New YORK, Dec. 17.—A largely atten-ded meeting was held underthe auspices of the Manhattan circle of the fenian brother-hood this evening to take action in regard to the execution of O'Donnell. After a number of inflammatory speeches, resolu-tions were adopted calling on Irishmen all over the world to avenge the death of O'Donnell, and pledging the members of the brotherhood to renewed energy in strik-ing down "England, the enemy of Ireland, who sets at naught the laws of humanity and civilization." O'Donovan Rossa and Prof. Mezzeroff were among the speakers.
