the drop fell and Travis dropped six feet. His neck was evidently instantly broken, as death was instantaneous, and almost without a struggle. His friends have applied for his body but it is not yet known whether the permission will be given to them to have it. Travis expressed a strong desire to be buried beside his mother.

THE RAILWAY AID RESOLUTIONS.

The principal business before the Legislature on Wednesday was the consideration of the resolutions...

The resolutions were then submitted and it was arranged that the House go into Committee on them to-day.

1. That, the Legislature having established a scheme for aiding in the construction of Railways, it is right that the public funds appropriated for that purpose should be adequate to the granting of aid to proper enterprises...

2. That towards accomplishing the object of the preceding resolution, it is expedient that the sum of \$400,000 be set apart from and out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of this Province...

3. That, towards accomplishing the same object, it is expedient that in further aid of railways a sum of one hundred thousand dollars yearly for twenty years should be set apart from and out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of this Province...

4. That no railway company of which any section is aided from the Railway Subsidy Fund shall be entitled to aid from the Railway Subsidy Fund in respect of such section.

5. That no railway company which does not come within the terms and provisions, and comply with the conditions of the Act in aid of railways, and any Act amending the same, shall be entitled to aid from the Railway Subsidy Fund.

6. That the provisions of the Act in Aid of Railways, and of any Act amending the same, shall, save in so far as they may be inconsistent with these resolutions, apply to the authorization and payment of any grant out of the Railway Subsidy Fund.

7. That the sum to be granted to any railway company out of the Railway Subsidy Fund shall not be less than one hundred and twenty dollars or more than two hundred and forty dollars, per mile per annum for twenty years.

8. That serps or certificates may be issued in respect of any grant out of the Railway Subsidy Fund after payment thereof has been duly authorized.

EDITORIAL ITEMS.

The Pope has asked permission of England and Austria for a meeting of the Ecumenical Council in their dominions.

The north shore mail has just arrived at Duluth, and by it the intelligence comes that McNab and party are all safe at Fort William.

Roger Cook, accused with stealing a span of horses from the premises of P. Gardiner, during the late fire near Kingston, has been sentenced to ten years in the Penitentiary.

The police authorities of Berlin have information that a man is concealed in the city who has sworn to take the life of Bismarck. Active search is going on for the would-be assassin.

The rumor prevails in Paris that King Amaleus, of Spain, meditates abdicating, on account of the unfavorable disposition of the Spanish people, and that his father, Victor Emmanuel, of Italy, counsels patience.

In the House of Commons Mr. Chas Dalrymple member for Buech, gave notice of his intention to ask the Government on Friday next, whether measures have been taken to prevent collisions between the American and Canadian fishermen during the coming fishing season.

Christies of the Bible. A man who was condemned to solitary confinement for life in a prison, relieved the tediousness of the years by ascertaining the following facts:—

The Bible contains 3,586,489 letters, 773,692 words, 31,173 verses, 1,189 chapters, and 66 books. The word "and" occurs 46,277 times; the word "Lord" occurs 1,845 times; the word "reverend" occurs but once, which is in the 9th verse of the 11th Psalm. The middle verse is the 8th verse of the 118th Psalm. The 21st verse of the 27th chapter of Ezra contains all the letters in the alphabet except the letter J. The first chapter to read is the 27th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. The 18th chapter of II. Kings and the 37th chapter of Isaiah are alike. The longest verse is in the 4th verse of the 8th chapter of Esther. The shortest verse is the 32nd verse of the 118th chapter of St. John. The 8th, 15th, 21st and 31st verses of the 19th Psalm are alike. All the verses of the 133rd Psalm end alike. There are no words or names of more than six syllables.

TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE RAILWAY.—At a meeting of the Directors of this company held yesterday, the tenders which had been received for the construction of the Bruce Extension from Mount Forest to Gorrie and Wroster station, were opened and considered. The Directors finally awarded the contract to Messrs. McKenzie & Co., Toronto and Owen Sound, their tender being the lowest. This firm is the same who last year secured the contract for the Northern Division of the Grey Extension of the line, the work of which has been so expeditiously pushed forward as to be now nearly completed and ready for the rails, although the date fixed in the contract for its completion is yet four months distant.

Sir Charles Dillie addressed his constituents on Monday night in opposition to monarchy. The proceedings passed off quietly.

Longfellow's niece has been formally initiated in the Roman Catholic faith at Boston.
