MONDAY EV'G, SEPT. 21, 1874 BANK DEFOSITS.—In an article in the Monetary Times, we learn that by the last published returns of our banks, the deposits belonging to the general public in their hands were as follows:—Payable on demand, \$34,-205,217; payable after notice, \$30,-215,519, making a total in our ordi-nary banks of \$64,510,736. This sum does not ivclude the deposits in four banks, one in Columbia, two in Prince Edward Island, and one in New Brunswick. It is calculated that about fourteen millions more are in deposit in the Government Post Office Savings' Banks and other insti-tutions. If the probable deposits in building Societies were added, they would swell the sum to eighty-five millions, which can be lifted imme-diately on short notice. This is a handsome amount to have at one's bankers, and it is creditable to the public that so much of it stands in their name, and to their credit. We are especially glad to observe that the Savings Banks contains or especi-able an amount as they do. These deposits are mostly in small sums, and are owned principally by the thrifty and economical among the working classes. It is gratifying to know that so many millions are laid up for a " rainy day." It is rumoured that Mr. M. C. 
